## MY TURN

TO THE 100 young people who have just graduated from Friona, Bovina and Lazbuddie High Schools last week:

You are going out into the most complex technological society mankind has ever known. We hope you are prepared for it.

The world is not geared to treat you as kindly as you were treated at your hometown schools in Parmer County. You were, however, given a good foundation here and if you and your inner-self can get together and work toward a positive goal, then there is no limit to what you can accomplish.

If you do not care deeply about getting a higher education, then please don't waste your time and your parents' money by heading off to college. It takes a lot of work and gut-bust determination to get that degree.

If you are thinking of college as a place to get away from the rules at home, a place to party, a place to get drunk, a place to meet new people of the opposite sex, a place to have fun and participate in extracurricular activities... then you might as well forget about it and start looking for employment now, because you aren't college material.

Not going to college is certainly no disgrace, either. The only disgrace is in not giving your all to whatever endeavor you commit to.

Some of the frustrations you will be dealing with at college will require all the fortitude you can muster. For instance, your math and science courses will be taught by instructors who can barely speak English. Plus, many of your undergraduate courses will not be taught by the professor who was named in your college catalogue at all, but will actually be taught by a graduate student who is the professor's assistant.

Registration can be a real nightmare for Freshman students. Most colleges and universities do not offer enough of some courses. By the time you have finished getting enrolled in one class, the next one you need to sign up for will have been filled to capacity and closed until the next semester. So you'll end up filling time and wasting money on a few courses that are not even part of your degree plan.

Even back when I was going to college, about a hundred years ago, you were required to take quite a few courses that you didn't want. They'd like for you to end up with a "well rounded" education, I guess. But, as a journalism major, I still can't see what "Advanced Algebra" has to do with writing articles for this weekly newspaper.

Selecting college courses is sort of like buying a "pig in a poke" anyway. (Ask your grandfather what that expression means.) You won't really know what you're in for until the class gets underway. Of course you can always drop the class, which ends up wasting your time and money.

Institutions of higher learning, even in the Southern states, are hotbeds of political correctness, liberalism, multiculturalism, radical feminism, affirmative action and official victimology. Even the assigned readings are, today, trending away from the traditional great works of such masters as Aristotle and Shakespeare, and are being shifted to unknown liberalist writers who espouse the ideas of Western civilization as being sexist, racist and oppressive. High moral character and Christianity are, of course, politically incorrect.

You cannot have reached the age of 18 and not know right from wrong. Right and wrong are the same as they have always been and always will be, despite the fact that you grew up during a time when society was attempting to cloud the facts. ## Exit Test Schedules Are Given

Individuals who have met all requirements for high school graduation but have not passed one or more sections of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) or the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) may take the test this summer.

Testing will be on the following dates: TAAS--July 12, writing; July 13, reading; July 14, mathematics; TEAMS--July 13, English language arts; July 14, mathematics.

Beginning in the fall of 1993, all individuals who wish to take the TEAMS test(s) must register in advance. This includes students currently enrolled in Texas public high schools as well as individuals who have completed all other high school graduation requirements.

The only individuals who must register for the TAAS test(s) are those who are no longer enrolled in school who have not met minimum expectations on all sections of the TAAS test or a student who will be testing in a district other than the district that they are enrolled in. A registration packet may be picked up at any high school campus, district central office or education service center.

The completed registration form must be received in Iowa City, Iowa, no later than 5 p.m., June 10. In Friona, call Friona High School, 247-3952.

## Chamber Proposes New Parmer County Annex

The Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture is assisting the citizens of the eastern section of Parmer County due to their interest in establishing a Parmer County Annex to better serve those residing as far as 38 miles away from the county seat.

Understanding the limits that state statutes put on services offered outside the county seat, the Chamber is addressing only the services that can be offered through an annex. These services could make a profound difference for many of the taxpayers of Parmer County.

One service to be addressed will be the availability of full motor vehicle registration and title transfer. Although tag renewals may be obtained in Friona, those needing new tags, handicap designated tags, or title transfer must still travel to Farwell.

This has proven to be a problem, especially for the elderly and handicapped. Those who are employed struggle with this due to Courthouse working hours compared to their own.

Other services addressed will be the availability of the County Extension Agents in the annex on an established schedule for those in need of consultation or assistance through the programs they offer.

Hunting licenses and marriage licenses are also possible services that might be offered. If an annex is established, early voting could be held there for all elections whereas those seeking early voting for the Hospital District Board are currently required to do so at the County

The Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture feels these services can be offered to the taxpayers at a minimal cost and are open to any suggestions or comments.

