SCOPES TRIAL IS ON IN TENNESSEE

Young School Teacher Who Taught Evolution Theory in Dayton School Goes Into Court

THROWS AT COURT HOUSE

People From All Countryside Attend Opening of Trial—Prayer Opens Court This Morning

DAYTON, Tenn., July 10.—In an atmosphere that combined the elements of a religious revival and a county fair, the Scopes evolution trial swung into its first stage today.

Opened with an exhortation by Rev. Courtwright that God might guide the decision of the judge and jury, it reverted shortly after to the semblance of carnival spirit as the townfolk and mere curious mingled in the huge court room while a new grand jury retired for the time being to bring in a strictly legal indictment against the young high school teacher who started the epoch battle.

Then when this jury of thirteen sturdy Tennessee farmers, miners and merchants had returned a new bill alleging the same criminal offense against Scopes, drafted into a more meticulous legal form, the earnestness which approached with the trial returned.

The new indictment was merely a formality, but served to delay the actual beginning of the legal battle.

Judge Raulston felt that there might be some doubt as to the legality of the first indictment. It took the new jury but one hour to bring in the new bill.

Tennessee Pastor Prays

DAYTON, Tenn., July 10.—With great throngs overflowing the Rhea county court house standing with bowed heads, and the typewriters and keys of press association reporters stilled, Judge Raulston banged his gavel at 9:06 o'clock this morning to open the now famous Scopes case with prayer.

Costless and collarless people of the countryside, counsel, newspaper men and court attaches thronged about the bench and through the huge chamber as the judge requested Rev. Courtwright to ask divine guidance before the trial proceeded.

The Tennessee pastor's voice boomed through the court room as he called upon God to direct the course of the trial, and give wisdom to the judge and jury.

The trial halted after the invocation while photographers made pictures of the principals and the scene of the epoch battle.

Background of Trial

DAYTON, Tenn., July 10.—The green foothills of the Appalachians as a background, a little county town fairly bristling with new dignity and fresh paint, an old ivy-clad court-house crowded with jurists, scientists, clergy and laymen famous the world over—such was the setting of the trial of Professor John T. Scopes on a charge of teaching high school pupils the theory of evolution opened here today.

Here and there in the throng that milled about the Rhea County Court House one could single out the beaming features of William Jennings Bryan, the stooped figure of Clarence Darrow, or catch the glimpse of a young, broad shouldered, serious minded defendant as well wishers pushed forward to shake his hand.

Vastly more than the offense of young Professor Scopes against the laws of the state was at stake today—the theory of the freedom of education was on trial. Scopes and his text books were merely tangible things about which the two great schools of thought whose leading exponents gathered here today could weave their arguments and base their contentions.

Troopers Guard Court House
Accordingly, it was the distinguished counsel, and the unofficial observers, who drew the stares of the curious and the excited buzzing of comment as they presented credentials and passed through the lines of troopers who guarded the court house against a stampede by those whom lack of space forbade admission.

This, of course, was a red-letter day for the townsfolk of Dayton.

There were some Dayton citizens today whose exuberance at the momentary focus of national attention knew no bounds.

Santa Fe Lake Unhurt After Big Dose of Arsenic

A branch of the Santa Fe Lake received a large dose of liquid arsenic during the night Thursday, but Friday morning the placid waters of the beautiful club lake were as pure and calm as ever after a train crew hastily headed off the arsenic flow by quickly throwing two dams across the creek north of Sweetwater.

An oil tank car, filled with the poison was standing on the Santa Fe tracks alongside the creek when the flow of poison started from a valve under the car. The arsenic poured into the creek and headed downstream toward the main body of water.

Unable to stop the flow, crews hastily started throwing up two small dams across the creek and prevented the poison from going into the lake.

The car of arsenic was said to be valued at \$2,400. The tank car was part of a Santa Fe "weed killing" train that had been in operation along the line during the day, and that had pulled into the yards for the night. Approximately 300 gallons of arsenic flowed into the creek.

