## LARGE AUDIENCE HEARS OFFICIALS OF

R Q Lee, President West Texas C of C, Addresses Guests of Sweetwater Club Thursday Evening

AGRICULTURE IS TOPIC

Appeals for Intensive and Diversified Farming—Whaley and Whitehead Speak—Boothe Toastmaster

Over two hundred Sweetwater and Nolan County citizens heard R. Q. Lee, Cisco, president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, make a strong appeal for intensive and diversified farming in Texas, for the planting of more grain, feedstuffs and vegetables and less cotton, and attack on "one crop idea" that will be the "ruin of Texas" in a stirring address before the Sweetwater Club and its guests at Hotel Wright Thursday evening.

The Chamber of Commerce had in completing a tour of West Texas, and his statements relative to farming and agriculture situation in the state are backed up by the close study he has made of the problem during his present tour, and in a tour of the southern states during the past year.

In opening his address, Lee recited statistics compiled to show the agricultural, financial, and farming conditions throughout the south, and the figures were submitted by him as ample proof that the hope of Texas and the South lies in intensive and diversified farming.

In the cotton states last year one billion, eight hundred million dollars was received from cotton, he said. Of this amount the farmers paid one billion back for food and feed, bought in states not classed as southern states. In further revealing the grip the one crop idea has on the south, and the danger of ruin lurking therein, Lee quoted further records that showed that of the two and one half million farms in the south, 12 per cent in 1924 produced no corn, 20 per cent produced no eggs, 25 per cent did not grow garden, and that a great majority of the farmers in the south were dependent on outside sources for the food they ate.

"Intensive and diversified farming is our only hope," Lee declared. "Cotton must be made secondary. There must be diversification, not alone in cotton, but in every line on the farm. We must not get the one crop idea of any product. I think that in addition to cotton, feed crops, forage, and vegetables there should be a good garden on every farm. I think that every farmer should keep a few first class dairy cows and a few hogs. And I think there should be a flock of poultry on every farm."

Lee's remarks on the poultry business and the cooperative marketing of poultry and eggs were especially interesting to the citizens of this county which is regarded as one of the leading poultry centers in the west. He told how Cisco and Eastland county was made "the egg basket of Texas", and outlined the program that Eastland county followed to establish the business as one of its chief industries.

Behind Lee's remarks and declarations were the earnestness and sincerity of the great West Texas man who was chosen to lead the state's greatest organization.

The feature speaker was introduced by Joe H. Boothe, Sweetwater ex-mayor, who was the capable toastmaster at the luncheon which preceded the program. In a short and splendid introduction, Boothe referred to Lee as "a town builder, a railroad builder, a community builder, now engaged in building an empire, our great empire of West Texas."

Mrs. Lee, who is traveling with the Chamber of Commerce president's party in the Texas tour, was introduced, and she expressed the appreciation of the delegation for the hospitality shown in Sweetwater.

Porter A. Whaley was first introduced by Boothe. Whaley, long time secretary-manager of the Chamber of Commerce, told his hearers of the common point freight controversy, of the present standing of the situation, and of the progress West Texas citizens had made in carrying on the fight. He went into detail with the history of the controversy, its relation to Texas businesses and dealt at length with the facts of the controversy and the Washington hearing recently where the fight was carried before the Interstate Commerce Commission.

## SCIENTISTS TESTIMONY OF

Judge Raulston Rules in Favor of Prosecution in Barring Scientific Evidence

DARROW IN TROUBLE

Nearly Threatened With Being Held in Contempt of Court After Stormy Argument

By United Press. DAYTON, Tenn., July 17.—In a grand display of verbal fireworks in which Clarence Darrow was nearly threatened with being held in contempt of court, the Scopes trial, through a ruling by Judge Raulston, neared a dissolution today.

The judge held that scientific evidence, on a resolution offered by the defense, was inadmissible, which left little to do but to hold closing argument and find the young school teacher guilty.

The defense, however, took forward a proposal that the testimony of scientists should be submitted for the benefit of the court, with the jury barred.

Judge Raulston agreed to this, whereon William Jennings Bryan interposed, demanding the right to cross examine the scientists.

