## MY TURN

IT HAS BEEN HAMMERED into our heads for years that we all need to go vote every time an election comes up. It is our duty as citizens and every vote is valuable to the democratic process.

The other day, I asked a young lady if she was going to vote in the election on November 8. She replied that she wasn't going to vote this time around because she had not studied the issues or the candidates well enough to be able to make good decisions about whom to vote for. I thought that was an extremely well thought out answer.

Far from being the be-all-to-end-all, simply herding warm bodies out to the polling places on voting day adds nothing to the value of our governmental system. Of the approximately 32 percent of the eligible voters who are not registered, you have such fine upstanding folks as the functional illiterates, street people, petty criminals, the indolent drones of society, purple haired punk-rock teens, career welfare siphons, and people who can't speak English, can't read a newspaper, and couldn't understand a debate between the candidates if they had an opportunity.

Mind you, all of these people are eligible to vote and certainly have the right to vote if they so choose. I'm simply saying that those who are not interested enough to learn what they are voting for, should not be persistently harangued into marking a ballot just for the sake of numbers at the polls. For one thing, these are the people who, when lured to the polls, are most likely to cast their ballot for the cutest candidate, the one who spent the most on TV commercials, or the one who promises to dole out the most benefits to the free-loaders of society.

I believe that our right to vote is a privilege which should not be taken lightly nor given away freely. The Voter Registration Act goes into effect in January next year. Under this new ruling, drivers will automatically be registered when they renew their licenses. Good grief! You have to take a test to get a driver's license. Shouldn't you at least have to answer a couple of intelligent questions in order to be able to vote?

Also under the new Voter Registration Act, welfare recipients will be able to register when they go to pick up their government hand-outs. Oh, goody! A bunch of people who care nothing about economics except how much they can get out of other people's pockets, and they'll be easily enticed into voting for the most liberal politicians.

Grass roots folks spend a third of their working years paying for government spending. It certainly behooves the conservative segment of the populace (which I believe is in the majority) to get out to the polls and vote for the candidates who promise less taxes, smaller government, family values, and strictly enforced penalties for criminals.

While on the subject of elections, these campaigns drag on much too long, which makes them much too expensive. The longer the campaign, the dirtier the mud slinging gets. With so much mud in everyone's eyes, it is impossible to tell who is telling the truth.

The campaigns wouldn't last long enough to get really dirty and prospective office holders wouldn't need to receive campaign contributions from those who expect political favors in return.

The President only holds office four years at a time. The first two years he runs the country and then the next two years he runs for office. So you might say that we have someone in charge only half the time. Whew! No wonder our government is in such a mess.

The number of people voting early for next Tuesday's general election indicated a good turnout at the polls, according to County Clerk Bonnie Warren.

The tight governor's race, plus a couple of local races have sparked a better than average turnout.

Countywide, there is a race for the District Clerk's office between incumbent Marjorie Watkins and challenger Sandra Warren. Friona's JP race pits longtime incumbent Frances Euler vs Reba Holt.

As of noon Thursday, a total of 260 votes had been cast early, and

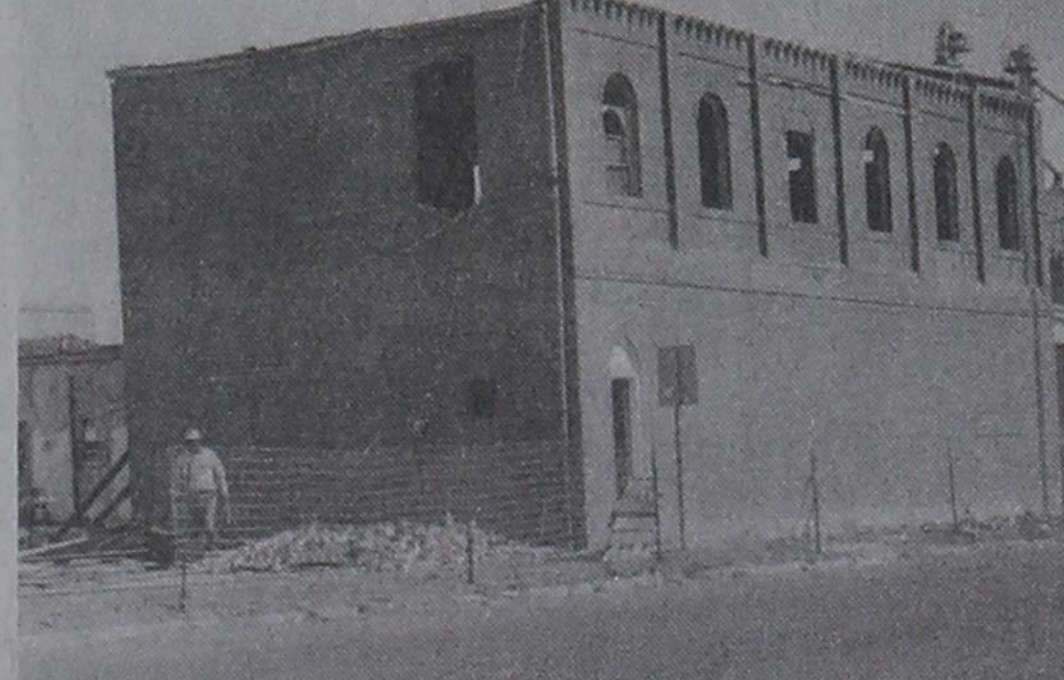
Another 14 contestants had scores of 11 for the week, and 20 contestants had the most popular score of ten correct.

