## CROP CONDITIONS GOOD IN COUNTY

Outlook For Bumper Yield All Crops Is Favorable, According to Nolan Farmers

MORE RAIN IS NEEDED

Grain Crops Over County Barring Up—Cotton Chopping Nearly Over—Labor Plentiful

The general condition of farm crops in Nolan county at the present is slightly above the average of years past, and favorably compares with the condition of the crops in early July last year, according to the opinion of various Nolan county farmers and others closely in touch with farm conditions.

Some stated that the crop outlook was even better this week, than at this time in previous years, while all indications are that a bountiful harvest of all crops will be the results of the well prepared soils, careful planting and working and timely rains.

More rain is needed in this section at present, farmers stated. Grain crops throughout this section are "burning up", it was said, and other crops need rain badly. Cotton, however, is still growing, and very little damage from either grasshoppers or lice has been reported.

Cotton chopping is going along in full sway throughout the county, and this work is nearly completed in some sections. It is believed that another ten days will see the cotton chopping completed. Although there is an increased acreage in cotton this year, individual farmers have planted no more than usual, several farmers stated. The increase is the result of new land being cultivated, new farms opened and more farmers coming to this country.

There is very little grain in this section. There is some grain sorghum planted and this crop needs rain.

Farm labor, which has been scarce, is plentiful now, farmers said, and sufficient cotton choppers and other laborers have been secured by nearly all farmers. The immigration to West Texas of farmers from the drought-stricken sections of east Texas has added materially to the supply of farm labor. There will be a heavy demand, as usual, for cotton pickers in this section, reports indicate. While it is too early to predict the time in which picking will get under way as the weather conditions of the next month are uncertain, it is not believed that the crop will be later than usual, and there will be plentiful employment for cotton pickers in this county and surrounding sections.

The early fruit crop is practically gone, farmers say, although there is some ripe peaches, grapes and Juné apples over the county. A good water melon crop was planted this year. Farmers in several communities over the county are already preparing for exhibits at the Nolan County Fair this fall.

Excavation Work Started On South First Street—Paving From Lamar to Musgrove

Excavation work for the paving of South First street was under way Wednesday, and West Texas Construction Co. officials stated that the street would be paved in short order. Practically all the curb and gutter work is completed along the street. The excavation work under way is for the pouring of concrete for the base of the pavement.

The project is on First street from Lamar to Musgrove street. Construction of the street from Lamar west to Musgrove will start later, it was said. The street is to be paved 30 feet wide from Lamar to El Paso street and 38 feet wide from El Paso to Musgrove. North First street will probably be the next project started after paving of South First is completed.

They dress for the show, of course, but their thought is that if they win they will be able to dress better next time.

## ITALY IS ROCKED BY EARTHQUAKES

Two Strong Shocks Shake Catania District Today—No Damage Is Reported

TREMOR HITS JAPAN

West Portion of Nation Rocked by Quake—Inhabitants Flee—Rain Storm Damages

ROME, Italy, July 8.—Two earthquakes rocked the Catania district today but did no damage. The shock was mild in the vicinity of Tenna, but strong in the city of Kantanis and even stronger in Acireale on the coast of the province, while at Via Grande and Zafferana the tremor caused panic.

Professor Rasfale Bendiandi's seismographs at Frenza registered two strong tremors 9,500 kilometers distant, part of the earthquake movements recently predicted to the United States.

Two mild earthquakes were felt during the night at Cividale, in the Udine region. Taranton reported that a six-second tremor was felt.

In the Tortorici region, a violent rainstorm did damage estimated at four million lire.

Shakes Japan

LONDON, July 8.—All of western Japan was shaken by an earthquake which rumbled through Nagoya and centered in the Hida mountains, according to a Times Tokio dispatch today.

The dispatch said terrified inhabitants rushed from their homes and spent the night in the open.

Many fissures in the earth were noticed, but no casualties were reported. Nagoya is a city lying between Tokio and Osaka.

