MEXICAN FILLED LEAD

Members Pursuing Posse Unhurt by Gunfire -- Extent Not Determined; Report Yarbrough Hurt Untrue.

Two charges of dynamite under a freight car at Lawn where they had taken refuge brought to an end the three day search for Lopez Morales and his brother, being sought for the killing of Sheriff W. W. Satterwhite of Howard County, Deputy Sheriff Reeves of Taylor County and another Mexican at Big Spring Saturday,

Early reports reaching Sweetwater were to the effect that Sheriff Yarbrough had been shot. This proved to be incorrect. Claude Bigham was not wounded as reported. He was seen to fall when bullets sped out of the box car when the Mexicans learned their refuge had been discovered

The sheriff of Jones County is reported to have trailed the Mexicans to the box car standing on a switch near Lawn where the dramatic end of the maahunt was staged.

Reports reaching Sweetwater late this afternoon indicated that the Mexicans had arrived at the end of their trail. The pursuers were evidently taking nochances but were using high explosives to blow up the car and either force the Mexicans out or bring their career to an

Lopez Morales was riddled with bullets from the rifles of scores of officers who had been on his trail since the double killing near Merkel Tuesday, at 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon as he ran from a box car on the Santa Fe tracks near Lawn.

Two charges of dynamite were set off under the car and the Mexican jumped from the door following the explosion. Instantly the rifles of the posse cracked and the body of the fugi-

tive killer crumpled to the ground. The hide and seek game of death was ended. Officers were preparing to leave Lawn for Abilene at 3 o'clock this afternoon, taking with them the body of Lopez Morales killer of Juan



LONDON, March 26 .- Is the old world becoming Americanized by the American film?

It appears so. Sir Sidney Low warns England that the omnipresent American film-the chief entertainment of millions of people in Europe-is remoulding the tastes, the minds, the very lives of the! masses in England and throughout the Continent. While there are other films on the market they cannot compete with the Yankee film. The result says Sir Sidney, is the steady inex+

ortible Americanizing of the old World "People have got so used to seeing American styles on the screen" hot continues "that they insist on having them; native styles in shoes, hats and wearing apparel don't seem 'right'. Constant familarity with American nemes with American interiors, with American business methods and Amercan sports all tends to promote America's domination of the world."

This preess, beginning with material things, will end up with nn-material things, says Sir Sidney.

"We are growing every day more accustomed to American 'atmosphere' on the stage and in fiction and we tend to modify our manners, our tastes and our morals to suit American standards. We shall express our thoughts in the English language as spoken in the United States and those thought themselves will have been largely moulded for us in the U.S.A. We shall cultivate American ideals and adopt American habits."

British film producers declare that it is hopeless for them to compete against American film "dumping" under present conditions. Among the things they demand are:

1. Removal of vexations red-tape re strictions. For example, it is against the law in England to film a fire brigade in action. No films may be taken in Hyde Park (which is a Royal park) nor in the Tower of London, These restrictions are typical.

2. Special taxation of the earnings

of all foreign films in England. 3. Prohibiting the import of more than one negative and one positive print of each film so as to encourage the filmprinting industry.

But as the theater goers are lukewarm toward the British films and are up in arms at the first suggestion of any restriction in imports, the situation will not change in the near future, leaving the Americanization of England to proceed unchecked.
