STAGE IS SET FOR AIR FORCE PROBE

U. S. Air Service on Threshold of Era of Searching Investigation—Starts Monday

MAY SUMMONS MITCHELL

Expect Colonel to Be Called to Washington Inquiry and to Shenandoah Probe at Lakehurst

By United Press. WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—The air service of the United States government tonight stood at the threshold of an era of searching investigation in which past policies will be tested in crucial expert analysis and new policies possibly be devised.

On Monday morning at 10:30, the first session of President Coolidge's aircraft board will convene in a committee room of the House of Representatives building here, and at the the Shenandoah disaster will formally same time the Navy investigation into be brought to order at Lakehurst, N. J.

The inquiry board will be under the chairmanship of Dwight F. Morrow of J. P. Morgan and Co. an old friend of the President's.

The Lakehurst probe will be conducted by Rear Admiral Hilary T. Jones, chief of the naval staff.

From this province procedure, the inquiry is expected to soar to a quick finish on Wednesday or Thursday, with the summoning of Colonel William Mitchell to take the stand and substantiate charges that tipped off the present explosive burst of investigations.

The court of the Shenandoah inquiry has not been announced. It has been reported that Colonel Mitchell may be summoned before it to explain charges against the Navy Department, but Capt. Paul Folet, judge advocate of the inquiry has not announced his intentions of doing so.

COMMUNIST ASKS FOR FAIR TRIAL

British Member of Parliament Excluded from United States by Kellogg Wants Chance

DAVIS ASKS FOR RULING

Secretary of Labor Requests Solicitor General for Opinion on Immigration Law

By United Press. LONDON, Sept. 19.—Shapurji Saklatvala, British Communist member of Parliament barred from entering the United States by Secretary of State Kellogg's withdrawal of his passport visa wants an investigation and defense before a special committee and the bar of the American public opinion, he told the United Press today.

He had made this request in answer to a cablegram from the American Civil Liberty Union which offered to pay the cost of a test case on the Kellogg ban.

Asks Ruling

By United Press. WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—Secretary of Labor Davis has requested the solicitor general of the United States for a ruling on the Immigration Law under which he can exclude any avowed member of the Communist party seeking admittance to this country.

Davis says he wants the ruling with special reference to the Parsee Communist Saklatvala whose American passport was cancelled by Secretary of State Kellogg.

FOIL LYNCHING

Three Negro Suspects Spirited Out of Marshall—Seventeen Would Be Lynched Held

By United Press. MARSHALL, Sept. 19.—Three negroes, who were seized from a mob here last night seeking revenge for the shooting of W. D. Tiller and his son Thursday were spirited out of Marshall today.

This is the second time the negroes have been moved in the past 24 hours to prevent mob violence. The three suspects were taken from here to an unknown jail for safe keeping. Seventeen members of the band who attempted the lynching party and who were arrested and jailed last night were released this morning.

Front Porch and Ukelele Training For Swim Is Denied

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—The United States Swimming Association which financed the trip of Gertrude Ederle to France for the purpose of swimming the English Channel tonight prepared an official statement on the subject of the American girl's failure. The statement, which will probably be issued next week, refutes charges made by Jabez Wolfe, the English trainer to the effect that Miss Ederle "trained on the front porch with a ukelele," and substantiates the woman's statements that she did not neglect her opportunity but was beaten by adverse circumstances.

CRASH FATAL TO RACE CAR DRIVER

One Dead, Many Dying and Three Injured When Machines Pile Up On Mile Dirt Track

FIRST RACE OF STATE FAIR

Opening Day Illinois Exposition Started—Driver Cuts in Ahead Clips Front Wheel

By United Press. SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Sept. 19.—Five men were injured here this afternoon, one of them dying a short time later, when five racing cars traveling at more than sixty miles an hour piled up on the first turn of the mile dirt track here.

The spill occurred in the first event of the automobile racing program today—the opening day of the Illinois State Fair.

Roy Humphrey of Keokuk, Iowa, died in the St. John hospital early tonight.

Paul Clancy of Chicago, Benny Shauff of Springfield, Ill., Homer Osansky of Indianapolis and "Dutch" Bauman of Indianapolis were drivers of the other four machines.

