BAPTISTS READY FOR CONFERENCE

Preparations Completed For Taking Care of Large Crowds Visitors Here Tuesday

ANNUAL WEST TEXAS MEET

Many Prominent Baptist Church Workers Will Be in Attendance at Two Day Session

Preparations have been completed for taking care of crowds of several hundred people who will begin arriving in Sweetwater tomorrow to attend the West Texas District annual conference of the B. Y. P. U. and Baptist Sunday School here Tuesday and Wednesday. It was stated that local Baptists are prepared to take care of the delegates who will come from throughout West Texas, and each visitor will be given a room and breakfast in local homes.

Advance indications are that the meeting here will probably exceed, by a large number, the 1924 convention at Ballinger where approximately 250 visitors were present.

An unusual array of prominent Baptists will have parts in the convention and the convention will probably bring here the greatest gathering of prominent Baptist workers, college officials and noted ministers in the history of the city.

Everyone is invited, and urged to attend the various services that are planned for the convention. The program in detail, for the two days, follows:

COMMUTE NEGRO DEATH PENALTY

Roy Mitchell, Charged With Death of Own Child, Will Serve Life Term Instead of Dying

Gillespie County Burglar Granted Conditional Pardon—Taylor County Man Is Paroled

AUSTIN, May 2.—Roy Mitchell, negro, under sentence to die in the electric chair for murder in Lamar County, was saved from death today when Governor Miriam A. Ferguson commuted the death sentence to life imprisonment.

Mitchell was convicted of killing a negro child who refused to obey his orders to bring wood into the house. Investigation by the governor convinced her that the killing of the child was not done thru malice. Death resulted from injuries inflicted when being whipped for disobeying orders.

Pardons Mexican

AUSTIN, May 2.—Vicente Garcia, convicted in Gillespie county of burglary and sentenced to two years, was granted a conditional pardon by Governor Miriam A. Ferguson. He had served one year in the county jail before being convicted and another year in the state penitentiary.

Hands Out Paroles

AUSTIN, May 2.—A. E. Ragsdale, serving a ten year sentence under conviction in Grayson county for violating the State banking law, was today granted an extension of 30 day parole which had been granted by Governor Ferguson.

A 30 day parole was granted W. L. Reddell, sentenced to 2 years for violating the liquor law, and A. L. Arledge, serving two years for forgery in Taylor county, was given a 15 day parole.

Henry Corcrew of Morris county, who finished serving 2 years for burglary some years ago, was granted a restoration of citizenship.

Seaplane In Air 28 Hours for New Record Endurance

PHILADELPHIA, May 2.—"We thought we never would run out of gas" was the only comment of Lieut. C. H. Schildhauer as he stepped off his navy seaplane, the CN-9 this afternoon after hanging up a new world record for sustained flight in a seaplane.

Schildhauer with Lieut. J. R. Kyle navigated the seaplane over a course of the Delaware River from 10:22 a. m. Friday until 2:58 o'clock this afternoon.

They remained in the air 28 hours and 36 minutes.

MAY LINK ORIENT AND MEXICO LINE

President W. T. Kemper and Clifford Histed Go To Mexico For Conference With Calles

TO BUILD MORE TRACK

Plan Construction Additional Mileage in Chihuahua To Join Orient And National Lines

KANSAS CITY, May 2.—Further evidence of plans to put the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient among the leading railroads of the Southwest was seen today with the announcement that a conference will be held next week between officials of the road and President Calles of Mexico in regard to linking the Orient with the National Railway of Mexico.

W. C. Kemper, president, and Clifford Histed, general counsel of the Orient, will leave for Mexico Tuesday to confer with Calles. The conference will deal with the assistance of the Mexican government in the construction of 50 miles of track this summer in the State of Chihuahua. Fifteen miles of the new track is already under construction there.

Under plans recently approved by Federal Court, several million dollars will be made available to the road to purchase rolling stock, locomotives, improve the road-bed and construction.