INJURED IN FALL

Allen Wesley Edwards, 11, Rendered Unconscious When Horse Falls—Horse Dies Instantly

Allen Wesley Edwards, 11 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Wesley Edwards, was seriously injured Thursday afternoon when the horse he was riding on his father's ranch in the Maryneal community fell, throwing him to the ground. The boy was rendered unconscious by the fall. When he regained consciousness he walked to his home and was immediately rushed to physicians at Sweetwater.

The youth received bad cuts about the face, head and neck, and was badly bruised. X-ray examinations here revealed that no broken bones resulted from the fall. He was resting nicely Friday.

The horse the boy was riding stepped in a prairie dog hole, it was reported, and was instantly thrown to the ground. The horse was dead when young Allen regained consciousness, its neck evidently having been broken in the fall.

Mr. and Mrs. Edwards live on the Polk Harris ranch near Maryneal, and are well known over the county.

COOLIDGE CALLS HURRIED SESSION

President Sends Hurried Summons For Secretary of State For Chinese Conference

SERIOUS TROUBLE LOOMS

Must Make Critical Decision at Once In Regard to Chinese Meeting—Instruct Consuls

WASHINGTON, July 10.—President Coolidge has hurriedly summoned Secretary of State Kellogg from St. Paul, Minn., and under Secretary of State Grew from Washington to the summer White House at Swampscott to confer on the serious Chinese situation which has suddenly taken a turn for the worse.

In a week-end conference beginning tomorrow, the president and state department chiefs will make critical decision as to whether the United States is to stand on its demand for an immediate Chinese conference, or submit to the pressure of Great Britain and other powers for delay.

With the anti-foreign sentiment rising rapidly in China, threatening further violent outbreaks, any longer delay by the foreign powers in replying to China's unanswered note demanding treaty revisions and apologies for the Shanghai affair, is considered dangerous.

This government is now insisting through its representatives in Peking, London, Paris and Tokio that these powers signatory to the resolution No. 5 of the Washington arms conference providing for a Chinese conference to consider the Chinese extra-territoriality, make good their promise now by calling such a conference.

Refuse Discussion

SWAMPSCOTT, July 10.—Secretary of State Kellogg will visit the summer White House here tomorrow to confer with the president on state department affairs, it was announced today.

The president's office here flatly refused to discuss the reason for the Secretary's visit, or even to say whether he had been summoned.

He stated however that there was no important foreign matters that required his sudden trip from St. Paul.

FARMER KILLED

Dawson County Farmer Shot to Death Thursday Morning—Neighbor Blamed For Killing

LUBBOCK, July 10.—Herbert Rains, Dawson county farmer, was shot twice with a six shooter and instantly killed by L. A. Lewis, 54, a neighbor, Thursday morning, according to a report received here late Thursday.

The shooting occurred on the Lamesa-Stranton highway about ten miles south of Lamesa near the homes of the two men. They lived about two miles apart.

The cause of the shooting has not been ascertained.

Heat records of 20 years standing were broken here when the mercury went to 104 degrees. Altus reports 108 degrees.

MONTANA AGAIN QUAKE ROCKED

Tremor of Thirty Seconds Duration Shakes Large Area of State Early Friday Morning
NO DAMAGE REPORTED

GREAT FALLS, Mont., July 10.—An earthquake shock lasting about 30 seconds shook the big belt mountain district at 7:45 a. m. today.

The shocks apparently centered between White Sulphur Springs and Three Forks, the area which suffered most in the severe earthquake on the night of June 27.

No serious damage was reported although the quake was felt distinctly at Lombard, Manhattan, Logan, in the Gallatin Valley district, and at other points as far north as White Sulphur Springs.

People were momentarily terrorized and hastened from buildings into the open.

J. W. Herndon, 74, Well Known Local Man, Passes Away at Home Here Thursday Night

FUNERAL SERVICE SATURDAY

Rev. Farris to Conduct Service With Masons In Charge at Grave—Leaves Six Children

J. W. Herndon, pioneer Nolan county citizen, and well known over West Texas, died suddenly at his home here Thursday night at 11:45 o'clock. His death came as a sudden shock to relatives and friends in this section, as he has been in the best of health, it was stated.