Clancy cutting in ahead of Shauff clipped off his front wheel. Both machines turned over and the drivers following, unable to swerve or stop, piled into the wreckage.

Bauman is badly injured and physicians are battling for his life tonight.

MALONE REPLIES TO BRYAN SPEECH

Defender of John T. Scopes in Evolution Trial Answers Last Speech of the Commoner

HITS TENNESSEE LAW

Is Bitter in Attack on His Opponents at Dayton Trial—Says Menace to Country

By United Press. LENOX, Mass., Sept. 19.—The champion of science tonight answered the posthumous attack of William Jennings Bryan on evolution. Dudley Field Malone, counsel for John T. Scopes, Tennessee school teacher, convicted at Dayton for teaching evolution, speaking before the national convention of laymen of the Unitarian Church of America, declared "Bryan's death removed the ablest leader of the most sinister movement in the United States."

Malone was even more bitter in his denunciation of the Tennessee anti-evolution law and the position taken by his opponents when he stood beside Clarence Darrow in defending Scopes in the court room at Dayton.

"The physiology for which they crucified Jesus, murdered Bruno, and burned Joan de'Arc, the fear of political theology tested by the power of truth again animates the movement which is a menace to the international peace of our country," he said.

The Scopes case came up on appeal before the Supreme Court Sept. 28, and his counsel is now engaged in securing a brief for the session. The address of Malone here tonight was entirely apart from any legal move in the case. Malone said he meant it as a direct answer to the last speech of Bryan published after his death. Malone denied the issue in the case was between science and religion.

START WORK ON FAIR STRUCTURES

Workmen Clearing Grounds at City Lake Park for First Buildings—Actual Construction Soon

SURVEY RACE TRACK

Splendid Racing Course to Be Provided—Will Build Grand Stand—Site Is Ideal

Actual construction work on fair buildings will begin early in the week and erection of the first three buildings will be completed in time for use at the opening of the Second Annual Nolan County Fair here Oct. 28.

The first three structures to be erected will be the main exhibit building, the poultry building and live stock building.

Fair officials are well pleased with the progress made to date in preparing for the fair. During the past week workmen and engineers have surveyed the building sites, staked the grounds, and staked out the new race track to be used this fall.

Workmen were clearing brush, weeds and trees Saturday on the sites of the buildings which are located in view of erecting additional structures each year.

The main exhibit building will be located at the far north side of the park property, across the bridge at the city lake. This spacious building is to be of frame and concrete, and will house all exhibits. Space 100 feet wide is left between the exhibit building and the poultry building on the west with intentions of building another structure there in the future. The livestock building will adjoin the poultry building on the west and extend to near the east side of the race track.

A small additional strip of land has been purchased in order to lay out a splendid race track that, when completed, will be one of the best in this section. The track will be oval in shape, extending east and west, or just opposite the layout used when the track was first opened here July 4. The track has been enlarged and will be five-eighths of a mile around.

Considerable work will be necessary to put the track in shape, it was stated. Plans are being made to level the track, taking out inclines and filling in the low places.

The grandstand will be constructed on the south side of the track facing north, and will be alongside the home stretch.

Fair officials consider the city fortunate in having an ideal layout for fair purposes. All fair buildings will be surrounded by trees and shades, and will border on the shores of City Lake. No buildings will be erected in the wide open space in the center of the fair grounds, this being left open for the crowds, stands and shows. Parking space has been provided near the entrance of the fair grounds large enough to accommodate many cars, and no cars will be permitted to cross the bridge or enter the fair grounds.

SHOT FOR THEFT

Filling Station Owner Arrested for Shooting, Claims Dead Man Stole Gasoline

Later three others were taken into custody and are being held by the police for questioning.

WILL CLAMP LID ON PLAGUE SPOT

Dr. Imes, Federal Expert in Charge Hoof and Mouth Disease, Threatens Drastic Action

MARTIAL LAW IMPENDS

Strict Quarantine 22 Counties Promised if Injunction Against Cattle Killing Continues

By United Press. HOUSTON, Sept. 19.—A strict quarantine of 22 counties was imminent Saturday unless Judge Canty dissolves his injunction at cattle there from slaughter.