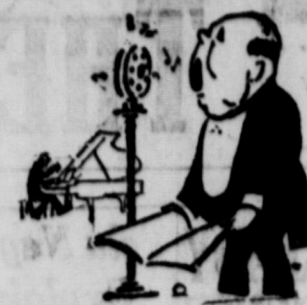

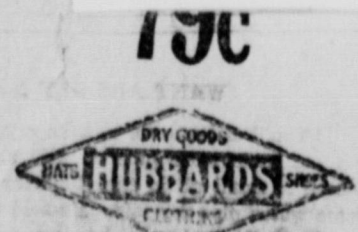

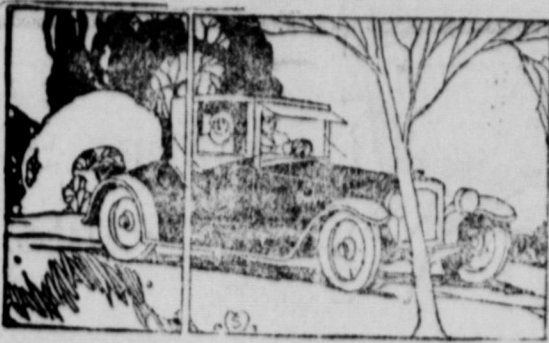

The upkeep of a car isn't so much, unless you count fines and hospital bills.

The daily output of nearly all makes of automobiles is this year from 25 to 50 per cent greater than a year ago, and many manufacturers are having difficulty in meeting the demands for their cars, while others are not guaranteeing delivery before July 1. This is revealed in a recent announcement and indicates that the automobile industry is in the midst of what may be its greatest year in history, according to the view point taken by local dealers.

Working overtime, factories are still unable to meet the demands of prospective car owners, for more automobiles are being purchased now than ever before and travel by auto has almost doubled during the past two years, dealers stated.

Locally, dealers declare that cars enough are available at present, except in a few instances, for the local demand, but with all splendid outlooks for a perfect crop and business year, the demand is expected to increase steadily from now on throughout the year. Good rains, pretty weather, and the coming of the touring season combine to make bright prospects for the 1925 business of local dealers.

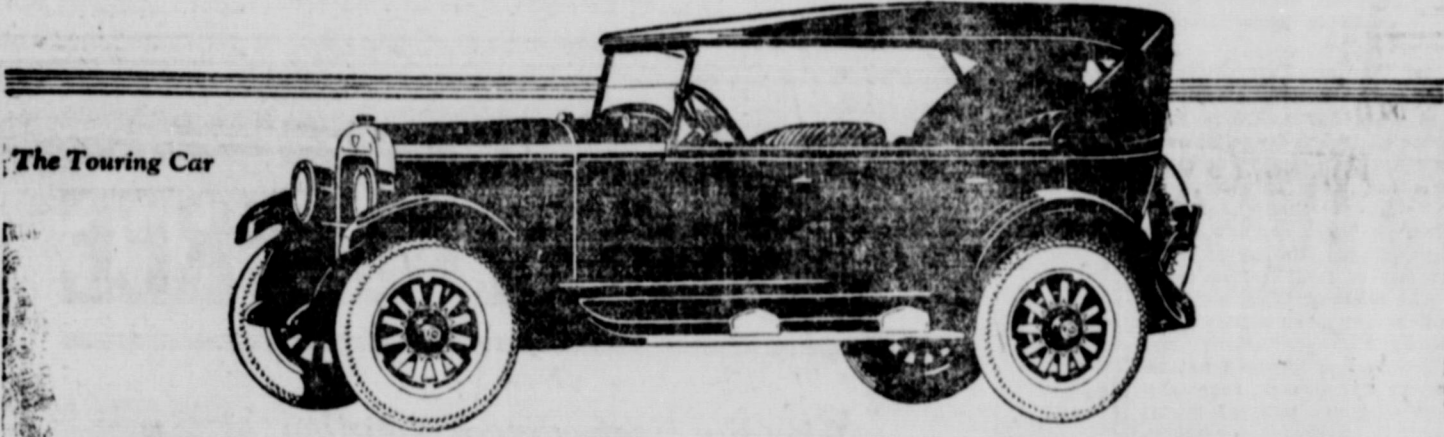

THE WORK OF THE NEAR EAST RELIEF IS BEING DONE IN SIX COUNTRIES BORDERING ON THE MEDITERRANEAN AND BLACK SEAS

MAKING HISTORY THROUGH CHARITY

Near East Relief Is World's Greatest Charity, Says Annual Report to Congress.

