## NEGRO SLAYERS TO DIE IN JUNE

Frank and Lorenzo Noel Must Sit in  
Electric Chair On June 29 Fol-  
lowing Sentence Today

TRIAL LASTED 90 MINUTES

Mrs. Mary Steer, Victim of Two Negroes,  
Only Witness To Be Examined—Judge Misread Date

DALLAS, May 28.—Frank and Lorenzo Noel, negro slayers, were sentenced to die in the electric chair June 29 for the confessed criminal assault upon Mrs. Mary Steer by a jury here today.

The sentence was passed by Judge C. A. Pippin after both had been found guilty. Lorenzo was found guilty in a hearing lasting 20 minutes, immediately after Frank had been found guilty.

Mrs. Mary Steer, principal in the attack, was the only witness at the hearing.

The two separate trials lasted only an hour and thirty minutes.

The negroes will not be tried on the other five outstanding indictments against them in connection with the death of Ryan Atkins, W. M. Milledge and attack upon Mrs. Mabel Berry.

The negroes were led back to their cell by an escort of State Rangers 90 minutes after the opening of the trial. There was no demonstration and no disorder in the vicinity of the court building. The negroes will be held under heavy guard until transferred to Huntsville to await execution.

The negroes gained another day of life when Judge Pippin misread his calendar. He first sentenced them to die June 28, which falls on a Sunday. When notified of his error, he changed it to Monday, June 29th.

### Jury Selected Quickly

DALLAS, May 28.—Selection of a jury to try Frank Noel, charged with criminal attack on Mrs. Mary Steer, was completed today 45 minutes after the session got under way.

Several veniremen were excused for cause. District Attorney Shelby Cox took 12 men from the venire of 40.

"These men will do," Cox said.

The defense accepted the men, who were sworn in.

Noel pleaded guilty the second time when the indictment was read to the jury. Mrs. Mary Steer was summoned as the first witness.

### Public Is Barred

DALLAS, May 28.—A cordon of armed guards were thrown about the criminal court building here at dawn where Frank and Lorenzo Noel, confessed negro slayers, go to trial on a series of indictments charging murder, criminal assault and robbery.

The public has been barred from the court room for the first time in the history of the city, and unauthorized persons were not allowed to enter the building.

Four State Rangers and several county officers were posted in the court room as an inner guard for the prisoners.

"Shoot to kill" orders have been issued to the officers in event of a mob attempt.

### Negroes Tried Separately.

DALLAS, May 28.—Frank and Lorenzo Noel, confessed slayers, will be tried separately for assault on Mrs. Mary Steer last Easter, it was announced when the trial opened in district court here today. Although neither the state or defense requested the severance, Judge C. A. Pippin announced the ruling.

The two negroes were brought into the court room shortly after court opened at 9 o'clock. Four Rangers constituted the personal bodyguard for the prisoners who were apparently unmoved by the spectacle.

Only a few persons gathered in the vicinity of the court building while all traffic was directed away from the vicinity.

Forty veniremen were brought into the court room for jury examination shortly after 9 o'clock.

### RIO GRANDE FLOODED

International Bridge at Eagle Pass Washed Out by High Water

## ETERNAL HELL IS VANTER THEME

Evangelist Defines Hell As Place of  
Eternal Homesickness Where  
Wicked Are Shut Away

COMPARED WITH PRISON

Says Both Are Places of Segregation  
of Good and Wicked—Saved  
Will Not Suffer

A fine crowd gathered at the First Christian church last night to hear Evangelist Vawter speak on the subject: "Does the Bible Teach Eternal Punishment?" He began by showing that whatever is said of Heaven is also said of Hell so far as duration is concerned. He passed over the question of the literalness of the fire, but made the following points:

"Hell will be a place of eternal homesickness. A place where we are shut away forever from those we love who have accepted the Saviour and eternal life.

"Some people say that God is too good to cause one of His creatures to suffer forever. Why not be fair to God, and say that God is too good to allow one of His creatures to suffer forever without doing everything that He could do to keep any one from suffering forever. Don't forget that God gave His Son to keep any one from suffering forever, and if you do suffer forever, it will be in spite of God and not because of Him.

