

We had not realized at the time that in spite of her grief, Jackie had quickly arranged all of the details of JFK's funeral, including the riderless horse that followed the coffin in the parade, and the burial of Kennedy in Arlington National Cemetery, beneath an eternal flame. To Ye Editor, that seemed like class, with a capital "C."

She was thrust into the public eye as first lady at the tender age of 31. Compare that with the ages of your children, or those you know, and it sort of makes you gasp. She was the first president's wife in quite some time--and only one during our lifetime--to have a baby while living in the White House.

As Carol could no doubt better relate to you, Jackie also set the fashion trend for her generation of young ladies during the short time she served as first lady. The story we enjoyed this week was about the time she had to grab her pillboxstyled hat quickly when she was going to the inauguration, due to a gust of wind, and the top of the hat became indented. After Jackie appeared at the inauguration with the indentation in her hat, everyone, including her fashion designer, Oleg Cassini, decided that this was the new trend-which it quickly became. Did you know that when Jackie had the White House restored in 1961 she located antique furnishings from the James Monroe era, and that walls which had been painted in seasick green were covered over in 19th-century wallpaper carefully (and at great expense) stripped from old farmhouses! She was too young a widow; too soon replaced (although no one has ever fully replaced her) as first lady. She died much too soon. The 1,000 days of "Camelot" were too short. "Don't let it be forgot, that once there was a spot; for one brief shining moment that was known as Camelot."

Area Gets Some Outstanding Rain

The Friona area received some great rainfall during the past week, with 2.09 inches measured in the official guage.

Some damage was noted by light hail that accompanied the first rain last Sunday afternoon. Then, a twister-like cloud damaged buildings in the Wednesday afternoon cloud. A trailer house was reported to be unroofed.

The cloud continued into Deaf Smith County, where it was reported that at the Barrett & Crofoot Feed Yard west of Hereford power lines and poles were snapped, and several cattle were killed.

Most of the rain received in the immediate Friona area was just about right, although the Wednesday rain came in sheets for awhile. Measurements were 1.26 inches on Sunday, .32 inch Tuesday night and .51 inches Wednesday.

Hailstorm **Cuts Across**

Friona's Home Health Department, which operates through Parmer County Community Hospital, observed its first birthday this week.

From its beginning in May of 1993 through April 30 of 1994, the unit had provided 4,394 home visits to people in this area needing medical assistance.

"Home health care enables people to stay at home where they are most comfortable when they're in need of medical care or assistance," said Chris Dennison, RN, director of the program

"Initiation of home health services is most often through the referral of a physician. However, family members also provide referrals for loved ones in need," Dennison said.

Services provided depend most specifically on the patient's diagnosis. A range of services provided are post-operative care, dressing changes, physical therapy, IV therapy, respiratory and diabetic care, injections and medication maintenance.

Personal care, hygiene, meal preparation and light housekeeping are provided by home health aides.

A 50 x 140 foot building will be constructed on the lots, all in one building, but just what the building will be used for is not known at this time.

Crop prospects in the Friona territory are said to be better than for the past several years. The wheat is looking like a better than average crop, and while only a few row crops are planted, hundreds of acres of sorghum grains, sudan and corn will be planted in the next few days.

60 Yrs. Ago--June 1, 1934 On Friday evening of last week the Frio Draw overflowed its banks at Friona and as usual swept down the State Highway No. 33 for the distance of nearly a mile. This overflow was caused not by any heavy rain falling within the immediate territory, but from rain that fell over in New Mexico. Two cars, unaware of the recent overflow, dashed into the wet road at this point, one being overturned and nearly buried, while the other barely escaped being ditched right where the other capsized.


Nearly 100 years ago two traveling strangers met by chance, never dreaming what they would start.


Paper salesman John "Nick" Nicholson reached the Central Hotel in Boscobel, Wisconsin at about 9:00 the night of September 14, 1898. The hotel lobby was full and the front desk confirmed his fears, every room was taken.

The hotel landlord wanted to help Nicholson, a regular customer, so he proposed to let him stay with another traveler, Sam Hill, whose room had a spare bed. Mr. Hill agreed to the arrangement.

That night as he was preparing for bed, Mr. Nicholson asked, "Excuse me if I keep this light on a little while longer, I always make it a practice to read the Word of God and speak to Him before I retire." "Read it aloud," Hill told him. "I'm a Christian too."

After reading the Word and praying together, they conversed until early in the morning. They





saw a need for traveling Christian salesmen and decided to form just such an organization.

> They parted the next morning, but soon forgot about their committments. The following May, however, they unexpectedly met again on a street in Beaver Dam, Wisconsin. This time they planned their first meeting and promised to invite other Christian salesmen to join them.

> Their first meeting was on July 1, 1899, there were only three in attendance, Nicholson, Hill, and the newcomer, William Knights.


> From that meeting the association has grown into what we know as the Gideons today. The public knows them most for their placing of Bibles into hotel and motel rooms. But they were founded with this object in mind: "winning commercial traveling men for Christ."

In present day they are known to have distributed some 32,000,000 Bibles a year. In 58 languages, in 140 countries, Gideon Bibles can be found in hotels and motels. Some 1,000,000 Bibles were distributed to military personnel in Operation Desert Storm.

It was a small beginning for those three men, but God has said in Zecheriah 4:10 "For who has despised the day of small things?"

Of His word, God says in Isaiah 55:10-11 "For as the rain and the snow come down from heaven, and do not return there without watering the earth, and making it bear and sprout, and furnishing seed to the sower and bread to the eater; so shall My word by which goes forth from My mouth: It shall not return to Me empty, without accomplishing what I desire, and without succeeding in the matter for which I sent it."



This allows for market fluctuations and reduces your exposure to unexpected drops in the market. Selecting only fixed-income investments may avoid the risk of losing principal, but it also may expose you to the biggest risk of all--outliving your nest egg. Don't forget about the importance of growth and staying ahead of inflation when choosing your investments.

## The Contacts/ **Bifocal Dilemma**

People wear contact lenses, basically, because they don't want to wear glasses. What happens, then, when their eyes no longer adapt easily from far to near vision, when they need, ugh, reading glasses? The easiest correction, of

course, is probably reading glasses worn over the contacts, but other options are increasingly available.

One choice is the "aspheric" soft contact lens, a simultaneous bifocal that has a gradual change in power from the center of the lens to its edges. The areas close to the edges provide correction for near vision. Other types are made with the near-vision section in the center with the distance-vision area around it. Other lenses are made like bifocal glasses; the top portion corrects for distance vision and the bottom for near vision.

Monovision fitting--wearing a contact lens for distance on one eye and a lens for near vision on the other--is still popular. Like other bifocal options, even glasses, it requires getting used to. Brought to you as a community service by:

Retirees often have their money too conservatively invested, thinking only about stability of principal. Even young people often have too large a portion of their portfolios invested only in fixedincome investments, which traditionally have yielded much less than common stocks.

No one should have all of his or her investments in growth securities. However, it is equally dangerous to be totally invested in short-term income securities. For example, in 1981, \$250,000 invested in certificates of deposit would have provided more than \$3,000 of income each month. Today, just 13 years later, that same nest egg would yield less than \$700 in monthly income. Although the principal has remained safe, monthly income has decreased more than 75 per cent, while inflation has continued to increase the cost of living.
