CITY OVER RULES PAVING PROTESTS

Objections Made At Former Hearing
Downed By Commission—Order
Property Owners Assessed

SIGN T - P CONTRACT

Finis Written On Crossing Hazards
As Seal is Stamped On Contract
—Covers All Agreements.

Overruling all protest and objections presented by property owners at the paving hearing Thursday of last week, the city commission in regular session Thursday afternoon took the final step in the combination paving-crossing elimination project when, following an unanimous vote, signatures of the mayor and city secretary, and the city seal, were affixed to a contract between the City of Sweetwater and the Texas and Pacific Railroad whereby the city would fulfill its agreement to pave South First, North First and sundry other streets, and the Texas and Pacific would construct a concrete subway over Mustang street and move its yards from the present location.

Removal of a crossing menace of many years duration is seen in the signing of the contract which will be returned to Dallas for the signatures of Texas and Pacific officials. The contract covers identically verbal agreement reached in a conference between city officers and T-P officers here last winter.

In short, the contract states that the city of Sweetwater shall pave approaches and construct sidewalks and through the proposed subway, and order paving of streets leading to the underground crossing.

The T-P obligation, as a result of the contract, are to remove the present pile trestle over Mustang street and construct there a reinforced concrete subway; and to move their switching tracks from the present congested district. Another step to be taken by the Texas and Pacific will be the closing of Halley and McCauley street crossings. The ordinance is to become effective with the completion of the concrete subway.

As shown in a blue print of the proposed subway accompanying the contract, the structure will be of reinforced concrete, with two driveways. The drives are 16 feet wide each. The two sidewalks are 6 feet 3 inches each. There are a clearance over the roadway of 12 feet 6 inches.

In connection with voting to overrule all protests filed at the paving hearing last week, the commission Thursday afternoon unanimously adopted another ordinance ordering assessments on property owners along streets affected in the project for their portion of the street paving costs.

Banker Suicides; Examiners Claim Account Straight

NEW BOSTON, Texas, March 13.—Marshal N. Morris, assistant cashier of the State Exchange Bank here, shot and killed himself last night. The body with a bullet hole in the forehead, was found by the bank janitor this morning.

Officials advanced no motive for the act. Bank examiners said Morris' account was all right. A coroner's jury reported the death as the result of a wound self-inflicted.

QUAIL SENT HERE

Game Commissioner of Texas Sends Nolan County 25 Bob Whites—Plan Increase of Quail.

A crate of 25 quail has been received by Roy Costephens from the Game, Fish and Oyster Department of Texas, and the birds have been set loose at various ranches over the county.

The department at Austin is sending shipments of quail to many counties over the state. The plans are to build up a better breed of quail, and increase the number of this fast disappearing bird.

Quail are being distributed by W. W. Bord, State Game, Fish and Oyster Commissioner, and are sent free to counties in Texas.

The Sweetwater Salty Pups suffered a 9 to 1 defeat at the hand of the Hamlin, Jones County, high school nine in the first game of the season Thursday afternoon. The game was played at Hamlin.

Coach Joe Gibson took a big flock of candidates to Hamlin for the initial game, giving tryouts to a number of rookies who are fighting for a berth on the Salty Pup aggregation.

The Hamlin nine outplayed the local team from the start, taking advantage of the inexperience of the majority of local players who were able to score only one lone tally in the ninth Webbs and Fitzgerald handled the mound work for the Pups, showing good stuff that will improve as the season wears along.

BUILD BIG SHOW

Ed Rowley Announces \$715,000 Investment in San Angelo—To Book Biggest Shows.

Robb and Rowley of Dallas, who recently bought the Lyric and Palace theaters in San Angelo and leased the Crystal expect to begin within ninety days the building in San Angelo of a larger theater that will seat 1,200 to 1,400 people and will cost approximately \$160,000 when completely equipped. The theater will be ready in the fall.

Ed H. Rowley made this announcement Thursday evening while in Sweetwater, enroute to Dallas. The site for the new theater has not been selected, several locations being under consideration. Completion of plans must await deals in other cities which give Robb and Rowley a circuit of 36 theaters in thirteen Texas and Oklahoma towns, as it was explained.

The chain of thirty-six theaters will enable Robb and Rowley to book the highest class shows. H. B. Robb will go to New York soon to contract for a half dozen of the feature attractions to come to Texas next fall and winter and play in R. R. Theaters exclusively.

"Everyone can't go to New York and we intend to bring the cream of Broadway's entertainments to Texas," said Mr. Rowley.