## LIQUOR TRIALS CROWD DOCKETS

Department of Justice Officials Announce 23,000 Liquor Trials Clogged Court Dockets

STATE ATTORNEYS DISAGREE

Contradict Statement of New York Official That Enforcement Is Crippled—Speedy Trials

NEW YORK, July 8.—United States attorneys in representative cities thru out the country disagree with United States Attorney Emory Buckner of New York in his recent statement that prohibition enforcement had been crippled by clogged calendars in Federal courts.

A consensus obtained by the United Press shows that in no city other than New York, do run runners and bootleggers benefit from crowded court dockets.

Department of Justice official at Washington announced today, however, that 23,000 liquor cases clogged Federal courts at the end of the past fiscal year, June 30. Liquor cases instituted in Federal courts during the last ten months of the year comprise 68 more than 50 per cent of all Federal prosecutions.

Columbus, Ohio, reported 34 jail sentences for violations during the past month. The Chicago district attorney said that the prohibition was the easiest of all laws to enforce.

The department has for four years been trying to "get across" the message of United States attorney Buckner of New York advocating speedy trials for liquor violators, officials declared. Instructions have been sent repeatedly to United States attorneys in the 81st judicial circuit of the nation to apply the padlock clause to the traffic act and seek speedy indictments and prosecutions in all cases brought to the bar.

With a large increase in appropriations and facilities for making arrests and gathering evidence, however, officials believe that additional judicial facilities must be provided before the dockets can be cleared.

Members of the Trinity University Male Quartet, which will appear in concert here Wednesday evening, July 8, at the Presbyterian church, take a leading part in the various student activities of the Freshyretier college at Waxahachie.

Charles Dickey, baritone and leader of the quartet is president of the Trinity student body for the 1925-26 term, and during the past year was chief executive of the junior class. Dickey is also a star athlete, playing on the Tiger football team. In 1923, he was mentioned by several sport writers and officials for a position on the All-T. I. A. A. team. The past year he was used at guard but was injured early in the season and it is probable that Barry Holton, new Trinity coach, will convert him into an end next fall.

All of the members of the quartet belong to the various musical organizations at Trinity, including the glee club, band and mixed chorus, and all have had the best of training under Clark Learning, dean of the Trinity conservatory of music.

This year's tour makes the fourth. Herring has made as a member of the quartet, while it is the third for Myers, the second for Dickey and the first for Grant.

Reason: Too much of a heat trap for tropical sun.

Foreigners wandering the streets of Constantinople wilted in the blazing summer sun in spite of linen suits and pith helmets or panamas, have marveled at the perspiring fortitude of the Turk going his way with a rimless, swarty fez perched on top of his cranium.

But all that is to be changed—and with the highest official sanction. Osmer Lutfi Bey, president of the Court of Cassation in an official proclamation has just stated in effect: "Muslims may henceforth wear whatever headgear they find most to their taste or most hygienic. The sacred text of the prophet readgear other than the fez is declared unreasonable. The Faithful may from now on wear any sort of hat that jolly well suits them."

## HEAT CONTINUES TO TAKE LIVES

Three Deaths and Fourteen Prostrations Reported in New York City Today

TEXAS CITIES SUFFER

Fort Worth Leads State With 100 Degrees—Dallas Sweaters With Mercury at 98 Degrees

NEW YORK CITY, July 8.—With 3 deaths and 14 prostrations already recorded this city faced its third day of the heat wave today. Relief is promised within 24 hours, however.

Texas Sweaters

DALLAS, July 8.—Tabulation by the United States weather bureau here bore out the plaint of seared citizenry that the "hot spell in the north must have leached south."

Fort Worth led the state Tuesday in the high temperature column with 100 degrees.

Dallas registered 98, while Lubbock, Amarillo and other plains towns dropped down to 92 degrees.

Partly cloudy weather was predicted at east Texas points today, while the balance of the state was scheduled for generally clear skies.