Clarence Darrow said the defense would not stand for this, and it was finally decided the testimony in question would be submitted in the form of affidavits.

Judge Raulston will consider these and in the meantime the trial will stand adjourned until Monday while the affidavits are being prepared. Judge Raulston said if the testimony altered his opinion, he would reverse himself and give it to the jury.

After the court ruled on the scientific evidence, Darrow indignantly remarked that it was strange that the judge always ruled in favor of the prosecution.

"I hope you don't intend this to be a reflection on this court," said the judge.

"You can hope," replied Darrow, looking up from his beetling brows.

"I can do something else, too," said the judge. But the matter went no further.

To Take Orchestra

The Sweetwater delegation to the annual state convention of the American Legion at Fort Worth, September 3, 4 and 5, will probably be accompanied by the Sweetwater Saxophone Orchestra, local Legion officials announced today. ## GET OIL MONEY

University of Texas Receives \$102,837 Oil Royalty, Based on June Production

## TWO BURNED TO DEATH IN WRECK

Mother and Baby Perish in Flames After Husband Lights Match, Ignites Gasoline

AUTO OVERTURNED

Two Pinned Beneath Car When Fire Starts—Husband Seriously Burned—Four Escape

By United Press. MONROE, La., July 17.—Two persons were burned to death and another was seriously injured when an automobile overturned on the highway near here today. Mrs. Camille Groff, 25, and her six months old baby were pinned beneath the car.

Her husband attempted to learn the condition of the victims and lit a match which ignited the gasoline escaping from the shattered tank.

Groff was seriously burned in a futile attempt to save his wife and baby. Four other persons in the car escaped injury.

## CHINESE KIDNAP WOMAN RANCHER

Beautiful Ranch Mistress and Magazine Writer Escapes from Gang and Notifies Police

DESCRIBES ABDUCTION

Was Held By Three Chinese in Dungeon for Marriage To Mexican Character—Effects Escape

By United Press. CALEXICO, Calif., July 17.—Dramatic details of her alleged kidnapping by Orientals were related to police today by Mrs. Virginia Lee Cookson, beautiful ranch owner and magazine writer.

Mrs. Cookson, who has been hunted since Tuesday morning in Santiago canyon by posse of deputy sheriffs and forest rangers, walked into the police station last night and told a weird story of her abduction at the hands of three Chinese.

Between spells of hysterics, she told of being brought to the border by her captors in an automobile, thrown into a dungeon, and held for marriage to "Old Don," aged Mexican character.

With the aid of a Chinese lackey, whom she had befriended, Mrs. Cookson escaped before her abductors had an opportunity to take her across the border, she said.

## TO CHANGE RATES

Interstate Commerce Commission Orders Revision of Rates in Five States

By United Press. WASHINGTON, July 17.—The Interstate Commerce Commission today ordered a revision on rates to and from points in Louisiana, Arkansas, Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas to Galveston and New Orleans on commodities destined for export, import or coastwise traffic.

The commission found that the present rates were unduly prejudicial to Galveston and preferential to New Orleans.

## Fire Destroys Hotel Where Jake Hammon Met Death

By United Press. ARDMORE, Okla., July 17.—Fire early today destroyed four grocery stores and an unoccupied hotel, with the loss estimated at approximately \$300,000. The Randien hotel, destroyed, was where Jake Hammon made his headquarters, and where he was shot to death by his secretary, Clara Smith Hammon.

All of the buildings burned were landmarks.

Another fire at Eufaula, Okla., today destroyed the county court house and many valuable records. The loss was estimated at \$50,000.

Origin of the fires in either case, was undetermined.

## TELEGRAM SAVES CONDEMNED MAN

Russell Scott Sleeps Soundly in Death Cell This Morning Instead of Mounting Gallows

BROTHER TAKES BLAME

Wires State Capital That He Is The Murderer of Drug Clerk—Governor Grants Reprieve

By United Press. CHICAGO, July 17.—Russell Scott, former millionaire, was not summoned to the gallows at daybreak to hang for the murder of Joseph Maurer, of which he was convicted. He was granted a reprieve a few hours earlier and the condemned man slept soundly in his death cell this morning.