COOLIDGE PLANS WAR FOR WARREN

Administration Marshaling All Its Strength to Put Over Attorney General After Refusal.

OPponents ARE ACTIVE

Democratic-Independent Senate Coalition Preparing to Refuse Nomination Again.

WASHINGTON, March 13.—With the nomination of Charles B. Warren as attorney general again rejected by the Senate Judiciary Committee, Republican leaders apparently lost hope for a movement to force a final vote by tomorrow night.

The Committee voted 9 to 7 to present an adverse vote on the nomination in the Senate. In view of the preliminary defeat at the outset, and the fact that opposition to Warren seems unchanged despite intense pressure from the White House, some Republicans believe there is no reason to drag the controversy through a prolonged fight.

WASHINGTON, March 13.—In an attempt to establish once for all the right of a president to select his own cabinet, President Coolidge today marshalled all the forces of the administration to put over his second attempt to have Charles Beecher Warren nominated as Attorney General.

Contemplating a second refusal in the Senate, Democratic and Independent Coalition Senators opposed to Warren prepared to repudiate the nomination with as much speed and precision as the president showed in resubmitting the name after it had once been rejected.

Se confident were opponents that only a cursory session of the Senate Judiciary Committee was held this morning. A more complete defense of Warren in connection with the big sugar deals which have come under the scrutiny of the Courts and Federal Trade Commission is anticipated.

SINK CRUISER

Japan Fulfills Treaty Obligation By Sinking Big War Ship.

TOKYO, March 13.—The battleship Tosa, sunk recently in Bungo strait by the Japanese navy, ended Japan's obligations as far as reduction of capital ships is concerned as required by the Washington treaty signed three years ago. It was the thirteenth vessel of Japan's navy scrapped in accordance with that agreement.

The coast defense ship Shikishima, 14,580 tons, built in 1898, was dismantled at the Sasebo Naval Arsenal in Japan, 1924, and is kept as a national monument. The Asahi, also a first class coast defense ship, 14,765 tons, built in 1899, was dismantled at the Yokosuka Naval Arsenal in January 1924. The battleship Settsu, 20,900 tons, built in 1910, was used as a target and sunk off the Kure Naval Arsenal on February 16, 1924. The coast defense ship Hizen, 12,700 tons, built in 1900, was torpedoed in the Bungo Strait on July 25, 1924.

The battleships Satsuma 19,350 tons built in 1906, and Aki, 19,800 tons, built in 1907, were torpedoed outside Tokyo Bay on September 2 and 7 respectively, in 1924. The battleship Kashima, 16,400 tons, built in 1905, and the second class cruiser Chikuma, 4,100 tons, built in 1911, were purchased by the government and scrapped by the Mitsubishi Dockyards at Nagasaki in November, 1924. The battle cruiser Ibuki, 14,620 tons, built in 1907, was purchased and scrapped by the Kawasaki Dockyards in December 1924. The battleship Kurama, 14,620 tons, built in 1907, a sister ship of the Ibuki, was purchased and scrapped by the Kobe Seikoji in January of this year. The Abagi was scrapped at the Yokosuka Naval Arsenal in July, 1924; and the Tosa, originally designed to be the largest battleship in the Japanese Navy, was sunk February 9.

GOVERNOR AMNESTY HAS COURT INQUIRY BILL ABRUPTLY ENDS

Governor Ferguson Gets Bill Passed By Legislature Restoring Civil Rights to Farmer Jim

AMENDMENT IS LOST WITNESSES LEAVE HASTILY

Opponents of Measure Attempt Amendment—"Amnesty Not To Condone Previous Acts."

AUSTIN, March 13.—Governor Ferguson had on her desk today the Woodward Bill to restore to citizenship her husband, former Governor James E. Ferguson, lost by virtue of his impeachment and removal from state funds.

The House late yesterday placed its stamp of approval on the bill by a vote of 78 to 51 in the face of a final attempt by opponents of the measure to attach an amendment providing that the Amnesty act was not considered to have condoned or vindicated J. E. Ferguson, for the acts for which he was impeached.

Five Little Tots Wait With Mother For Parton Daddy

AUSTIN, March 13.—Weary from a 2-day overland trip from Dallas, and crying, 5 tots, all under 10 years, lugged at their mother's skirt at the entrance of Governor Miriam A. Ferguson's office today, waiting until the wife and mother could lay a plea before the State executive for the life of their father.