98 Degrees Here

The mercury climbed to 98 degrees in Sweetwater Tuesday afternoon, the high mark for the day. Cool breezes, however, made the heat hardly noticeable. Wednesday was clear and cooling, with the high mark during the morning being 86 degrees.

Two More Deaths

KANSAS CITY, July 8.—Two heat prostrations before 9 a. m. marked the beginning of a sweating day here. One person died yesterday from the heat, and two were overcome. The temperature will soar above the 100 degree mark, according to the weather bureau, breaking records of the past few years.

No Relief in Sight

WASHINGTON, July 8.—No relief was in sight for the eastern states now suffering intense heat, the weather bureau reported today. Temperature Thursday will be even warmer than today in the north middle Atlantic and lower lake regions.

## GERMS IN LAKE

Tests at Filtration Plant Show Small Count of Typhoid Germs in City Lake Water

A test made by officials in charge of the city filtration plant and laboratory of City Lake water recently revealed a small count of typhoid germs in the water. A number of tests have been made of the water recently.

According to Louis Gellert, in charge of the laboratory at the plant, each test showed a very small count of typhoid germs. The sample of water for the tests were taken from widely separated portions of the lake. One sample was obtained at the bathing beach, another on the north side of the lake and a sample was taken from the center of the lake.

The fact that typhoid germs were revealed in the lake water is not considered alarming, it was stated, as the number was not large enough to be considered dangerous.

Another test of City Lake water will probably be made within a few days.

T-P Hauls Water

MARSHALL, July 8.—For the first time in many years the Texas & Pacific Ry. is hauling water to the shops here, a train of 20 tank cars makes four trips daily from Jefferson, where water is taken from the Cypress Bayou and dumped into the reservoir here.

## PARDON BOARD VISITS PRISONERS

Enroute to Huntsville and Convict Farms—Will Interview 3,600 Prisoners on Trip

EXPECT MORE PARDONS

Trip Believed To Be Forerunner of Additional Pardons—Will Report to Governor

AUSTIN, July 8.—What may be the forerunner of a large number of additional pardons is manifest in the unexpected departure of the state pardon board for Huntsville and convict farms to personally interview every one of 3,600 prisoners there confined.

W. H. Sebastian and J. N. Aldredge of the pardon board, arrived in Austin this morning to accompany R. E. Franklow, assistant secretary of the Governor who has been handling all proclamations in the executive office. He is to make a report of the findings of the board as it proceeds with regard to each prisoner eligible to receive pardon.

The report is to be used by the pardon board and is to be available to the governor.

All this week will be used in making the trip, and possibly next week. After ex-governor Ferguson visited the friendless and penniless negro convicts, more than 40 pardons were granted on emigration day.

Prepares Ten Pardons

AUSTIN, July 8.—Proclamations were in the course of preparation this morning for executive clemency in some ten cases, mostly pardons. The names will not be available until the Governor affixes her signature to the proclamation.

## WILL MEET HERE

Rural School Trustees to be in Session Here August 1—Education Department Official Coming

A meeting has been called for Sweetwater on August 1 of all rural school trustees in the county. Will Scott, county superintendent, announced today, at which meeting L. D. Borden, rural school supervisor, will discuss school matters with the trustees.

The meeting will be held at the court house, and a program is now being prepared for the session by Scott and Borden.

Borden is supervisor of rural schools in Texas, and comes from the State Department of Education, Austin, to Sweetwater for the meeting.

The main purpose of the called session is to discuss state aid for rural schools, changes in the state aid laws and other matters connected with country schools.

There will be approximately 85 trustees of rural schools over the county at the meeting, Scott said.

A meeting of the County Board of Trustees composed of five members, has been called in Sweetwater for late this week. There are five members of the county board, one from each precinct and one member at large. The purpose of the meeting is to select new trustees and make appointments for vacancies created on the board recently.