That was the announcement of Dr. Imes, Federal expert in full charge of the plague spot following receipt of a telegram from John R. Mohler, chief of the Bureau of Animal Industry at Washington.

Dr. Imes said that no extension of the quarantine would be necessary if the court dissolves the injunction. If not, at least 22 counties and probably more, will be quarantined. The hearing at Galveston was adjourned late today after six hours of argument until Monday morning.

Declaration of martial law also hinges upon Judge Canty's order in the suit up for hearing. Former governor Ferguson said today that if the injunction is continued martial law will be declared. Many states are threatening embargoes on Texas products if the injunction continues.

MORE PUPILS

Enrollment Increases 83—Total 1178 in School, As Compared With 1095 Opening Day

A total enrollment of 1178 pupils in the public schools of Sweetwater the current week as compared with 1095 on the opening day and 1143 on September 30, 1924, is reported by Superintendent of Schools B. H. McLain. An increase of 83 pupils over opening day is pointed out.

The pupils are distributed among the various schools of the city as follows: High School, 310; Seventh Grade (at High School) 110; East Ward, 368; West Ward, 197; South Ward, 203.

The East Ward is showing the greatest gain, while the West Ward is some what lower in attendance figures than last year.

Lyons had moved down the Senators with almost mechanical precision for 8 2/3 innings. He was about to enter baseball's hall of fame with the second no hit game in the major league this year when Veach blasted his hopes.

Mrs. Williams was instantly killed while her husband died a few minutes after being put aboard the train.

Truck Driver Killed

Mallott was hurled 25 feet by the impact while the truck was completely demolished.

ECONOMY PLANS RESULT IN SAVING

Annual Report of Budget Director Lord to President Shows Budget Methods Net Surplus

EXPENDITURES ARE CUT

U. S. Revenues for Year Ending July 30 Exceed Three Billion—Surplus Added to Debts

By United Press. WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—The way to further reduction has been opened by the economy program of the administration, the annual report of director of the budget Lord to President Coolidge showed tonight.

Every known method of economy was utilized by the government during the fiscal year ending July 30, resulting in a surplus of \$250,505,238.33 over expenditures and receipts.

Revenues for the year totaled \$3,780, 148,684.42 while the expenditures amounted to \$3,529,643,446.06

The surplus accumulated at the end of the year was utilized by the treasury department in further reductions of the public debt beyond the reduction required by the sinking fund and loans. Reduction of debts during theyear was \$734,619,101.59.

"Operation of the general reserve during the four years of the budget control has resulted in preventing requests for deficiency appropriations, has been a material factor in holding expenditures below the amount of available appropriations," Lord reported.

CALM REIGNS ON COLLEGE CAMPUS

Everybody Pledges Themselves to "Work for Best Interests of College" in Statement

ROW IS OVER AT C. I. A.

Statement Issued by Hugh Nugent Fitzgerald Says All Charges Are Withdrawn

DENTON, Sept. 19.—Calm descended over the campus of the College of Industrial Arts tonight after a week of turbulence which centered around Dr. Lindsey Blayney, president of the College.

A full hearing of the charges and counter charges which had been hurled back and forth during the week of heated discussion apparently ironed out all the difficulties, according to a brief statement issued following the board meeting.

A brief message signed by Hugh Nugent Fitzgerald, chairman of the Board of Regents to the effect that "all charges had been withdrawn, and all parties pledged themselves to work to the best interests of the college. Consequently Dr. Blayney was not asked to resign."

Some of the faculty members claimed that Dr. Blayney was not fitted for the post.

LEAGUE NATIONS BOUNDARY ROW

Mosul Dispute Far From Solution at Geneva Session When Turk Withdraws Pledge

HAD REACHED DECISION

Council Earlier in Day Had Agreed to Refer Question to Hague Court—Britain Speaks

By United Press. GENEVA, Sept. 19.—The Mosul boundary dispute tonight was admittedly further than ever from a solution following a dramatic scene in the League of Nations council when Turkey's earlier pledge to observe any decision of the council was not binding since the Angora national assembly had not ratified it.