The little group waited patiently for an opportunity to see the woman Governor, hoping again a freedom from death for T. Wees—sentenced to die in the electric chair at Huntsville April 3, upon conviction of murder of Willis Champion, Das jail employe killed in an attempt jail break in October 1923. Wees is now in the death cell at Huntsville.

Chicago Unites To Fight Deadly Unknown Disease

CHICAGO, March 13.—Business men, police, fire departments and all physicians were asked today by health commissioner Dr. Herman Bundezen to assist him in fighting the influenza-like outbreak which is daily increasing the toll of life and illness.

A total of 112 new cases of influenza and pneumonia were reported to Dr. Bundezen up to 10 a. m. today. Several new deaths add to the 239 fatalities since March 1, according to the health department.

Two new trans-continental trains will be routed via Amarillo, giving double daily service between Chicago and California.

No. 1 the new westbound train, will leave Chicago, 10:45 a. m., Kansas City 11:20 p. m., arrive Amarillo 6:40 p. m., leave 7:10 p. m., connecting at Canyon with Plainview District Train at 7:40 p. m., and arrive in Los Angeles 11:00 a. m. the second day.

No. 10, the eastbound, will leave Los Angeles 10:00 p. m., arrive Amarillo 7:40 p. m., leave 8:35 p. m., arrive Kansas City 5:10 p. m. and Chicago 7:25 a. m.

Train No's. 21 and 22 will be operated as heretofore with but slight change in schedule.

No. 91 from South Texas will leave Galveston 8:25 p. m., Houston 10:10 p. m., and arrive Lubbock 4:45 p. m. and Clovis 7:55 p. m., connecting with No. 1 for the west. Passengers on No. 91 for Amarillo will leave Amarillo 8:10 p. m. and connecting with No. 10 for the east.

No. 92 will leave Clovis 8:20 a. m., and No. 67 will depart from Amarillo 7:15 a. m. These trains consolidating at Slaton, leaving that point 12:05 p. m., arriving Houston 7:40 a. m., Austin 5:55 a. m., San Antonio 8:30 a. m.

Trains 91 and 92 will handle thru Pullman between Brownwood, Austin and San Antonio.

The schedules of trains 95, and 96 between Sweetwater and Amarillo will also change slightly. No. 95 will leave Sweetwater 3:25 a. m., arriving Amarillo 11:40 a. m. No. 96 will leave Amarillo 10:30 p. m. and reach Sweetwater at 6:30 a. m.

PLAN COMPLETE ALL LEGISLATION

Both Houses of Legislature All Set To Wind Up Session on March 19, 6 P. M.

END PRACTICALLY ASSURED

Last Days of Session to Be Devoted To Outstanding Unfinished Legislation.

AUSTIN, March 13.—Both houses of the Legislature began today to wind up the 59th session in compliance with the house resolution finally adopted late yesterday calling for sine die adjournment at 6 p. m. March 19. Ending of the session on that date was practically assured.

The two houses will give priority consideration to outstanding unfinished legislation during the next four days.

The last two days of the session will be devoted by the House to last minute Senate bills, while the Senate will consider only urgent measures.

Final enactment was voted by the house to the bill by Senator Hardin of Erath, providing for the creation of a new Civil District Court of Appeals.

The House voted 39 to 25 for location of the court at Eastland, after voting down amendments seeking to locate the court at Abilene and Wichita Falls.

Residents of the district have to furnish quarters, library and equipment for the new court before it becomes operative under the measure passed on to the Governor for approval.

The House also finally passed the measure creating a State Highway System to be directed by the State Highway Department to assure the conforming with Federal aid requirements. The measure was adopted 77 to 30.

MANY LEAKS IN BOUNDARY LINE

Department Labor Finds Influx of Aliens Difficult Problem to Solve Adequately.

TO CODIFY ALL LAWS

Conflicting Legislation Hampers Activities of Department—Measures Unrelated.

WASHINGTON, March 13.—Stopping up the holes in the Canadian and Mexican boundaries of the United States to halt the admittedly large illegal entry of aliens, is the biggest job confronting the Department of Labor.

Secretary of Labor James J. Davis entering another term, will shortly call all of his expert immigration and naturalization men into conference to go over all acts of Congress affecting this situation, with a view of submitting a proposal to Congress that will serve as a basis for a permanent policy.

Codification of all laws affecting the activities of Davis' department of arbitration of labor disputes, naturalization and Americanization works, surveys of labor conditions and costs of living and welfare work supervisors, as well as the paramount problems of immigration regulation under the 1924 quota law, will be attempted also.

