HIGHWAY PROBE SESSIONS OVER

Investigation State Highway Commission Ends Taking Testimony At Night Meet.

LEGISLATURE TO ADJOURN

End of Legislative Term Enforces Close of Hearings—May Revive It Later On.

AUSTIN, March 5.—Prospects of an early adjournment of the legislature have virtually closed the investigation of the State Highway Commission investigation, according to Representative John C. Smith, leading investigator.

"Inasmuch as the end of the session is in sight there will probably be no additional testimony taken by the committee," Smith said in a statement read into the record at last night's session.

"Core drillings may be taken on some highways which have been under investigation," Smith said, "to test the system of paving in use and the investigation may be revived in the event of a special session of the legislature."

STATE ABOUT TO PAY FOR CAPITOL

Bill Under Consideration for Belated Payment \$20,000 on Site Where Capitol Stands.

COMMITTEE VOTE FAVORABLE

Bill Whittled Down from \$100,000 To \$20,000—Payable to Heirs Original Owner.

AUSTIN, March 5.—Recommendation that the state make belated payment of twenty thousand dollars for the capitol site were made by the senate finance committee today.

The committee recommended that an appropriation for that amount be made for settlement with Mrs. Kate Chambers, and Mrs. Dallas Chambers-McGregor, heirs of General D. J. Chambers for land secured for the capitol fifty years ago.

The bill as originally introduced called for \$100,000 payment.

A permit was issued to Jack Fulgham as owner and contractor, for a stucco dwelling on Pine street, estimated cost, \$3,000. A permit was also issued to Frank Elliott, with Jack Fulgham contractor, for a dwelling on lot 3 block 4, Pine street, with the estimated cost placed at \$5,500.

Ford Motor Co. Pays Huge Sum For Its Labor

DETROIT, March 5.—Figures released today by the Ford Motor Co. show more than a quarter of a billion dollars paid out last year by that concern in salaries and wages. Salaries paid amounted to \$172,820,125.

Other plants and branches throughout the country spent \$72,532,476 in salaries, while expenses paid by the Lincoln Motor Co. and other Ford organizations totaled \$8,650,000.

AMNESTY BILL MEETS REVERSE

State Senate Votes 75 to 59 Against Suspension of Rules to Consider Measure.

SENATE CALENDAR IS UP

Bills Numbered Up to 210 Will Be Considered—Ferguson Measure Is Number 252.

AUSTIN, March 5.—Another reverse vote went up against the Ferguson amnesty measure today when the house refused suspension of constitutional rules relative to special orders by a vote of 75 to 59.

The move lost as it failed to secure a two-thirds majority. The calendar under which the senate is considering bills includes all bills up to No. 210. The amnesty bill is No. 252.

REMODEL HOUSE

Harvey House in Santa Fe Yards Being Worked Over for Serving Meals to Passengers.

Superintendent Menger and assistant superintendent Smith of the Fred Harvey system were in Sweetwater this week in connection with the remodeling of the Harvey House here and a force of painters and decorators are already on the ground to begin improvements on the dining room of the Harvey House as a result of the change in schedule of Santa Fe passenger trains which becomes effective the fifteenth of this month.

"The Santa Fe will make great improvements in the house here," C. A. McCorkle, manager of the Harvey system here said. "The dining room will be remodeled and redecorated, and equipped throughout with new furnishings."

A force of chefs, dining room girls and other employes are expected to arrive here at once, it was reported, to get things in shape for the new train schedule. When the change is made on the 15th, the local Harvey House will be prepared to serve lunch for passengers on No. 91 from Brownwood which will arrive in Sweetwater at 12:40 p. m. instead of 1 a. m. as formerly. Present plans call for serving of meals to the passengers on this train at the Harvey House in the north edge of town while the train pulls in to the down-town station.

Mr. and Mrs. McCorele, who for the past 5 years have had charge of the dining room and rooming house for Santa Fe employes here, will continue to manage the rooming house. The new manager of the dining room of the Harvey House has not been named as yet.

