PHILADELPHIA, June 30.—Golf as a remedy for ill is nothing new. 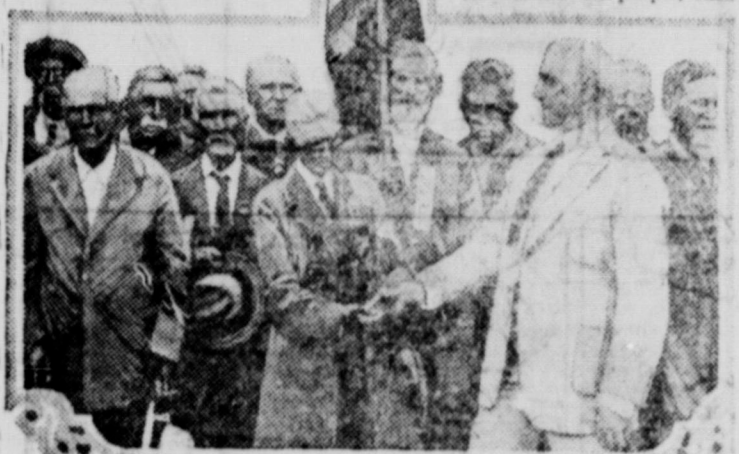

Presenting Memorial Coins To Confederate Veterans

PERHAPS the most impressive and touching ceremony in connection with the recent Enactment of Confederate Veterans at Dallas, Texas, was the presentation to their officers of the fifth, sixth and seventh memorial coins minted, by Hollis N. Randolph, President of the Stone Mountain Confederate Monumental Association.

To the Veterans, these beautiful coins minted by the United States Government in their honor, have a

great significance. Not only do they bear on their face the likenesses of their beloved leaders, Robert E. Lee and Stonewall Jackson, but by one of those strange coincidences, in which many are wont to see the hand of Providence, they were struck at the Mint on the birthday of Stonewall Jackson, January 21st.