## 'Cardiac Kids' Make Plans For Playoffs

The 1994 Friona Chieftain football team, which has won, lost or tied eight of their nine games on the basis of last-quarter heroics either on their own part, or by their opponents, have quietly assembled one of the best football seasons on record at FHS.

With their electrifying 35-21 victory over the Littlefield Wildcats last Friday, the team clinched a spot in the playoffs, for the first time in eight years.

They go to Floydada on Friday evening with one last goal--that of winning the district championship. Friona has not had an outright district champion in football since 1965, and there have been only three previous stand-alone championship teams in the school's entire history, adding 1952 and 1957 to the '65 group.

The playoff picture will be much clearer after Friday night. In addition to going for the title, the Chiefs will be trying to nail down District 2-3A's number one seed for the post-season competition. They clinched at least number two with the win over Littlefield.

The event is sponsored by the Parmer County Extension Service.

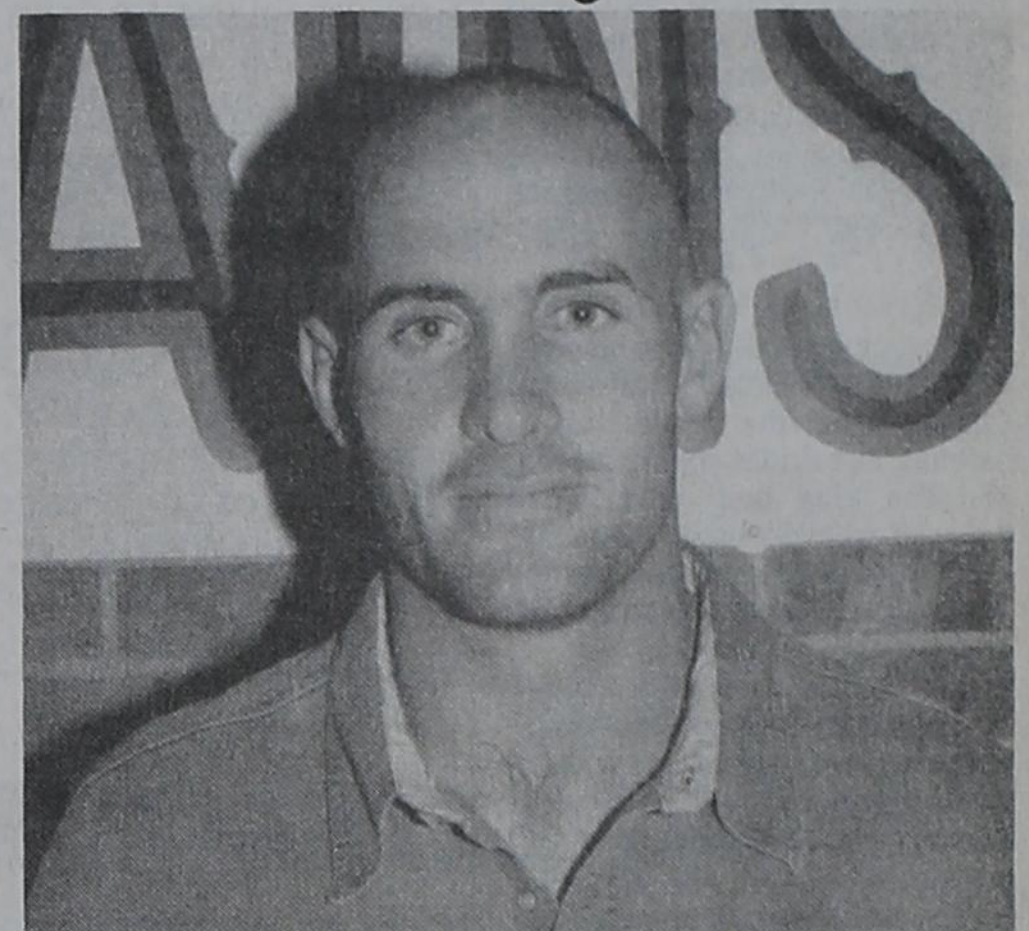
## FHS Team Wins Dist.

