Star Lites

OUR TWO STATE senators, Phil Gramm and Kay Bailey Hutchison, are both taking a conservative approach to the Health Care debate, as you would expect that they would.

Senator Gramm, who is making a name for himself as a conservative champion, has vowed to stage a filibuster, for however long it takes, if the Health Care bill is brought up for a vote in this session of congress.

Gramm may well have his chance, since the senate was ordered this week to go on a 24-hour around-the-clock basis while it debates Health Care. Those hoping to pass a bill decided that the only way a bill would pass would be to do it before congress adjourned, and before they were allowed to go back home, where it seems that a vast majority of Americans are somewhat skeptical about turning over the world's best health care system to the federal government.

And our newest senator, Kay B. Hutchison, looks as though she also fits the conservative mold. It is refreshing for a change for Texas to have both of its senators thinking alike, and mirroring the will of the majority of Texans, after a quarter of a century of having Lloyd Bentsen neutralizing the state's conservative vote.

In her weekly newsletter, Ms. Hutchison said she hoped that her cohorts would take their time in debating the Health Care issue. She points out that more than 85 per cent of Americans participate in what she calls the best health care system in the world, while lawmakers are considering 95 per cent coverage as "universal."

"The question becomes, "How can we bring in the unserved 10 per cent, and what will happen to the other 85 per cent when we do," the senator states.

She adds that President Clinton has raised the question "How can we get universal coverage?" while she believes that the question should be "How can we get universal coverage without destroying the good elements of our system, which now serves 85 per cent of the people well?"

"If we get it wrong, our errors will likely be irreversible. We must be very careful before dismantling the best health care system in the world. Once broken, it can't be fixed, and our health will suffer, along with our economy," she adds.

The state's junior senator stated in her letter that two new bills being considered by the senate, the one from Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell and House Majority Leader Richard Gephardt have been touted as being substantively different from the original Clinton plan.

"In fact," the senator declares "Each bill contains the worst elements of the president's original proposal, including an estimated \$100 million in new taxes, burdensome, job-destroying mandates and price controls. The end result could be health-care rationing," she warns.

"The employer mandate, called for in both the Gebhardt and Mitchell plans, will cost jobs, as businesses struggling to meet increased payroll costs will be forced to curtail hiring or even lay off workers."

"The most troubling aspect of the health-care debate is the unseemly way in which this critical question is being rushed through Congress. Such haste is not surprising, because the history of the debate, is that public support for plans like Clinton-Mitchell-Gebhardt disappears as voters learn more of them."

"This should be the most deliberative of processes, not a slapdash race. We must take our time and do it right. The only responsible approach to such a critical quality of life issue is to study it thoroughly, and to implement any changes carefully--one step at a time." We wholeheartedly agree!

Fourth grade students should report to the east doors on Euclid and fifth grade to the south doors by the principal's office.

New students who have not enrolled should report to the office immediately upon arrival at school Monday morning.

All seventh and eighth grade students will have their homeroom assignment posted outside the east door. All sixth grade students will have their homeroom assignments posted on the west doors of the building.

Each student will report to their respective homeroom at 8:20 a.m. and will receive their schedule at that time along with their locker assignment.

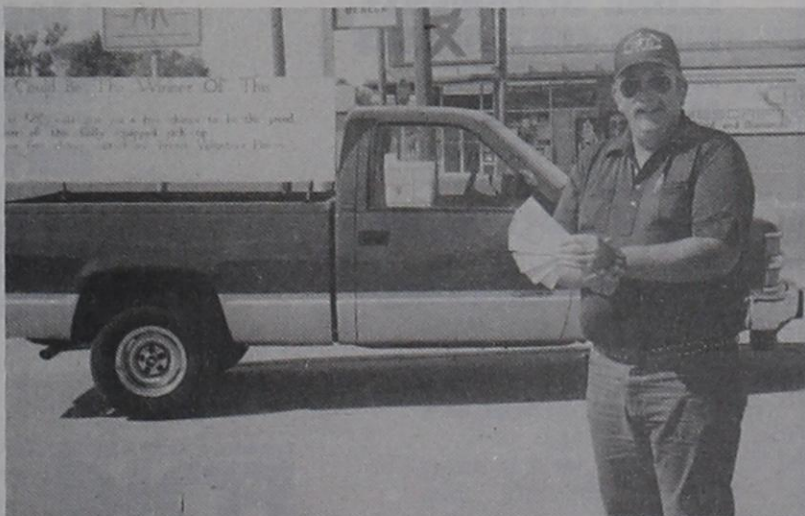

He was preceded in death by a son, Roy Dickens on March, 1990. Pallbearers were his grandsons.