Scott had abandoned all hope; he had made a tearful parting with his wife and aged father; he had made a last statement denying that he had anything to do with the killing of the young drug clerk, and had prepared to meet his doom some five hours later, when the electrifying news of his reprieve reached him.

A telegram from Detroit signed "Robert Scott," a brother of Russell, excepting him from the blame of the murder, and promising to surrender, reached Springfield near midnight. The telegram read:

"Delay hanging my brother, Russell Scott. I will surrender myself. I am the man that shot Joseph Maurer."

Governor Len Small was located by Will Colvin, head of the board of pardons, and Small extended a week's clemency to make sure that there was no miscarriage of justice.

Russell told newspaper men that he did not believe the telegram was from Robert.

"If Robert actually sent the wire, he would have got word to me," Russell said. "I do not believe he will show up."

Police and detectives have been asked to find Robert, for until he is found the Governor and police cannot believe that the telegram was genuine. In some quarters it is believed that the message was sent by friends of Russell in efforts to gain a stay of execution.

## NEGRO FLOGGED

Thirty Men, Many of Them Masked, Flog Negro Upon His Release from Jail

By United Press. DALLAS, July 17.—Authorities here today were investigating the flogging of Clarence Brown, negro, who was seized here last night by a mob of 30 men after he had been released from jail where he had been held on a statutory charge.

Brown told officers that many of the floggers wore masks.

More than thirty lash wounds were found on the negro's back, although physicians said he was not seriously injured.

## CITY FLOODED

Hong Kong Hit By Disastrous Flood—Houses Washed Away—Many Believed Dead

Seven houses containing 30 Chinese families, were washed away. Many were believed to have been killed, including an ex-legislator with most of his family.

## PLAN BIG TIME AT MCCREA REUNION

Mr. and Mrs. Clyde McAnelly and Family to Attend Annual Reunion of McCrea Kinsmen

MEET NEAR LAMPASAS

Celebration to Be Staged On Historic Land in Vicinity of Old McCrea Log Cabin

Mr. and Mrs. Clyde McAnelly and family have just received information concerning the annual family reunion of the McCreas relationship near Lampasas, Texas, on August 3, 4 and 5, at which time scores of members and relations of this family will gather for the famed reunion which will be in the form of a camping party.

The annual reunion is comparable to no holiday celebration or any great convention in Texas, it is stated, and preparations are made on the same gigantic scale in which cities usually plan for a picnic or jubilee.

This year the reunion carries additional interest in that it will be held near the old McCrea homestead, a log cabin more than half a century old in a beautiful and historical spot 10 miles east of Lampasas.

Mr. and Mrs. McAnelly, relations of the McCreas in Sweetwater, will attend the reunion, and other relatives from throughout the state will attend. Seven automobiles of relatives will go to the reunion from Waco alone, it was stated.

Mr. McAnelly, in commenting on the proposed plans for the reunion, stated:

"The reunion will be held at McCrea, August 3, 4 and 5.

"There will be music, plenty of ice water and iced melons; those who wish to dance will do so, others will play games, the children will have swings and other amusements; those wishing to have a swim will go to the pool in Lampasas; a 'possum hunt and arrandillo hunt will be enjoyed, and ten bee trees cut. A trip may be organized by a group one night and be made to the famous Gorman Cave; a fishing party on the Colorado will be a picnic trip—down the Colorado creek is planned. Old times will be reviewed; all will get acquainted, and many other pleasures enjoyed. Telegrams will be read and announcements made, also one or two short addresses will be delivered. Group pictures will be made of those present. Mementoes of the War of Texas Independence will be shown by Mrs. Neil McAnelly and others, and letters read showing the part McCrea kinsmen took in the historic battles.

"Leonard McCrea has invited those attending to camp at this place, just across the road from the old original McCrea place, and he and his wife will be glad to see as many attend as possible.

"The reunion will be held on land which came to the family originally through the blood of a near kinsman of James McCrea, Archibald Swords, and we will have free access to the old pioneer days cedar log house of the McCreas, which was built much more than half a century ago."