The council had decided earlier in the day to refer to the Hague court the question of whether the council was to act as arbitrator of mediator in the dispute involving jurisdiction over Mosul as between Turkey and England.

LOYALTY

If you ask the first ten persons you meet on the street or the first hundred whether or not they believe in loyalty to their town, all ten will say "yes" without hesitating or stammering to argue the point at all but come right out flatfooted in favor of it. Ought to be a law and vigorously enforced and words to that effect.

But there are a whole of a lot of folks who believe in town loyalty just like they believe in law enforcement; it's a fine thing for the other fellow. But personally, they reserve the right to do as they think fit to their own best interest, until forced into line by an outraged public opinion.

SO NEAR—SO FAR

Whatever strides Dallas has made toward the commercial supremacy of North Texas, and they have been many and lengthy these past few years, go as naught these days. For the Dallas club ball has once more been humbled by the haughty Pantherians from Cowtown and once more will it be Ft. Worth's burden to carry the Texas League gonfalon into the Dixie Series. Although going in to the end of the last half of the split season with a tie, it was no trouble at all for Ft. Worth to take three in a row when playing off the tie, and thus quickly humble the hopes of the Dallas Steers and fans who thought



for the moment they were going somewhere.

SCOLDING AND SCOLDERS

People didn't differ in the matter of scolding. Few deserve punishment under the penal code, for common scolds but petulant scolding is one of the most universal of human traits. Whether we know it or admit it we are all chronic critics of our fellows. Perhaps there is some truth in the expression, "we love each other for our faults."

Cartoons and comic strips are given to gross exaggeration especially as regards the marital state, but where a happily wedded pair which is not scolded into married bliss? Of course they are intended as helpful suggestions and household hints, but these remarks about bills, cigar ashes, late dinners and delayed dinners, and other conjugal annoyances are but examples of everyday and unnoticed family scoldings. Our neighbors alone are aware of their presence.

The statistician affords us rare opportunities for giving vent to our natural propensity for complaining. How the men scold the women for their extravagance when the revenue bureau announces what was spent for cosmetics and silken hose in the preceding

year and what a babel is set up by the wives and mothers when the tobacco statistics are broadcasted. A new source of scolding is the automobile. Non-owners charge the motorists with forcing the world into bankruptcy and automobile owners scold the pedestrian for something just as reasonable.

GREAT MEN

In his still well-known calendar of the world's great men, from the dawn of history down to about 1820, Auguste Comte included only 559 names. And to get this number he included such tiny stars as the American novelist, Fenimore Cooper, the English dramatist, Thomas Otway, and the Italian composer, Donizetti.

That many men who might be called great are not recognized is one conclusion that may be drawn from this. Doubtless that is true today. The man who invented the typewriter has affected the lives of millions. Judged by the benefits he has conferred this inventor might well be called great. But how many know that the typewriter was devised by Christopher Sholes, a collector of customs at Milwaukee, in 1867.

That recognition of greatness is an accident is another conclusion to be drawn from the old list of the world's great men. Men are much alike, however greatly their achievements may vary. Greatness, one may conclude, is merely a label attached to a few who are little different from their fellows whom none calls great.

Men once broke horses, but now autos break men.

STEWART'S WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON.—With President Coolidge back in the White House, politics in Washington has pepped up noticeably of late.

Senators and representatives are beginning to drift in. Plans for the coming session of Congress are being discussed.

The House Ways and Means Committee is to meet Oct. 17 to adopt a tax reduction program. There'll be a \$400,000,000 cut, according to Speaker Longworth. This is more than anybody has predicted yet.

Most of the cabinet members have returned to their desks. The capitol looks more like itself again. It's been a pretty dead place all summer.

President Coolidge's project for a lot of new—and much needed—government buildings in Washington is in difficulties right from the start.

"We're willing to vote for your bill," congressional arrivals in the city are telling the president, "on condition that you agree to a hundred or two million dollars' worth of new federal buildings in our various home towns, too."

Practically none of this kind of "pork" has been dished out since 1914 and the whole country is fairly starving for some.

Paying for it, however, doesn't fit in with the presidential economy policy.