"The penitentiary is full of men who are shut up because it is not safe to allow them to run at large. They are a menace to society. God has a place of segregation where He puts the wicked because He loves the good people so well, and He has fixed it so they are saved from association with the evil ones. Heaven could not be Heaven if all the wicked of earth were there.

"Instead of saying that God loves the wicked too well to allow them to suffer forever, let us say that God loves the good too well to make them suffer forever as they would suffer if they were forced to spend eternity with the wicked."

## TO SHIP WATER

West Texas Utilities Co. of Hamlin Applies For Two Carloads Water From Sweetwater Daily

Reporting that the lake which supplies Hamlin with water was low, the West Texas Utilities Co. of the Jones county city, applied to Sweetwater late Wednesday for two carloads of water to be shipped from here daily.

The water was said to be wanted for the making of ice, the present water supply being unsatisfactory.

Beginning this week, probably Thursday or Friday, the city will ship two carloads of Lake Trammell water to Hamlin daily. The revenue will probably run 18 cents per thousand, it was stated.

## MEMORIAL DAY IS TO BE OBSERVED

Legionnaires and Auxiliary Will Deco-  
rate Graves of War Heroes  
Saturday Morning

UNION SERVICE SUNDAY

American Legion to Sponsor Memo-  
rial Services at First Christian  
Church—Arrange Program

National Memorial Day will be observed in Sweetwater Saturday, when the American Legion, assisted by members of the Legion Auxiliary, will decorate the grave of World War veterans at the city cemetery and Sunday, when union memorial services will be conducted at the First Christian church under the direction of the Oscar McDonald Post of Nolan county.

At 9:30 Saturday morning, all Legionnaires will gather at the square and proceed to the cemetery at 10 o'clock where the graves of war heroes will be decorated with flowers. Every one who will contribute wreaths and flowers for this purpose have been asked to notify Legion officials, the Legion Auxiliary or telephone 216 and the flowers will be sent for.

Only a short program featuring the decoration of the graves of war dead is planned for Saturday morning. The Memorial program at the First Christian church Sunday afternoon, however, will be a very complete and beautiful service, Legion officials announced today.

All ex-service men will gather at the east side of the court house at 2:30 o'clock Sunday and will march in a body to the First Christian church which has been offered the Legion for use on the occasion. Color bearers with the flags, and a color guard, all in uniform, will head the parade to the church.

The services will be in charge of Post Commander Ray Scudguy and the Legion membership. Rev. J. T. McKissick, pastor of the First Christian church, will deliver the Memorial address. Those in charge of the music of the Vawter revival, now in progress at the First Christian church, will appear on the musical program during the afternoon, and the Sweetwater Choral club will sing.

## COLLIER CASE IS NEARING CLOSE

Closing Arguments Expected This  
Afternoon in Trial Mrs. Collier  
Charged Murder Son-in-Law

MRS. WOOD TAKES STAND

Tells of Conversation With Mrs. Col-  
lier in Which Threats Against  
Robertson Made

HASKELL, May 28.—Closing arguments is expected to start here this afternoon in the trial of Mrs. Frank Collier, charged with murder in connection with the slaying of her 17-year-old son-in-law, Elzie Robertson.

Both the state and defense rested shortly before noon.

The case drew rapidly toward a close after Mrs. Frank Woods detailed a conversation with Mrs. Collier in which threats were made against young Robertson.

The only testimony offered by the defense was the testimony of Mrs. Collier given by her at the habeas corpus hearing for her husband when she said that she "had no idea that young Robertson would be killed and that she endeavored to prevent her husband from killing him."

Efforts of the defense to place Collier on the stand were successfully evaded on the ground that he was under conviction and therefore could not be used as a witness.

