IS STATE HIGHWAY

Road from Sweetwater to Angelo to Be Improved

SAN ANGELO, Oct. 15.—The Texas Highway Commission re-designated the road between San Angelo and Robert Lee as a State Highway, closing a gap which has delayed work on this route connecting San Angelo and Sweetwater.

Action was taken while J. T. Mathison, Tom Green county Judge and W. C. Blanks, president of the Central National Bank and a member of the citizens' advisory committee, were in Austin. They conferred with the Texas Highway Commission relative to

plans for hard-surfacing approximately seventy miles of roads with the proceeds from the half-million dollar bond issue voted September 19, supplemented by Federal and State aid.

The commission earlier agreed to grant aid to Tom Green County on a 50-50 basis. Re-designating of the San Angelo-Robert Lee road as a State highway means that Federal and State aid will apply on this pro-

ject as well as on the San Angelo-Miles and San Angelo-Sherwood roads and the extensions of the Wall and Carlsbad pikes.

Probably three months will be required to complete plans and specifications on these projects and submit them to the State Highway Commission. The county commissioners do not intend to issue the bonds and offer them for sale until the money is needed, thereby saving interest.

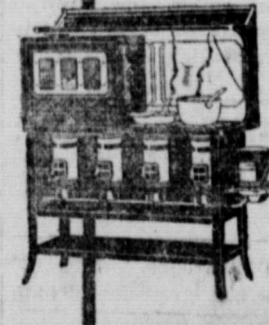