MILLION GIVERS DURING YEAR

What Dawes Plan Did for Europe, Philanthropy is Doing in Bible Lands.

The state committee of Near East Relief has received from Washington a copy of the organization's annual report, which was laid before the Senate a few days ago by its presiding officer, Vice President Dawes, who happens also to be one of the national trustees of the relief organization. This report is filed with Congress annually in accordance with the national charter of Near East Relief, and embodies a full account of the work done during the calendar year. The report says in part:

"In principle what the Dawes Committee did in Europe in 1924, American philanthropy has attempted to do in the Near East. A concentration of ways and means of international reconstruction was not only a prime essential of good relief, but it became peculiarly necessary in 1924 to enable American philanthropy adequately to round out its work.
 "The chain of orphanages that Near East Relief has built up overseas is the most remarkable success of continuing charity that the American people has ever achieved; for the raising of money in a spurt after some great catastrophe is child's play compared with the continuous support, year in and year out, of children salvaged from death in such catastrophe.

Volunteer Workers Everywhere
 "More than a million Americans contributed \$4,265,323 to Near East Relief during the past year. But even more significant than this financial response was the large enlistment of volunteer workers throughout the United States. Local committees in every state of the Union included 12,000 persons in their active membership. The National Woman's Committee had the organized assistance of 45,725 women's organizations and clubs. More than a hundred nationwide Advisory Committees, representing various religious, political, social or commercial groups, co-operated in nationwide promotion of Near East Relief. It has been this volunteer service on a large scale which has made possible the effective and economical collection of funds necessary for the overseas operations.
 "The general policy in our work abroad during the year has been to confine activities, as largely as practicable, to orphanage and child-welfare work. In a war-ravaged, impoverished area, where 28 per cent of the population are refugees and where the wholesale exchanges of the populations are still in progress with an inevitable accompaniment of suffering, reduction of the relief program has not been easy.
 During the past year the service of Near East Relief abroad reached 554,978 persons, of whom the great majority were women and children. This service included food, medical aid, education, clothing and personal service, such as the release of Greek military and civil prisoners and the supervision of refugee emigration. Children in orphanages numbered 41,062 at the beginning of the year; children supervised and subsidized in families were 18,774, and children in special schools were 1,454. The institutions supported were as follows: 46 orphanage centers, 65 hospitals and clinics, and 23 special schools and other institutions. The report adds:

Homes for Refugees
 Discussing the refugee problem in Greece, the report says:
 "When the allied nations sought a solution of the greatest human problem since the days of Moses—the replanting of a million Turkish-speaking Greeks who were refugees from Turkey—America provided the man to lead the effort in the founder and executive committeeman of the Near East Relief, Henry Morgenthau.
 "Near East Relief in nominating one of its own officials to this high international task was showing no immodesty. It was essential that American philanthropy promote all possible means of helping Greece to restore itself so that thousands of orphan children could eventually leave the orphanages.
 "Beyond the high sentimental value of participating in the giving of work to refugee families, it was a plain case of necessity for stabilizing the regions surrounding the American orphanages in order to complete the job of child relief."

Anti-Malaria Campaign
 "The outstanding cause of the Near East is malaria," says a report. "During the past year the Near East Relief conducted a comprehensive demonstration of anti-malaria technique at Corinth, Greece, where the disease was making heavy inroads in the American orphanages. The American director had succumbed to the disease and several of the American nurses were likewise victims. Children went ill by the hundreds.
 "A survey of the local surroundings of the orphanage showed that 64 per cent of the native population were infected. The Near East Relief mobilized sanitary engineers to find the root of the epidemic. The source was a vast swamp covering more than a square mile, and acres of vineyards from which the malarial mosquitoes swept over the whole valley of Corinth.
 "With Greek government support, the Americans obtained authority to drain the swamps and enforce rigid sanitary regulations in the town. Ninety orphan boys did the work, assisted by squads of refugee laborers. After two months' work the swamp was dry; fifty miles of irrigation ditches had been completed; 783 open wells had been covered; 29 reservoirs were oiled biweekly; 300 houses were under constant inspection, a small river channel had been deepened, and 2,000 pounds of petroleum was being used weekly for oiling stagnant water.
 "Thus the mosquito plague was got under control, and instead of 14,000 cases of virulent malaria per month, as in the previous year, not a single new case of malaria was reported in August. The percentage of children ill from malaria dropped from 56 to 1 per cent.
 "The government of Turkey, hearing of the success of this experiment in Greece, has asked the Near East Relief to give advice and assistance in a similar campaign at Angora, the new Turkish capital."

