COOKING FOR THE THRESHERS

We regret a movement which has made itself manifest at Fostoria, O., and hope that it will not be widespread. A group of farmers in that locality have formed a threshing club, with this startling innovation: Each will carry his own lunch to the threshing.

No person who has never sat down to a thresher meal can know what this departure means. There are two great meals in the course of the farm wife's year—the Thanksgiving dinner and the dinner for the threshers. On the former occasion she cooks for her relatives. On the latter she cooks for the neighborhood. If there is any difference in the importance of the two banquets, the latter is more significant, because it maintains the standing as a housewife in the community. It is the proof of her fair name as a skillful and bountiful cook.

And how she spreads herself! There is no branch of her art which is not represented on the table in a copious measure. Gargantuan would go away from her table satisfied with its quality and *Eusebius* could find no fault with its quantity.

The new movement is advertised as being for the benefit of the farm wife, and save her a great deal of work. There is no question but that a great deal of hard labor goes into the preparation of a threshers' meal. But that is true of every piece of consummate art. We like to recall the enthusiasm and pride with which every good housewife of our boyhood neighborhood tackled the job of cooking for the threshers. The labor was lightened by that pride and enthusiasm.

Every American farm wife who is as proud of her cooking as she should be will resent this movement as an insult to her delight in perfect endeavor. She will recognize in it a menace to a noble American institution, and repel it even as the genuine artist always rejects any subterfuge which will weaken the products of his genius.

A DOUBLE TRIUMPH

M. Caillaux, French minister of finance, had two triumphs in a day. He was elected a member of the senate by the people of his district, and both houses of the French parliament approved the plan which he had prepared for balancing the budget. For one who a year ago was in exile from Paris, because of his opinion that France's sword rattlers had done evil in beguiling their nation into war, this was a good day's work. But it may be another story a year hence when Frenchmen find out how the Caillaux budget works. It puts them under necessity of paying heavy taxes, some thing that every finance minister since the World War had discreetly avoided exacting from them. These other statesmen had postponed the day of reckoning by resorting to borrowing, and by feeding their countrymen with the fiction that "Germany would pay all." Germany is paying, but if she would, could not pay enough to make up for all the foolish spending that went on during the war, and that did not cease with its ending. Caillaux's enemies are counting on his being overthrown by popular resentment when Frenchmen find that they as well as others must pay for the folly of the war. If Frenchmen are wise they will not punish the man who is telling them the unpleasant truth. Rather they should honor him for destroying the ancient delusion that any country can never come to happiness and prosperity through war.

WASHINGTON GOSSIP

In the last Congress Independents blocked organization and forced thru an amendment which permitted a motion to discharge a committee to be made on the petition of 100 members. Independents contended that this procedure prevented committees from "killing" legislation in which many members were interested.

The Howell Barkley bill, abolishing the Railroad Labor Board, was called up under this procedure but Republican leaders prevented its passage. This was the only measure considered under the change effected by Independents.