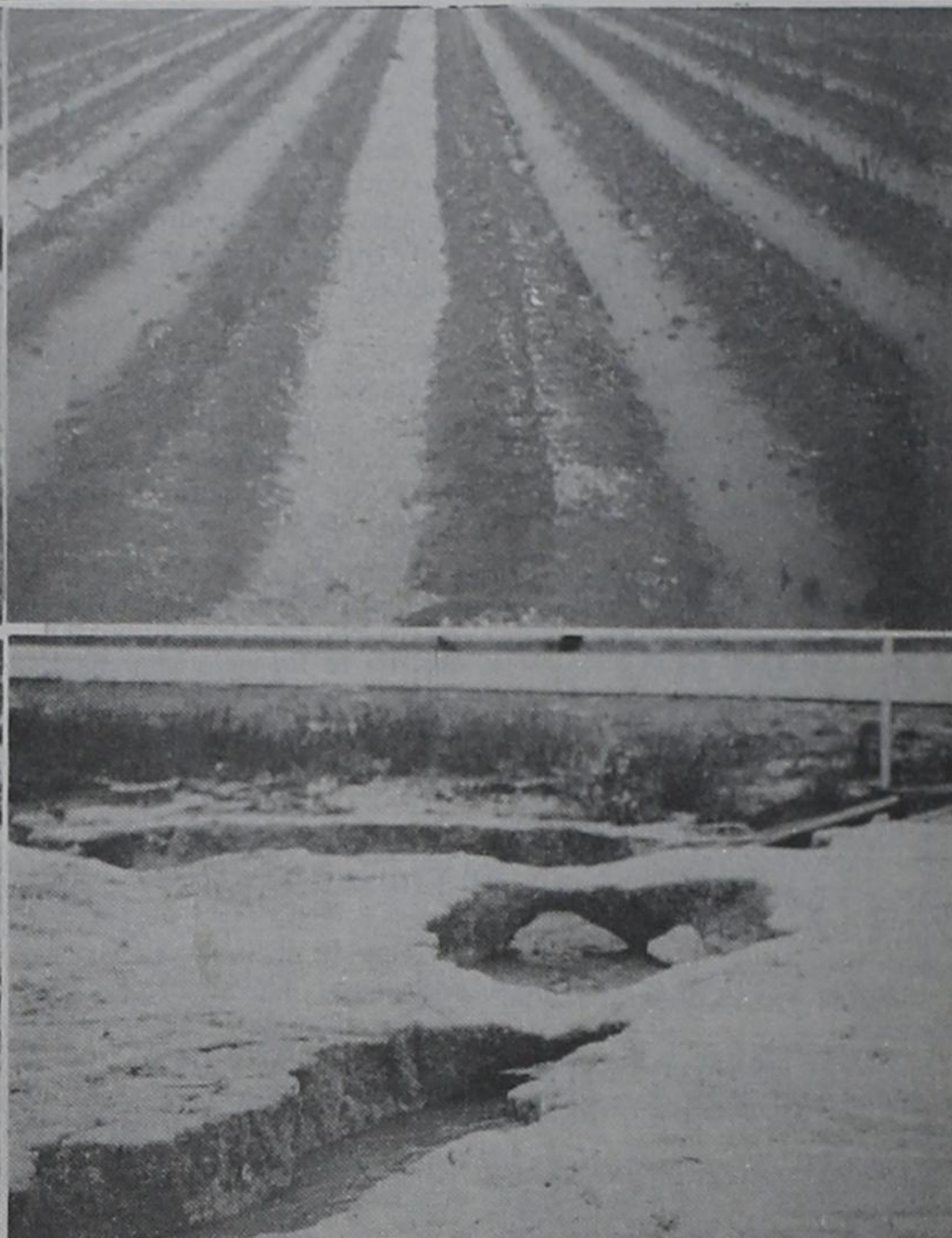
This proposal will be presented in behalf of the residents of Parmer County to the Commissioner's Court at their next meeting.

## Free Lunch Is Available For Children

As the school year comes to a close, plans are underway to assure that free lunches don't end when the school doors close. Friona I.S.D. will be sponsoring the USDA Summer Food Service Program which will provide free lunches to children from 1-18 years of age. These meals will provide the same nutrition kids receive throughout the school year through the National School Lunch Program.

The free lunches will be available to the community at the Elementary School Cafeteria. Meal service runs from 11:30 a.m. until 1 p.m. Monday through Friday. The program will run from June 6-August 5. Children do not have to sign up for meals, they simply come to the site. Regulations require meals must be eaten at the feeding site.

The Summer Food Service Program is available to all children 1-18 years of age regardless of race, color, national origin, sex, disability, religion or political belief. For more information about the program, contact the Friona I.S.D. food service department at 247-3353.