Mr. Herndon appeared in the best of health Thursday. He was in town a portion of the day, and also made a trip to his farm near Sweetwater during the day.

Funeral services will be held Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Herndon home, 310 E. N. 3rd street. Rev. G. C. Farris will conduct the funeral service at the home, and members of the Masonic Order will have charge of the services at the Sweetwater Cemetery.

Mr. Herndon had made his home in this city for nearly four years. Prior to that he was in business in Eskota, and also operated farms and ranches in this section. He owned farm holdings in Nolan county and also in Coleman county in the Santa Anna section.

A wife, six children and a number of relatives survive. The children, four sons and two daughters, are Dr. J. H. Herndon, Miles; D. I. Herndon, Sweetwater; E. B. Herndon, Sweetwater, Will Herndon, Fort Worth; Mrs. Jewel Hargroves, Dallas, and Mrs. John Kinabrew, Shreveport, La.

Several of the children are in Sweetwater, and others have been notified of Mr. Herndon's death and will probably reach the city in time for the funeral Saturday.

FILE APPEAL IN VETS FRAUD CASE

Attorney Files Appeal With Supreme Court in Case of Veterans Bureau Director and Contractor, Appeal Convicted of Fraud

CHICAGO, July 10.—Attorneys representing Colonel Chas. R. Forbes and John W. Thompson today filed an appeal in the United States Court of Appeals from the conviction of Forbes and Thompson on charges of conspiracy to defraud the government through fraudulent contracts to construct veterans hospitals.

Forbes, director of the United States Veterans' Bureau during the Harding administration, and Thompson, wealthy St. Louis contractor, were found guilty last winter and sentenced to two years in Federal Prison at Leavenworth in addition to being fined \$10,000 each.

The appeal was filed by James Hamilton Lewis, Randolph Laughlin and Elwood Goodman, and constituted 10,000 pages, the largest ever filed in the district. The printing bill alone cost \$3,500, attorney a said.

Wheat Production in United States Forecast at 680,000,000 Bushels by Government

CONDITION IS 73.46

Yield Per Acre Estimated at 12.6 Bushels as Compared With 16.1 Last Year—Lower Acreage

WASHINGTON, July 10.—The condition of all wheat in the United States on July 1, was 73.46, forecasting a total production of 680,000,000 bushels, the Department of Agriculture estimates show. This compares with 73.1 per cent on June 1, when the forecast was for 681,000,000 bushels and 79 per cent on July 1, last year when 873,000,000 were produced.

The yield per acre this year was estimated at 12.6 bushels compared with 16.1 last year and a five year average of 13.9.

Wheat remaining on farms on July 1 was estimated at 13.4 per cent of last year's crop, or about 29,750,000 bushels as compared with 30,980,000 bushels on the same date last year.

The acreage of all wheat is 53,994,000—99.6 of last year's acreage. The condition of winter wheat on July 1, was 53.9 per cent, forecasting a production of 404,000,000 bushels compared with an estimate of 407,000,000 bushels on June 1, and a production last year of 590,000,000 bushels. The yield per acre was estimated at 12.8 bushels compared with 16.2 last year and a five year average of 14.7.

The condition of spring wheat on July 1 was 88.1 per cent forecasting a production of 276,000,000 bushels, compared with an estimate of 254,000,000 bushels on June 1 and a production last year of 283,000,000 bushels. The yield per acre was estimated at 13 bushels, compared with 15.9 last year and a five year average of 13.3.

FIRE AT ABILENE

Blaze Does Damage in Abilene Thursday Evening—Loss Large

ABILENE, July 10.—Fire of undetermined origin caused a huge loss, July 9, in Abilene, when a three-story brick building burned. Five streams of water and all available fire fighting equipment were used in battling the flames which were well under way at 7 o'clock.