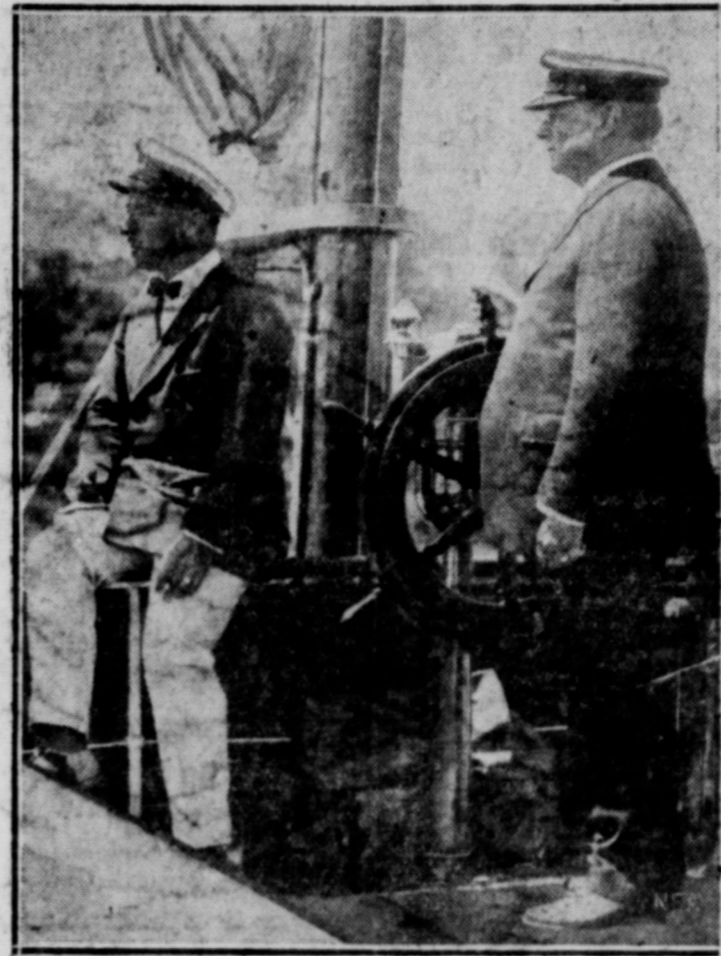
## WEEKS BETTER

## BODY OF NEGRO MISSES CROWDS

Scores Pedestrians in Crowded Chi-  
cago Loop District Have Narrow  
Escape Hurling Body

STEAM BOILER EXPLODES

Two Negroes Killed, Another Injured  
and Nine Chinese Waiters Hurt  
By Force of Blast

CHICAGO, May 28.—The body of a dead negro was hurled from a fourth story window in the crowded Loop district today, narrowly missing many pedestrians in its flight, when a steam boiler in a Chinese restaurant exploded.

Two negroes were killed in the explosion, another hurt, and nine Chinese waiters injured.

The other dead negro was flattened out with tremendous force against a wall in the restaurant.

## HUGE FIRE LOSS AT CAMP MABRY

Flames of Mysterious Origin Destroy  
Camp Warehouse—National  
Guard Loss Is \$600,000

INVESTIGATION IS ORDERED

Officers Will Probe Cause of Fire—  
Property Destruction Will Not  
Interfere With Encampment

AUSTIN, May 28.—Fire of mysterious origin destroyed the principal warehouse at Camp Mabry last night with the Texas National Guard equipment loss estimated at \$600,000.

Assistant Adjutant General Neill H. Banister will appoint a board of officers today to make an investigation as to the cause of the fire. One theory is that the fire was of incendiary origin.

Announcement was made by Major Banister that the loss would not interfere with the summer camp of the Texas National Guard.

## LUNCHEON CLUB PLANS FOR TRIP

Trades Trip Dates Set For June 9-10-  
11 Barring Unforeseen Incidents—

MAIL MEN HERE SATURDAY

Plans For Their Entertainment and  
Legion Activities Discussed—  
Evangelists Attend

Further plans for the three-day trade trip, June 9, 10, and 11, sponsored by the Sweetwater club, were outlined at the regular noon luncheon of that organization at Hotel Wright, Thursday.

Chester Freeman, chairman of the trip committee, announced that the trip would be held June 9, 10 and 11 barring unforeseen circumstances, while arrangements have been made for the Sweetwater Boys band to accompany the trippers to play at each stop. Cox, in behalf of the Nolan County American Legion, briefly outlined the aim and plans of the Legion in raising the endowment fund during National Endowment Week which begins Monday, and asked the aid and co-operation of the Sweetwater club. Following a motion by Rufus Wright, the club voted to contribute \$30 to the county's quota of \$850.