## Thursday Storm Destroys Crops

Last Thursday evening's storm cloud, which moved from the Lazbuddie community northward through the county, wiped out thousands of acres of crops.

Many of the crops have been replanted, except that in the case of the wheat that was damaged or destroyed, harvest time was right around the corner.

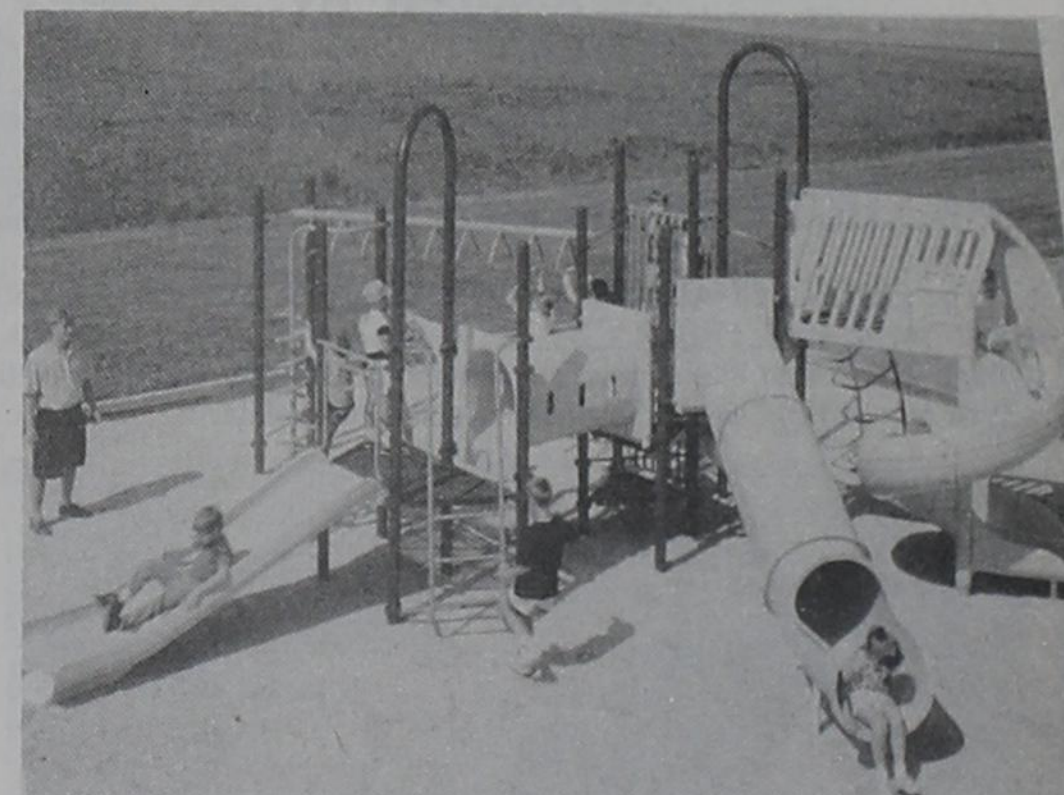
Jerry Butman, manager of Friona Farmers Co-op Gin, said that around 1500 acres of cotton were destroyed, and as of Thursday of this week, most had been replanted.

"The cotton crop was late anyway, due cold weather last month. We need some hot weather now, for the cotton to make it," he said.

Ron Smiley, manager of Friona Wheat Growers, said there was at least 1,000 acres of corn destroyed or damaged, and most of it had likewise been replanted.

"Some of the crops were just devastated. Others were cut off near the growth line. It was a tough decision by those farmers, but most decided to replant," Smiley said.

The elevator spokesman said that another 1,000 to 1500 acres of wheat may have been damaged or destroyed. The Wyllys were known to have lost 400 acres.

The project committee will be conducting several fund raising activities over the next several months. Raffles for various prizes will take place on July 4. Your support is greatly appreciated.