**SHORE LEAVE**

It is not clear whether Secretary Wilbur's action in the Mayflower incident will boost enlistings for the navy or deter it. Some of the "gobs" serving on the Mayflower asked to be transferred to another ship because its frequent Sunday cruises "kept them away from church." They really meant the shore leave that is joy of most other marines on the Sabbath, but they made the error of bringing it in the church. So the secretary of the navy promptly ministered to their spiritual craving by assigning them a chaplain, who will see that they do not want for plenty of devotional exercise of the Lord's day.

Back in war times or immediately thereafter it was discovered that some soldier patients in hospitals had acquired an apparent fondness for castor oil. The records show that it was the custom to accompany every dose of oil with a liberal hunk of hard liquor to kill the taste. One night when there were unusual calls for castor oil the head nurse gave orders to supply the oil but omit the liquor. Thereafter there was a remarkable falling off in the number of soldiers who craved oil.

It remains to be seen how the new chaplain will fare aboard the Mayflower with a worshipful ceremony that is not preceded by shore leave.

**THE CONVENTION HABIT**

Something of the problem the nation has in financing the cost of its congress is being shared by the labor organizations and all others which hold great national conventions. At the last triennial convention of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers, Past Grand Master, J. J. Hannahan said: "Brothers, permit me to suggest that you are approaching a time when your representation must be changed in some way or other. The expense of your convention is something that must be considered. It is staggering to think that your conventions cost \$500,000 or over—half a million dollars to revise your constitution. Isn't there some way that you could take what you could save of the \$500,000 and use it to better advantage?" Mr. Hannahan belongs to another generation. When he was the first president of the railway organization their conventions were held for a slight fraction of the cost of a present day meeting. His

suggestion for a reform of methods that have raised the cost but not the general efficiency of modern national deliberations is something that will interest other than railroad men. There is not a line of social effort in the nation that has not acquired the convention habit and often at an individual cost comparable with the figures that "staggered" Past Commander Hannahan. When to these figures are added the traveling expenses of delegates, and their time lost from productive work, the sum is even more impressive. But if any old timer, merely for economy, would reform this habit of the American people he will find himself up against an obstacle worse than a stone wall. The collective American privilege of striving for the honor of wearing a delegate's badge, marching in a parade, and spell-binding in a convention is a thing that will not be surrendered upon the altar of thrift, even if it is something that makes for no common gain. And perhaps the nation has worse luxuries than that of bringing its many specialized classes of citizenship together and allowing them to voice the interests of their group. Not even government helped itself much by abolishing conventions, and allowing its electors to mass their opinions and open their mistakes in a primary.

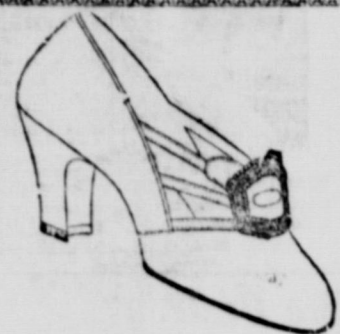

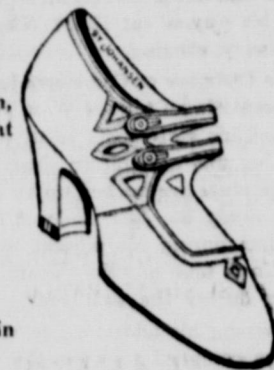

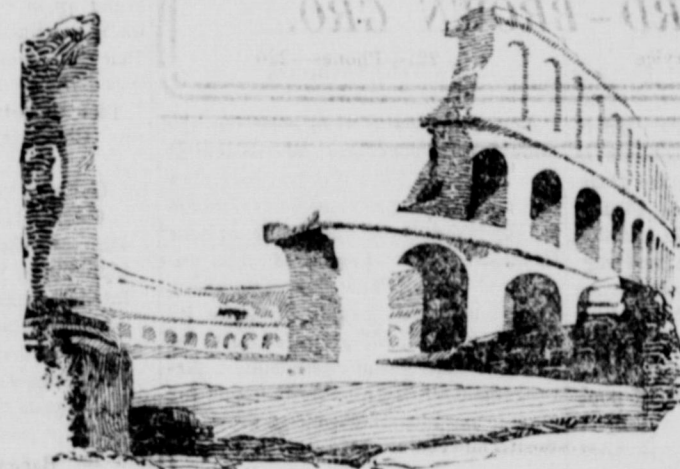

### Macaroni, Virginia Style

1 1-2 cup macaroni, 1 1-4 cup of white sauce, 1-2 cup grated cheese, 1 tsp. mustard, 2 t. p. butter, 3 t. p. dried bread crumbs.