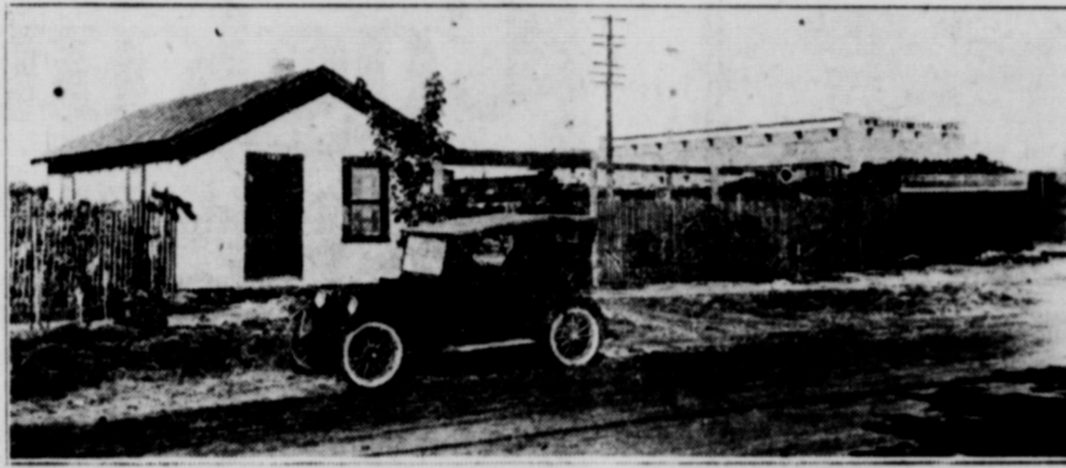

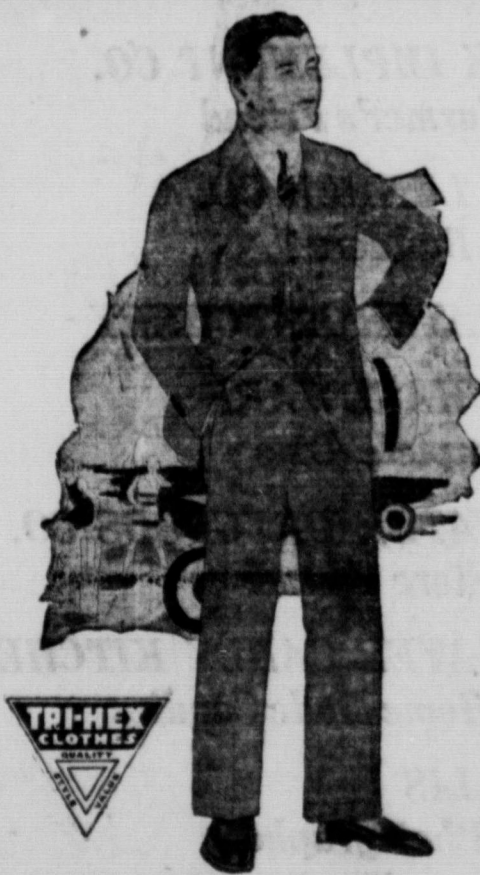

Save the Dough for Rolls

The rolls will not rise in the refrigerator but will come up quickly after taking them from the refrigerator into a warm kitchen. Vegetable Cakes for Children

Prepare three or four cooked vegetables, cutting them into small pieces or putting them through the food chopper. Add bread crumbs and a beaten egg. Then shape these into little cakes, dust them with flour and brown them in the oven or fry them in a little fat. Children enjoy vegetables prepared in this way.

RUSH IS ON FOR THREE GINS HERE

Expect Movement of Cotton to Strike Full Swing This Week—Several Weeks Late

GIN 401 BALES HERE

Season Total for Sweetwater Goes Over 400 Mark—Cottonseed Brings \$34 Here

Sweetwater cotton gins expect the heavy fall rush of cotton to begin this week following fair weather during the week just closed during which 401 bales were ginned here. Although the movement of cotton is slow this

fall, and several weeks behind the usual rush the next few weeks will see gins throughout this section launch into capacity ginnings, cotton men declared Saturday.

Very little cotton came to town during the early part of the week just past due to rains of the preceding weeks. The movement to the gins increased the latter part of the week, and a heavy run was reported Saturday.