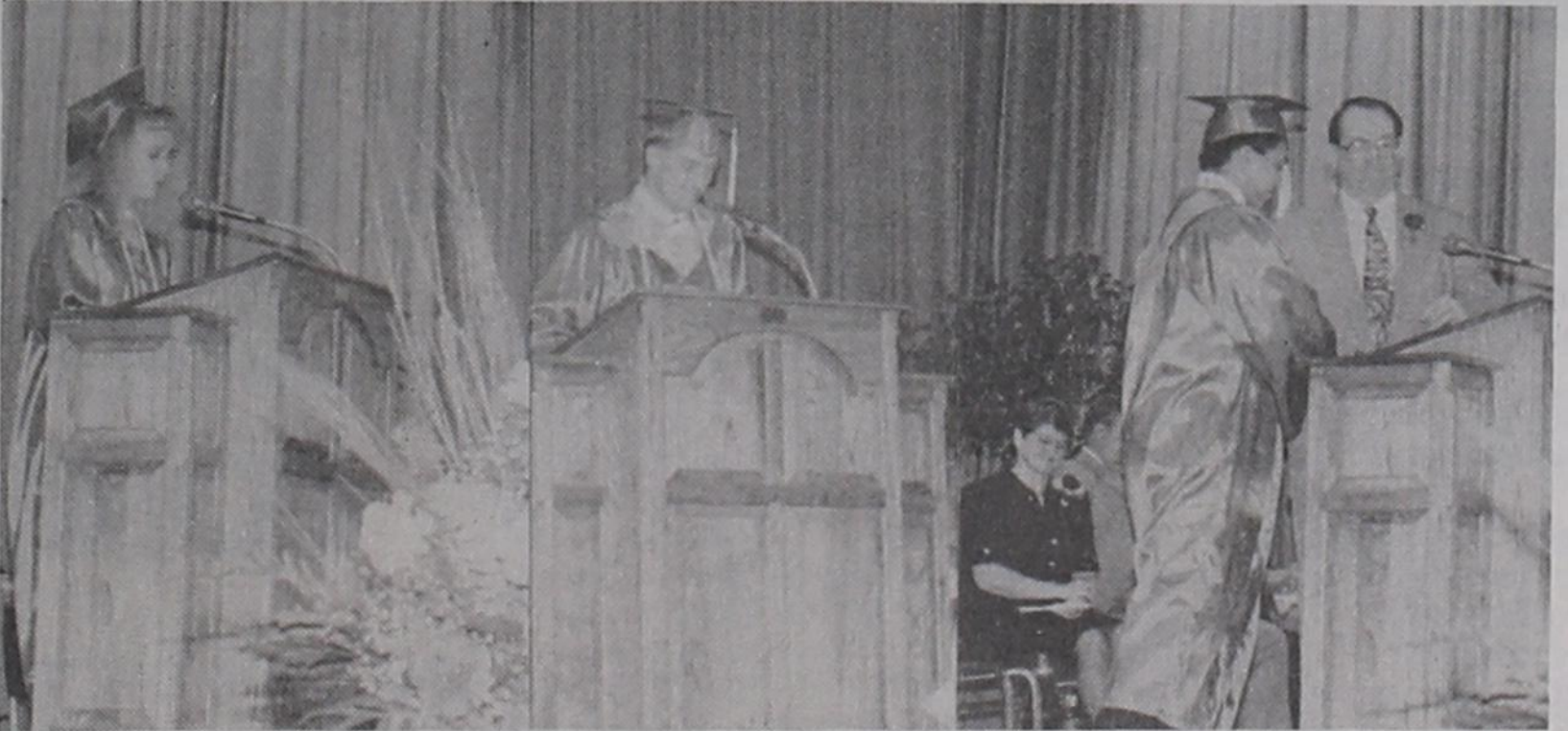

**65 Yrs. Ago--June 5, 1929**

It now appears to be an established fact that Friona will be the center of a system of rural telephones, which will be connected with and operated by the same system that will be in use in the city.

It is reported on the best of authority that Friona will have a first class and strictly up-to-date "M" System store, which will be open for business on or about the fifteenth of June.

**60 Yrs. Ago--June 8, 1934**

## M. Ramon Is Buried At Earth

Services for Margarito Ramon, 71, of Earth, were held Thursday at First Baptist Church of Earth with Rev. Oscar Rejino, pastor of Trinity Mission Baptist Church of Olton, officiating.

Burial was in Earth Memorial Cemetery.

Ramon died May 30, 1994 at Runningwater Draw Care Center, Olton.

He was born February 12, 1923 in Moore, Texas and married Irenia Samarron on January 24, 1949 in Jourdanon, Texas.

Ramon had been a resident of Earth since 1960 moving there from Charlotte. He was a maintenance worker for the City of Earth eighteen years, was a veteran of the United States Army and attended the Pentecostal Church.

Survivors include his wife, Irenia Ramon of Earth; three sons, Emilio Ramon of Earth, Paul Ramon of Plainview and Selso Ramon of Earth; four daughters, Wilma Rejino of Olton, Lina Padillo of Friona, Patricia Carrillo of Earth and Virginia Olivares of Plainview.

Also surviving are a brother, Gregorio Ramon of Charlotte, sixteen grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

**55 Yrs. Ago--June 9, 1939**

The City of Friona is soon to have a new fire truck, which is now being built and nearing completion in the work shops of Reeve Chevrolet Company, with Charles Bainum, one of the firemen, doing and supervising the work of building.

