She was feeling quite dizzy, but with all the strength she could muster, Yvette finally pulled into the emergency room driveway at the hospital. She slumped weakly over the wheel, and the horn started blaring. An attendant came out to see what was the matter.

"I've been shot," she told him. He opened the door to check on her condition and she told him she'd been shot in the back of the head by a drive-by shooter or a gang person. He began checking out her head and then he started to laugh.

"Lady, you've been shot by a biscuit," he said.

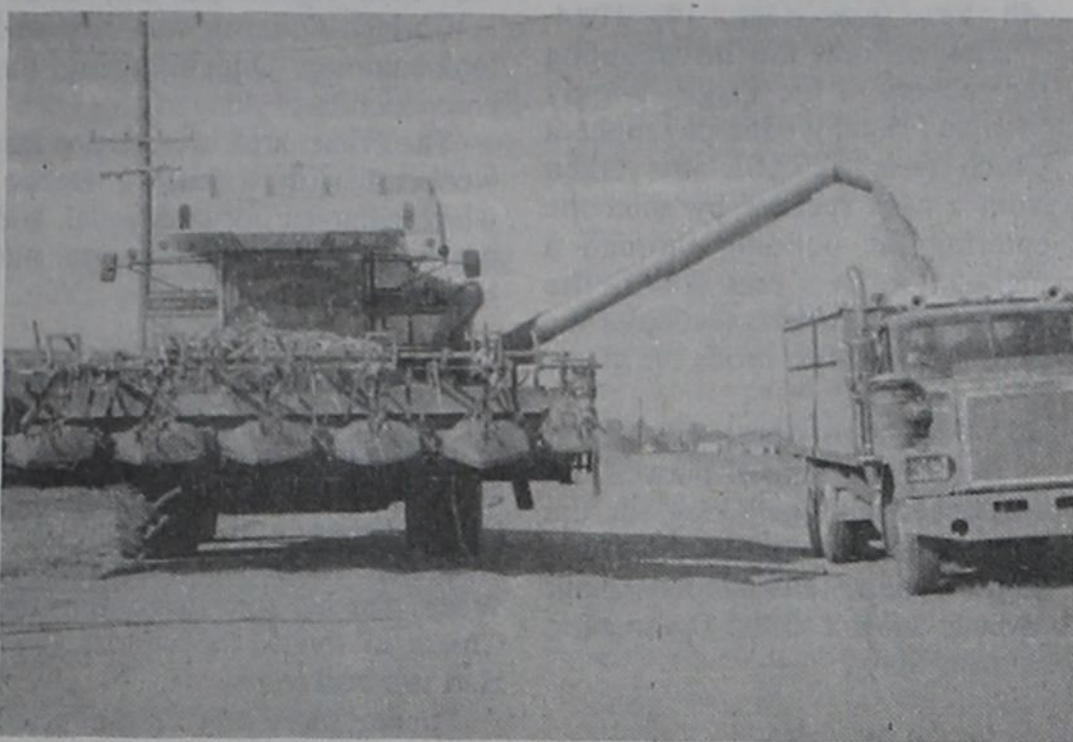

"They'll charge you a lot here at the hospital to clean that out of your hair," the attendant laughed. "I think you'd be a lot better off going to a beauty shop."