Up to five o'clock Saturday afternoon, 401 bales had been ginned here this season. They were distributed among the three gins in the city as follows:

- Planters Gin Co., 202 bales.
- William-Miller Gin, 122 bales.
- Brown-Mitchell Gin, 77 bales.

The latter gin was idle early in the

week, due to machine repairs.

The heaviest day of the week for cotton receipts was late in the week when one gin turned out 44 bales. The same gin turned out 30 bales Saturday.

Receipts here have so far been much heavier than at Roscoe, according to reports from that town. The rush is expected to begin there, however within the next week. Six gins will be operated in Roscoe this season. About 50 farmers in that section recently purchased one of the gins and will operate it under their own direction.

The grade of cotton received at gins this year is good, according to reports, although some cotton shows the effect of recent rains. Cottonseed was bringing \$34 a ton Saturday.

The Sweetwater Cotton Oil Co. plant will open for the fall season Monday, it was announced Saturday.

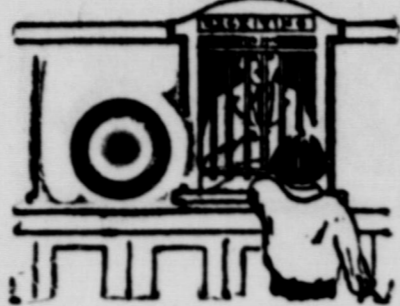

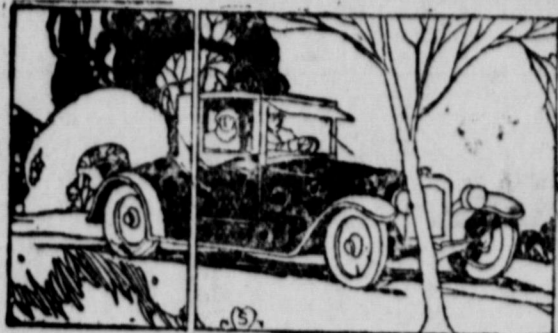

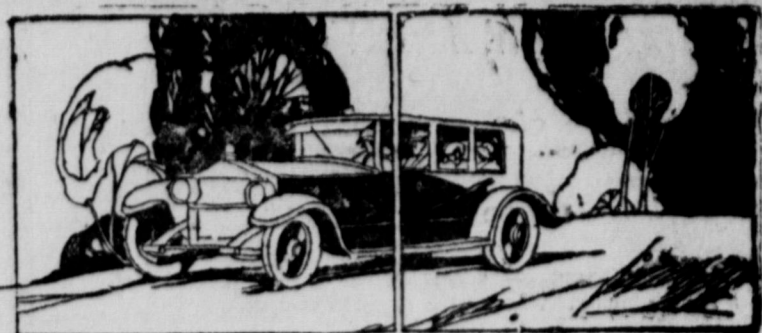

INCREASE PRODUCTION Chevrolet Factory Now Turning Out More Cars Than Ever

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 19.—Sustained demand and a growing list unfilled orders has caused the Chevrolet Motor Company to increase heavily its production schedule during September.

The schedule revision involves an increase of more than 16 per cent over the production program originally planned for September. The new schedule calls for 53,165 motor cars and

trucks in September, a Chevrolet record for that month and only 3,078 less than the highest production month in the history of the company.

Both day and night shifts have been augmented to maintain the new schedule. The company shipped 4,284 cars to dealers on Aug. 31, establishing a new record 600 higher than the largest previous shipment for one day.

The company, which recently made its two-millionth car, attained during August a greater production thus far for 1925 than the entire production of 1924.

VALUES BETTER Toler Predicts 30,000,000 Cars in United States Soon

"Never in the history of automotive industry has the public been offered such motor car values as is true today," says Huber Toler.

"Motor cars today cost 30 per cent less than before the war. Commodities in general cost 67 per cent more.

"Not only have motor car manufacturers found new ways of effecting economies in manufacture but they also discovered new ways of reducing sales costs. Not only have manufacturers reduced prices but they have also reduced finance charges and insurance rates until today almost every family is able to own its own motor car.