**50 Yrs. Ago--June 9, 1944**

On Saturday afternoon, June 10, Friona will be featured on a historical broadcast over station KGNC by Miss Laura V. Hamner of Amarillo.

Some time Monday afternoon, Mrs. Pearl Kinsley was uninjured when her car overturned while enroute to Friona. Mrs. Kinsley sustained only a few minor bruises, but the car was considerably damaged.

**45 Yrs. Ago--June 10, 1949**

On Monday of last week, Day Brothers, house movers of Hereford, arrived in Friona and began preparations for moving the home of Rev. Tommie Allen, pastor of the First Baptist Church, from its old location to make room for the proposed new auditorium to be built on the ground it formerly occupied.

**40 Yrs. Ago--June 4, 1954**

The city has begun making street markers for Friona, a badly needed commodity to assist strangers in finding addresses. The Lions Club set up 64 of the markers on Wednesday, and still have 52 to place on the corners.

Thirty-four cars of a Santa Fe freight train were derailed Sunday at the east switch at Summerfield. The cars were filled with perishable goods. Five or six carloads of fruit were taken to Hereford to reload on other cars.

**35 Yrs. Ago--June 4, 1959**

W. O. (Bill) Wright, 39, drowned sometime Friday night following an unexplained accident at Lake Conchas in New Mexico.

Hail cut a destructive swath through Parmer County, in the shape of a new moon from Rhea to east of Hub. Hail was stacked up a foot deep next to buildings on some farms following the storm.

**30 Yrs. Ago--June 4, 1964**

Peggye McNair, who is the reigning "Miss Wool of Texas," paid a visit to the Otho Whitefield sheep ranch this week. Whitefield is an official in both the Columbia Sheep Breeders of America and the Texas Columbia Breeders.

**25 Yrs. Ago--June 5, 1969**

Joe Bob Mann, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Mann of Friona, was aboard the USS Frank E. Evans when it was cut in half by an Australian aircraft carrier in a pre-dawn collision early Tuesday morning.

Airman Kirk Matlock, grandson of Mr. and Mrs. E. D. Matlock of Friona, is in a hospital in Japan after suffering a hand wound while in Vietnam, it was reported after the Matlocks talked with Kirk by telephone this week.

**20 Yrs. Ago--June 2, 1974**

A contract for the Highway 214 project, to include widening the road and construction of an overpass, was awarded this week by the Texas Highway Department.

Kay Riethmayer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Riethmayer of Route 3, Friona, has been placed on the Dean's honor Roll at Lubbock Christian College for the spring semester of 1974.

Darrell Mason, a junior student at New Mexico Military Institute, compiled a 3.7 grade point average on a 4.0 grading system for the semester just ended.

**15 Yrs. Ago--June 3, 1979**

General Telephone Company of the Southwest has over 1.5 million telephones in service, according to O.D. Hearn, Brownfield division manager.

Donna Rector presented the valedictory address at the High School graduation ceremonies last Friday night. Jan Mason gave the salutatory address and Chris Barnett gave the class history.

**10 Yrs. Ago--June 3, 1984**

White's Supermarket observed it's Grand Opening at the company's newly expanded store, and the Friona Chamber of Commerce provided a ribbon-cutting ceremony.

The parents of Masayo Okamoto, foreign exchange student for the 1983-84 school year flew in from their home in Osaka, Japan, to be here for the Friona High School graduation exercises. ### Texans served and died in World War II

June 6 marks the 50th anniversary of the landing of Allied forces on the beaches of Normandy, France, to drive the Nazi army back into Germany. U.S. General Dwight D. Eisenhower, who was born in the North Texas town of Denison, directed the Allied invasion. Of the 16.5 million U.S. troops who served in World War II, about 1.5 million men were trained for military service on Texas bases, while 21 prisoner-of-war camps were located in the state. Of the 830,000 men and 12,200 women from Texas who served in the war, more than 14,000 were killed in battle.

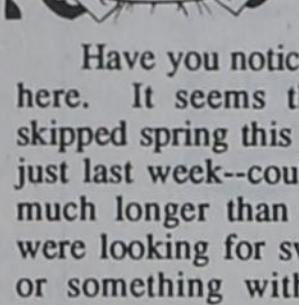

#### ORANGE SLICE BARS

- 4 eggs
- 1 tablespoon orange juice
- 1 medium size bag orange slice candy
- 2 cups brown sugar
- 2-1/4 cups flour
- 1 cup nuts
- 2 tablespoons water

Beat eggs well. Add other ingredients, except candy. Cut candy in small pieces. Add to batter. Bake in large greased and floured shallow baking dish for 25 minutes at 325 degrees.