BUY THEATERS

Robb and Rowley Add to Theater Holdings in San Angelo—Now Largest Owners.

SAN ANGELO, March 5.—H. B. Robb and Ed Rowley, operating under the name of Robb and Rowley closed a deal with Frank Roberts and John D. Jones by which they become the owners of the Lyric Theater and take over the leases of the Palace and the Crystal. This adds three more shows to their string, which now includes 36 picture theaters. Consideration was said to have been in the neighborhood of \$50,000 to Jones for the operation of all the theaters.

The deal will be formally closed in Dallas on March 10. Mr. Rowley will come to San Angelo immediately and go over the situation here in detail. He says he will have an announcement that will be very interesting to San Angelo people. Both said they were glad to get back to "the old home town."

Mr. Robb and Mr. Rowley went into the picture show business in San Angelo ten years ago when in conjunction with Mr. Robb's father they operated a roof garden on the Neeley Building now occupied by the J. E. Young Co. In this time they have developed into the largest picture show operators in Texas, owning more individual theaters than any other independent concern in the state.

TOWN IS GROWING

HERMLEIGH One of Most Progressive Towns in Scurry County.

HERMLEIGH, March 5.—Sited in the east portion of Scurry county in the center of splendid farming and ranch land located on the Santa Fe and Koscoe-Snyder railroads, Hermleigh has progressed and expanded steadily during the past few years and the town is now contemplating more improvements which will really bring it up out of the village class, stepping into the town class.

The town has 5 churches, Methodist, two Baptists, Christian, and Catholic, with services held in each every Sunday. An excellent school with 8 teachers under Superintendent Watson, is maintained, but an epidemic of flu has cut down on attendance recently.

The business part of town includes five filling stations, two garages, two meat markets, 3 cotton gins with a fourth under construction, 3 groceries, 3 dry goods concerns, one lumber yard and several smaller businesses.

There has been some discussion relative to the location of a wholesale concern here and further developments are expected in the near future.

FIND WIFE DEAD ENGINEER HELD

Winnie Anderson on International Great Northern Railway Arrested for Wife's Death.

BUTCHER KNIFE WAS USED

Throat Slashed—Engineer Is Alleged To Have Confessed to Crime According Reports.

PALESTINE, Texas, March 5.—Winnie Anderson, 40, passenger engineer of the International and Great Northern Railway, is under arrest here today in connection with the death of his wife, who was found murdered in the bedroom of their home here last Wednesday. The woman's throat was cut with a butcher knife.

The body was found by neighbors. Anderson was notified of his wife's death at Longview, midway on his daily run. He is alleged to have confessed to the crime when taken into custody upon his return here, according to reports. No motive for the slaying has been advanced.

Dawes Razed In Senate for Talk On Rules Change

WASHINGTON, March 5.—Resentment over the inaugural address of vice president Dawes, demanding of the senate that it revise its rules, broke out on the floor when the upper house convened in special session today.

With Dawes personally in charge, Senators Reed, Mo., Democrat, and Ashurst, Ariz., Democrat, found opportunity to "razz" the vice president on points of his "personal privileges."

ITALIAN TROOPS FIGHT IN EGYPT

Cross Boundary of Western Egypt and Attack Caravan, According To London Dispatch.

KILL 15 OF CARAVAN

All Troops With Caravan Either Killed or Taken Prisoner—Egyptians Are Mobilizing

LONDON, March 5.—Italian troops crossed the western boundary of Egypt, attacked a caravan, killed 15 and took the remaining persons prisoners, according to dispatches to the Daily Chronicle-Herald of London.

All the troops with the caravan were killed or carried away. Egyptian authorities in the meantime were busy mobilizing troops at garrison on Sollum.

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DAWES PLAN NOT POPULAR AT ALL

Demand of New Vice President For Change in Rules Will Be Ineffective, Leaders Say.

