STEPHENS TRIAL **NEARING AN END**

Both State and Defense Rest Case Late Saturday-Judge Leslie Prepares Charge

DEFENDANT TAKES STAND

Aged Fisher County Deputy Tells of Threats and Overhearing "There He Is, Shoot Him"

The hearing of testimony in the trial of Dan Stephens charged with the slaying of Otha Martin, his son in law, at the Roby court house in March, 1924, was completed in district court here at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon, Judge W. P Lestie immediately re tired to prepare his charge to the jury. Late Saturday the court was adjourned until Monday La e l' day the aged but vig-

orous defendant took the stand in his own behalf, pleading self defense and telling of threats against his life and of vverhcaring one of the Martin boys tell the other to "shoot him" when he saw them coming up the court house steps at Roby in March, 1924, when Otha was summened on stalutory charges with another daughter of Stephens' as complaining witness.

The fourth day of the trial. which has attracted wide interest in this section, opened shortly after nine o'clock Saturday when the defense examined a number of character witnesses. The day's hearing was featured by the testimony of G. W. Martin, father of the slain man who witnes ed the shooting, and by lively tilts between opposing counsel over the testimony of E. T. Child With Measles May Infect 20 Others -Isolation Is Best

BY DR. RUGH S. CUMMING Surgean General, United States Pub-lic Health Service.

fact that measles is a disease of leaving behind. p prime importance. It is a disease of mottling of the skin. close association. A single child in the beginning stages of measles may easily infect fifteen or twenty other people and because of this fact it is highly important that anyone known or thought to be suffering from measles should not be allowed to come in ocntact with well persons who have not had the disease until the fever accompanying the disease close association. A single child in the fever accompanying the disease has passed, and the patient released from quarantine at which time he should be free from nasal discharge

and free from a cold.

The first symptoms of measles usually apear about ten days after exposure. At this time the eyes of he child usualy becomes red and watery. The eyelids show signs of puffiness and the eyes themselves are

In severe cases, the whole face is swollen and puffed, the throat is parched and dry and an irritating cough adds to the discomfort.

The child is apt to come home from school feeling drowsy and irri-

table and complaining of chilly sen sations. He may even have a chill. At night the irritation increases, the child is feverish, the whites of the eyeballs show little red lines upon them and the sufferer gives the ap-Pearance of a person about to cry There may be a few little red spots

on the hard palate and if you look closely on the membrane of the cheek inside the mouth you will probably see some small, white-tipped, red-dish spots. These are called "Kop-lik's" spots and are one of the signs of measles.

Child Should Be Kept in Bed.

in all cases great care should be taken that bronchial pneumonia does ot develop. Bronchial pneumonia is one of the most fatal of all the com-plications of measles. While all se-vere cases may not be grave, you should be constantly on the alert lest brouchial paeumonia develop. Measies is a serious disease and spares very few exposed persons

who have not had it.
The old idea, still prevalent among the uninformed, to the effect that children should be exposed to measies early in order that they may have the disease and get it over with is erroneous.

Chilling May

Cause Pneumonia. A child with measles should be put to bed and kept there as long as it has any fever or cough. The room hould be airy but it should be darkened because children with measle are very sensitive to light.

The ned clothes should be thin be-cause the child is apt to become too waim, kick off the comforters and suffer from a cold. A chilling of this kind may predispose to pneu-monia. Food should be light and should consist chiefly of nutritious broths, soft boiled eggs, and the like. Milk, unless certified and of known purity, should be pasteurized. A little iced lemonade will prove com-porting to the inflamed throat and is usually well borne, particularly in



per gallon, check the following items: Dash adjustment or choke rod improperly set .- Many choke valves are faultily set, so that when the control Anything that prevents the owner is in the forward or wide open position the choke valve will be at a slight angle, restricting the flow of air and increasing the quantity of fuel used. Be sure that when the choke is in the running position the valve is wide

> Leaky connections from fuel tank -Examine the lines to the vacuum ank and to the carburetor.

Fuel in float chamber .- Make cerain that the level of the fuel in the float chamber is not too high.

Timing of distributor .- One prevalent cause of high fuel consumption is ncorrectly timed distributors. In gen eral, if the distributor is so set that with the spark in full advance posiion, a slight-"ping" is noted upon udden acecleration with wide open brottle this cause is eliminated.

Carburetor or manifold loose. hese conditions are quite often responsible for defective carburetion. Also gaskets at these two points are some times affected by the grade of fuel used and cause air leaks.

Under-inflation of tires .- This has an appreciable effect on gasoline mile

Operating temperature of motor .-When cold weather approaches it is well to provide a radiator cover or some other means to insure operating at high enough temperature so that reasonable efficiency will be obtained.

Brakes .- The effect of dragging brakes on fuel economy is much great er than the average owner would believe. Be sure that the brakes are free and the results will show up in improved performance, as well as better economy

Speedometer reading.-Some cars claiming extremely high gasoline mile age will be found actually not to have as great economy as claimed, due to incorrect speedometers. Some speedometer drives are so proportioned that the indicated distance and speeds







A more ideal location for poultry than West Texas has yet to be discovered. Like every other industry, however, folks had to learn of its possibilities but it is increasing by leaps and bounds.

Two years ago the Sweetwater Hatchery was started to give poultrymen something they had needed—commercial hatching easily available to the territory served by Sweetwater.

Last spring, the second season this hatchery was operated, over 70,000 eggs were hatched, after the capacity was increased.

This year the hatchery will begin operation about January
1. The charge to the poultrymen is only \$3 per case of 96 eggs
which is much cheaper than they can be handled individually.

Baby chicks will also be available to those who prefer to get their young stock on the hoof rather than in the shell. The charge is from 15c to 20c per chick depending on quality of the breeding stock.

The Sweetwater Hatchery is operated by Merritt Mauzey. Well known local poultryman of long experience, G. A. Lackey, another experienced poultryman is interested in the hatchery and supervised construction and installation.