Cut in squares while hot. Glaze with mixture of 1/2 stick oleo, 2 tablespoons water and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, which has been thickened with powdered sugar.

- She prefaced it with the following paragraph: "This recipe was given to me at a fair in Friona in the fall of 1950 or 1951. Hank Outland, Sr. was baking them for "Reddy Kilowatt" and was a busy busy gentleman."
- 3/4 cup shortening
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla
  - 1 cup brown sugar (firmly packed)
  - 1 egg
  - 1/4 cup maraschino cherries
  - 1/2 cup nuts (finely chopped)
  - 2 cups sifted all purpose flour
  - 1/2 teaspoon soda
  - 1/4 teaspoon salt
  - 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar

Place shortening, vanilla, brown sugar and egg in mixing bowl. Beat thoroughly. Add nuts and cherries and mix well. Sift together flour, soda, cream of tartar and salt. Add to first mixture. Beat and mix well--knead with hands until smooth.

Pack very firmly and shape into 2" x 2" bars. Wrap bars in waxed paper and chill until firm. Cut in 1/8 inch slices, place on ungreased baking sheet. Bake 6 to 8 minutes in 400 degree oven.

## Immunization Clinics Set

The monthly immunization clinics, sponsored by the Texas Department of Health, are scheduled for June. These clinics offer vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases.

Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps and HIB (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B).

The TDH charges a fee to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged is based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

A clinic has been set at the Texas Department of Human Services Office, 104 West Seventh Street, Friona, Wednesday, June 15, from 10 a.m.-12 noon and 1-3 p.m.

A clinic will be held at the Bovina Medical Clinic, 509 Avenue I on Monday, June 13 from 10 a.m.-3 p.m.; and in Hereford at the Texas Department of Health, 205 West Fourth Street, on Thursday, June 9 and Thursday, June 16 from 7-11:30 a.m. and 1-5:45 p.m. and Thursday, June 23 from 7-11:30 a.m. and 1-4:30 p.m.

Combine egg, sugar, milk and shortening. Add flour sifted well with baking powder and salt. Mix well. Pour into 8" x 8" x 2" baking pan. Sprinkle with mixture of 1/4 cup brown sugar, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 tablespoon flour and 1

tablespoon melted butter and 1/2 cup chopped pecans. Bake 25 minutes at 375 degrees.

#### MATRIMONIAL COOKIES

- 1 cup shortening
- 2 cups brown sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 2 cups oatmeal
- 2-1/2 cups flour

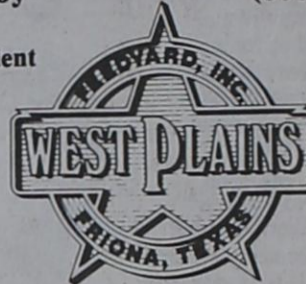

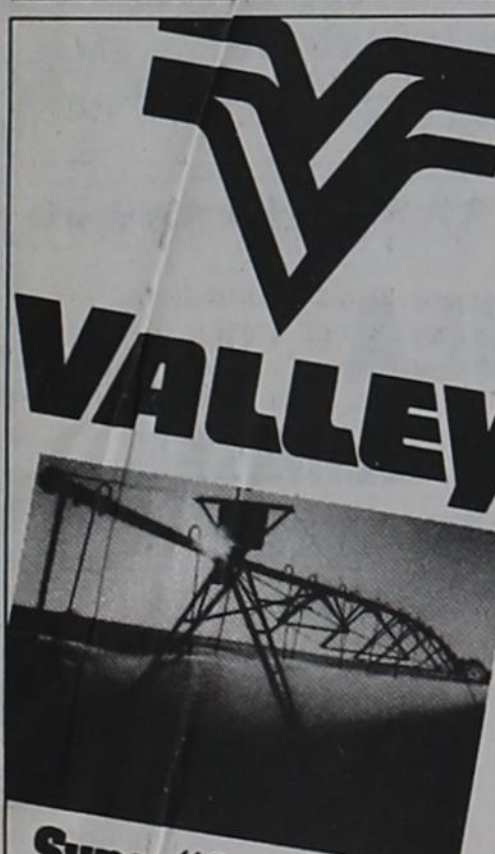
The Friona Girl Scouts have projects planned beginning with a pool party on June 18 at the Friona Swimming Pool, starting at 6 p.m.