## TO MOVE TRACKS

Orient to Widen South First by Re-  
moval of Passage Tracks—Ex-  
pect Paving to Start

Following a conference with engineers of the Texas and Pacific and Orient railroads here yesterday, city officials received the assurance of Orient officials that the Orient passing track on South First street would be moved from the middle of the street. Following this, it is expected that the paving of the street will get under way at once.

The Orient track cuts First street down to only 28 feet in width at its intersection near Orange street, and T. & P. and Orient engineers made arrangements to move the track over. They assured city officials that the track would be moved within three weeks.

Other paving work was discussed at a meeting of the city commission in special session late Wednesday. It was announced that the city had accepted a deed to a strip of land on Crane street. The land is on the west side of the street near the Catholic church, measuring 300 feet long by 16 feet wide. It is believed that the only obstacle to paving Crane street is removed with the deed of the land.

At the Wednesday afternoon session, the commission assigned further duties to Meat Inspector Dr. O. Stephenson, making him also hotel, restaurant and dairy inspector.

## BOND IS FIXED

D. J. Rook Out on \$5,000 Bond Con-  
nection Slaying Roy Wilson in  
Dallas Movie House

All of which leads back to the influence of women over all men. For man is very much a product of his environment. He is very susceptible to the influences that surround him. Of these influences, women wield the most potent.

Find a man who has made a striking success in any field of endeavor and the chances are there is a devoted woman, usually in the background, who by her cheery encouragement and inspiration, keeps the said male in the path that leads to conquest.

The wife of the noted pitcher reveals conditions in the home life of "The Big Smoke" which show how his strength has been conserved throughout the years, so that he could continue winning.

**HAVE A HEART, MR. DAWES**

Senator Curtis is chairman of the rules committee of the senate. Consequently Mr. Dawes proposes to invade Kansas and ask Senator Curtis what he proposes to do about it. Senator Curtis is a politician. No politician likes fire any better than any cat likes water. Consequently Senator Curtis takes the advice of the Elder Weller and brings in a whole bundle of alibis. In the first place, Senator Curtis says that from youth up he has been in favor of limiting debate in the senate, but he doubts whether it can be done except in two ways. They might, he suggests, pass a rule requiring the senator to confine his discussion to the subject in hand, and in the next place Mr. Dawes should get after the chronic offenders who insist on discussing everything from the birth of Adam to the death of the Devil. Senator Curtis is here plainly after "Honest" Bob LaFollette. But how in the name of common sense is Mr. Dawes going to stop Bob or anybody else? We will suppose the senate has under consideration a bill to eradicate the boll weevil. Bob has just gotten to a thrill-

ing account of how they put up gelatine in the reign of Ramses I. The gentleman from Wisconsin, Mr. Dawes says, will please confine himself to the question before the senate. The gentleman from Wisconsin says he is confining himself to the question for he will presently show the falling off of gelatine was indirectly traceable to the increase of the boll weevil about the year 3800 B. C. Now what is Mr. Dawes going to do about it? Will he be in a position to say that in that momentous year there was no indirect relation between a diminished supply of gelatine and an increased supply of boll weevils? He will not. But suppose he did, and Bob still stuck to his boll weevil story. We would have here an issue not necessarily of gelatine or boll weevils but rather what one calls veracity. Now what equipment is there in the senate to try an issue of veracity? None whatever. It used to be different. Once the grand, gloomy and peculiar John Randolph of Roanoke said something about the august Henry Clay being a blackleg. Whereupon the august Henry sent a swift challenge for a deadly duel. They met. But their marksmanship was fully up to that of a federal official shooting at a bootlegger. Nobody was hurt and honor was satisfied. But that was long ago when statesmen took their liquor strong and straight and their Glorias weak and wild. You do not shoot senators now unless one gets between you and a bootlegger who is trying to intimidate a congressman into taking a drink. Therefore Mr. Dawes could not shoot Bob even for discussing ancient Egyptian gelatine and boll weevils. It would do no good to yell Hell and Maria at him. Bob has heard that before. So that remedy totters and falls back on the land even at the launching pier.