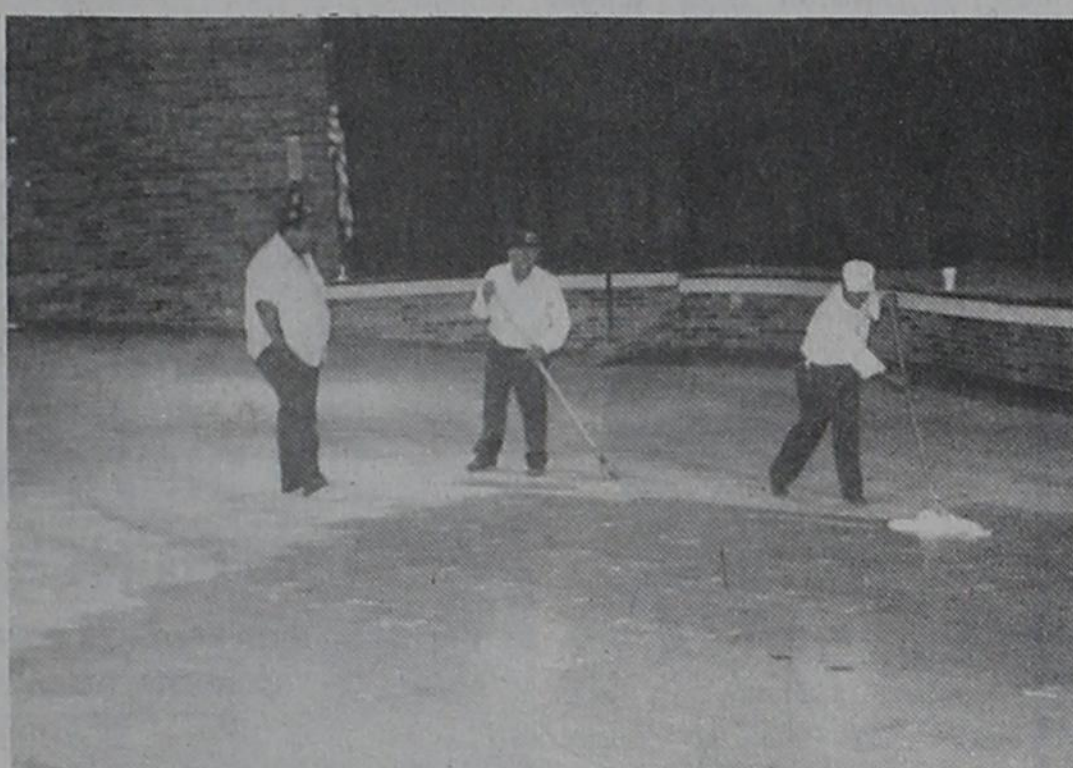
Here's another one:

Vaccination Schedule Is Announced

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for October.

Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps and HIB (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B).

The Texas Department of Health is charging money to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

The vaccinations will be available at the Bovina Clinic on Monday, October 10 from 10 a.m.-3 p.m.

They will be available at Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona or at the WIC Office, 703 Main Street on Friday, October 21.