Happy Homemaker

Many of us who are older have fond memories of being awake in time to watch our grandmothers grind the coffee beans before making breakfast coffee for our grandfathers and other family members.

I'm wondering if it would be possible to purchase coffee beans at this time.

I've never heard of "do-it-yourself" vanilla and am wondering where a person could get a vanilla bean.

However, if you plan to use our first recipe, which was submitted for the Schlenker Family Favorite Cookbook by Bula Schlenker Hopkins, you will have to find out.

VANILLA Aunt Bea

1 vanilla bean
1-4 or 6 ounce glass bottle (your pharmacy is a good source for this)

Dark rum or brandy
With sharp knife, split vanilla bean lengthwise, then cut the two pieces into 1 inch sections. Put in bottle and fill with either rum or brandy. Screw bottle cap on tightly.

Mark bottle with date it was made and put it away to age at least

three months, but the longer it stands, the better it gets.
The rum makes a robust vanilla, the brandy smooth and sweet.

Following the recipe was a brief explanation about vanilla beans. It was entitled:

DID YOU KNOW?

"Vanilla beans are the fruit of a tropical orchid grown on the islands of Madagascar, Reunion and Comores. These beans are the only source of true vanilla from which pure vanilla extract is made. Vanilla beans are becoming increasingly available across the whole country. And here is an idea: Use for cooking or sugar bowl.

"To flavor and scent your sugar, split bean in half lengthwise, cut into 1/2 inch pieces, place in covered jar with 2-5 pounds sugar. Let stand 2 weeks."

Our next recipe appeared on page one of the cookbook and was followed by this sentence:

This recipe plagiarized from Anonymous' by Kendall O. Schlenker.

1981 FAMILY REUNION ELEPHANT STEW

1 medium sized elephant
1 ton carrots

1 ton white potatoes
1/2 ton onions
Salt and pepper to taste
4 rabbits (optional)

Cut elephant into bite size pieces. This takes about four months. Dice vegetables, cover with water and cook on kerosene stove at 425 degrees for three weeks.

This recipe serves about 3800 people. If more people show up, the 4 rabbits may be added, but only if absolutely necessary as more people do not like to find "hare" in their stew.

PRESERVED CHILDREN

1 large field
6 or more children
2-3 dogs
Pinch of creek
Some pebbles
Lots of wet sand
Bunch of flowers
Scads of tall grass

Mix children and dogs well; put them on field, stirring constantly. Pour creek over pebbles and wet sand and sprinkle with grass. Then spread over a bright blue sky and bake in the sun. When brown, set away to cook in a clean bath tub.

*The Texas version requires one to substitute a bucket of water carried from the well house or nearest stock tank!

"I found this recipe in a Colorado family's cookbook. It reminded me of those 'magical' times one spends with grandparents.

"In my case, it is the memory of many happy hours spent down the road at 'Mom' and 'Pop' Schlenker's house.

"This recipe has been tried in many Schlenker households!"
Connie Johnson, who submitted this one, is the daughter of Carl and Velma Schlenker and grew up in the Rhea community very close to the home of her paternal grandparents, Floyd and Malinda Schlenker.

"I've tried the next interesting recipe and can assure anyone who tries it that perfect biscuits will be the result each time.

Louis Welch
Scratch up a box of Pioneer Biscuit Mix and follow the directions on the side of the box--explicitly!!

1 car
2 gallons of gas
1 person with license

Push button and order a Big Mac.

Lest some of our readers begin thinking this whole book must be fun and games, let's go on to some of the authentic recipes it contains.

How about something different? Let's start off with a recipe submitted by Sarah Schlenker Dean, daughter of Floyd and Malinda Reeve Schlenker, which is entitled simply:

NOODLES
For each egg used, use about 1/4 teaspoon cream of tarter, dash of salt and two tablespoons top cream, if you're fortunate enough to have a milk cow. If you don't have a milk cow, use whipping cream from the store or condensed milk. Beat eggs until thick. Add cream of tarter, salt and cream or milk. Then add enough flour to make a very stiff dough. Turn out on floured board and work enough flour into dough to make it rubbery.

According to the number of eggs used, divide dough and roll until it is thin enough to read a newspaper through.

Roll each thin sheet of dough into a roll and with a sharp knife, cut into thin noodles. Let dry

thoroughly.
It is very helpful to make up several eggs at a time and freeze the noodles. Then, presto, they are ready at a minute's notice.

I'm not sure I have eaten home made noodles since my grandmother made them many years ago. When I was growing up and the chickens came from the yard, it was a real convenience to have noodles ready to put in the chicken broth instantly.