**HIGHWAY SAFETY SLOGANS**

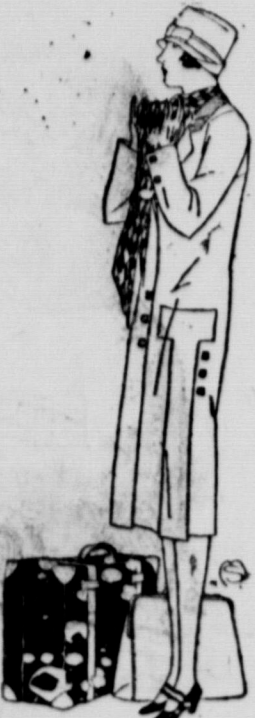

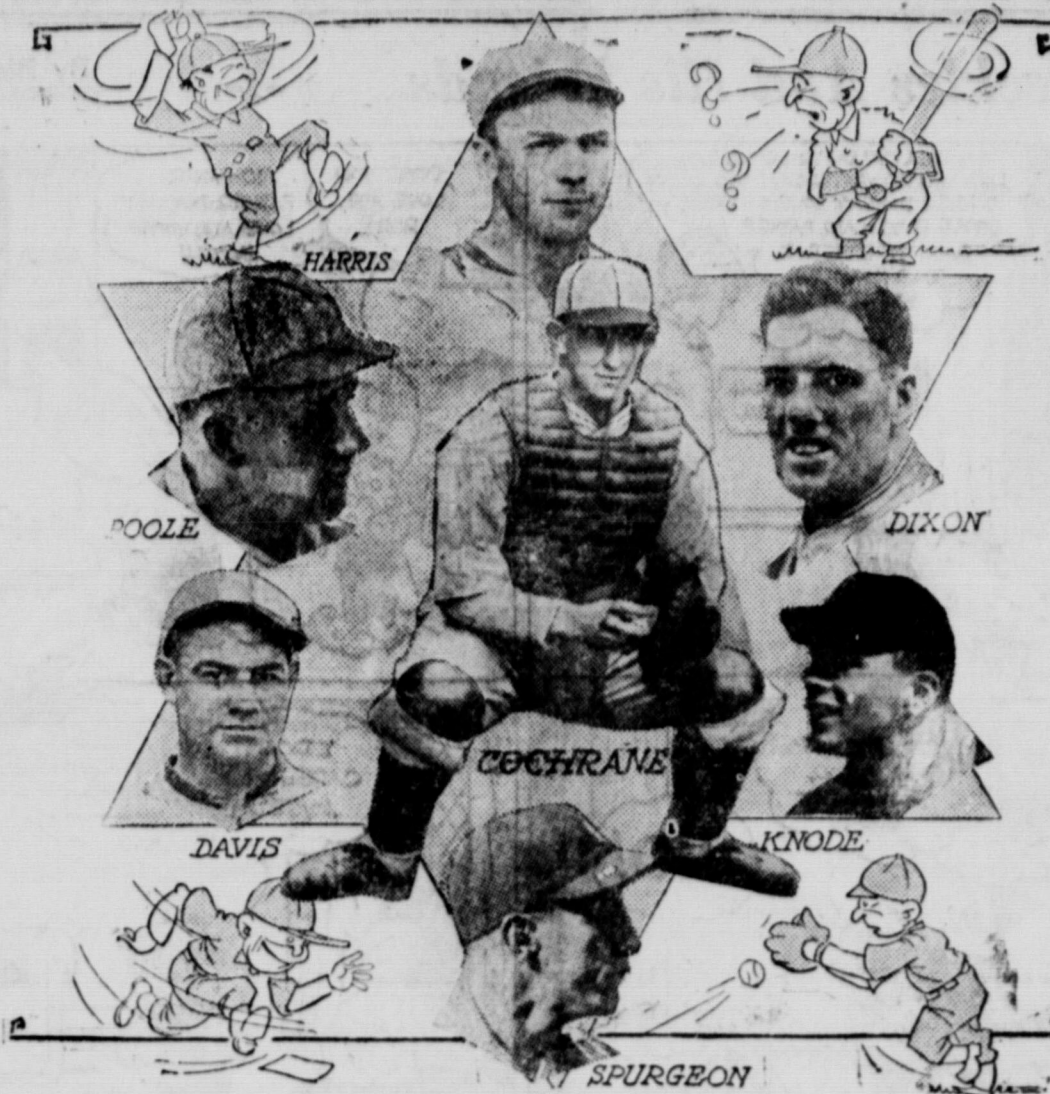

A major league club, having a vital weakness at one or more spots, can not hope for much success. Very often the addition of one ball player, who plugs up an apparent weakness, makes a pennant contender out of an ordinary club. The work of certain new players in the American League this year bears out my contention, that one player often makes a club. In the early season success of the Chicago White Sox, the work of one recruit stands out in bold relief, like Davis, shortstop. Davis appears to have plugged up the weak spot on the White Sox that has been a serious handicap since the disciplining of Swede Risberg. Shortstop Important Cog. An infield without a capable shortstop is no infield. For that reason the Sox, for several years, have been floundering about getting nowhere. A half dozen players have been tried out at short with varying success. Then along comes the Davis. Davis is no kid. He has had much professional experience in minor leagues of the higher classification. He looks like a ball player and so fits in playing the part he looks for. No doubt having Eddie Collins working alongside of him has done much to stabilize Davis. The Sox manager has taken a great interest in him and feels that Davis is going to be a big help to his club. Collins has impressed upon Davis the importance of the double play. He cuts the ball loose ala Collins. Double plays can not be made by merely tossing