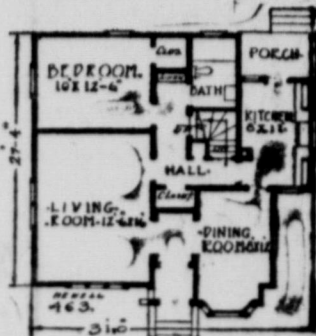

Auto Sales Climb During The First Week of June; 15 Sold

The first week of June, just passed, saw a new high record for auto sales in one week since the first of the year when the week's registrations, up to 10 o'clock Saturday morning, totaled 16 new cars, and a large number of second-hand cars.

The new car sales during the week just past exceed any previous week in May. If sales continue steady during the balance of the month, indications are that the month of June will be the high month of the first half of the year.

HIGH PRODUCTION CONTINUES

Chevrolet Sales Manager Says Usual Summer Slump Not Forthcoming

High automotive production will continue well through the second half of 1925, it is expected by R. H. Grant, sales manager of the Chevrolet Motor company, who has spent three months of the current year visiting in direct contact with Chevrolet dealers. His travels have taken him to most of the large cities and more than half the states.

"Demand for cars, which even before this time last year was beginning to slacken, still remains strong," said Mr. Grant. "The sales peaks and depressions of former years are beginning to flatten out. The automobile has become a year 'round product, particularly since the closed car grew to such favor. Seasonable variations in demand are becoming less marked."

"The rate of the Chevrolet unfilled order list against recent record production strikes augurs well for future sales. Chevrolets went into May with 25,682 unfilled orders. In spite of a

large production schedule the amount of reserve orders was diminished but slightly, due to the number of new orders received."

INCREASE POWER

Maxwell Engines Make Improvements In Car Design

A statement of the Maxwell-Chrysler engineers that a 15 per cent increase in horsepower has been accomplished in the new Maxwell without increasing bore or stroke, apparently has considerable to do with the new engineering achievements of combining into the new Maxwell models, for the first time in low-priced motor cars, the three assets of economy, speed and flexibility. These sweeping

improvements are said to have been made possible through redesigning the cylinder blocks, changing valves and valve seats, improving the cooling system and lengthening the pistons. The trick seems to be to group the third with the other two.

"The same engineers," says Hubert Toler, of the local Maxwell-Chrysler dealer, "declare that obtaining the third is a most different engineering problem, even with the proper design. An engineer can get speed and acceleration, but that almost invariably

means loss of economy. He can have economy and also speed, but that means loss of economy. He can have the very high gear ratio. He may secure economy and acceleration through the use of a small engine and low gear ratio, but he will lose in speed. Maxwell, for the first time in all motor car history, is giving speed, acceleration and economy in a four-cylinder car to a degree far higher than practically any one, except actual owners of the new cars, really suspects.