The three story brick building, owned by W. J. Fulwiler, housed a portion of the Fulwiler Co. stock, the Moore storage warehouse, Swift and Co. office and Reo Motor Sales room. Automobiles, tractors, and automobile bodies were destroyed in large numbers. The entire building was gutted.

While the building was burning, fire broke out in a two-story frame house nearby, located near the West Texas Utilities Co. building and Witt, Chevrolet Co.

The latter firm suffered great water damage when firemen were battling the new fire.

A BURIED HOODOO

Down at Daytona, Florida, a group of town boosters had a big ceremony on the beach and resolved to devote their every effort to promote the welfare of their town and country. They decided never to neglect a civic responsibility, whether that of voting, making true tax returns, supporting the best man for the public job, or giving wholehearted encouragement to the officials who are elected. In token of this they brought out an effigy of the familiar American alibi of "Let George Do It," and after mauling the figure all over the beach, buried it in a grave most wide and deep. It remains to be seen how long this conversion to a better manner of civic life will last. If it endures, other communities could try the plan to their advantage.

IF IT'S ONLY TRUE

It may be only a gesture, as there have been many in the past, this announcement from Paris that a commission is to be sent to the United States to negotiate for debt settlement, but the news has a plausible and agreeable sound. M. Caillaux, the new minister of finance, has done what no other man in his place has achieved since the war—he has balanced the French budget. If to this triumph he could add that of reaching an understanding with the American nation concerning the war debt, he would have perfected his title to the claim of being the nation's best financier and at the same time bring even his enemies to regret that they had ever so bitterly condemned him for his policies throughout the war.

It is to be regretted that circumstances may prevent M. Caillaux from paying a personal visit to the United States as a member of the French commission. This nation would like to meet face to face the man who did his level best to prevent the World War, declaring that it would bring no advantage even to the victors, and who prophesied to the indignation of a storming military staff, that France would emerge from it worse off than when she was driven into it.

As for the debt, discussion will be a wholesome thing. The sentiment is abroad in this country that France has intended to repudiate the debt, or at least, by her own outlay for extravagant military policies of her own and subsidized nations, has deliberately made it impossible for her to pay, which is the same thing as repudiation. By putting all the cards on the table there will be a better understanding all around, a splendid

thing for two nations which have been goaded by circumstances into a lively distrust for each other.

NO WAR HERE

When a Russian goes to England he finds it difficult to omit saying a few helpful words, upon every convenient occasion, for the fantastically system of government that exists back home. When an Englishman goes to Russia it is usually with a view to gaining a few concessions that will permit him to exploit the country's undeveloped resources. It is told that because England threatens to exclude Russians from its country if they will not stop trying to make converts to their ideas of government, the soviet leaders threaten to grant no more concessions to British subjects, and maybe make war upon their empire. The chances are heavily against there being a war upon such an issue. The soviet minority has enough to do to maintain its own precarious hold upon power in Russia without taking on the task of avenging its foreign missionaries because they are not permitted to preach their economic gospel in far countries. And there will be no war over Russian concessions not granted to Englishmen, because who ever sided since the death of the Czar, that was worth the paper on which it was written. If there is no more war until English and Russian nations come to grips, one of the principal slogans of the last one will have been redeemed.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Before washing cotton stockings put a handful of common salt in the washing water. This will set the dye. Candles will burn better and more slowly if they are stored in a dry place for six or seven weeks before they are to be used.

To remove axle grease apply lard to spot and wash in warm, soapy water. If in silk, place a pad under neath spot and sponge with chloroform until soil is removed.

To improve the flavor of currants and raisins in puddings and cakes, place them in a bowl, pour boiling water over them and leave to soak over night. Drain and dry in oven before adding to other ingredients.

Cloth that has become mildewed can be restored by putting lemon juice on spots and exposing to strong sunshine. A new spool of cotton will often tangle when used on the sewing machine. Cut a piece of cloth larger than the spool and put on the post under the spool. It will keep it steady.

When polishing furniture rub the same way as the grain. The furniture will get bright more quickly.

