BETTER HALF CAROL has said for years that Ye Editor spends 'way too much time watching, or listening to baseball games.

When I grew up on cotton farms in southern Parmer and northern Bailey counties it seemed that baseball was "America's sport." It was one thing everyone took part in.

For years, communities in this area had their "town" baseball teams, which competed against each other. Remember the Friona "Indians," and the Bovina "Bulls"?

We recall watching schoolyard games of softball at some of the rural schools we attended, such as Baileyboro, Lazbuddie and Oklahoma Lane. We've told several times about almost losing most of our teeth from not being behind the backstop when Sam Sudderth was batting during lunch break at O.L.

Later on, as an eighth grader at Muleshoe, we had a school softball team in junior high, and played same-age teams all around the area, against such metropolises as Three Way, Bledsoe, Circle Back, Pettit and Whitharral. Ye editor even served as pitcher for his eighth grade team at this time.

As a youngster in high school, our Muleshoe team used to play one from Progress out in a cow-pasture-turned-baseball field. We had some great games back then!

That was also the time that you could go to Clovis' Bell Park and see a West Texas-New Mexico League game involving the Clovis Pioneers against such teams as the Lubbock Hubbers, Amarillo Gold Sox, or the Albuquerque Dukes.

Realizing early in life that I'd never be a Bob Feller, I decided to try for a career doing the next-best thing: being a reporter on a big-city daily and covering the games played by my idols of that time.

The two years after graduating from Texas Tech, Ye Editor was able to achieve his dream, and the San Francisco Giants (as well as the 49ers) became his assignment. You might say that for two seasons, this country boy virtually overdid on major league sports.

Getting to meet and visit with my idol of the time, Stan Musial, was probably the highlight of my sportswriting career. That and watching the Willie Mays-led Giants and covering the 1961 All-Star Game at Candlestick Park for my newspaper.

Looking back on that time period, when we also saw the first AFL game ever played, between the Oakland Raiders and the Dallas Texans, we sometimes find ourselves wondering if it all was just a dream—especially when I decided to do exactly what I always said I'd never do—come back to a small town to live.

Ye Editor has continued to be a major sports fan through the years, but events of the past few years, culminating in this year's baseball strike, with millionaire players striking against millionaire team owners, has just about ruined the game for this long-time fan. Same thing for the pro football teams.

Early in the '94 baseball season, it looked as though Ken Griffey, Jr. might break Roger Maris' record of 61 homers in a year, and that the Texas Rangers might win a divisional title. Then came the strike.

In our youth, the major league teams had the same players year in and year out. You knew everyone's stats, and you could root for a team.

There is no team concept in today's sports. It just boils down to which owner can manage to cough up the most \$\$\$ for those million-dollar athletes. The players have absolutely no loyalty to the home team, especially if someone else in the league offers them more money.

We have heard more than one of the stars from the 1950s era state that they would have played baseball whether they'd have been paid or not. This years' players have proven beyond a doubt that they'd never play "just for the fun of it."

The team concept and fair play were the things being stressed when I grew up. There's sure not much of that in today's sports (especially on the pro level), and more's the pity.

Adrian Archer, a native of Borger and former Miss Amarillo Area, was crowned "Miss Texas" on July 9 at the scholastic pageant in Fort Worth.

This was her second appearance in the pageant. Last year she held the title "Miss Top of Texas," but failed to survive the final cut.

Twenty-eight years ago, her mother, Crista Evans, a Friona High School junior and daughter of Myrtice Evans, who still lives here, and the late W. H. Evans, was crowned "Maize Queen" (now "Miss Friona") during the annual Maize Days festivities.

Following her graduation here in 1968, Crista attended West Texas State University in pursuit of an elementary education degree, but was married to Richard Archer of Borger before she reached that goal.

Richard, whose parents are Mr. and Mrs. Howard Archer of Lefors, Texas, and Crista also have two sons, Matt, who is seventeen and a high school senior and Cody, 13, a seventh-grade student.

After the Archer children were in school, Crista commuted to West Texas State University and completed requirements for her bachelor's degree in education and is currently working on a master's in counseling.

She has been employed by the Borger Independent School District for the past several years.

