Well, nobody said life was going to be a real picnic or a bed of roses, but a lot of folks just don't seem to be able to cope with the daily frustrations of life. I think the reason so many people watch those talk shows on televison ("Cross-dressing drug-users who cheat on their spouses") is because these shows make the viewers' own dull, anxiety-riddled existence seem so much nicer by comparison. And if watching the mis-fits on TV don't do it for you, there's always alcohol abuse, drug addiction, overeating, gambling, and other self-destructive activities to indulge in while pursuing your happiness. Maybe using the correct underarm deodorant, drinking the right cola, using the "in" perfume, or driving the classiest vehicle would be the answer to your pursuit. These things are just quick fixes that fail to live up to expectations. The founding fathers should have said...the citizens are endowed with the right to "life, liberty and the pursuit of enlightenment," or perhaps "the pursuit of meaningful achievement." We get so caught up in our frenzied pursuit that we sometimes lose sight of the intended goal. We spend money we don't have to buy things we don't need to impress people we don't care about. And people will steal anything that isn't nailed down. Stores now have fancy surveillance equipment, security guards and store detectives just to keep people from walking off with all the merchandise. People put all sorts of alarms and devices on their cars to try to keep people from stealing them. If you need to get rid of something at your house, just put it out in your front yard and somebody will rip it off. Someone once said "The best things in life are free," but I don't think this is exactly what they had in mind. Each individual has something to be glad about if we just take a minute to think about it: falling in love; watching the sunset or the moonrise; cheering your youngster around the bases after a terrific hit; chocolate chip cookies; listening to the church choir on Sunday morning; fresh fruit and vegetable stands along the roadside; cuddling a freshly-bathed baby; birds gathering at your backyard feeder; homemade ice cream; catching a twelveinch rainbow in a mountain stream on a misty morning; puppy breath; driving home from work with the knowledge that you put your best into your job today; waving to neighbors and strangers alike as you take your evening walk. Pennies For Park Grant Has Been Approved

By KATHLEEN DAVIS About 90 years ago, settlers on the western High Plains founded Friona and staked out some of the flat earth hoping to land the Parmer County Courthouse.

But county business went to Farwell, a decision that apparently so annoyed turn-of-the-century Frionans that their chosen site of county government was left a vacant reminder of what would have been.

"The land for the Courthouse sat there with nothing on it all these years," said Teresa Buske, executive vice president of the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

Maybe the property never will host judges and juries, but the community has handed down a new ruling: it now shall be a park centered on the restored Santa Fe depot with playground equipment, restrooms, a gazebo and 15 muchloved trees.


For many, the SBA grants made planting new trees possible. The SBA Texas report indicates that 80 per cent fewer trees--some 1,800 trees--would have been planted if the grants weren't available.

Smith said the SBA program, which has been available in Texas since 1991, will have planted 50,000 trees when all of the 1994 projects are completed.

Money was divided among 13 regions, based on population, to make sure the funds would flow into all parts of the sate, according to the Texas Forest Service. At least 25 per cent of the SBA funds were reserved for places that had been declared federal disaster areas. Almost 20 disaster counties gualified for more than \$697,000 of the funds to be used to replant trees in damaged areas.

FEEDYARD PROJECT Work has been underway at West Plains Feed Yard the past couple of weeks to re-surface the parking lot. Manager Bill McCoy said that as of Wednesday evening the new asphalt surface was completed, which will be extra-nice for customers. In addition, West Plains is building a new mechanic's shop, and adding a new boiler room to the mill with a 300 HP motor, increasing their volume by 50 per cent. "These are improvements that have been badly needed," McCov said.



To make the improvements, the chamber's Women's Division started Pennies for the Park--placing canisters in stores around town and at the schools--to collect funds.

That money enabled Friona to apply for a Small Business Administration National Tree Planting Program grant through the Texas Forest Service. Recipients of these grants must provide at least 45 per cent local matching funds in cash or in-kind services and use small businesses to purchase the trees, plant them, provide landscape design or install irrigation systems.

Friona's Pennies for the Park project received a \$3,374 grant from SBA to go with \$2,761 from local coffers.

"We've taken lots and lots of rolls of pennies to the bank," Mrs. Buske said. "This has turned into a community-wide effort."

She said the trees will be an important part of the park for shade and beauty.

"We'll be planting the trees in November during the proper season. We're planning a big ceremony for Police Department and the DPS. that," she said.

Without the SBA grant, Friona would have only been able to afford two trees.

Friona is but one of 109 projects funded by SBA grants in Texas this year, according to Pete Smith, grants administrator at the Texas Forest Service.