the ball. The player starting the double-killing must put something on the ball when he makes the force at second. Double plays have been the savior of the White Sox in many of the early games. The combination of Knamm, Davis, Collins and Shesly is certain to give the Washington infield keen competition for the double play honors of the American League. Connie Mack Fortunate. Another White Sox youngster to make good is Outfielder Spencer Harris. This young man, playing in Harry Hooper's place in right

field, is doing a most excellent job. For the Cleveland Indians, the fine play of Spurgeon at third base has rounded out the Cleveland infield. Bob Knobe, at first, has been another link in the success of the Cleveland club. At Philadelphia, Connie Mack was very fortunate in being able to pick up so capable a first baseman as Poole, when Joe Hauser broke his knee-cap just prior to the season's opening. Young catchers able to deliver from the start are the exception in the majors. The American League has been fortunate in discovering two such performers. Dixon of the St. Louis Browns and Cochrane of the Athletics have already established themselves as big league regulars. No doubt they are welcomed by Hank Severid and Cy Perkins, who for years have had to practically carry the entire catching burden of the two clubs. The success of these seven youngsters has been the outstanding feature in the play of their respective clubs.

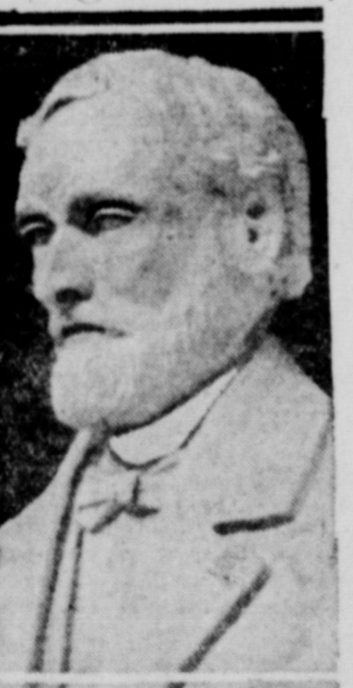

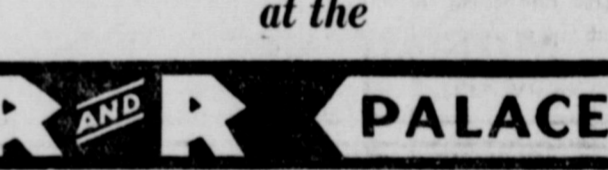