HAS BEEN ASKED BEFORE

New Set of Rules for Senate Advocated Many Times in Previous Years—Got Nowhere

WASHINGTON, March 5.—The Dawes bomb exploded in the Senate yesterday by the new vice-president demanding that the time worn rules of the Senate be revised to expedite business that organization will be ineffective, leaders on both sides declared today.

This policy in the Senate will rob that body of its entire legislative authority and delegate it to the status of the senates of foreign governments which have in recent years lost power.

Senator Charles E. Curtis, Republican floor leader, Reed Smoot, Utah, Moses, New Hampshire, and Jones of Washington, declared today that it will be impossible to carry out the suggestions of Dawes.

They pointed out that the idea had been advanced many times in recent years but had never been successful.

SELL HALF FAIR STOCK IN NOLAN

Over Half Stock Issue in Nolan County Fair Subscribed Up To Thursday, Reported.

SWEETWATER IS BUYING

Nearly 150 of 200 Shares Sold Purchased in Sweetwater—Fair Plans Under Way.

Over half of the stock in the Nolan County Fair has been sold to Nolan county people up to Thursday, according to directors of the Fair association. Meaning, the sale for more stock holders will continue until the full quota of 400 shares are disposed of, and arrangements can proceed towards the securing of a charter from the secretary of state.

Of the approximately 200 shares that have so far been sold, nearly 150 shares have been sold in Sweetwater proper, it was reported. The campaign in the city is not yet concluded, and every one will have an opportunity to become a stock holder in the fair association before the drive is ended. It is urged that every person in the county purchase at least one share of fair stock in order that the campaign may go over the top. Those who are able are asked to purchase several shares. The shares are selling at \$25 each, with one half payable when the stock is bought and the balance some time next fall. Half the money must be paid in by all the stock holders before a charter will be granted.

At the same time a committee of over 20 Sweetwater citizens, both men and women, are conducting drives here, workers in various communities over the county are carrying on the campaign in the rural sections. Indications are that a large amount of stock holders will be represented by county residents. Practically all the farmers and ranchmen in the county are showing great interest in the fair proposition, it was reported.

It is hoped to sell the remaining 200 old shares within the next few days and submit the application for a charter.

When these arrangements are completed, plans will begin to take definite form for next year's event which will be staged, it is said, on a more extensive basis than the fair of 1924. Preliminary plans are already under way towards the programs, events and attractions for this year's fair which will probably be held late in October.

INAUGURATED

Calvin Coolidge has placed his hand upon the Bible and taken the oath of office as President of the United States. In doing so the chief executive becomes most inaugurated man in the history of the United States. When he followed through the simple ceremonies at the capitol, he established the record of being inaugurated into high office eight times in the past nine years.

Like the novel hero and strangely like the history of nearly all great men, Calvin Coolidge was born of poor parents and through his own determination, character and ability climbed the heights. His father, plain, God-fearing old John Coolidge, contributed much to his son's sterling character, the foundation of which was built on that bleak and barren little farm nestled among the rugged hills of Vermont.

And now this father, who administered the oath under which his son, up to Wednesday served as the nation's chief executive, journeyed from the farm down to the capitol to see Calvin take the oath of his