Break macaroni in 1 inch pieces and cook in boiling water salted 20 minutes or until soft; drain in colander.

Put half in buttered baking dish; and pour over one quart of cold water; repeat, pour over white sauce, cover with dried bread crumbs mixed with remaining butter and bake in a hot oven till crumbs are brown.

### Plain or One Egg Muffins

1 3-4 cup flour, 1 1-2 t. p. melted butter, 2 3 cup milk, 1-2 t. p. sugar, 3 t. p. baking powder, 1 small egg, 1 1-2 t. p. s. sugar.

Mix and sift dry ingredients; add gradually milk, egg, well beaten and melted butter. Bake in buttered pans 25 minutes.

### Marshmallow Gingerbread

1-2 cup shortening, 1 t. p. salt, 2 2-3 cup flour, 1 3-4 t. p. soda, 1 egg, 1 cup sour milk, 1 cup molasses, 1 t. p. ginger, marshmallows.

Melt shortening and add molasses, egg well beaten, flour mixed and sifted with soda, salt, ginger and sour milk. Beat vigorously, turn into a buttered and floured dripping pan and bake in a moderate oven 25 minutes.

Remove from pan, cut in halves crosswise and let stand three minutes. Remove to serving dish, cool slightly, cut in squares and serve with whipped cream, sweetened and flavored with vanilla.

### Candle Salad

2 slices pineapple, 2 t. p. mayonnaise, 2 lettuce leaves, 2 cherries, 1 banana, 2 t. p. nuts.

Place lettuce leaves on salad plates, put on slices of pineapple. Peel banana, cut in halves crosswise and stand up in center of pineapple. Pour on mayonnaise, sprinkle with nuts. Place red cherry on top of banana.

### Gold Cake

1-2 cup butter (scant), 3 t. p. baking powder, 2 cups flour, yolks of 4 eggs, 1 cup sugar, 1-2 cup milk.

Cream butter and add gradually, while beating constantly, sugar, then add egg yolks, beaten until thick and lemon-colored. Mix with and sift flour and baking powder. Bake in shallow pan or layer cake tins in a moderate oven.

### SANDWICH SPREADS

#### Bacon or Ham Butter

Fry thin slices of lean bacon or ham until crisp. Lift the slices from the fat and pound into a paste on a meat board. Add enough butter to make a smoothly spreading paste. To two tablespoons of paste add one teaspoon of horseradish or mustard.

#### Anchovy Butter

Place half a cup of butter in a bowl. Add one tablespoon of pounded anchovy. Mix well together. Keep