Miss Texas is a native of Borger and 1991 graduate of Borger High School. During her high school days she participated in band and was a drum major.

She also participated in choir and received an all-state rating. Her interest in choral directing was influenced by band and voice teachers.

Eventually Adrian plans to return to her studies as a music major at Texas Tech University, Lubbock, where she hopes to get a bachelor's and master's degree before entering the teaching field.

On August 21, Miss Texas was honored with a VIP reception at the Radisson Inn in Amarillo, a Polk Street parade, a welcome home reception at Amarillo Civic Center and other festivities.

Since the Miss Texas pageant, Miss Archer has spent most of her time in Dallas preparing for the Miss America Pageant, which will

be held in Atlantic City, September 17.

Her parents and paternal grandparents plan to fly to Atlantic City for this event.

Miss Archer's participation in the Miss America Pageant will be a first for the Panhandle of Texas. This region has never had an entrant in this, the grandmother of them all event, before.

Congratulations Miss Texas! Many of your Friona relatives and friends will be cheering you on to victory as the pageant is being televised.

Ex-Deputy's Rites Held Saturday


Funeral services for a retired Parmer County Deputy Sheriff were conducted last Saturday in Olton.

65 Yrs. Ago--Sept. 27, 1929

The Santa Fe Grain Company has this week begun the removal of the old warehouse on its property on Main Street just north of the railroad site. This is one of the oldest buildings in Friona and was at one time, located near the center of the city from which place it was moved to the location above mentioned, and since the organization of Santa Fe Grain Company, the building has been used as a storage room for feeds, salt and other commodities handled by the company.

60 Yrs. Ago--Sept. 28, 1934
 Costly fumbles prevented the Chiefs from dedicating the new Chieftain Stadium with a win last Friday when they played the Adrian Highs to a scoreless tie.

The contract for carrying the mail over the newly established Star Route from Friona to Summerfield and return, which is advertised to begin on October 1, was let to Lloyd Pope, son of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Pope, he being the lowest bidder for the contract.

55 Yrs. Ago--Sept. 29, 1939

Another very disastrous farm fire occurred in the Friona territory about 2:30 a.m. Saturday morning, when the barn on the G. L. Mingus farm was destroyed as was the garage and the family car and a truck which were in it. A poultry

house with a large number of chickens and a grainery with about 2,000 bushels of wheat, also burned.

50 Yrs. Ago--Sept. 29, 1944

Mrs. G. H. Brock, who lives in the Parmerton community, was injured when a glass jar exploded as she removed it from her pressure cooker. A piece of glass cut a gash on her hand, and several stitches were required to close the wound. She escaped with only slight burns about her ankles.

Happy Homemaker

Our first recipe this week was submitted to "What's Cooking In Parmer County" by Jimmie Lou Wainscott, who was the Parmer County Home Demonstration Agent at the time it was published.

COLE SLAW

Jimmie Lou Wainscott, P.C.H.D.A.

To shred cabbage easily, trim off outer leaves; then cut into half crosswise (save core end for cooked cabbage). Cut each half into two pieces. Place quarters on board with rounded side down. With sharp knife, shred finely—never lifting knife from board. Cabbage may be shredded on coarse grater.

DRESSING

1 cup mayonnaise or cooked salad dressing
1-1/2 teaspoon salt
Dash of pepper
Dash of paprika
1 teaspoon sugar
2 tablespoons vinegar
2 tablespoons milk

Blend all ingredients together until smooth. Chill.

Variations:

COLORFUL VEGETABLE SLAW: toss 4 cups shredded green cabbage or Chinese cabbage, 1/2 cup grated raw carrot, 1 tablespoon minced onion and 1/4 cup radish with 1/2 cup dressing.

WALDORF SALAD: toss 4 cups shredded green cabbage, 1/2

cup diced unpared red apple, 1/4 cup broken nut meats and 1/2 cup seedless raisins, which have been plumped in hot water then chilled or grapes with 1/2 cup above dressing.



Chiefs Topple Rams In 34-12 Victory

In last Friday's Homecoming game, Friona downed the Portales Rams 34-12, evening the Chiefs' record at 1-1.