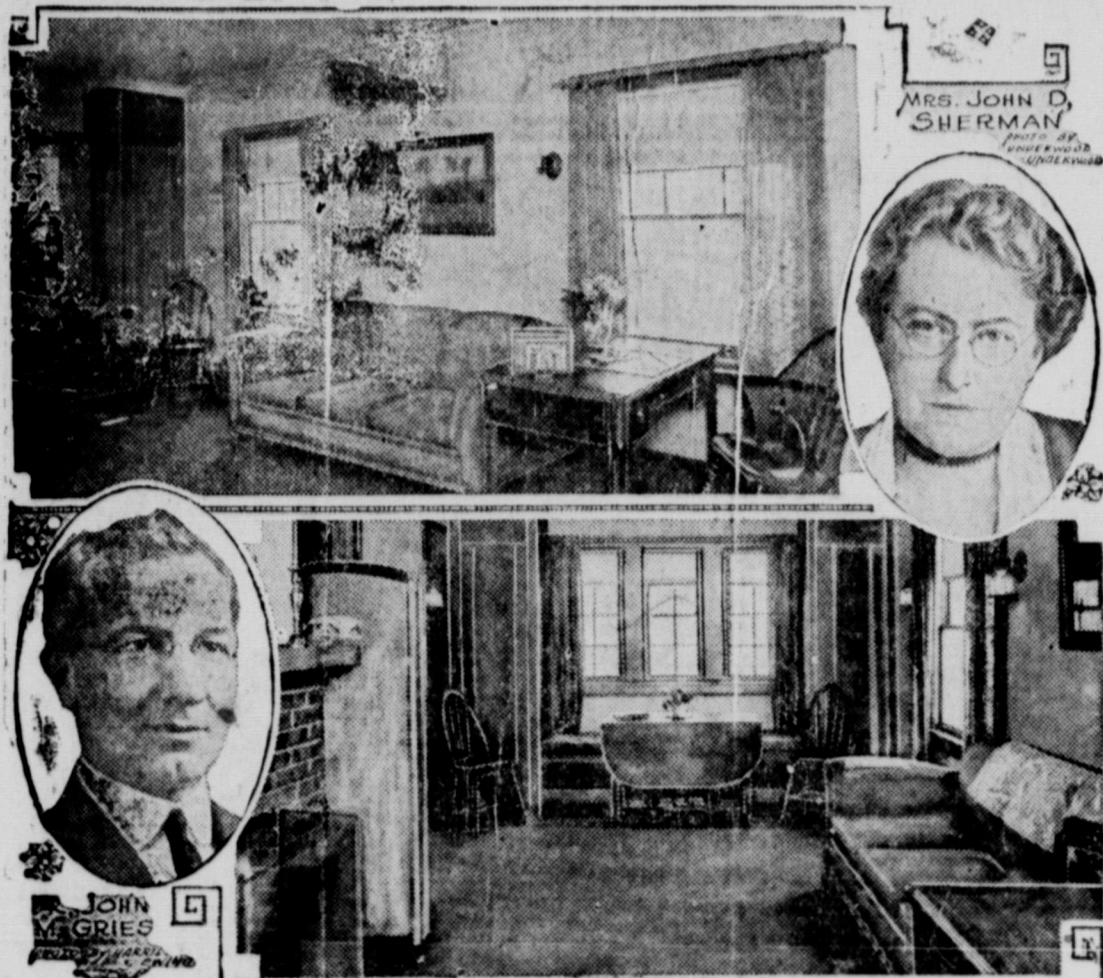




