

Star Lites

JUST ABOUT THE time you think you've heard it all: sure enough, you haven't!

Guess what the federal government (at least its agency) classifies as an air pollutant? None other than the smell given off at bakeries of the delightful loaves of bread they are producing.

It seems that according to the Environmental Protection Agency, when bread bakes, it releases ethanol, which is classified as a volatile organic compound, but a non-toxic one. Ethanol released into the air in this process contributes to the creation of ozone, with which some large cities have a problem.

The experts have admitted that the bakeries' creation of ozone, compared for instance, to automobiles, would be like a fly in the Astrodome.

According to Gene Hall, public relations director for Farm Bureau. the DPA's order to the bakeries would cost Mrs. Baird's, one of the state's largest bakeries, \$4.5 million to install the equipment, plus an additional \$2.5 million annually to maintain.

"Perhaps Mrs. Baird's can absorb this without serious damage to its bottom line. Maybe it won't have to lay anyone off or raise the price of bread. Maybe it won't have any effect on new jobs that the company might have created. Maybe pigs can fly!" Hall says.

This is just a small window on the process of government. Create an army of regulators, and you can expect them to regulate. Make sure that no cost-benefit analysis is done and the regulators won't care about the cost. Multiply this times hundreds of situations and you begin to see how regulations are strangling the economy.

Such organizations as LULAC and TRLA (Texas Rural Legal Aid) use tax moneys to bring lawsuits against entities such as schools, cities, counties, and even businesses and individuals, in many cases costing taxpayers additional thousands (or millions) of dollars,

as they have locally. These organizations attempt to use the legal system to gain IMMEDIATELY what the minority leaders feel they should have in rights and representation, rather than working through the system, as have other minority groups throughout history.

In spite of the fact that they caused the thousands of dollars of expense locally (which went to fatten the pockets of downstate law firms), LULAC is still going to have to work through the system to achieve its goals, despite being given the advantage of the compound voting rule in some



Calf Project Is **Educational For** 4-H Youngsters

Parmer County youngsters ages 5-12 are invited to participate in the 1994 4-H Bucket Calf Project, according to Gary Patterson, Parmer County Extension Agent.

Youth will learn to care for calves from a few days up to four months 1-1/2 teaspoon salt of age. They will attend monthly weigh-days through the summer when 8 ounce lasagne noodles (wide) calves weight gains will be monitored.

A program will be presented at each weigh day on a variety of topics ranging from animal health and disease prevention to nutrition and feeding. The project ends with the annual bucket calf show held in August. Project participants will maintain simple records of their project, as well.


"This project was developed to minimize competition and maximize the learning opportunities," said Patterson. "Our goal is to get as many kids as possible exposed to the value of caring for an animal project. The daily care for a calf helps teach young people responsibility. This has been a tremendous project."

Guidelines for the project are simple. Calves are bought during May or early June. Calves need to be started on a milk replacer then gradually weaned to feed. Records are kept on the expenses of the project. All participants will receive awards at the completion of the project.

In the fall of 1965, Estelle 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper Caffey was teaching home economics and sponsoring Future 2 tablespoons butter Homemakers of America in Friona 1/8 teaspoon nutmeg High School.

A money making project sponsored by one of the cooking classes was a Tasting Bee. Each member of the class was required to prepare one dish for the bee and furnish the recipe which she had used to prepare it.

These recipes were typed and combined to make a cookbook with the title "F.H. Cookin'." Since copying machines were unknown at this time, the sheets were mimeographed and stapled together.

We're taking our recipes from this publication.

Roman Holiday By Terri Sue Cummings 1/2 cup Crisco

1 large onion, chopped 4 cups cooked spaghetti 2 pounds ground beef

2 teaspoons salt 1/4 teaspoon pepper 3 cups canned tomatoes

1-1/2 cup grated cheese Fry onions in Crisco. Add beef and seasonings. Cook five minutes. Place a layer of spaghetti in baking dish. Add meat mixture and drippings. Then add another layer of spaghetti. Pour in tomatoes and sprinkle with grated

cheese. Cover and bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees. Remove cover and bake another ten minutes. Lasagne By Crista Evans