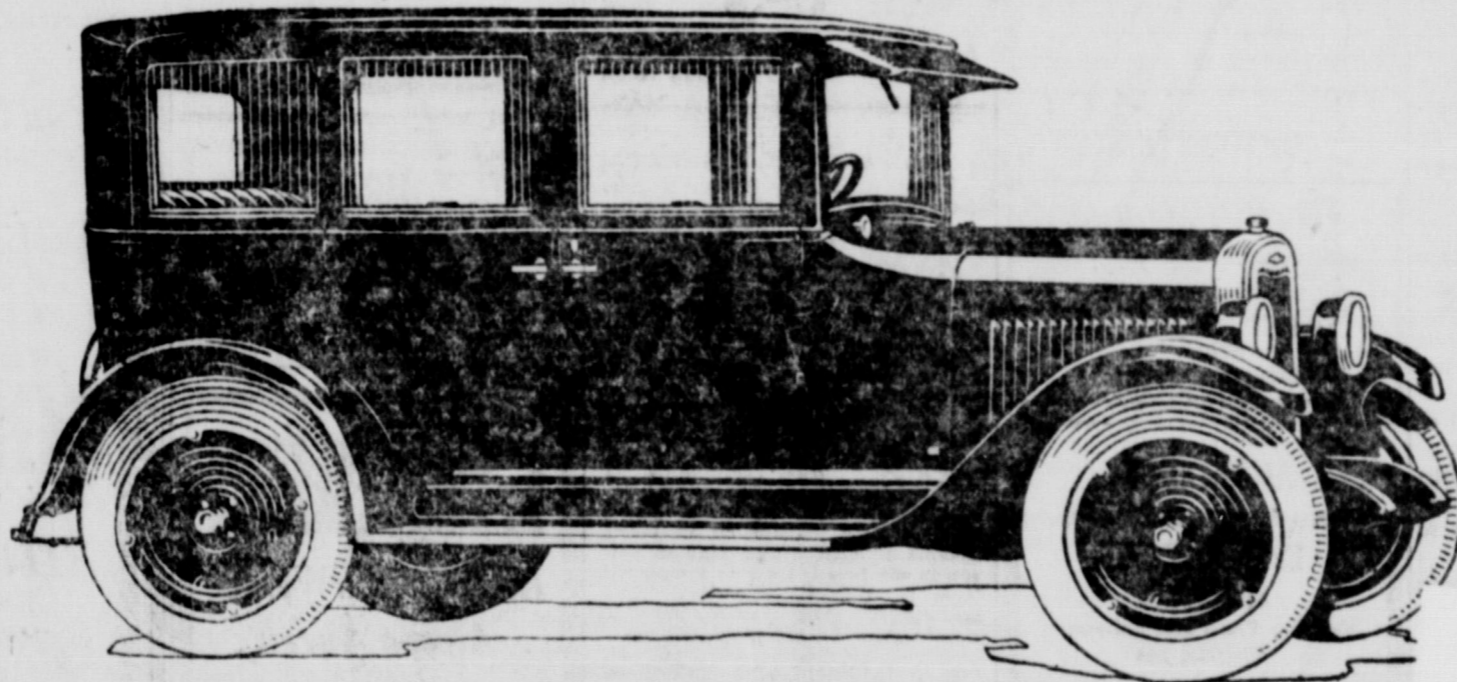