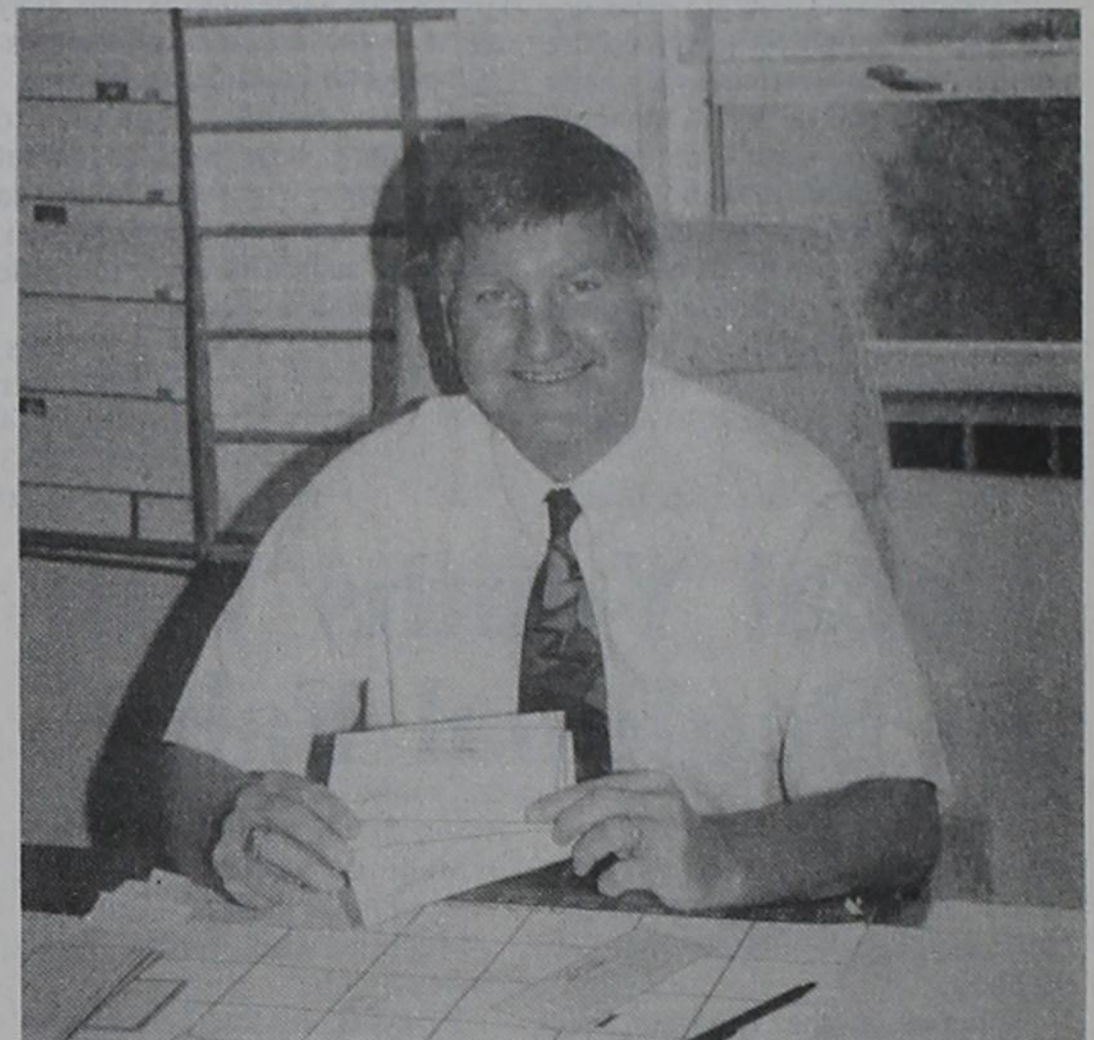


Exes Asked To Attend Meeting

Hot-Air Balloons Had Friona Looking Up

Several Parmer County people were out driving around the country roads on Sunday morning while staring up in the sky at several hot-air balloons soaring overhead.

In the Rhea community, Mitch Terry reported seeing six balloons and they were low enough that he was able to have a conversation with one or two of the balloon crew members by shouting up to them. They had left the Albuquerque International Balloon Fiesta around midnight on Saturday and were in the air over Friona by ten o'clock on Sunday morning.

They were heading for Dimmitt which was the finish line for the balloon race competition. While in Dimmitt, the crew members had lunch and were interviewed by Don Nelson of the *Castro County News*.

It seems that there were 14 gas balloons from six countries in the competition and 680 hot-air balloons at the Albuquerque Fiesta.

Two of the balloon crews, pilots, referee and chase vehicle drivers were among those interviewed by Nelson in Dimmitt.

The first crew, pilots, referee and chase group, were Americans from Minnesota, Wisconsin, Colorado, Vermont and California. The second group consisted of all Germans except for the referee of

Albuquerque. Following are excerpts from Nelson's interview with the balloonists:

The German ballooners included the two young pilots, Thomas Fink of Nuremberg and Rainer Hassold of Augsburg; Rainer's father, Horst Hassold of Augsburg; Fink's wife, Angelika; and Rainer's girlfriend, Renate Scherbel.

They're serious about their ballooning. The Hassolds run a family-owned balloon factory in Augsburg. Fink and Rainer Hassold are the current German gas-balloon champions and placed second in the last world championships in Austria. Fink placed fourth in hot-air balloon competition at the Albuquerque festival last year. And the elder Hassold is the honorary president of the World Balloon Committee, headquartered in Paris.

"With a hot-air balloon, you go up by turning up your propane burners and you come down by turning them down," the elder Hassold explained. "In a gas balloon, you go up by throwing out sand and you come down by letting helium out of the balloon through an 'appendix'."

