FIREWORKS HERE TO BE SENSATION

Sparks and Fire of Great Value Will
Bring Spectacular Climax To
Fourth Celebration

PLAN RECORD DISPLAY

Event Will Be Greatest Scene Ever
Witnessed Here—Give Description
Of Numbers

On the night of July Fourth, dazzling fireworks will go up in flames, sparks, balls of fire and smoke to end the two-day American Legion celebration here with the most spectacular and gorgeous display of fireworks ever seen in West Texas. Legion officials declare that the display, which will be free, will be one of the most sensational and thrilling sights ever witnessed in this section.

The great display contains 48 separate numbers, concluding with the grand finale and an explosion of 48 more bomb shells at the same time.

The display will begin at the park at 10:30 p. m. and nearly an hour will be required to fire the many explosives.

Some idea is gained of the spectacular event is gained from the following description of pieces to be fired during the display.

Opening Salute

A simultaneous discharge of six nine inch aerial bombs which explode high in the air with terrific detonations announcing the opening of the display.

Magic Illumination

With twelve extra large prismatic illuminators the grounds are lighted in beautiful manner with bright tints of crimson, emerald green and other colors blending delightfully.

Old Glory Shells

Three 12-inch special shells break high in the air forming cloud of brilliant red, white, and blue fire, with explosions saluting the colors.

Haley's Comet

A 12-inch special shell throwing a series of comets through the sky leaving an ever widening trail of lurid sparks.

Swarm Butterflies

When two of these 16-inch shells burst, thousands of butterflies swarm around like magic.

Shell of Shells

This number is composed of one 15 inch shell containing many small ones. The large shell explodes high in the air throwing out the small ones that explode in every direction.

Royal Purple

A flight of special shells that weave a wonderful cloth of purple in the sky.

Fool Device

Nothing but a fool would cut the capers this device goes through spinning constantly it throws out from time to time a sizzling, whirling spray followed by a blinding flash and report; after a moment of rest it is back again active as ever. This is repeated five times.

Dandelion

Produced by discharge of one 15-inch combination shell which floats high in the heavens with golden dandelion in full bloom nesting in the center of green foliage, with a great golden spider waiting patiently in the center of its web for its prey.

Garden of Paradise

Produced by the discharge of one 18-inch shell disclosing floating hemispheres hanging waving and sparkling gradually spreading over the heavens. Never before exhibited.

American Legion Emblem

Delineating in brilliant lines of colored fire the large sized design of the American Legion.

Daisies and Buttercups

A floral effect produced by the discharge of three 9-inch shells, forming a canopy of daisies and buttercups.

Electric Canopy

Three special shells which break into Japanese Golden stars spreading a thousand feet through the sky.

Inspiration

This effect is created by soft tints of blue and a radiant gold and has never been equalled in the pyrotechnic art.

Aerial Engagement

Produced by the discharge of a 15-inch, 50 shot special artillery bomb-shell which sends forth brilliant flashes accompanied by heavy detonations, a realistic representation of an engagement between airplanes.

Liberty Bell

A reproduction of one of the oldest relics of America's fight for freedom.

Summer Snow Storm

Discharge of three nine-inch shells which fill the skies with thousands of particles of fire, resembling a brilliant snowstorm.

CHARGE MONEY IS CAUSE OF TRIAL

Defense in Shepherd Germ Murder
Case Says McClintock Fortune At
Bottom of Prosecution

"PEOPLE ARE JEALOUS"

Stewart Charges Others Of Being
Jealous Of Shepherd's Money—
State Demands Hanging

CRIMINAL COURT ROOM, CHICAGO, June 24.—Money is at the bottom of the prosecution of William D. Shepherd on charges that he murdered his ward, Billy McClintock, William Scott Stewart, chief defense attorney, charged in his argument for acquittal.

"If Mr. Shepherd had taken a hatchet and murdered his own son, this would simply be another murder case," Stewart argued. "But in this case, Billy McClintock had lots of money. There are people who are jealous because Billy gave it to Shepherd."

"That is why Shepherd is being prosecuted and persecuted," Stewart started his arguments when George E. Gorman, first assistant state attorney, finished his demand that Shepherd be hanged "for the murder of Billy McClintock."

Dallas Black Injures Two When He
Runs Amuck With Shotgun In
"Little Mexico"

DALLAS, June 24.—Two persons were seriously injured and several others imperiled when Sam Davis, negro, ran amuck with a shotgun in "Little Mexico" here today.

Arona Blaza, a Mexican woman, and Leroy Foreman, negro, were struck by shot as the negro fired several times in the street.

Davis escaped after the shooting which resulted over a love affair, officers believe.

RAIN NORTH

Mulshoe Reports Two Inches In Past
24 Hours—Panhandle Counties
Get Rain—Good Crops

BRITISH MARINES LEAVE HONG KONG

Troops Being Rushed To Shameen,
Foreign Settlement—Chinese
Situation Is Tense

REFUGEES ARE FLEEING

Many Americans Included Among
Foreigners Who Rush From Sha-
meen—Students—Troops Clash

CANTON, June 24.—While foreign refugees, including many Americans were pouring into strike ridden Hong Kong from the foreign settlement, Shameen, at Canton, British and Indian troops were being dispatched to Shameen from Hong Kong. This move followed a clash yesterday at Canton involving Chinese students and British marines in which one Frenchman was killed and several British were slightly wounded and indicated the British intentions of defending Shameen with arms if necessary.

It takes on added significance in view of Hong Kong dispatches that before the British marines replied to the Chinese fire, the British consul warned the Canton government that any Chinese attempt to enter the foreign concession would be forcibly resisted and the government held responsible.