Friona started the scoring on the first drive of the ballgame, capped off with an 18-yard-run by Jay Belcher. On the next drive, Juan Gamboa finished it off with a one-yard push into the end zone.

Both touchdowns were followed by good P.A.T.'s by Kit Preston. Then, Portales' Chris Summers managed a 61 yard touchdown run before the half, making the score 14-6.

The entire third quarter took place on Portales' end of the field. Two times, Kit Preston kicked off into the end zone, which set up the Rams' offense at their own 20 yard line. Their bad field position meant Portales had to drive the ball 80 yards for a touchdown. It proved to be too much for them.

Twice in the third quarter the Chiefs scored on blocked punts. The first one was blocked and run back by Rusty Simmons.

"It was my first time on punt block return," said Simmons, "so I didn't know what to expect. I didn't really even have to jump to block the punt because the guard chose to block Chris Hanna instead of me."

The second kick was blocked by Tony Mejia and returned by Cory Hamilton. "When I saw the ball, I just grabbed it and ran! I thought, 'just pick it up and score!'" said Hamilton. At the end of the third quarter, Friona had a commanding, 27-6 lead.

The Chiefs scored again at the beginning of the fourth quarter when Gamboa ran 60 yards for the T. D. Another P.A.T. by Kit Preston drove the score up to 34 points.

The Chiefs almost made it to 40 points, driving to the Portales 13-yard line midway through the quarter, but an offside penalty killed this drive.

Portales made a final attempt to come back when Jimmy Bargas eluded the Chieftain Defense for an 80-yard touchdown run.

The Chieftain running game was again spectacular as Juan Gamboa had 136 yards on 11 carries, and Chris Hanna had 120 yards on 17 carries.

Gamboa was named the Amarillo Globe-News AAA Player of the Week, while Hanna was named Honorable Mention.

On the down side, Colby Carthel suffered a "class 1" shoulder separation. "They ran a sweep and I took on the lead blocker. He didn't hit real hard, so he must have hit me just right," said Carthel.

It is uncertain whether or not he will be able to play this week, but the coaches will probably hold Carthel out to get him healed for district play.

The coaches were pleased with the win against Portales, but want the players to fight complacency.

There were two times in the game when the Rams were able to score off big runs because the Chiefs sat back and let their guard down.

Chris Hanna said, "We're breakin' down on open field tackles. We're not doing our job and we're missing tackles out there."

Overall, the effort was great. If the Chiefs can keep their intensity steady, coaches believe they have what it takes to be a championship team.

Friona received .54 inch of rainfall Wednesday evening, the most moisture recorded as yet during the month of September.

It seemed that Friona was on the edge of the moisture system, which left more rainfall to the south and east.

Friona has received .66 inches for September, and a total of 16.65 inches for the calendar year.



 - Plant Workers:** An individual (whether or not employed by Ciba-Geigy Corporation) who in the course of his or her employment at Ciba-Geigy Corporation's St. Gabriel, Louisiana or McIntosh, Alabama sites, was exposed to Galecron®, including, without limitation, individuals who worked in manufacturing, formulating or packaging Galecron® or in the waste disposal of Galecron®, or worked in the construction, demolition or maintenance of any facilities used for the foregoing activities at such St. Gabriel, Louisiana or McIntosh, Alabama sites; or
 - Formulators:** An individual (whether or not employed by Ciba-Geigy Corporation) who in the course of his or her employment was exposed to Galecron® while at a plant or site which was involved in mixing, blending, packaging, handling or otherwise formulating pesticides which contained, in whole or in part, Galecron®; or
 - Applicators:** An individual (whether or not employed by Ciba-Geigy Corporation) who in the course of his or her employment, was exposed to Galecron® while involved in the application of pesticides which contained, in whole or in part, Galecron®, including, without limitation, aerial and land applicators, flagmen, mixers, blenders, loaders and other individuals who handled such pesticide prior to or during the application process; and
 - Other Covered Workers:** An individual (whether or not employed by Ciba-Geigy Corporation) who in the course of his or her employment was exposed to Galecron® at the Clean Land, Air, Water Corporation or Environmental Purification Advancement, Inc. disposal sites located near Bayou Sorrel, Louisiana; at Empak, Inc. in Deer Park, Texas; or in a testing or research laboratory, whether or not owned by Ciba-Geigy Corporation; or
- The spouses, parents, children or other relatives of the Exposed Persons described above.