To remove tar or grease marks from the most delicate fabrics soak a piece of white rag in eucalyptus oil and rub it on the affected part until the latter is quite clean.

Save the broom handles. They will come in handy for moving heavy furniture and trunks. Two handles act as rollers.

One tsp. of cornstarch added to

tsps. salt will prevent lumping of salt in shakers. If the ends of paraffin candles are kept and melted they can be used to saturate dust cloths.

English Pea and Beet Salad
Drain and rinse canned peas. Use two parts of peas to one part diced, boiled beets, marinate, arrange on dish with fringe of lettuce leaves and pour over French dressing.

Coconut Macaroons
Beat whites of three eggs until stiff; add gradually 1/2 cup sugar, mix 1 cup shredded coconut and 1 cup bread crumbs; add to first mixture. Drop by spoonfuls into baking sheet covered with waxed paper. Bake in slow oven until light brown.

Fruit Salad
1 lb. red cherries, 1 pt. strawberries, 1 c. shredded pineapple, 2 sprays mint, meringue dressing, pistachia nuts.

Devil's Food Delight
Between two medium thick slices of plain unfrosted devil's food place a slice of vanilla ice cream. Over all pour hot fudge chocolate sauce and sprinkle lightly with chopped roasted almonds.

Fruit Punch
1 cup shredded pineapple, 1 cup diced orange, 1 cup strawberries cut in halves, 1 cup sugar, 1 1/2 cup water. Boil sugar and water five minutes. Add fruit and when cold pour over fruit. Let stand in a cold place one hour. Garnish with tiny strips candied citron.

Hot Weather Hints
During these hot days, any one who is responsible for the cooking of the meals, has wished that meals could cook themselves, occasionally.

It's a queer thing, but during the summer some begin to lose flesh while others never lose a pound it seems no matter how hot the weather of what they eat. In some cases loss of flesh may be due to unwise eating—and some of us never lose a bit no matter how little we eat.

Hours of hot cooking can be avoided by the housewife who will spend a half hour in careful planning each week. Make out your week's menu, providing fruit in one form or another at least two meals a day and a salad as a side dish at dinner, as the main dish at supper or lunch. Fresh vegetables and fruits, of course, in summer are to be preferred.

During the hot days the system cries loudly for moisture. Evaporation from the skin is excessive and the several pounds of water which are lost every day in the body's effort to keep the temperature normal, must be replaced or replenished in some way. Cooling drinks such as ice water, lemonade, grape juice, milk, iced coffee or tea at the fountain or at home furnish much of the moisture required. Vegetables and fruits supply the rest. They contain almost no fat and their starch and sugar content is unusually small. Vegetables and fruits may be eaten in abundance without fear of heating the body, and with the markets, at this season offering a large variety at a reasonable cost, we have no excuse for skimping on them.

Cold meat loaves, cold roast meats sliced or fish salads all properly chilled certainly appeal to the appetite on a hot day. Do not, however, only cold foods continuously without an accompanying hot dish, or the stomach will soon register distress.

Why not cook the potatoes or the vegetables which is to accompany the meat at the same time you are preparing breakfast? Wash and get them ready the night before—just before retiring. It is then an easy task to reheat or add a hot sauce to them for the noon or evening meal.

When making coffee for breakfast make enough more occasionally to chill and serve at dinner or for afternoon guests. At noon if tea is the beverage make extra for iced tea at

SCOPES' TRIAL

(Continued from Page One)

Court presiding, everything was serious. Opposing counsel exchanged courtesies with a deal of formality.

Professor Scopes, the defendant, was the most serious of all, his face slightly pale behind his horn-rimmed spectacles. He is only 24, this Kentucky youth who is the central figure in what has grown into one of the most famous trials in history. When not engaged in the class-room at the local high school, he coached the athletic teams.

In his best known remark since the present case, Professor Scopes said it was "drug store argument" that got out of control. As a matter of fact, he was persuaded somewhat reluctantly to play his part in what men interested in education in Tennessee felt should be made a test case.