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor, *FRIONA STAR*:
Ann Richards has been appearing with her grandchildren in recent campaign ads, and it is a comforting, touching portrait. How fortunate for all of them that her grandchildren, unlike the children of Sierra Blanca, don't have to grow up in the shadow of adjacent sewer sludge from New York and nuclear waste from Texas and our first compact partners, Maine and Vermont.

The sludge, which zipped through the state licensing process in a record 23 days after its hauler made a \$1.5 million sludge research grant to Texas Tech, contains pathogens and heavy metals.

The Surgeon General's battle cry of Zero Tolerance for lead (because of its disastrous effects on young children) is echoed by all branches of the EPA save one -- the Sludge Risk Assessment division. They have a number for safe lead levels.

The nuclear waste en route will contain, along with the medical gloves and booties touted by Governor Richards' minions, plutonium and cesium-137, among other horrors.

The idea is to take a thousand-

year toxic, pack it in a hundred-year container, and bury it in a forty-foot trench near an isolated, poor, minority-heavy community in an area of recent seismic activity. Now, the big Texas utilities want the cheaper dumping rates which will result from the increased volume and waste importation, perhaps massive waste importation, will provide.

So Ann tells us that, in order to avoid having to accept nuclear waste from other states, we first must accept nuclear waste from other states. Well, this is Texas, so you expect to hear politicians saying wild things like that, and people even vote them into office afterwards, amazing as that may seem to the denizens of the less-colorful world outside our borders.

It is tough, though, to understand how such a sweet grandmother, who seems to care so much for her own grandchildren, could do such a thing to the little children of Sierra Blanca.



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Happy Homemaker

Before beginning cucumber pickle recipes from Carrie's Cooking this week, we're going to present a highly recommended pickle recipe submitted by Vuthill Loafman, who reported, "This is Jo Blackburn's recipe that I have been using for many years and it is one of the easiest and best I've ever tried."

JO'S CUCUMBER PICKLES
2 quarts vinegar
2 quarts water
1 cup canning salt

Combine these ingredients and bring to a boil. Add 1 tablespoon white mustard seed, 3 red hot dry peppers, 1/2 teaspoon alum, 3-4 bay leaves and one bunch of dill.

Pack cucumbers in jars and pour hot liquid over them before sealing. Leave six weeks before eating.

LYDA'S SWEET CRISP PICKLES
(Over 100 years old)

Wash medium to small cucumbers and put into a crock or quart jars. For each quart add: 1 tablespoon salt (not iodized) and 1 teaspoon alum

Fill container or containers

with cold vinegar and let stand at least six weeks before making sweet pickles.

For sour pickles, leave them as they are and use as needed. This is a good idea if you're using a crock. Put cucumbers in as picked and add the vinegar solution to cover. These do not have to be sealed.

For sweet pickles, slice and add syrup made as follows, combining:
1 cup water
1-1/4 cups sugar
1-1/2 teaspoon pickling spice

Combine ingredients and boil before pouring over cucumbers. Let stand at least 12 hours before using.

DEMOCRATS SWEET CRISP PICKLES
(This is very good)

Slice seven pounds of medium sized cucumbers 1/4 inch thick. Cover with a solution of 2 cups of slaked lime in two gallons of water.

Soak 24 hours. (Slaked lime is available from your lumber dealer.)

Next day, rinse cucumbers well and cover with fresh water. Soak three hours longer. Drain and cover with mixture made as follows:

2 quarts vinegar
4-1/2 pounds (9 cups) sugar
1 teaspoon celery seed
1 teaspoon whole cloves
1 teaspoon mixed pickling spices
1 tablespoon salt

Soak cucumbers overnight then boil four minutes. Pack in sterilized jars and seal. This recipe can be used for green tomato pickles and for watermelon pickles. A variation calls for 1 tablespoon each of celery salt and pickling spices and no whole cloves.

FOURTEEN DAY SWEET PICKLES
(This is a very old recipe but has proven to be great.)