(Collectively "Settlement Class Members"). Note: If you are an Exposed Person, you are a Settlement Class Member whether or not you have been diagnosed with an illness. Spouses, parents, children or other relatives are Settlement Class Members but the claims they are settling are limited to those arising from an Exposed Person's exposure.

Relevant Dates

Galecron® was registered for use from 1968-1989. Some Exposed Persons may have been exposed before or after those dates.

II. IMPORTANT MEDICAL NOTICE To Plant Workers, Formulators, Applicators and Other Covered Workers (as defined above):

You may have an increased risk of developing bladder cancer if you had on-the-job exposure to Galecron®. Workers exposed to Galecron® should participate in a medical monitoring program because early detection of bladder cancer can result in more effective treatment. As part of the Settlement, Ciba-Geigy has agreed to establish a medical monitoring program for the detection of bladder cancer for those individuals who do not exclude themselves from the lawsuit. Within six months, this program should be available free of charge to all Exposed Persons who do not exclude themselves from the lawsuit.

If you had on-the-job exposure to Galecron®, it is recommended that you or your doctor call 1-800-565-3126 to learn how you can obtain further medical information or enroll in the medical monitoring program.

III. BRIEF SUMMARY OF LITIGATION

On February 8, 1994, a class action lawsuit was filed against defendant, Ciba-Geigy Corporation ("Ciba-Geigy"), in Alabama State Court, which lawsuit was later removed to the United States District Court for the Southern District of Alabama. The Complaint, as amended, alleges that the Settlement Class as defined above is entitled to damages for medical monitoring and other compensation as a result of Exposed Persons' exposure to Galecron®.

Ciba-Geigy has filed an Answer denying all essential allegations of the Complaint, and asserting affirmative legal defenses. The Court has decided that the case can proceed as a class action for purposes of settlement only. This does not mean that the Class Representatives would have been successful had the case gone to trial. The Court has made no such determination, and the proposed Settlement is not to be construed as an expression of any opinion by the Court as to the merits of any of the claims asserted against Ciba-Geigy.

IV. PROPOSED SETTLEMENT

A Settlement has been entered into between the Class Representatives, Class Counsel and Ciba-Geigy, which will resolve all past, present and future claims against Ciba-Geigy arising out of Exposed Persons' exposure to Galecron®. The Settlement provides for the establishment by Ciba-Geigy of two funds to provide medical benefits and compensation to Exposed Persons or their legal representatives.

(1) **The Medical Monitoring and Treatment Fund ("The MMT Fund").** If the Settlement is approved, Ciba-Geigy will make an initial deposit of \$5,000,000 into the MMT Fund, and will thereafter make additional deposits on an as-needed basis. There is no limit to the amount of money Ciba-Geigy can be required to contribute over the life of this Fund.

The MMT Fund will pay for a medical monitoring program designed to detect at an early stage the form of bladder cancer alleged to be associated with Galecron®; specifically, primary urothelial carcinoma of the urinary collecting system, i.e., renal pelvis, ureter, bladder and urethra. The MMT Fund also will pay for all medically necessary treatment not paid for by Medicare or Medicaid if the Exposed Person has been or in the future is diagnosed with such bladder cancer.

The MMT Fund will pay for medical monitoring to Exposed Persons for a period of 20 years, and will pay for medical treatment until one full year passes with no claims for treatment being filed but in no event less than 20 years. Ciba-Geigy will have no obligation to continue the medical monitoring and treatment program if the Settlement is not approved. Only Exposed Persons, i.e., eligible Plant Workers, Formulators, Applicators and Other Covered Workers, as defined in this Notice, will be entitled to medical monitoring and treatment.