As the department now operates, its activities are hampered by a large number of conflicting laws. There have been too many different and unrelated measures passed by Congress, the administration of which were passed to his department that Davis believes codification is the most important step to be taken now.

ELIMINATE CROSSING

The final chapter in the grade crossing agreement between this city and the Texas-Pacific railway was written Thursday by the City Commission when they signed the agreement with that railway for the improvement of the subway under the tracks and agreeing to close the two grade crossings east of the subway.

Citizens generally will approve of this action wherein the bulk of the expense of the grade crossing elimination is generously borne by the railway company and wherein a safe passage across the tracks is provided between the north and south portions of the city. Not only are lives of those who must pass this way protected but vexatious delays from blocked crossings are eliminated.

The only expense to the city is the paving of the approaches. This is a cheap way indeed out of the situation which faced this city in the grade crossing problem. This town can't have too much paving for one thing, and it is especially necessary on these approaches where the traffic will be exceptionally heavy.

The City Commission is to be congratulated on the successful ending of these negotiations. Individual property owners assessed for paving in connection with this project have the double reward in that they are enhancing the value of their property and aiding the city generally in one of its most worthwhile projects. They must remember that good paving is always worth much more to property than it costs.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

There is no doubt that the fashion of cooking in casseroles has come to stay in this country; and it is hardly a matter of surprise when the advantages of this form of cookery are considered. The sooner the casserole utensil becomes an indispensable part of our kitchen outfit, the better, for it makes in every way for economy—economy of materials, time and labor.

These are a few of the advantages of cooking in a casserole.

First—The flavor of the food cooked is brought out when it is prepared in a casserole.

Second—When vegetables are cooked in a casserole—and nearly all vegetables are wonderfully better when cooked by this method—a small amount of water, in many cases seasoned stock, should be used.

Third—Left-overs, salads and small entrees of all kinds may be served in a most attractive manner in ramekins or individual casseroles.

Fourth—The cooking in the casserole is slow but thorough, and all the nutritious elements in the viands are preserved. The cover must fit snugly to each utensil, to prevent too rapid escaping of the aroma and flavors. Some times a strip of cloth, spread with a soft paste of flour and water or washed potatoes is pressed over the joining of the casserole and cover, and the heat of the oven finishes the sealing of the dish. When the dish is ready to serve, the strip of cloth and paste is removed.

Fifth—Because of the fact that the food is cooked slowly and evenly, less fuel is used and once the material has been started cooking, they require little attention.

Sixth—The cleanliness and wholesome nature of a casserole make it especially valuable in preparing food for the invalid and the convalescent.

Seventh—Another advantage of casserole cooking, especially in a family where for some reason or another, meals are irregular, is that the dish can be kept waiting for a considerable time without losing its heat and without deterioration. Food can be left in a casserole with perfect safety as long as desired.

The next time you have a bake for your dinner, why not utilize the heat of the oven for a casserole dessert—and think of the time, energy, and dishwashing you will save; or why not make your next vegetable dinner, supper or luncheon one of casserole dishes—say Curried Vegetable, as the principal dish and then have a Chocolate Rice Meringue or Bread Pudding for your casserole dessert? We seldom think of scalloped fruits, but scalloped apples, apricots, peaches, etc., make splendid casserole dishes.

Ham and Potatoes in Casserole
1 lb. slice of ham about 2-3 inch thick; 12 cloves, 1-4 tsp. paprika, 1 tsp. chopped parsley, 4 new potatoes, 1 cup flour, 2 tsp. fat.

Have a frying pan very hot. Add the ham and brown thoroughly on both sides. Add the water and let boil for one minute. Remove the ham. Stick the cloves into it and place it in the bottom of a casserole. Add parsley and paprika to the water in the pan and pour the liquid over the meat. Cover and bake in a moderate oven for half an hour. Roll the potatoes (which have been washed and peeled) in the flour, and add to the casserole. Baste with the liquid. Cover and cook 3-4 of an hour. Serve in the casserole.

Pork Chops in Casserole
1 lb. slice of ham, 12 cloves.
6 pork chops, 1-2 cup brown sugar, 6 sweet potatoes, 1 to 2 cups milk, salt and pepper.

Place a layer of sweet potatoes, sliced crosswise, in a greased casserole dust with salt, pepper and a little brown sugar; continue laying until the casserole is about two-thirds full. Heat the milk and pour it over the potatoes; it should just cover them. Place the pork chops on top of the potatoes, cover and bake for an hour.

then remove the cover and season with salt and pepper. Leave cover off and cook until chops are tender and browned on top.