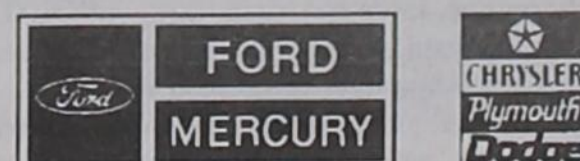

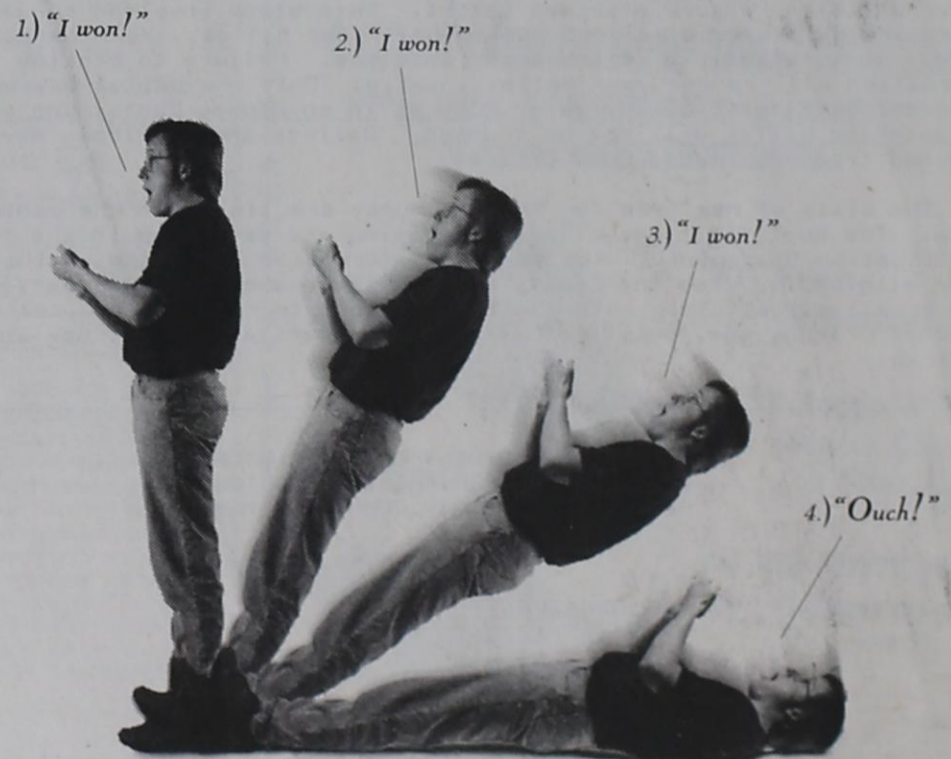

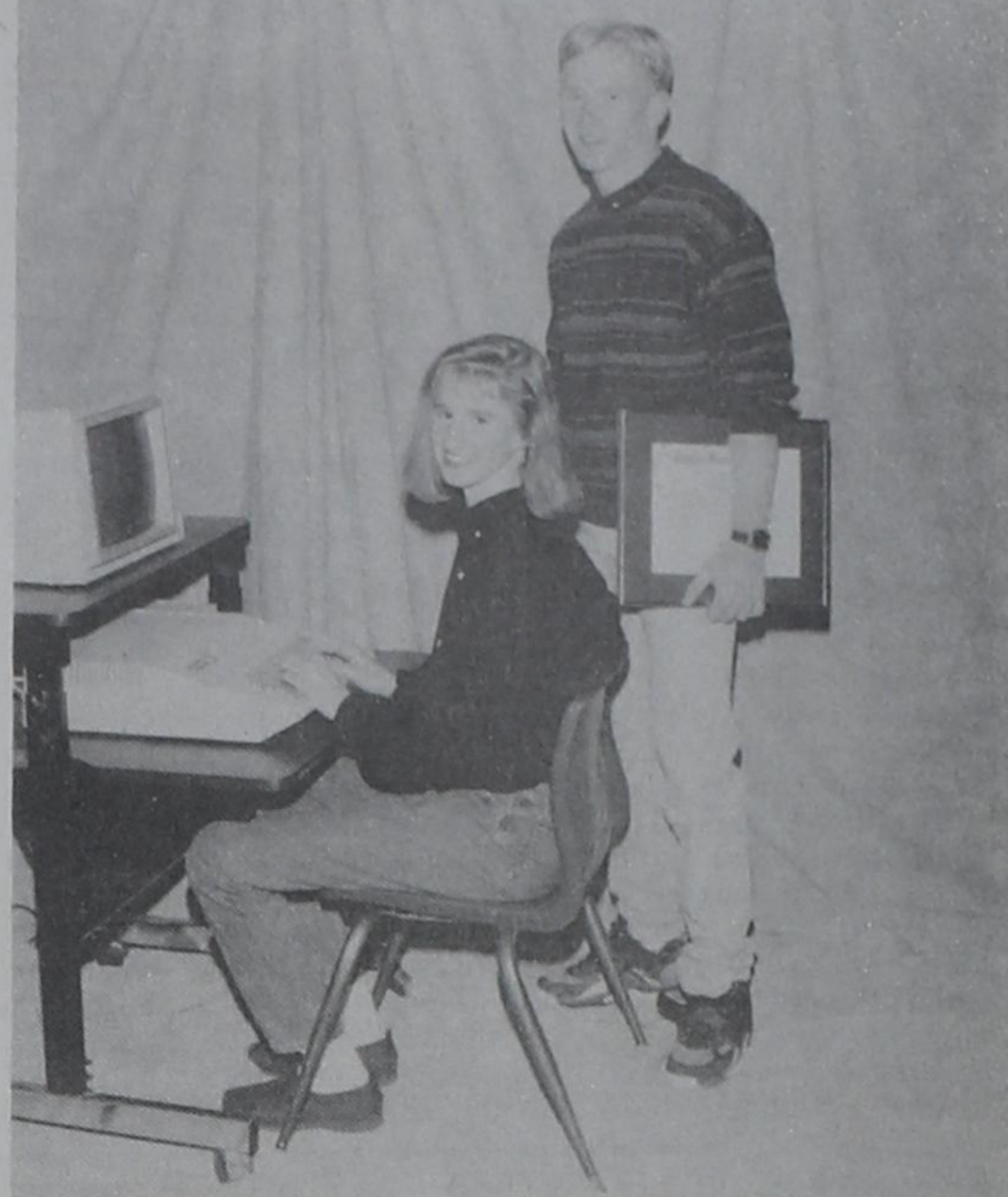

## YOUR EYES



### What Is Vision Training?

Some vision deficits are corrected with lenses. Others call for vision training, exercises that teach or correct visual skills that may be lacking in adults or children. A combination of both glasses and training may be recommended by the optometrist.

Training most often consists of a series of prescribed visual tasks or exercises, first practiced under supervision in the optometrist's office and then reinforced at home. Repetition of specific tasks can improve eye movement, eye coordination and focusing ability in many cases. Vision training may also be effective in restoring eye muscle coordination and straightening alignment of the eyes.

The optometrist prescribes an individualized vision training program for each patient and his or her particular vision needs. The objective is to increase the ability of the eyes to see clearly and comfortably and to enhance the brain's ability to interpret the visual information that it receives.

### Regulation of the Mutual Fund Industry

(Editor's note: First of a two-part series)

The first mutual fund began in the United States in 1924, and in the years that followed, the demand for securities grew at an unprecedented rate. Then, in 1929, the U.S. stock market crashed, followed by a worldwide depression. These events signaled the need for federal control of securities, including mutual funds.

Today, mutual funds are among the most strictly regulated investments under federal securities laws. They are regulated by five major statutes:

**The Securities Act of 1933.** This act established a number of filing requirements for all mutual funds, including the filing of detailed registration statements with the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC). It also requires funds to regularly disclose detailed information about their operations to the SEC, state securities boards and shareholders. Further, this disclosure must be uniform, providing