Into a clean stone jar, place 2 gallons of medium size cucumbers, which have been washed and sliced lengthwise. If not sliced, they will shrivel. Dissolve two cups salt in one gallon boiling water. Pour, while hot, over cucumbers; cover and weight down. Let stand in brine one week. On eighth day, drain and pour 1 gallon of boiling water over cucumbers. Let stand 24 hours. On ninth day, drain and cover with one gallon of boiling water to which one tablespoon powdered alum has been added. Let stand another 24 hours. On tenth day, drain again and put 1 gallon boiling water over cucumbers. Let stand 24 hours. On eleventh day, you are ready for the mixture made by combining:
4 pints boiling vinegar
6 cups sugar
1/2 ounce celery seed
1 ounce stick cinnamon

Heat to boiling point and pour over pickles. On twelfth day, drain, heat and add 1 cup sugar. Once again, pour over pickles. On 13th day, add another cup of sugar and repeat process. On 14th day, drain, heat, add sugar and put cucumbers

in jars. Cover with hot mixture and seal. Each quart, add 1 head fresh dill, 1 small red or green hot pepper and 2 to 3 cloves fresh garlic.

Bring two quarts water, one quart vinegar and 1 cup non-iodized salt to a boil. Pour over cucumbers while hot and seal.

PICKLED RINGS

Wash and peel 8 to 10 large cucumbers. Core center and cut like apple rings. Soak overnight in: 2 cups lime
2 gallons water

Drain next morning and let stand 3 hours in clear water. Drain and cover with:
1 cup vinegar
1 bottle red food coloring
1 teaspoon alum

Enough water to cover
Boil 1 hour. Let stand overnight. Drain. Make syrup of:
2 cups vinegar
10 cups sugar
2 cups water
2 teaspoons salt
12-14 red hots
8 cinnamon sticks

Heat syrup and pour over cucumbers. Let stand overnight. The next three mornings, drain syrup, heat and pour over cucumbers again. The fourth morning, heat syrup and pour over cucumbers, which have been placed in jars, and seal. When you stir, be sure to do it carefully so you will not break the rings--especially while they are in the lime solution.

Jr. Team Falls 26-6

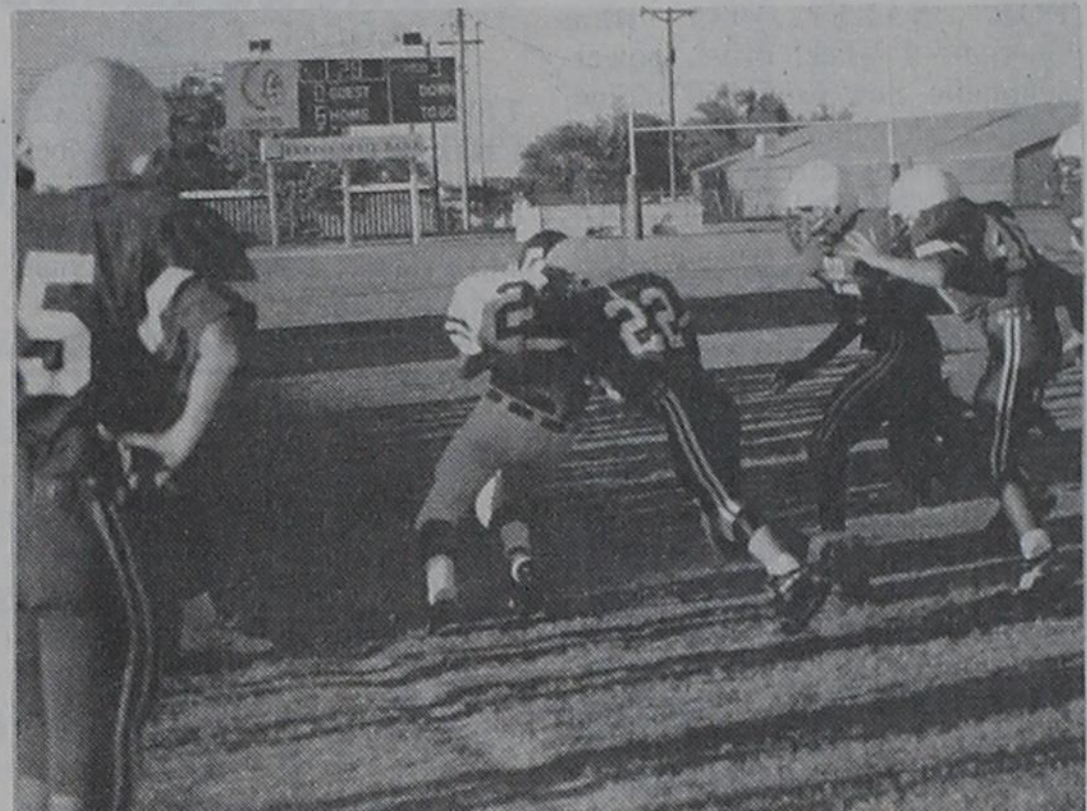
A combined seventh and eighth grade team lost to Littlefield, 26-6, but gained valuable experience with much needed playing time.