"The time is rapidly coming when there will be 30,000,000 motor cars in the United States. This is a surprising number but it is in the same proportion to population as there are registered automobiles in California today.

CAR SALES INCREASE Total of Eight Sold During Week—Two Trucks Are Registered

Automobile sales during the week just passed totalled eight, an increase of five cars over the previous week when only three cars were registered.

Sales are still slow, however, as compared with business during the summer months when from 10 to 18 cars were registered here weekly.

Automobile thieves were active in Sweetwater Friday night for the first time in several months, when the Ford roadster belonging to E. A. Harkins was stolen at the carnival grounds.

The car was parked near the grounds among scores of other cars, and the theft was discovered about 10 o'clock. Officers are without clues in connection with the theft.

TRAINS SAFER

Santa Fe Man Says Passengers Safer Than Pedestrians

AMARILLO, Sept. 19.—A passenger traveling today on a railroad train is safer than if he or she were walking on the streets in a large city, or even the highway, according to T. B. Jallaher, general passenger agent of the Santa Fe railway.

He bases this upon the fact that the railroads last year carried 931,000,000 passengers with only 149 killed. In other words, there was but one passenger killed out of every six million carried. The staggering revelation is that the passengers carried were equivalent to transporting every inhabitant in the United States eight times, and the loss of life was less than the week's auto death list in some of the big centers of population.

The Santa Fe general passenger agent points to the growing mortality due to automobiles, and stresses the importance of safety precautions both by drivers and others. The following cities show the greatest number of deaths from automobile accidents.

Philadelphia, one killed out of each 7,400; New York, one killed out of each 7,100; Boston, one killed out of each 6,900; Chicago, one killed out of each 6,400; St. Louis, one killed out of each 6,500; Cleveland, one killed out of each 6,200; Detroit, one killed out of each 6,700; Los Angeles, one killed out of each 3,100.

"The cities mentioned are not the horrible examples of automobile accidents, but are intended to present a reasonably fair reflection of the average conditions," he said.

WANTED MORE CLOTHES

Campaign Started For Clothing For Women and Girls

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Sept. 19.—A campaign to increase the amount of clothing worn by women and girls has been started by an organization which styles itself "the fully clothed Christians."

Will C. Wood, superintendent of public instruction for California received a letter from E. E. Hubbard, an officer of the society who wrote from Cardenas, Cuba, to upbraid the modern tendency toward scanty attire.

"Greater exposure of the bodies of women and girls does not make them fightously attractive but it does tend to lower the moral tone of some men," he letter states.

Hubbard went on to propose dresses worn to the shoulders, shirt waists toned well up around the neck and sleeves to the wrist.

"If there is not enough cloth to clothe everyone fully," the letter concluded, "then clothe the women and girls first."

The Bimbo Show, featuring dancing girls, of the Alamo Exposition shows playing here this week, was closed by the sheriff's department Friday night.

CHARGE CATTLE STEALING Meat Market Men at Meadow Under \$1,000 Bond Each

LUBBOCK, Sept. 19.—Sheriff Ellington and Deputy Sheriff Brown, of Terry County, were here from Brownfield conferring with Sheriff H. L. Johnston concerning discovery that operations of alleged cattle thieves is believed to be causing material losses to cattlemen in Terry county, and the outgrowth of which Jack Price and Jess Self, who have been operating a meat market delivery service at Meadow, were arrested and charged with theft of cattle.

Lem Chesher, of Lubbock, inspector for the Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, assisted the Terry county officers in working up the charges against the Meadow men, and in affecting their arrests.

Ellington stated that the men were released following their arrest after they made bonds in the amount of \$1,000 each.

Other arrests in Terry county are anticipated by the officers who believe that wholesale slaughtering of cattle on which bills of sale transfers were not made has occurred in various towns of that county, and as is the case in Lubbock, strict enforcement of the laws regulating the buying and selling of beef cattle and the marketing of beef will be made.

Some of the animals alleged to have been stolen at Meadow have been returned to their owners by the officers, however, quite a number of cattle have not been located, and it is believed that discovery of wholesale theft of cattle there will be made by officers in the near future, as they are making every possible effort to round up those responsible for the disappearance of the herds.