2 tablespoons salad oil 2 cloves crushed garlic 1-1/2 pound ground beef 1-8 ounce can tomato sauce

1 cup tomato juice 1/4 teaspoon pepper

1/2 pound sliced mozzarella or mild cheese

Brown ground beef and garlic in oil, then add next four items and simmer 29 minutes. While this mixture is simmering, cook noodles in boiling water, to which salt has been added, about fifteen minutes. Drain. Fill buttered casserole dish with alternate layers of noodles, mozzarella or mild cheese, beef-garlic mixture, cottage cheese, tomato sauce and parmesan cheese, finishing with a layer of tomato sauce and parmesan. Bake uncovered 30 minutes at 375 degrees.

Reeve Visits D.C. With Farm Group

22 agricultural leaders from across the state visited Congressmen and as part of a fact-finding mission on the whole thing." the upcoming 1995 Farm Bill

Floyd Reeve of Friona was one of 13 agricultural producers, who represent every region of Texas, on the state's largest general farm organization's Farm Bill Advisory Committee. The committee was accompanied on the Washington, D.C. trip by the TFB Board of Directors.

As Congress develops plans for the 1995 Farm Bill, one overriding concern will be budget factors. Reeve said. Farm program spending has been cut an average of 9 per cent in each of the last four years. It has fallen from a high of \$25 billion in 1986 to a low of \$9 billion last year.

Sen. Bob Dole of Kansas, Senate minority leader, told the group it was too early in the legislative process to tell what the budget for farm program spending would be. Other estimates during the three-day Washington trip ranged from \$6 to \$12 billion budgeted for farm programs.

House Ag Committee Chairman Kika de la Garza (D-Texas) told the committee to develop a wish list

WASHINGTON, D.C.--Some for the '95 Farm Bill. But he also warned them to be realistic.

"Everything is budget driven," government officials here recently he said. "We may have to revamp

After hearing the different debate on behalf of the Texas Farm views, Floyd expressed "cautious optimism" among the committee members.

> "I believe, however, that we may be able to constructively design a program that will work for Texas farmers and ranchers," he said. "And maybe there will be enough budget to make it work."

> U. S. Representative Charles Stenholm (D-Texas) told the group that coalition building will be vital to agriculture in the upcoming

He said one ally might be environmental groups. Another ally might be consumer groups, especially those with an interest in the quantity of food.

"Somehow, in the debate, we have to enlist the support of those in the hunger and nutrition community to be with producers, so we can continue to have a blessing of an abundance of quantity, and at the same time, deal with the quality and safety side of the equation," Stenholm said.

The group also met with Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison (R-Texas), U. S. Representative Bill Sarpalius (D-Texas) and U. S. Representative Pat Roberts (R-Kansas). Following three days in Washington, the group flew to Dekalb, Illinois, where they held a meeting with Illinois Farm Bureau members and the Illinois Farm Bureau Board.

"I think our committee has been stimulated, for sure, by all the information we've been exposed to. We're anxious to get back home and go to work, formulating what we'd like to see in a farm program," Reeve concluded.

Nine grandchildren, fourteen great-grandchildren and three greatgreat-grandchildren also survive.

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
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

Longtime Resident Gives Family Historical Sketch

Lessie Carter Watson, the mother of six, grandmother of twelve, great-grandmother of thirtyfour and great-great-grandmother of three, spent Mother's Day visiting in the home of a son-in-law and

Mrs. Watson, a native Texan, has lived in Parmer County sixtyseven years. She was born in rural Bell County between Killeen and Belton and grew up in the same community.

daughter, Harold and Jamie Lu

Lillard, who live in Waco.

She was the eighth of nine children born to E.J. and Martha Jane Smith Carter, and was married to James Milton Watson, April 13, 1913.

The Watsons moved to Parmer County with five daughters, Martha Evelyn, Lorraine, Doris, Helen and Jamie Lu, fourteen years later. Another daughter, Macie Kathryn, was born later.

As the oldest of the family, Martha Evelyn, was asked to compose the opening paragraph of the family story. Each of the other five was asked to provide information concerning her family.

Their responses follow: Martha: "Lessie Carter and James Milton Watson were married in Bell County, Texas, in 1913. They farmed for a few years in a small community near Belton and Killeen, Texas. He then worked several years for the Southern Pacific Railroad in New Mexico and California. In 1925, they purchased 160 acres from 'The Syndicate.'