NO QUAKE DANGER

University Scientist Says Dallas Vicinity Safe From Tremors

DALLAS, July 8.—Dallas and the surrounding territory is not likely to ever be disturbed by earthquakes, according to Dr. Ellis W. Shuler, Southern Methodist University Scientist, and a recognized authority on the subject.

Dr. Shuler explained that the western part of the United States is subject to seismic disturbances because of the "youthfulness" of the mountain range and the fact that the earth's crust is still settling down. In this section, he says, there are no mountains and the base is well established and not subject to spasmodic shifting of the surface.

Dallasites began growing perturbed over the California quakes and university professors were quizzed considerably on the possibility of disturbances in this country.

## White Trousers For Girls On the Beaches Censored

LONG BEACH, Cal. July 8.—Women wearing white trousers on the beach without bathing suits underneath were subjected to police censorship here today.

Warm, sultry weather brought out a parade of white trousers on the streets and on beaches. The girls who wore them, according to police were "cheating the law" by discarding their bathing suits.

"When worn simply as trousers the white pants are illegal and we will arrest the girls who wear them," declared Police Chief Yancey. "If worn as protection from the sun over a bathing suit, they will be regarded as a substitute for pajamas or bath robes and strictly legal."

A detail of police patrolled the streets and beaches to enforce the new ruling.

## BRING SWINDLER BACK TO TEXAS

Last of Gang Who Fleeced J. Frank Norfleet Out of Fortune Is Enroute to Huntsville

DENIES HABEAS CORPUS

Judge Stone Permits Texas Officers To Take Charge of Spencer—Arrested at Prison Gates

KANSAS CITY, July 8.—W. B. Spencer, last of a gang of swindlers that fleeced J. Frank Norfleet, Texas rancher, out of \$15,000 six years ago, will leave for Huntsville, Texas, this afternoon to start serving his 8-year sentence for his part in the mugging of Norfleet.

Federal Judge Stone denied Spencer a writ of habeas corpus which would have prevented his removal to Texas.

Spencer was recently released from the Federal penitentiary at Leavenworth where he served a term for violation of the narcotic act. Norfleet was waiting at the prison gate when Spencer was released and had him arrested again.

Spencer's attorneys fought extradition to Texas on the grounds that Texas authorities had no jurisdiction over him after he had been turned over to Federal authorities.

Harry Hamilton, deputy sheriff of Tarrant county, Texas, will take Spencer to Huntsville.

HAS FISH LIP

Fisherman Gets Tangled Up With 42 Pound Cat—Wins

BRECKENRIDGE, July 8.—Jim Collins came back from a fishing trip on the Llano river last week with a sore lip and an odd story of how he got it. But he had evidence with him to prove it.

Collins and other members of his party corralled a 42 pound cat fish and brought him home. He says that they caught the monster on a trot line and wrapped a net around him to prevent his escape. In the scramble, the fish chewed up his lip, Collins said.

MANY TOURISTS

Sweetwater Tourist Camp at City Lake Filled With Cross State Campers—Popular Park

Sweetwater this year continues to hold attractions for the great army of tourists enroute east and west over the cross-state Bankhead highway, or north and south over highway No. 70. Ever since the tourist park was opened several years ago, the number of tourists stopping over in Sweetwater has increased every year.

With added improvements and new additions to the tourists camp here this year, tourists are even more attracted to the camp at City Lake, according to camp officials.

WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON, July 8.—Official procedure involving the proper ceremonial in connection with the President has become so complicated by tradition piled on precedent that occasions sometimes arise in which no one knows what to do.

Recently President Coolidge was cruising down the Potomac on the Mayflower. The Secretary of the Navy, aboard the Sylph, running faster, drew up from behind and was ready to pass.

Officers at Loss Officers of both ships were at loss as to the proper observance of the passing. Ordinarily when the Secretary of the Navy passes a ship of the navy the crew is drawn up at the rail and he is given the secretary's salute as a mark of respect to the civilian head of the navy.