(2) **The Disease Compensation and Administration Fund ("The DCA Fund").** If the Settlement is approved, Ciba-Geigy will also make an initial deposit of \$30,000,000 into the DCA Fund. In addition to medical treatment paid for by the MMT Fund, the DCA Fund will make cash payments of up to \$410,000, as set forth in more detail below, on behalf of an Exposed Person who, after exposure to Galecron®, has developed or in the future develops the form of bladder cancer alleged to be associated with Galecron®; specifically, primary urothelial carcinoma of the urinary collecting system, i.e., renal pelvis, ureter, bladder and urethra. Cash payments will vary depending upon the Exposed Person's age, smoking status and participation in the health screening program. For Exposed Persons who are non-smokers and participants in the health screening program, the cash payments will be as follows: (a) \$10,000 in the event of treatment involving an invasive procedure (this is a one-time payment regardless of the number of procedures); (b) up to \$150,000 in the event of a radical cystectomy (bladder removal) with diversion of the urinary tract, which amount will decrease with a person's age to a minimum of \$10,000 if the Exposed Person is 85 years or older; and (c) up to \$250,000 in the event an Exposed Person's death is found to be caused by bladder cancer, which amount will decrease with age to a minimum of \$17,500 if the Exposed Person is 85 years or older. An Exposed Person may collect separately for (a), (b) and (c) above, so that the maximum payment to an Exposed Person is \$410,000. The cash payments described above will be reduced by 12.5% if the Exposed Person had smoked in the five years prior to diagnosis. A separate 12.5% reduction will be made if he or she had failed to participate in the health screening program in each of the three years prior to diagnosis (or in each year that the program was available, if less than three years). The DCA Fund also will pay \$1,000 to any Exposed Person who was diagnosed with hemorrhagic cystitis within three months following exposure (this is a one-time payment regardless of the number of manifestations). In addition, the DCA Fund will pay for administrative costs, and class counsel's attorneys' fees, costs and expenses as determined by the Court. All cash payments from the DCA Fund are paid only on account of a compensable claim of an Exposed Person, i.e., an eligible Plant Worker, Formulator, Applicator or Other Covered Worker, as defined in this Notice. Cash payments to a spouse, parent, child or other relative will only be made if they are the legal representative of an Exposed Person.

The benefits of the DCA Fund will continue as long as the MMT Fund continues, or until the DCA Fund is exhausted as set forth below. Ciba-Geigy has agreed to pay up to a maximum of \$45,000,000 for the benefits afforded by that Fund. If the DCA Fund is exhausted, Ciba-Geigy may continue paying for compensable claims. If Ciba-Geigy does not continue to pay, Settlement Class Members will be able to opt-out of the DCA Fund and will regain their right to pursue any legal claims they may have, except for claims for medical monitoring, medical treatment, fear of illness or cancer, or increased risk of illness or cancer, because medical monitoring and treatment will continue to be available.

(3) **Other Conditions.** The Stipulation of Settlement presently provides for medical monitoring, treatment and compensation payments for certain medical conditions set forth in this Notice. In the event, however, that a Court approved Epidemiology Panel determines to a reasonable medical certainty that any other medical condition is caused by Galecron® exposure, that condition will be deemed a compensable claim, and will be eligible for medical monitoring (if feasible); medical treatment; and cash payments. The cash payments will not exceed the maximum amounts payable for the covered medical conditions set forth above.

(4) **Administrator.** A nationally recognized entity or entities with substantial investment and medical claims administration experience will be appointed by the Court to administer the Settlement. The Administrator will determine whether a Settlement Class Member is eligible for benefits under the settlement. Any disputes concerning a Settlement Class Member's entitlement to benefits will be resolved by a Medical Advisory Panel or by a single arbitrator, depending upon the issue in dispute. The decision of the Medical Advisory Panel or arbitrator each have the effect of an arbitration decision and shall be binding upon all parties, including the Settlement Class Member.

(5) **Release.** Settlement Class Members who do not exclude themselves from the Class release all past, present and future claims: (i) relating to the covered medical conditions listed above; and (ii) relating to an Exposed Person's exposure to Galecron®, including all claims alleging that any other cancers, personal injuries or risks are caused by exposure to Galecron®. This means that claims that Galecron® exposure caused any condition other than those medical conditions listed above will be released, but will receive no compensation or treatment, unless the Court approved Epidemiology Panel finds that such other condition is caused by Galecron® exposure. The release is effective as caused by Ciba-Geigy and certain additional releases as defined in the Stipulation of Settlement, including Ciba-Geigy, Ltd., the parent of Ciba-Geigy.