"Mother and five children rode the train from Sanger, California to our grandparents' home in Central Texas, where we stayed until our house on the farm was almost

"Daddy, accompanied by a small mongrel dog named "Sputter," drove a Model T Ford carrying our household belongings

over mountains and across the desert in late summer. "Our father began farming as a neighbor built our house. Upon its near completion, Daddy drove the Ford to Central Texas to bring his family home. We camped out one

night on the trip back as it was just

too far to complete the journey in one day. "The most memorable event was keeping our eyes closed at the command of our father given at the base of the escarpment near Post until he asked us to open them. The Model T chugged upward and

upon command, the most

amazingly level land as far as eye could see lay before us. "Our youngest sister was born here ending hopes of a male child to help with the farm work. Those years were a struggle but with all the family involved in plowing, picking, heading, milking, feeding

hogs and raising chickens, we survived. "However, our father was one of the most pitied men in the area...a farmer and just girls! The Dust Bowl and Great Depression

were additional burdens.

"I married Robert L. Bates in 1938. We both taught in area schools. He coached girls' basketball, was a grade school principal then superintendent in Channing, Estelline and Sunray Schools. He died of a heart attack in 1967.

"Our sons are Phillip and Dwight.

"Phillip married Gretchwin Brown and they are parents of six children. Phillip served in the Air Force as an officer in the Minuteman Missile Program, retiring after 20 years. He and Gretchwin are now teachers: he in math in Lubbock and she has art in Levelland Middle School.



Mutual Fund Prospectuses May Change

Before purchasing a mutual fund, an investor must be given a prospectus. The prospectus describes the history and background of the fund's managers, the fund's objectives, financial statement and other essential data. This requirement was established by the Investment Company Act of 1940, and it has prevailed virtually untouched since then.

However, the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) is now considering streamlining the prospectus requirement to allow sellers of mutual funds to provide a summary prospectus rather than the traditional version. A summary prospectus would still have to include all key information about the mutual fund and would be subject to full prospectus liability under the Securities Act, but it would be written in a more concise, easy-to-read format than the traditional prospectus.

The Investment Company Institute (ICI), the national association of the mutual fund industry, strongly supports the SEC's proposal. Craig S. Tyle, vice president for securities matters at ICI, says the summary prospectus would make it easier for investors to assess and compare mutual funds while eliminating extra costs and delays. Investors mutual fund shares.

> would have the option of purchasing fund shares without waiting for a current prospectus. Buying mutual fund shares would become similar to buying bank and insurance products, which are not subject to any prospectus delivery

> However, some trade associations believe the proposal is unfair. The Independent Bankers Association of America and the American Bankers Association says that because banks are required to disclose account fees, conditions on receipt of advertised yields and withdrawal penalties, mutual fund sellers also should be required to provide as much information.

> According to Tyle, the investor protection provisions that apply to the banking industry are less stringent than those of the summary prospectus proposal. The only change that would be made under the SEC proposal would be to allow investors to purchase mutual funds without waiting for a prospectus--just like purchasers of bank products are allowed to do.

> Whatever the outcome, there is no doubt that mutual fund representatives will still be required to give a prospectus to every investor. It is also clear that the prospectus will continue to provide all essential information. The only question seems to be whether the prospectus will have to be given to investors before they purchase

Color Blindness

Fact: dogs may be color-blind, but people aren't. What we call "color-blind" is a genetically inherent color deficiency that makes it hard to recognize certain shades. The deficiency is more common in males, showing

ip in one man out of 12. Females are much less likely to have this fault; only one in 200 women do. There is no "cure."

In almost every case, the color-blind person sees the primary colorsred, blue and green--in incorrect proportions. Pastel shades are almost impossible for them to identify, and even bright color recognition may cause trouble in times of stress or fatigue. A few cannot see all three of the primary colors, so they have difficulty telling red from green or orange from purple.

The classic test for color-blindness presents letters or numbers in various shades of pink dots against a field of pale green dots of the same color intensity; the color-blind person cannot see the letters or numbers. In some case, filters or tinted contact lenses can help.

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