Statewide, SBA is granting \$1,184,540 to plant more than 9,300 trees in more than 90 communities. Those communities are supplying almost \$1.4 million additional dollars to purchase, plant and maintain the trees. Nationally, the SBA is putting almost \$18 million into the tree planting program this year, Smith said.

"We need a response rate of 75 per cent of the total city Mrs. Wilson said.

Mrs. Wilson indicated that there were 20 to 30 households that had been visited at least twice in the evenings this week, without finding anyone at home. "We plan to try once more, in the daytime, to see if we can catch them," she said.

"Everyone was very cordial and cooperative with our surveyors, and we appreciate the residents taking time to help our survey team. I know it seems nosy to ask people about their income, but at least they only had to indicate that their income was above or below the stated level (in this case \$18,000).

The City must show from the survey that 51 per cent of the persons which benefit from the proposed project are persons whose income is 80 per cent or less of the median income in Parmer County, which is \$18,000 per capita.

"I feel like the figures will show that over half of our residents' income is less than the median income, but we won't know for sure until next week," Mrs. Wilson continued.

Bovina had a 8.01 per cent increase with the 1994 total sales tax of \$13,780.06 compared to last year's \$12,758.04.

Farwell had a 3.54 per cent decrease in sales tax with a 1994 total of \$23,043.87 compared to last year's \$23,890.01.

"The adjusted local sales tax revenue for the first half of 1993 was \$708 million, while the adjusted revenue for the same period in 1994 totals \$761 million.

"One of the few things that economists will agree on is that sales tax revenue is a good barometer of local retail sales activity. To better gauge the true level of local economic activity, we've adjusted local tax revenues to delete such non-economic factors as sales tax rate changes, audits or reallocations," Sharp said. "Those adjustments allow us to compare apples with apples, or more importantly, sales tax revenue for the first six months of this year with the first half of 1993."

The adjusted sales tax revenue varies by regions of the state. According to Sharp's analysis, local sales tax revenue is up in each of the 10 economic regions of Texas. Those increases are: Central Texas, up 11.2 per cent; Gulf Coast, up 5.2 per cent; High Plains, up 7.8 per cent; Metroplex, up 9.3 per cent; Northwest Texas, up 4.1 per cent; South Texas, up 3.7 per cent, Upper East Texas, up 6.9 percent; Upper Rio Grande, up 7.7 per cent and West Texas, up 5.3 per cent.

Approximately 500,000 Texas businesses collect the state and local sales tax from their customers and remit the money to the Comptroller's Office on a monthly, quarterly or annual basis, depending upon the size of their operation. The state sales tax rate is 6.25 per cent, while the local rate can be as much as two per cent.

The Comptroller deposits the state's share of the tax revenue into the State Treasury and returns the local share back to the communities to help fund a wide variety of programs and services.



The tournament is being sponsored by the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce and the Church of the Nazarene.


There will be only one division offered and Class D teams are the only teams accepted for competition. The entry fee is \$125 with the fee and team roster returned no later than August 10.






The Rules Of Asset Allocation

Managing money is not an exact science, because expectations can be altered by national and worldwide economic changes. In the 1980s, for example, we experienced double-digit inflation and unprecedented interest rates. Today, we're faced with the lowest interest rates in more than 25 years.

What's the best way to manage

1. Inaccurate assumptions can make major differences in investment results. For example, if your financial professional allocates assets based on stock market returns over the past 10 years, you may be disappointed, because returns over the past decade were twice what they have been over the past 70 years.

2. History has a way of repeating itself, but relying too nuch on historical returns can be



money through all kinds of economic conditions? Most experts agree that diversification, or asset allocation, is one of the safest approaches.

Investors can find financial professionals everywhere offering "asset allocation." The term may refer to anything from a simple diversification of investments to elaborate computer programs that analyze a wide array of variables. The same thing happened in the 1980s when the term "financial planning" became more of a sales buzzword than a term describing a legitimate way to structure one's finances.

disappointing. For example, the historical relationships between stock and bond movements are relatively good indicators. On the other hand, real estate values can appear quite differently when using appraised value rather than real returns, which includes the effects of inflation. Money managers should use history as a guide, not a rule.

implementing an allocation plan is vital. Investment professionals and clients first must agree on how funds are to be allocated. Then the plan should be implemented. Factors such as age and earnings in the future need to be reviewed.

4. Finally, make it simple. Plans that are overcomplicated, filled with theory and jargon, can be confusing to the point where it's difficult to take action. Any asset allocation plan, along with expected risks and returns, should be simple to understand.