How Charge Arose
Scopes taught his pupils from a text book approved by the school board which contained an exposition of the theory of evolution. He was indicted on a charge of instructing his charges in a "theory that denies the story of Divine creation of man as taught in the Bible, and to teach instead that man has descended from a lower order of animals." There is no doubt that this law is on the statute books, it being the work of John W. Butler, a farmer-legislator, who lives 100 miles away over the rolling foothills on a badly run-down little farm.

The defense, including on the legal staff Professor John R. Neal, chief counsel, Clarence Darrow, Dudley Field Malone and others in various capacities, will seek to show:—

First, that the theory of evolution is by no means a denial of the story of Divine creation.

Second, that education in scientific subjects should not be denied the school children of the United States because it occasionally enters upon controversial ground.

To Appeal
If Scopes is convicted, as nearly everyone believes he will be at this trial, he will be subject to a fine of from \$100 to \$500. An appeal will be taken, and it is in their argument before a higher court that the counsel for the defense hope to do their best trying work.

The prosecution today was represented by William Jennings Bryan as his associate. The Com-moner has thrown himself into the fight with an enthusiasm matched only by that of the counsel for the defense.

Bryan's slogan, upon which he was expected to expound when his turn came to speak was:

"The hand which writes the pay checks should rule the schools. The teachers are employees of the tax-payers and should no more be allowed to teach what they personally wish than dictate the policy of a bank." "The greatest menace we have to face today is the substitution of education for religion."

To which Professor Neal, who is professor in the College of Law of Tennessee University previous to his dispute over freedom of education, replied:

"The question is whether the Tennessee legislature has the power to prevent the young minds of Tennessee from knowing what has been thought and said by the world's great-

est scientists, thus preventing them from forming their own judgment in regard to questions of life and science."

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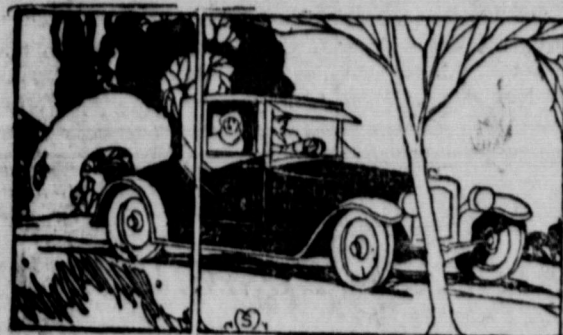

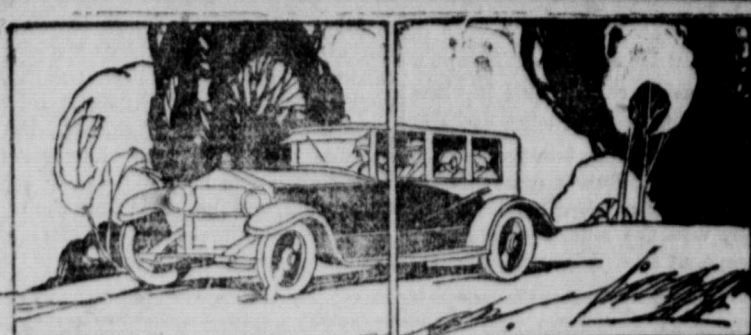

GRAHAM TRUCKS LEAD

Produce More 1 1-2 Ton Trucks During First Quarter 1925

Following closely the information that Graham Brothers produced more 1 1-2-ton trucks than any other manufacturer during the first quarter of 1925, and ranked second in the 1 ton and 1 1-2 ton fields combined, comes the announcement that their Detroit factory has again found it necessary to take greatly enlarged space, according to H. B. Allen, Dodge dealer here.

On June 18, it is also announced, Graham Brothers opened a new Pacific coast plant in Stockton, California, including Graham Brothers, Canada, Ltd., this gives them four factories.

The rapidity of Graham Brothers growth is clearly indicated by the repeated increases in their space requirements, which have much more than doubled since 1921.