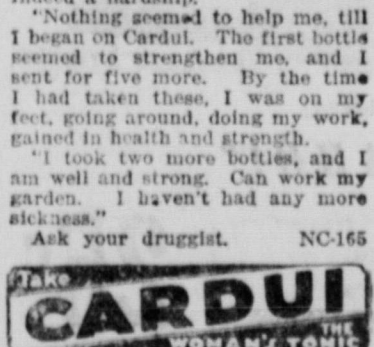

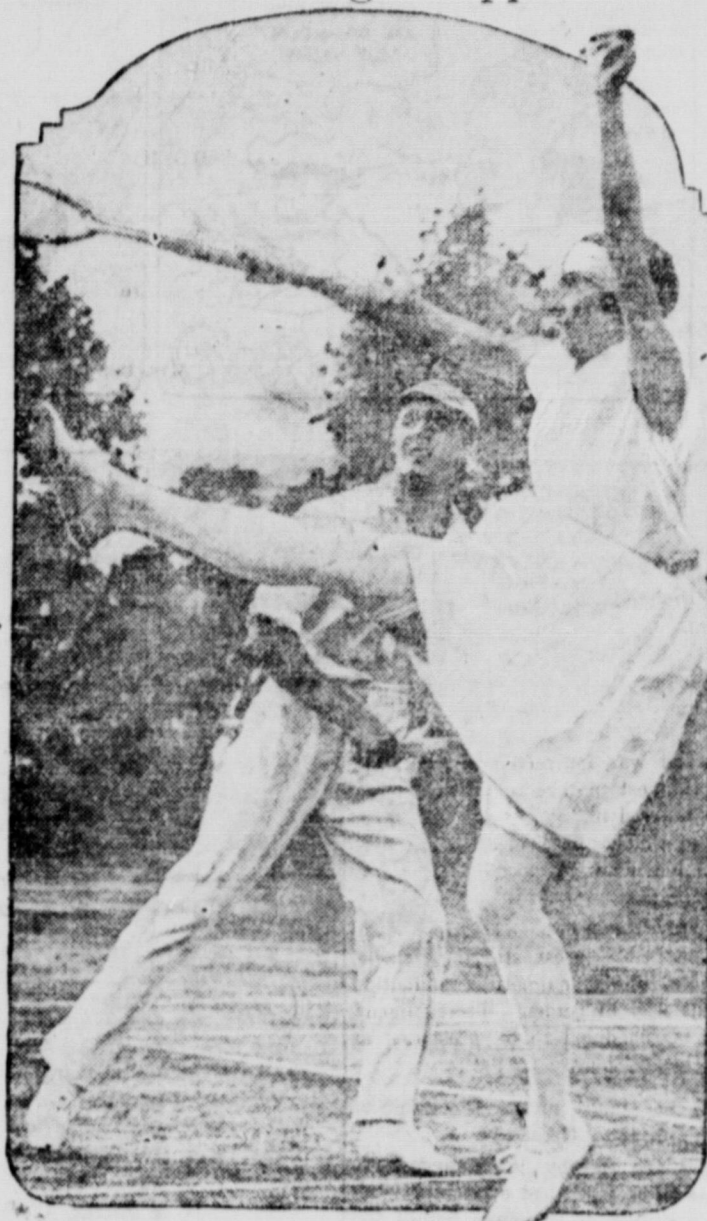

**Sardine Masher**  
Take one-fourth cup of butter, four large sardines, drained, 1 t. p. salt, and one teaspoon of lemon juice. Pound these into a smooth paste. When using this paste, spread one half of the sandwich with a mashed hard-boiled egg or a thin layer of minced onion.

**Cheese Butter**  
Mash together one-half cup of American cheese and one-half cup of butter. When using this butter spread one-half of the sandwich with this mixture and the other half with a tart jelly. Either crackers or saltines or bread can be used. Also any pungent cheese can be used instead of American cheese if desired.

**Date Butter**  
Mix one cup mashed dates, and one-half cup of butter with the oil squeezed out of the rind of a lemon. Mash these together into a paste. When using this butter spread it thickly on bread or crackers.

**KITCHEN SUGGESTIONS**  
Lemons may be preserved from decaying by keeping in a jar of cold water which is renewed every 24 hours. If desired to keep for many months, pack in clean dry salt.  
Jam that has become hard and sugary can be made almost like new by placing it in an oven until the sugar melts—take out and let cool.  
Sun dried fruits should not be left outdoors overnight. The dew falling on them makes them moist.  
Iron or tin vessels should never be used in preparing fruits, as the action of the acids on the metals gives dark color and disagreeable taste to fruits.  
The various kitchen tasks can be done most comfortably at different heights. Sinks especially are often set too low; 30 or 31 inches from the bottom of the sink to the floor is considered a good average height, says the United States Department of Agriculture. The housewife should experiment until she finds the best height for her sink, and also for the table, ironing board, washtubs and stove. The woman who stoops over a table to wash dishes is sure to have a tired feeling and possibly a backache, when her work is done.  
The table and stove can be raised on blocks hollowed out to fit the legs and with a little ingenuity the ironing board and tubs can be adjusted. A stool or a high chair on which to sit while preparing vegetables at the sink washing dishes, or ironing, saves energy and helps to prevent fatigue.
