WILL RETIRE FROM RING

Gibbons Says He Is Through-Tun ney Will Demand Chance To Fight Jack Dempsey

NEW YORK, June 6.-Knocked out for the first time since he started boxing 15 years ago, Tommy Gibbons has given up his ambition to be the world's heavyweight champion and will retire from the ring.

Gibbons, who was floored twice by Gene Tunney, former A. E. F. champion, in the 12th round last night, and was counted out while gamely trying to pull himself up by the ropes, made no announcement but he has decided to give up boxing.

Gibbons took his defeat gamely. "This is a business where it always comes to those who wait long enough" Gibbons said today.

"I just couldn't get started. I was tired and weary through " the fight. Tunney is a greatly improved fighter. I have no kick coming. I had my chance and I am glad I can retire. I can go into another business."