Devil's Food Cake.
2 cups brown sugar
1-2 cup shortening
2 teaspoons (level) baking powder
1-2 teaspoon soda
2 squares bitter chocolate
1 teaspoon salt 3-4 cup sour milk
2 1-2 cups pastry flour
2 eggs 1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup hot water
Sift together dry ingredients. Add milk, melted shortening and drop in eggs. Mix well. Cook chocolate and hot water until thick. Add to cake mixture with flavoring. Put into three layer pans and bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees) for 25 minutes; in loaf at 350 degrees for 45 minutes.

Fish Mousse.
1 one-pound can salmon, tana or other fish (left-over fish may be used)
1-2 tablespoon salt
1 1-2 tablespoon sugar
1 teaspoon mustard
3-4 cup scalded milk
1 1-2 tablespoons melted butter
2 yolks of eggs, beaten
1-4 cup hot vinegar
3-4 tablespoon granulated gelatine
2 tablespoons cold water
Shred fish. Mix the dry ingredients. Pour over, gradually, the scalded milk and place in double boiler and cook 5 minutes. Then add the melted butter, beaten yolks, with a tablespoon of cold water and the hot vinegar. Stir and cook a moment. Add the granulated gelatine softened in two tablespoons of cold water. Stir until melted, add the fish, and turn into small moulds to harden.

ST. PATRICK'S PARTY

There are many who plan to entertain at some holiday time because of the opportunities afforded for table decoration and color arrangement. St. Patrick's Day offers an opportunity that is needed to give the happy springtime tone that is needed to cheer one over the dismal days of March dust and winds toward the sunny, balmy days that are drawing near. Green plants, shamrocks, green crepe paper trimmings, ect., against a background of white certainly assures us that "spring is not far behind."

If small tables are to be used, as for a card party or tea, have two different arrangements for decoration and then alternate the tables. For one effect, use a green and white checked gingham table cloth, with paper napkins, or gingham napkins to match the cloth. Inexpensive glass candle holders may be purchased at the ten-cent stores and if placed at each corner of the table with green candles inserted therein will start you on your decorative way. An inexpensive but attractive centerpiece, that was used at a church social not long ago, was a child's toy wagon painted green and filled with Irish potatoes.

The alternating tables could be covered with small white cloths and scattered here and there, leaves of real shamrock or cut-outs of Bristol board or crepe paper. The centerpiece might be a plant of real shamrocks. If carefully arranged one could use for a centerpiece as many of the tiny pots of shamrocks as there are guests. Tie to each a green ribbon and have the ribbons radiate to each plate. There is found a tiny pig tied to the end of the ribbon, or possibly a paper potato basket filled with green candies. Afterwards, each guest may draw his little plant of shamrocks from the center.

If a card party is planned, or any party where partners must be chosen arrange sufficient slips of paper containing such combinations as "cornbeef and cabbage," "ham and eggs," "bread and milk," "ice cream and cake," etc. Then clip these in half and distribute to the guests. Let them match up their halves as someone reads the correct combinations.

If one has time, a cross-word puzzle is interesting and in keeping with the present "craze." Such a game will prove quite interesting. The blocks in the puzzle design may be printed or crayoned in green.

The menu, of course, must be just as interesting and decorative as the decoration. Salads, green garnishes for salads, green sandwich filling such as chopped olives and cream cheese or unts, stuffed green peppers, pistachio ice cream or cakes with pistachio frosting, candy, mints, etc., all offer ideas for "decorative" refreshments.

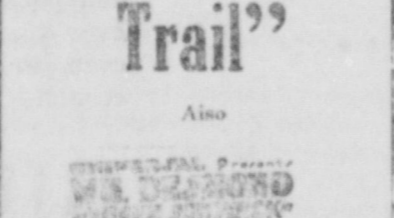

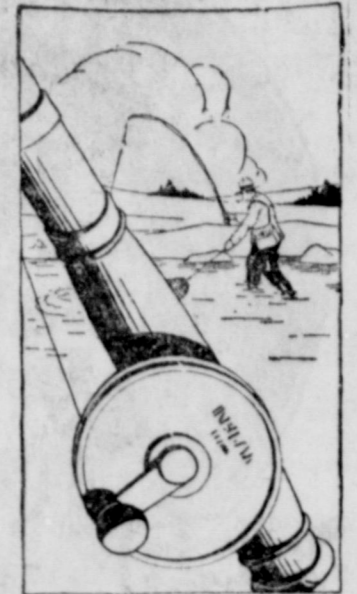
