NEFF IN LIMELIGHT

Quite a bit of interest has been stirred up in political circles by a reported interview with former governor Pat M. Neff while in Chicago this week attending a convention of a fraternal organization.

The former governor dropped out of sight very thoroughly and very suddenly about January 1, 1925, but came back from obscurity on the wings of what seems to be a sort of "tempest in a teapot."

According to the alleged interview, which Neff denies, the former governor landed on the Ferguson administration with both feet, criticizing the pardon record, among other things, and concluding that while the Klan issue was dead in Texas politics, clean law enforcement was not; that it would be an issue at the coming election but would not require Attorney General Moody to decide it.

There has been more or less of a breach between the Fergusons and Moody ever since the Amnesty bill

but the purported Neff statement would have brought a hot reply from the Attorney General, whose political aspirations may or may not include the governor's chair in 1927. The denial, however, from Neff obviated any reason for Moody becoming involved. The Neff denial follows:

"Neither in Chicago or elsewhere at any time have I directly or indirectly, in public or in private to any person, made any unfavorable critical remarks about any thing said or done by the Ferguson administration. Any purported interview about Texas politics is wholly without any foundation whatever."

The telegram from Sharpley, the correspondent who quoted Neff as saying the Ferguson administration would meet an untimely end, follows:

"Neff could be expected to deny his indiscretion in unbosoming himself to a total stranger. I approached him in the lobby of the Hotel Sherman here. 'I had told Neff I was from Houston, Texas, but had been away from my home state two years and knew little of what had happened there.

"Neff and I found chairs. 'Do you represent any Texas paper, Mr. Sharpley?' was the first thing he asked.

"No sir, I do not. I have worked for a number of them, but am fully occupied here now, I replied.

"Neff seemed relieved at this and I led him to assail the Fergusons as I reported in my dispatch to you.

"I told him that I attended Texas University several years ago when students burned Jim in effigy and he seemed much pleased.

"Neff seemed exuberant in spirits, which I attributed to rumors of late business success.

"Neff at the end of his diatribe on Texas politics attempted to exact a promise from me not to quote him on politics in the Press, which I had no intention of respecting. I went to him as a newspaper man and so I did myself. I was not making social calls but gathering news and information."

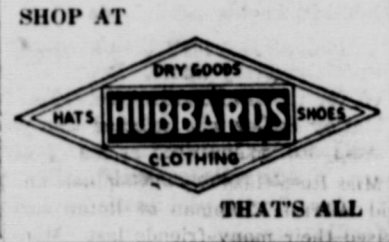