After homemakers of that generation had killed the chickens, scalded it, picked the feathers off, singed it and cut it into serving

pieces, having noodles ready instantly was a real time saver.

HARD CRUSTED WHITE BREAD

John D. Schlenker
7 cups flour
3 cups hot tap water
4 teaspoons salt
2 packages yeast

Mix flour, salt and yeast in large mixing bowl. Add water in a "well" formed in the center of the mixture. Stir 'til it does no good.

Dump the works on floured board. Knead 10 minutes dusting freely with flour as needed. Form in ball, grease, cover and let rise two hours. Punch down and let rise

to double.
Pat out to 1/2 inch thickness, divide into portions, form loaves or whatever. Cover and let rise no more than two hours. Bake at 425 degrees for 20 minutes, then turn heat down to 325 degrees for fifteen minutes.

Makes a lot of bread--3 big loaves, 2 loaves and 1 pizza, 2 loaves and dinner rolls--whatever looks good.

Works best at high altitude (23,000 feet).

Kesner died August 13, 1994 at Parmer County Community Hospital.

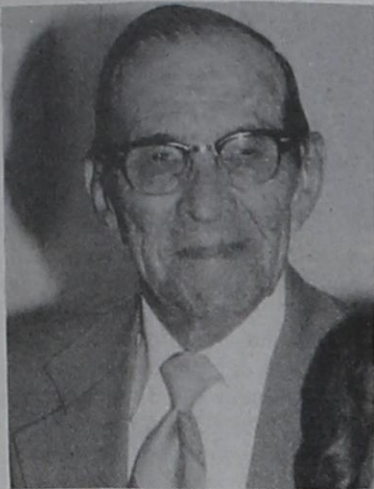
He was born November 6, 1909, in Haytie, Missouri.

Plan Early For A Secure Retirement

One of the best reasons to start a retirement program early is that the more you have until retirement, the less money you must deposit to build your nest egg. Unfortunately, many younger adults find it difficult to establish a regular savings program.

However, even people who do save regularly often settle for the lowest returns instead of learning about other investment options. Starting late and earning low returns can be two mistakes that rob you of a comfortable retirement.

The table illustrates how time and return can be either your best friend or your worst enemy. First, let's look at the importance of earning a good rate of return on your retirement savings. At age 25, if an investor begins contributing \$1,000 a year to an investment compounding at 10 per cent, she could retire with \$442,593. That is a reasonable goal, considering 10 per cent is in line with historic trends in the stock market.

If that same 25-year-old deposited the same amount in an investment earning only 5 per cent, her retirement savings would amount to only \$120,800—more than \$300,000 less than if she had earned 10 per cent. Five per cent is only slightly less than historic returns of long-term corporate or government bonds. Obviously, selecting investments with the highest returns, within the limits of your risk tolerance, can make a big difference in your retirement.

Time is just as important as returns. A 35-year-old who deposits \$1,000 a year in an investment compounding at 10 per cent will have \$164,494 at age 65. But if he waits until age 45 to begin depositing the same amount earning the same return, his retirement fund will grow to only \$57,275 by age 65.

Even at a 5 per cent return, waiting can be costly. As the table shows, a 30-year-old depositing \$1,000 a year at 5 per cent will have \$90,320 at age 65. If he waits until he's 50, he'll only have \$21,579.

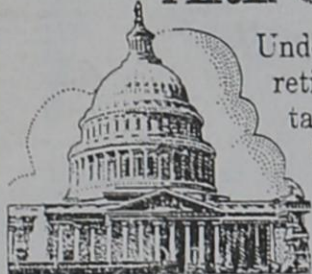
The table can be a useful tool in planning your retirement. Use it as a guide to project your retirement nest egg using various rates of return. If your savings are earning a low rate of return, and you cannot increase your deposits, you might consider moving your retirement account to an investment offering a higher return. If you have a long time before retirement, study the benefits of starting early. Remember, the earlier you begin, the easier it is.

YOUR EYES



Double Vision

What causes double vision? There are any number of reasons. If double vision comes on suddenly, it may mean simply that bifocals are misaligned. It's a simple matter to readjust the glasses, or place the reading segment

differently.

On the other hand, double vision may be the sign of developing health problems. If it is advisable, your optometrist will refer you to a specialist.

In children, though, double vision more often indicates poor eye muscle coordination that can result in crossed eyes. To compensate for the problem, the child's brain may block out the image from one eye, which interferes with normal binocular vision and depth perception. This lack may limit normal school and play activities. Your optometrist can help. After a professional examination, the condition can usually be helped by glasses and/or vision training.