At Hong Kong, additional Chinese were reported joining in the general strike while Americans were enrolling in the special consular forces and foreign women were working as waitresses in cafes.

Special measures were being taken to keep the public works in operation. The British government is reported prepared to take relentless measures against any attempt at disorder. At Peking, the Americans planned a meeting to consider the situation.

Says Disturbance Fostered

LONDON, June 24.—The British government possesses "evidence that agents of another country are fostering disturbances in China," foreign secretary Austen Chamberlain told House of Commons today in answer to questioning.

He told another questioner that Great Britain did not contemplate the appointment of an ambassador to Russia.

Bandits Hold Up, Bind and Gag Two
Men To Rob Marcus Feldman's
Store On Broadway

NEW YORK, June 24.—Three armed bandits held up, bound and gagged two men in Marcus Field's jewelry store on Broadway, and escaped with a large quantity of diamonds and platinum.

The loss will exceed \$200,000, it was estimated.

FARABEE DIES

Noted Anthropologist Had Suffered
Strange Malady 3 Years—Stood
35 Blood Transfusions

WASHINGTON, June 24.—Dr. William Curtis Farabee, 60, noted anthropologist, died here in a hospital today.

Three years ago Dr. Farabee was stricken with a mysterious malady while heading an exploring expedition in the wilds of South America, and since then he has fought courageously to overcome the disease.

He had submitted to more than 35 blood transfusions in efforts to save his life.

MAN IS ARRESTED AFTER NIGHT FIRE

TRADE TRIPPERS MAKE TOUR EAST

Over 100 Sweetwater Boosters Visit
Trent and Merkel In Final
Excursion Tuesday

BAND GIVES CONCERTS

Program In Each Town Featured By
Band Music, Pep Squad And Ad-
dresses By County Judge

Sweetwater trade trippers completed the annual summer excursion with a tour east Tuesday afternoon when about 60 cars and over three hundred boosters with the Sweetwater band and a lively pep squad visited Trent and Merkel in Taylor county.

The motor caravan left Sweetwater shortly after 5 o'clock Tuesday afternoon and went to Merkel via Eskota. Banners and streamers, advertising the American Legion celebration for July 3 and 4, and the Nolan County Fair, were seen on all cars, while advertising literature was distributed in each town.

Large crowds greeted the trippers in both Trent and Merkel, where the programs included band concerts, speeches, snake dances and singing.

County Judge A. S. Mauzey addressed the crowds at the two towns. He suggested Sweetwater as an ideal trading point for smaller towns in this section. He also issued a cordial invitation to the two towns to attend the celebration here in July, and urged that all be guests of Sweetwater for the big barbecue on July 3.

The Sweetwater band, under the direction of H. M. Rose furnished splendid music for the trip.

SUPPLEMENT TO REPORT

I wish to give a supplement and correction to the report of the city engineer on city improvements given in Sunday's Reporter, which was hurriedly made up, incomplete and the wrong impression unintentionally given the Reporter as to the paving program which the engineer wishes to correct.

The street paving is under the supervision of the Elrod Engineering company of Dallas. H. H. Batjer, resident engineer for the company. Mr. Batjer kindly gives a report of the work as follows:
Pine street from N. Third to N. 12th 2250 running feet; Elm street, 380 running feet; re surfacing, N. Third 380 feet, 50 feet wide; paving under contract, First street 1140 feet, 38 feet wide; First street, 1140 feet 30 feet wide; First street, 195 feet, 30 feet wide; First street 1325 feet, 40 feet wide; Crane street, 30 0feet, 30 feet wide; purposed street paving, Elm street 3875; North Fourth street, 3600.

The West Texas Construction company has done the paving and is a sample of the surfacing can be seen in Mr. Batjer's office.

One of the most important items overlooked in the other report is the street grading which is approximately 65,800 feet or about 11 miles. All the streets in the settled portions of the additions have been improved by W. T. Trammell, street commissioner.

In connection with this statement, I wish to say that the engineers have noticed lately that weeds, old cans and other unsightly trash and objects have made their disappearance from the alleys and streets in the last few weeks.

TELLS OF CANCER

Eminent Surgeon Says To Regulate Diet Carefully—Exercise

"Cancer is the great human menace. It is increasing by leaps and bounds. If anything, it is increasing more rapidly in the United States than it is in the British Isles. Of those now living in the British Isles, 5,000,000 are doomed to die of cancer if they do nothing to prevent it. In the United States the doomed number is 10,000,000 and might easily rise to 15,000,000 or 20,000,000."

This remarkable statement is made by Sir W. Arbuthnot Lane, Bart., one of the world's eminent surgeons and dietitians, in an article appearing in the June 20 issue of the Dearborn Independent.

According to Sir Arbuthnot, cancer is not caused by the bacillus that scientists have so long sought and not yet found, but rather by poisons created in the body by the food eaten. It is a filth disease, and its prevention is accomplished by keeping the digestive tract thoroughly drained of its accumulations.

Continuing the Doctor says: "What we should do then, if we would avoid cancer, is to eat whole wheat bread and raw fruits and vegetables, shunning all meat, first that we may be better nourished, second that we may more easily eliminate waste products and thus adequately drain the house in which our cells live. Whoever foregoes white bread will perform a great

service for himself. It is deadly." It is a difficult task to change the food habits of a nation or to induce the people to take sufficient exercise each day. Sir Arbuthnot says, however, that "whoever will correct his diet to a reasonable extent, take reasonable exercise and keep his digestive tract absolutely clean, need have no fear of cancer."