The first Detroit plant in 1921 had 13,000 square feet. During 1922 this was increased to 27,000 and during 1923 to 40,000. In May, 1923, they moved into a plant of 60,000 square feet, more advantageously located with respect to Dodge Brothers from whom they obtain the engine for their trucks. Soon, still more space was required. First, 36,000, then 50,000 more square feet were added, and on June 1st, 1925, another move gave them 250,000 square feet.

Graham Brothers now have a space under one roof 400 feet by 600 feet in a steel and concrete building which was erected by Dodge Brothers during the winter of 1917 as an ordnance plant for the manufacture of recoil mechanism for 155 millimeter French heavy guns.

The new plant has been laid out for direct flow of materials, units and parts from the receiving docks thru the various departments and stock-rooms to the assembly line without retracing or unnecessary handling.

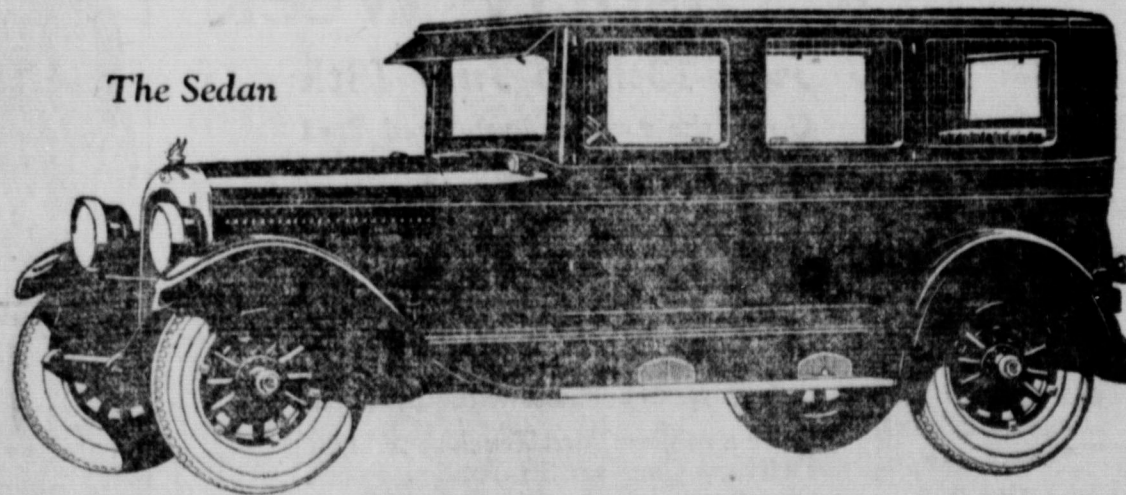

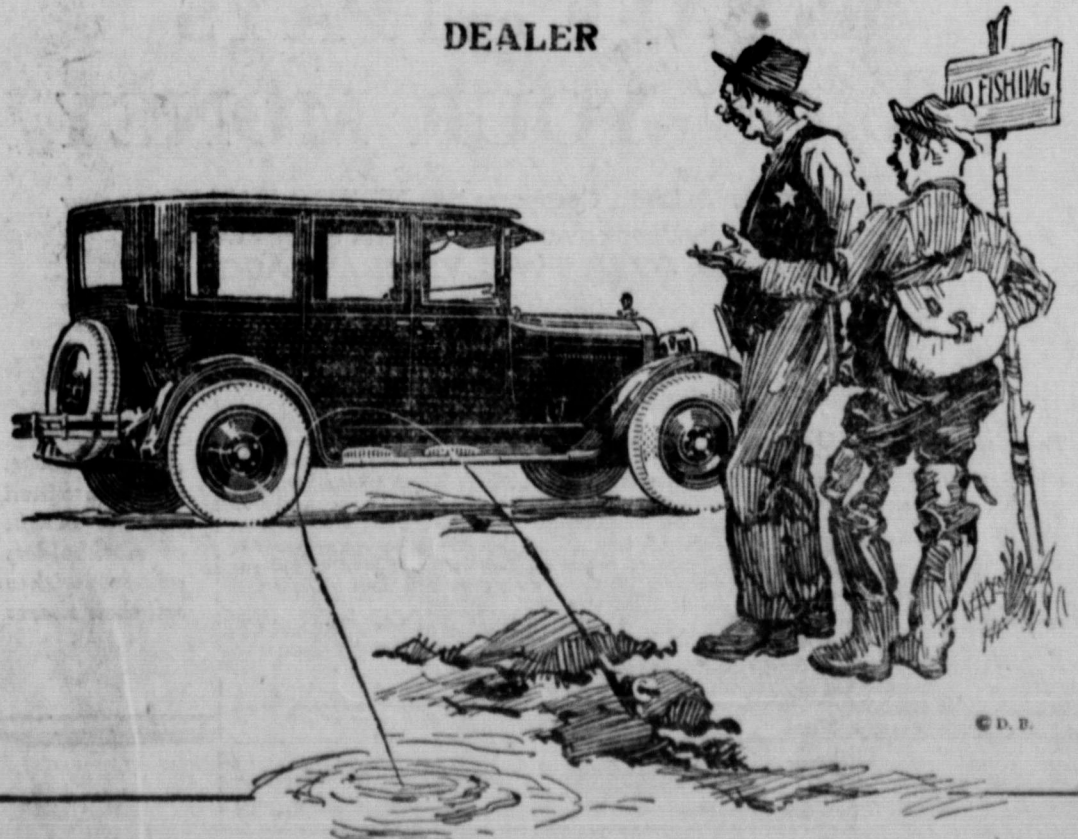

CROP CONDITIONS REPORTED POOR

July Statement Issued Saturday By Commissioner of Agriculture Terrell Shows Low Average

SHORT COTTON CROP

Forecast Less Cotton This Season—East Texas Hard Hit By Drought West Texas Condition Good

Probability of a short cotton crop increased acreage of some crops, and need of rains in eastern and southern Texas are revealed in the report made public Saturday by George B. Terrell, Commissioner of Agriculture, Austin. While the condition of cotton throughout the state is given at 61 per cent, the condition of this section of the state will probably rank above the average.

Terrell states that this year has been one of the driest in many years, and adds that a large portion of east, central and southern Texas was badly hurt by the extended drought.

The report is some phases is in contrast to West Texas conditions, as indications are, according to the report, that whereas the general condition of the State is slightly below average, the main area of West Texas gives a very optimistic outlook.

