WASHINGTON.—France's war in Morocco, with another one just starting in Syria, won't improve this country's prospects of arranging a satisfactory debt settlement.

It's beginning to become apparent that the Moroccan affair is of considerable size.

The Druses who are in revolt in Syria, are stubborn fighters, too.

Both these campaigns are expensive and undoubtedly will make the French feel poorer.

All the indications are that America's World War Foreign Debt Commission will stand pat in its conversations with Finance Minister Caillaux of France—that is it will insist on an agreement which appears to give the United States all that she has coming.

In reality the figures are likely to be hounded so as to make a good many concessions to the French, but it must be done so that nobody will know except a few super-experts like Secretary Mellon and Hoover and Senator Smoot.

It must be done that way because the administration doesn't believe the

American public opinion would approve undue leniency toward the French. But this won't suit Minister Caillaux, whose game it to make his people think they're getting more than they are.

The outlook doesn't favor harmony.

The beauty of the whole thing is that nobody on the inside in Washington expects America to get full pay

ment on war loans except from England.

As for the rest—a little interest, perhaps, here and there, but nothing more.

The pending negotiations are for popular consumption.

It is yet too early to tell whether the bugaboo next time will be a third party or a third term.

Survey New Line POST, Sept. 15.—Several Santa Fe engineers are busy here making a survey for a proposed line to connect Post with the Gulf Colorado and Santa Fe, Oklahoma to Galveston, and it is considered likely that the Santa Fe will shortly ask the Interstate Commerce Commission for permission to construct a new branch. 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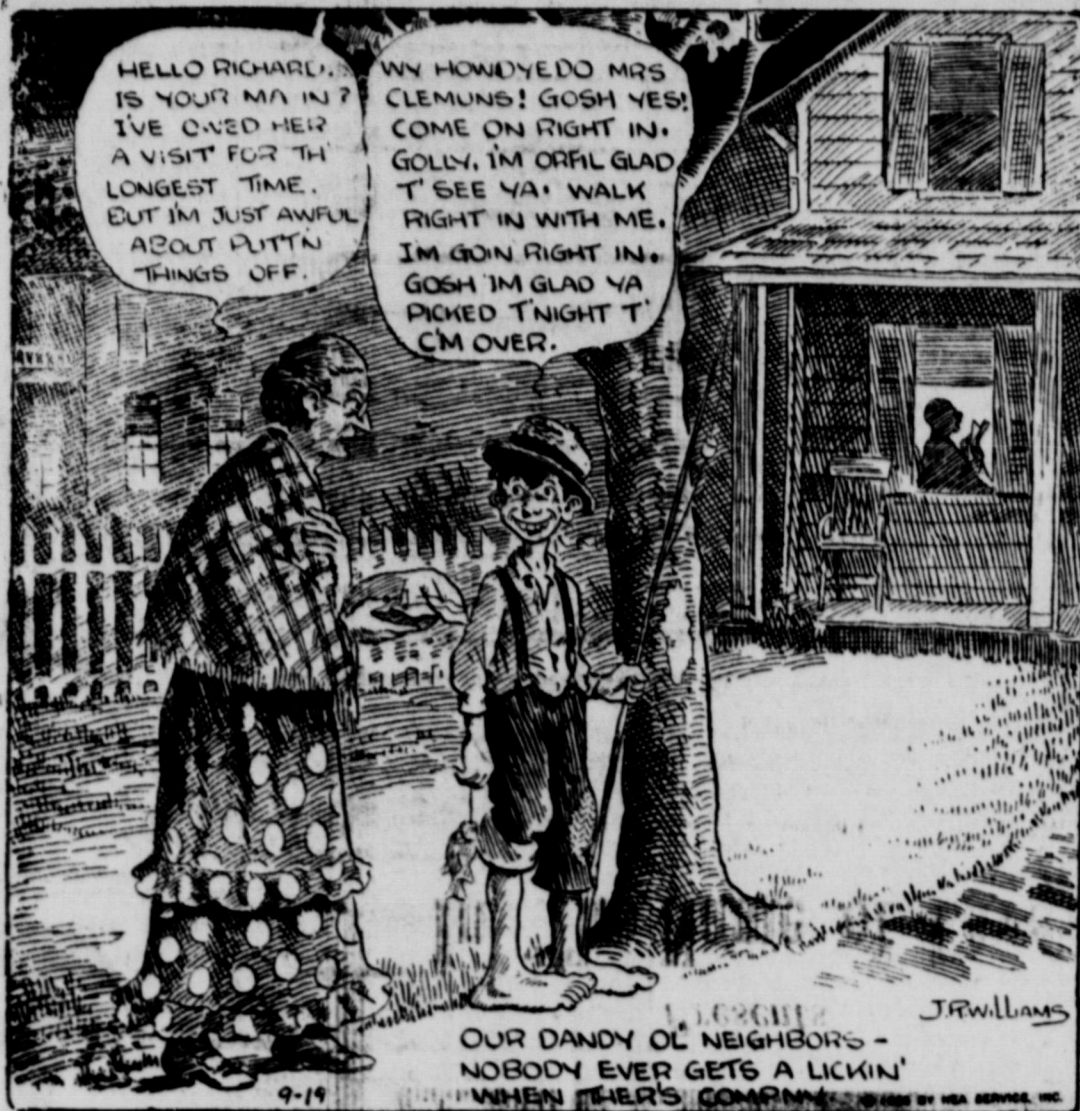
