

One of the principal factors back of the most extraordinary stock markets which the country has seen in years is the plentitude of money available for the use of bullish operators and in the hands of people who are seeking investments.

Scarcely a day passes which do not see new high record prices established for some securities, many of which are selling at figures quite out of proportion to their dividend distributions.