Upon this occasion, however, there was some doubt whether the crew of a ship carrying the President should salute a lesser official. There seemed to be no precedent. The difficulty was surmounted by a message from the Sylph asking in the name of the Secretary of the Navy the President's permission to pass.

Like Royalty This was but one instance of the many occasions in which the deference due the president is maintained with careful ceremony. As the elected head of the nation he is granted the military and naval honors which is a monarchy devolve upon royalty.

Recent Presidents have dealt with these ceremonial demands in various ways. President Coolidge is rather punctilious. He believes honors due the president should be practiced. Every time he boards the Mayflower for a pleasure cruise the crew is drawn up at the rail, the President's flag is run up to the masthead, he receives the presidential salute, the national anthem is played and finally as the yacht pulls out the presidential salute of 21 guns is fired.

President Harding submitted to all formal honors he was told the presidency during the first weeks of his terms but he rapidly became impatient and overruled many of them. He abolished the Mayflower salutes, for example. In many cases he insisted on the formal marks of respect tradition has ruled due the president.

President Wilson paid but slight attention to the rules of tradition. He always discouraged military and naval observances of his arrival and at one time issued orders he should not be given the usual salutes.

GIRL TO SWIM

Young American Will Attempt Swim 15 Hours Across English Channel This Month

By United Press.

NEW YORK, July 8.—No athletic event on the whole list of strenuous sports demands the skill, endurance and the courage that is required to swim the English Channel. Rowing is the most exacting of sports that are commonly practiced in this country but the physical beating of twenty minutes or more in a four-mile race cannot compare to the harrowing torture of a battle against wind and tide for fifteen hours or more.

Swimming the English Channel is a job that calls for the specifications of a man and a very strong man. In all time only three men have been able to cross from the English shore to the French side. It is most unusual then and extraordinary to find a nineteen-year old girl who is game enough to make the attempt.

Young Gertraude Ederle, one of America's greatest swimmers, is in England now, preparing herself to hop off and head for the French shore some time this month when the conditions are considered favorable. No definite date can be set and she must be trained and ready to take the water on very short notice when skilled seamen believe that tide and wind conditions are favorable.

Miss Ederle did not decide to make the attempt until she had tried the stretch from the Battery in New York to Sandy Hook, a distance slightly short of the twenty-mile distance between Dover to Cape Gris-Nez on the French shore. Her father would not have given his permission if she had not shown in that trial that she was capable of doing the distance under more severe circumstances. Without any nourishment, Miss Ederle swam the distance in seven hours and eleven minutes, cutting seven minutes off the best time ever made by a man on that course. By a mistake in the calculations she had two hours of a severe battle against a tricky tide, but she pulled up strong with a sprint at the finish.

The distance from the Battery to Sandy Hook cannot be compared as a trial, however, to the channel course. The average rise and fall of the tide in New York bay is four feet five inches, while it is four times as great in the English Channel with fierce undercurrents to correspond. The channel is almost continuously in a nasty chop and a swimmer cannot follow a map line of the shortest distance between the two shore points. The course must be altered to meet changing conditions and in the extreme, the swimmer may have to describe a course very similar to a large M. It has frequently happened that a swimmer has been within striking distance of the French shore when he would be swept so far off his course that he would be unable to get back. Miss Ederle has the mechanical equipment to swim the distance, she has the courage to fight the water but it remains to be seen if she has the endurance to fight more than a half day against ice cold water and a cruel tide.