If you believe you are a member of the Settlement Class, and have any questions regarding any of the benefits set forth above, you are urged to call 1-800-565-3126 for further information.

V. CLASS REPRESENTATIVES AND CLASS COUNSEL

The Court has designated the following Settlement Class Members, Russell W. Price, Leslie E. Hoven, Grady W. Brown, Jennie Ropp Brown, Jack Harley Woodward, Alta Woodward, Joe H. Bowman and Martha Annie Bowman, as class representatives to represent all Settlement Class Members. The Court has also designated as Class Counsel the following individuals: Timothy E. Eble; J. Cecil Gardner; Joseph J. McKernan; S.C. Middlebrooks III; Charles W. Patrick, Jr.; and Patrick W. Pendley.

The Class Representatives and Class Counsel believe that the proposed Settlement is fair, reasonable and adequate. Class Representatives and Class Counsel have entered into the proposed Settlement after weighing the substantial benefits against the probabilities of success or failure, and the long delays that would be likely if the case proceeded to trial.

There has been no agreement between the parties regarding attorneys' fees. At the fairness hearing, Class Counsel will request the Court to award attorneys' fees and reimbursement of costs and expenses, to be paid from the DCA Fund. Class counsel will request a percentage fee award not to exceed 20% of the benefit conferred on the class, half of which will be requested to be paid over a 4-year period while legal work continues.

VI. RIGHTS AND OPTIONS OF SETTLEMENT CLASS MEMBERS

If you are a Settlement Class Member, you have the following options:

(1) **You may do nothing and remain a Settlement Class Member.** If you choose to take no action, your interests as a member of the Settlement Class will be represented by the Class Representatives and Class Counsel, at no cost to you individually. You will be bound by any judgment or final disposition of the litigation, and may participate in the benefits available as a member of the Settlement Class. It is important, however, to fill out the REQUEST FOR INFORMATION FORM in order to learn how to receive benefits.

(2) **You may remain a Settlement Class Member and either represent yourself or hire your own attorney to represent you at your own cost.** You or your attorney must file an Entry of Appearance with the Clerk of the Court and send a copy to Class Counsel and Ciba-Geigy, at the addresses set forth below. Such Entry of Appearance must be filed by December 16, 1994.

(3) **You may remain a Settlement Class Member and object to the Settlement.** Any Settlement Class Member who does not elect exclusion from the Settlement Class and who objects to the proposed Settlement must mail such objections and any supporting papers to the Clerk of Court, at the address set forth below, on or before December 16, 1994. If the person filing the objection intends to appear personally at the January 30, 1995 Fairness Hearing described above, he or she must file with the Clerk, on or before December 16, 1994, a Notice of Intent to Appear. Any Settlement Class Member who does not file objections in the time and manner described above is forever foreclosed from raising any objection to such matters. Any Settlement Class Member whose objection is overruled will still be bound by any judgment or final disposition of the litigation. Copies of all objections and Notices of Intent to Appear that are mailed to the Clerk of Court must also be mailed to Class Counsel and to counsel for Ciba-Geigy at the following addresses:

(4) **If you choose to remain a Settlement Class Member (under Options 1, 2 or 3 above), you may receive the benefits afforded by this Settlement within six months of the Court's Order directing this Notice.** Ciba-Geigy has agreed to make all benefits afforded by this Settlement available to Settlement Class Members on an interim basis prior to final Court approval of the Settlement. The appropriate Proof of Claim forms will be required (see Section VII below), and an appropriate release will be required for any cash payments made. During this interim claims procedure, class counsel's fees and expenses will be paid upon approval of the Court and ultimately deducted from the DCA Fund initial deposit.

(5) **You may request exclusion from the Settlement Class.** If you elect to be excluded from the Settlement Class, you will not be bound by any judgment, disposition, or settlement of the class action, but you also will not be able to participate in the Settlement. You will retain and be free to pursue any claims you may have. If you wish to exclude yourself from the Settlement Class, you must mail a request for exclusion to the following:

Your exclusion request must set forth your full name and current address. Your written request for exclusion must be post-marked no later than December 16, 1994.