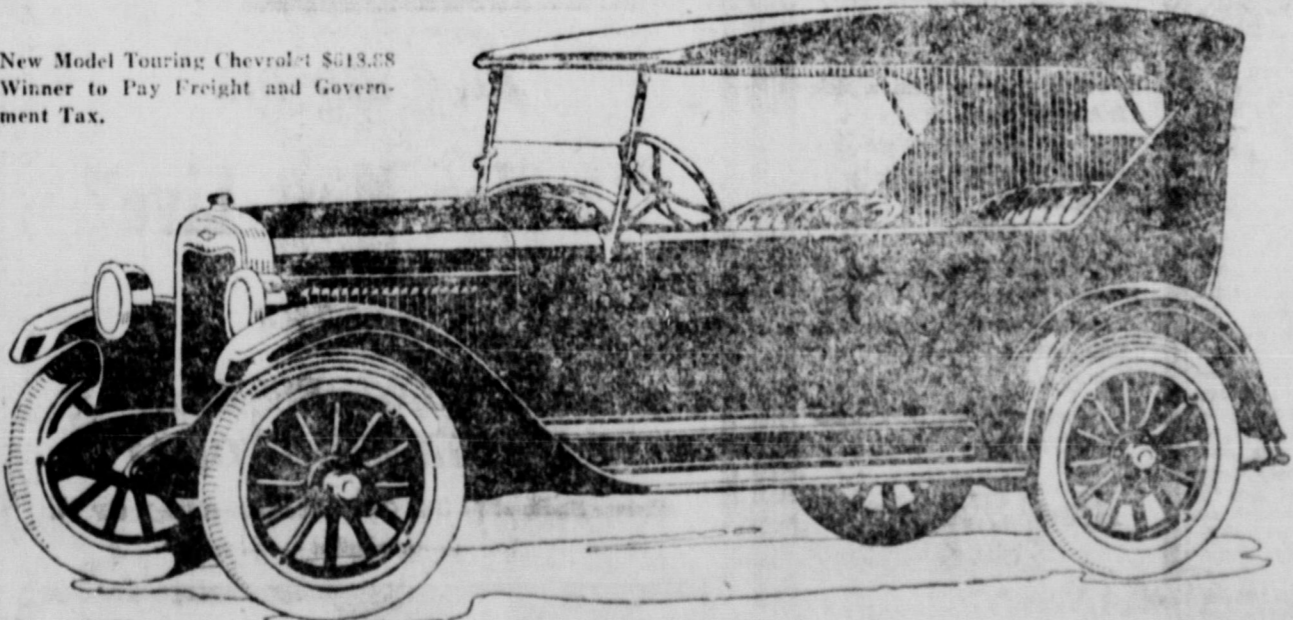

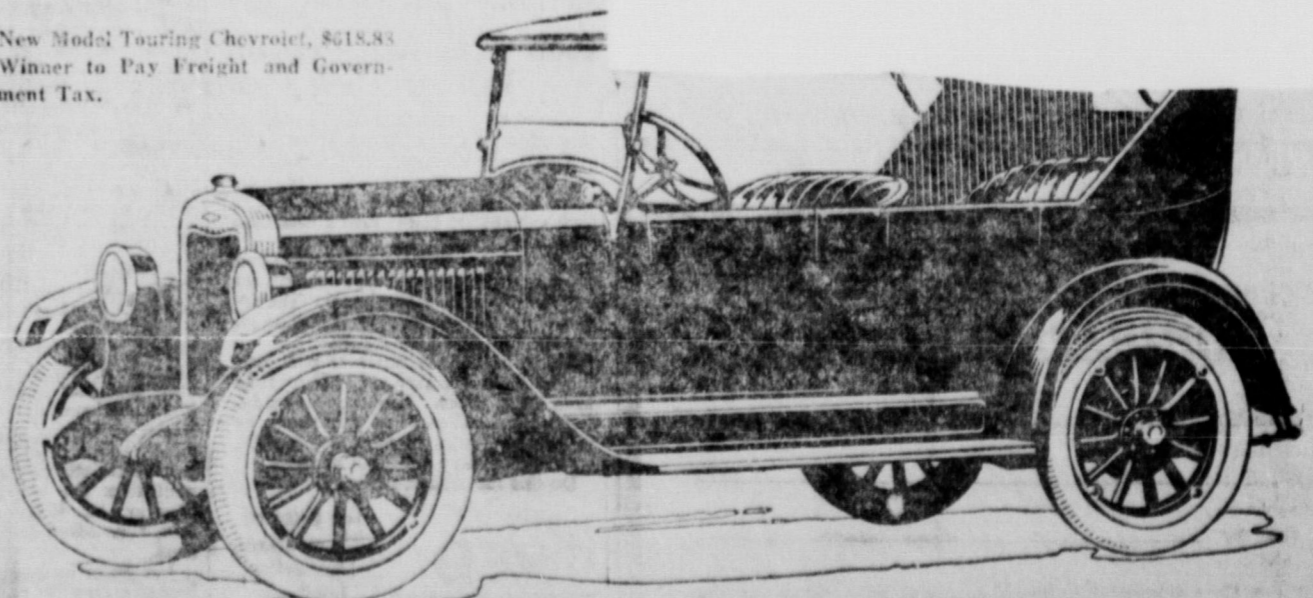