the same information to all audiences. Under this act, funds also must provide potential investors with current prospectuses (updated annually) describing each fund's management, objectives, risks, investment policies and other essential data. The act also approved but limited all mutual fund advertising. The provisions of the act are still in effect.

**The Securities Exchange Act of 1934.** This legislation regulates the purchase and sale of mutual fund shares. It subjects distributors to anti-fraud provisions that are monitored and enforced by the SEC and National Association of Securities Dealers (NASD).

**The Investment Advisers Act of 1940.** This act regulates the activities of mutual fund advisers. Specifically, it focuses on self-dealing and conflicts of interest within mutual funds, and it guards against charging shareholders excessive fees. In 1992, the SEC

prepared a 500-page document with recommendations for updating this act; some changes may be forthcoming.

**The Insider Trading and Securities Fraud Enforcement Act of 1988.** This law requires investment advisers and broker/dealers to develop and enforce strict procedures to prevent insider trading. Insider trading occurs when people with access to information not available to the general public use that information for their own benefit. The act also expanded the SEC's authority to regulate insider trading.

**The Market Reform Act of 1990.** This latest securities act gives the SEC authority to halt securities trading and/or restrict program trading, or automated computer trading, usually of huge blocks of securities. This law was brought about by the 500-point decline in the Dow Jones Industrial Average on October 19, 1987; its purpose is to prevent such drastic drops from occurring again.

In addition to these federal laws, each state has its own securities regulations pertaining to mutual funds. Federal and state laws are all designed to ensure that mutual funds are operated and managed in an open, consistent way so that investors receive the information they need to make investment decisions.