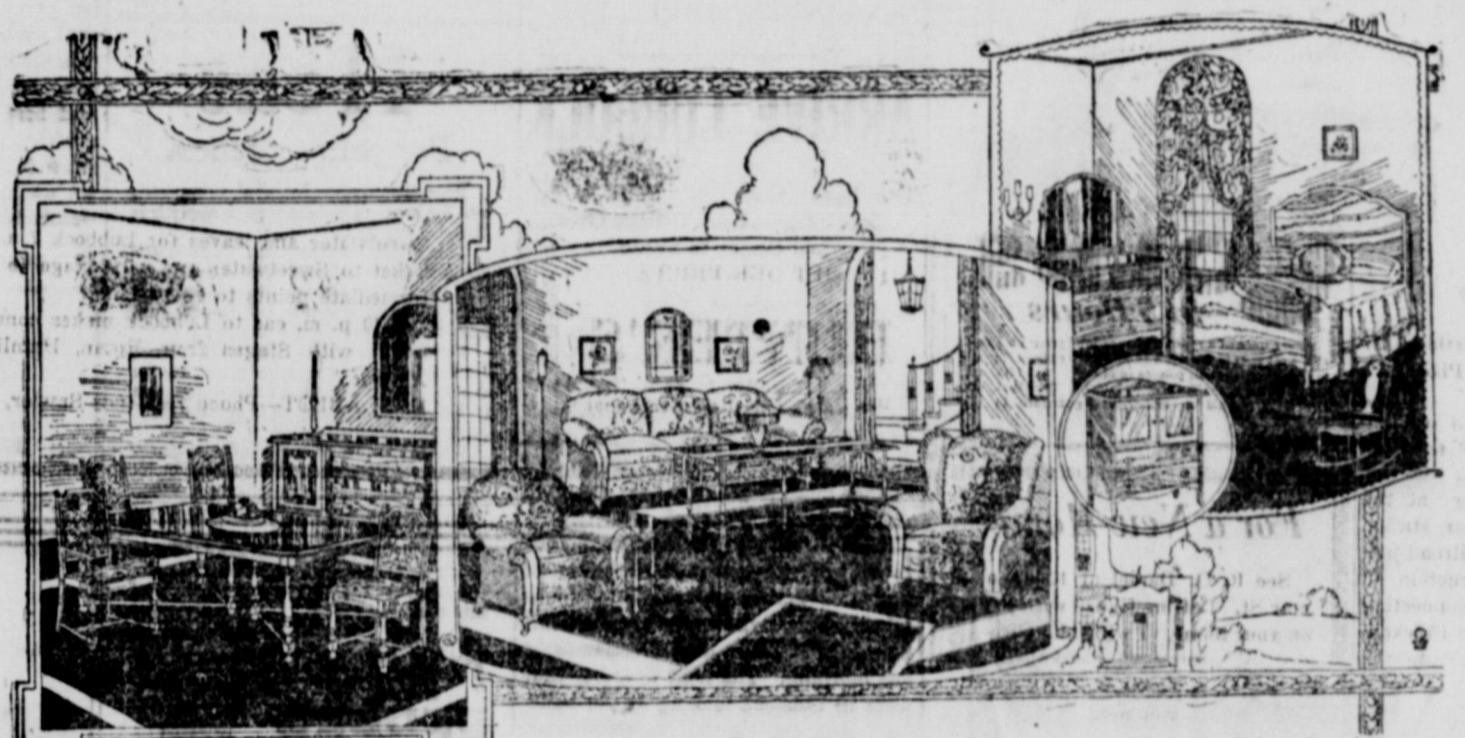

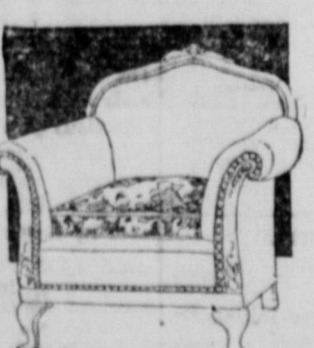
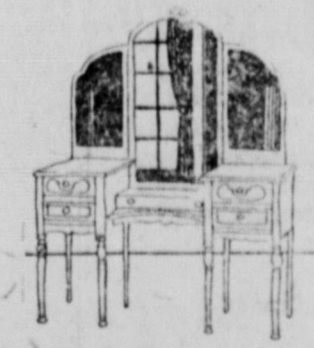