ASCS Office Releases Most Recent Guidelines

Curt Miller of the Parmer County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service has recently released the following deadlines and guidelines for area farmers:

Eligible livestock producers who are grazing CRP acreage must remember that all cattle must be removed from CRP acreage by September 30. In order to avoid delaying annual payments, actual acres grazed and number of livestock grazed need to be reported to the ASCS office as soon as possible after grazing is completed and no later than the close of business on October 14.

Eligible livestock producers who are having CRP acreage must remember that harvesting of hay must be complete by September 30. In order to avoid delaying annual payments, actual acres hayed and yield in tons need to be reported no later than the close of business on October 14.

All bales or stacks of hay must be removed from the CRP acreage by December 31.

All operating gins in Parmer County have furnished bagging and bale tie agreements and are eligible for the cotton to be placed in the loan at the ASCS office.

It is the responsibility of the producer to be sure that weeds on

ACR and CU for Pay acres are controlled in a timely manner. Failure to do so through December 31 may result in loss of program benefits.

CRP participants must maintain the vegetative cover and all required conservation practices on CRP land and take other action as necessary to control weeds to maintain the production capability of the soil and prevent creating a problem or becoming a nuisance to other farms. It is the CRP participants' responsibility to inspect this land and use good judgment in the maintenance of CRP acres. Failure to maintain your CRP acreage will result in penalties.

When a crop (program, non-program, vegetable, etc.) fails due to a natural disaster, the producer must file an ASCS-574 (Application for Disaster Credit) within 15 days after the date the abnormal condition occurred or was obvious, and before physical evidence of the crop is destroyed.

Secretary of Agriculture, Mike Espy, has announced a zero net acreage reduction program (ARP) for the 1995 wheat crop, the same as in 1994. A paid land diversion will not be implemented and target will be \$4.00/bushel as in 1994. Other provisions of the 1995 program will be announced as they become available.

The variable interest rate for loans disbursed in September 1994 is 5.50%.

Foreign investors who have acquired agriculture land must report the transaction to the ASCS Office in the respective county within 90 days from the date of acquisition. Failure to do so could result in

penalties assessed on the purchased land.

The ASCS Office will be closed on October 10 in observance of Columbus Day.

easily distinguishable: A hot-air balloon usually is shaped like a spinning-top and is always open at the bottom, while a gas balloon is closed and usually looks like a large, perfectly round ball.

In both types the pilots ride in a basket suspended from the bottom of the balloon.

"The range of a hot-air balloon is about 20 miles -- that's about as far as they can go before their propane runs out," the elder Hassold said. "Gas balloons can go much farther. All the long-range balloon flights you read about are made with gas balloons."

The ballooners use three different methods to maintain contact -- two-way radio, visual contact (eye-sight by day and strobe lights by night), and the Global Positioning System (GPS), a precise method that utilizes communication satellites.

The Germans lifted off in Albuquerque at 1 a.m. Saturday, in our time, and touched down near Dimmitt at 10:49 a.m., they said.

The American team lifted off and touched down about an hour ahead of the Germans.

"This was my most difficult gas balloon flight ever, I think," Fink said. "There was a new moon, so not much light. We had to tell the chase vehicle to flash its lights so we could tell it from any other vehicles."

The Germans didn't realize that

they had touched down within 40 or 50 air miles of the world's only source of helium, at Amarillo.