This report is carefully tabulated from the reports of our correspondents representing all agricultural counties, and is believed to be as accurate as possible under such varied and adverse agricultural and climatic conditions as have prevailed in the state this year.

Cotton, acreage, 106 per cent, condition, 61 per cent.

Corn, condition, 82 per cent, condition, 49 per cent.

Hay, acreage 90 per cent, condition 65 per cent.

Grain sorghum, acreage 97 per cent, condition 65 per cent.

Sweet potatoes, 79 acreage per cent, condition 67 per cent.

Ribbon cane acreage 72 per cent, condition, 53 per cent.

"Our report for June 1st, showed oats and wheat to be of a normal and wheat to be reduced in acreage and condition to be very poor. Less than half of a normal crop of each has been made, and the corn crop has shown little improvement since that time, except in a few counties where rain came in time to benefit late corn and probably not more than half of a normal crop will be

made. This condition makes the feed crop unusually short.

"Should general rains come during this month, the lands that have been planted to cotton or other crops, and failed to make anything because of the drought can be planted in some of the early maturing grain sorghums and make feed. I would not advise planting corn or cotton this late in the season. The farmers generally know what they can plant with any hope of making a crop and do not need advice, as badly as they need the money to buy the seed.

"This has been the driest year in Texas for many years. What rains have fallen have been confined to small areas in different parts of the state, and crops are very spotted, owing to scattered and limited rainfall. Only about two inches of rain fell during June and this much did not fall in some sections. Some rain has fallen in July, but this is not shown in this report. It was not general over the state.

A large area extending from Waxahatchie to Corpus Christi has had so little rainfall that nearly all crops have failed, and it is not possible to