VII. PROOF OF CLAIM PROCEDURE

In order for an Exposed Person to receive medical monitoring, he or she will be required to submit proof of certain employment-related exposure to Galecron®. In order to receive medical treatment or the disease compensation outlined above, a Settlement Class Member will also be required to have been diagnosed, subsequent to exposure, with one of the covered medical conditions listed above. A Proof of Claim to participate in medical monitoring may be submitted at any time during the duration of the program. A Proof of Claim for a covered medical condition must be submitted within one year of diagnosis (or, if the condition has already been diagnosed, within one year after approval of the Settlement).

The Proof of Claim is designed so that you may complete it yourself. Class Counsel is available to answer questions you may have about claims procedures, without charge to you. If you desire legal assistance, you are free to retain an attorney of your choice.

To obtain a Proof of Claim Form for medical monitoring, medical treatment or disease compensation, please call 1-800-565-3126 or fill out the REQUEST FOR INFORMATION FORM below and mail it to Class Counsel at P.O. Box 974, Charleston, SC 29402. No benefits will be available to any member of the Settlement Class unless he or she submits the necessary Proof of Claim Form.

He said, "When I realized what was happening, I was shocked and said, 'Thank you, Lord!'"


Bands Are Invited To Competition

Understand Municipal Bonds Before You Invest

As individual tax rates go up, investors become more interested in tax-exempt municipal bonds. Tax-free income may be attractive, but it is of little importance if a bond's issuer defaults because of poor credit. The quality and safety of the issuer should be evaluated closely before an investment is made.

Currently, more than 1 million separate municipal bond issues are outstanding. Compare this to about 10,000 publicly traded stocks on all major exchanges, and even fewer corporate bond issues. Each municipal bond issue has its own credit responsibility, indenture, restrictions and guarantors. The municipal bond market is open to individual investors but dominated by institutions.

Because of the complexity of the municipal bond market, many individuals choose mutual funds and unit investment trusts (UITs) for tax-free income. For those who do invest in individual municipal bonds, there are several precautions to consider.

First, carefully select a broker. Make sure that the firm he or she represents is large enough to be committed to municipal bond business. Firms with strong commitments to the municipal market generally have staffs of people to research credit quality and continuously monitor the issues they sell or recommend. Today, many municipalities are issued in "book entry" form so that the broker buying the bond and holding the entry on your behalf is responsible for timely collection and payment of interest to you. The broker also collects the principal when the bond matures or is called for early redemption.

Because municipals are not traded on any exchange, there can be wide differences in price among dealers. It is not uncommon for lower-quality bonds to be offered at the same price as investment-grade bonds. A broker with whom you have established a relationship should work in your best interest. He or she should take the time to shop the markets and find the highest quality for the lowest price. The savings to you can be

considerable.

In addition, interest rates play a major role in the market value of municipal bonds. But concentrating only on interest rate movements rather than on the quality of your bonds can be a mistake. Recognizing improvement or deterioration in credit quality is an important part of selecting municipals. Avoid bonds issued by entities that are susceptible to recessionary impact or bonds issued by government bodies with imprudent fiscal habits.

Municipal bonds can be an important addition to your financial plan. However, if you don't have the time or expertise to adequately study the municipal markets, a quality tax-exempt mutual fund or unit investment trust may be your best option for tax-free income.

Conjunctivitis

Conjunctivitis, old-fashioned "pink eye," has two basic causes: ordinary irritation or bacterial infection. Your optometrist can help you clear up either kind.

Ordinary, non-contagious conjunctivitis is usually traced to a chemical or allergic reaction. Swimmers' eyes may be irritated by the chlorine in a pool. Allergies to pollens, smoke or dust may make the eyes swell, water, sting, itch and look red. Rest and eye drops are usually enough to take care of this problem.

But bacterial conjunctivitis is more serious and, without professional care, may linger for a long time. The first symptoms may be awakening with one or both eyelids stuck together; there may be discharge and extra-sensitivity to light. Cure usually requires prescription-strength eye drops. In addition, bacterial conjunctivitis is highly contagious; it can be spread through shared face towels and eye makeup.