"So we brought the helium back!" Horst Hassold exclaimed.

"Our balloon holds 1,050 cubic meters of helium," he explained. "In Germany, helium is expensive. We pay for our helium by taking people for rides. Our balloon can carry five passengers plus a pilot."

"I guess it's not so expensive here. Our helium was included in the entry fee."

"Everyone here has been very helpful," he added. "Thank you for the hospitality."

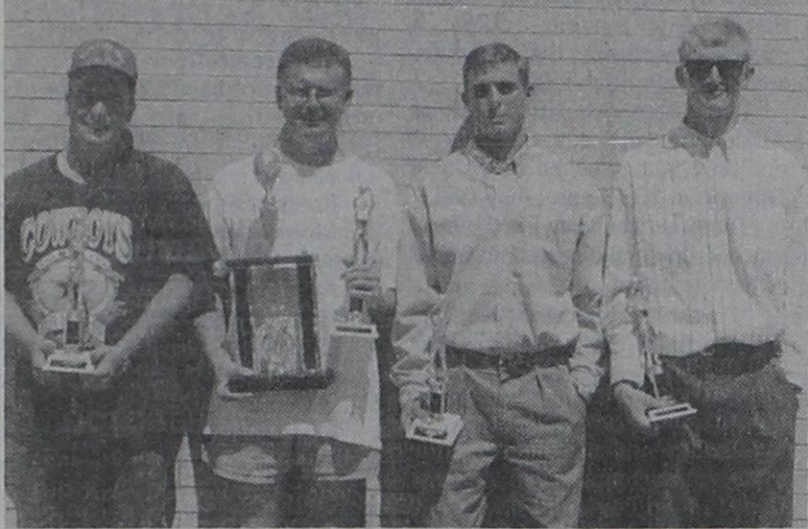

What Does Medicare Cover?

Medicare is designed to cover the cost of health care for senior citizens--and that includes eye health care, too.

As long as the care of a licensed optometrist is necessary for a health-related condition, symptom or complaint, Medicare will pay for the visit, or part of it. Anyone with a history of diabetes or headaches, for example, would be covered for the cost of an eye examination. Blurred side vision, which might indicate glaucoma, should signal a visit to the optometrist; the eye examination, including a field test for glaucoma, would be covered. Likewise, testing for cataracts is a Medicare expense. So are the glasses and contact lenses needed after cataract surgery.

In many states, optometrists may be permitted to treat eye conditions as well as diagnose them. Where this is allowed, Medicare will cover the expense. If you have any questions about what eye health expenses Medicare will cover, discuss them with your optometrist.

Donating Appreciated Securities Can Eliminate Capital Gains Tax

Many people have stocks or other securities that they have owned for a long time. Over the years, additional shares may have been acquired through stock splits, dividend re-investment or mergers. The current value of the security may be much more than the original cost. If the security is sold, the investor receives a sizable capital gain. Not only must the investor pay taxes on the gain, but the proceeds from the sale could put the investor into a higher tax bracket for the year, further increasing the tax bill. Many investors in this situation feel they can't afford to sell their securities.

However, they may be able to afford to donate the security or securities to a charitable organization such as a college or church. That organization may sell the security and use the proceeds, or hold it for income and future appreciation. If the donor had chosen to sell the security and then donate the proceeds, he or she would still have to pay taxes on the capital gain. By donating the security directly, the donor not only avoids capital gains tax but also gets a tax deduction for the security's fair market value at the time of the donation.

Donations of appreciated securities to charitable organizations are an important way to help improve our communities. In "The Gospel of Wealth," Andrew Carnegie observed, "Those who would administer wisely must, indeed, be wise, for one of the serious obstacles to the improvement of our race is indiscriminate charity." Carnegie rarely, if ever, gave money directly to the less fortunate. He invested in institutions that he believed would administer his gifts to the community "far better than it could or would have done for itself."

Carnegie gave away more than \$300 million in his lifetime. Much of this was done through gifts of appreciated securities. You may not have Carnegie's resources, but if you think you might benefit from making a charitable donation, ask your tax professional or investment representative.

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