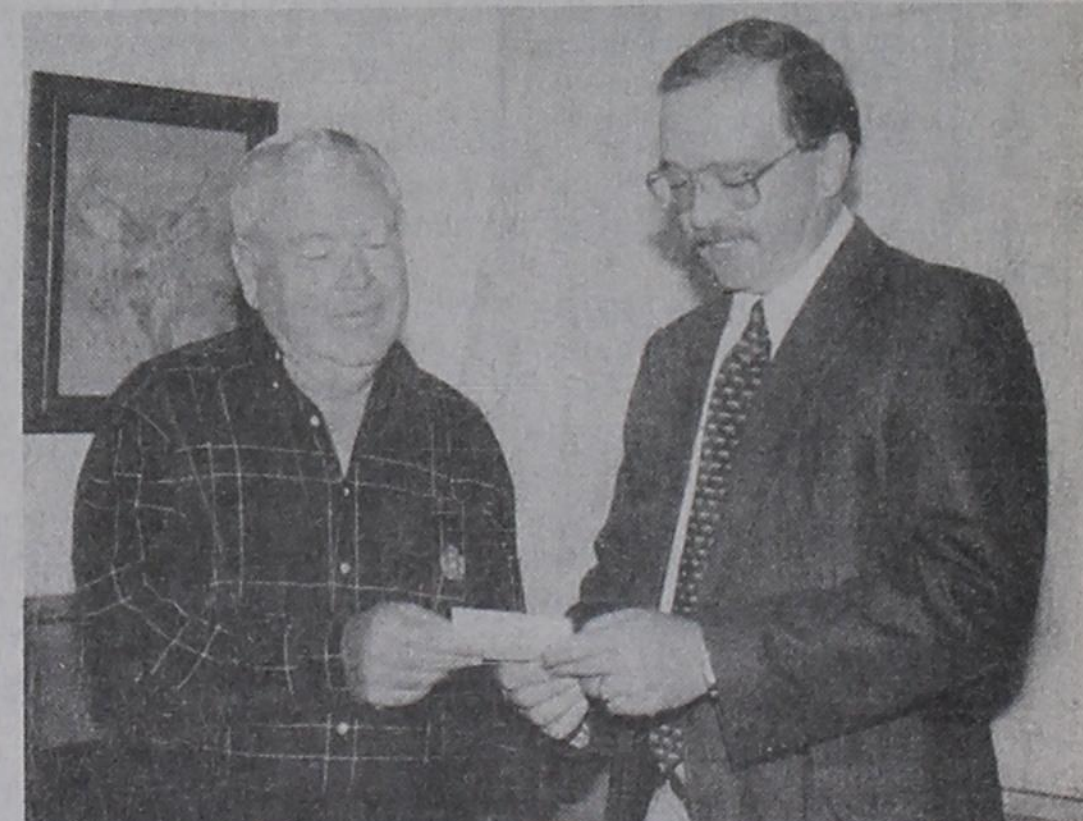
The judges for the competition were complimentary of the group stating "The band looked sharp, at times played very well, and the band is well-rehearsed." The band received a Division II rating.

# Friona Flashbacks

65 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 8, 1929

Work on new buildings is progressing nicely this week, thanks to the good weather which has visited the area. O. G. Turner has the walls of his new building on the east side of town up, and the framework on the new Baptist Church has been erected.

Friona grain prices are as good as at any other Panhandle point, it was shown in an investigation in Monday. A false rumor had it that Bovina dealers were paying 15 cents per hundredweight more than local elevators, but the truth of the matter is that local prices were 98 cents on Monday, and had never been as low as the 80 cents, which was rumored.

60 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 9, 1934

The members of the Friona PTA held their annual Halloween Carnival at the high school building last Friday night, October 26. The king and queen were crowned with the usual ceremony. The king was George Taylor of the senior class, and the queen was Lois Presley of the junior class.

55 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 3, 1939

The people of Friona were horrified this week when they learned of the death of R. H. (Reube) Kingsley, who had been terribly burned Wednesday morning in the west part of town. The burning occurred about 10 o'clock when a can of blasting powder exploded in the little workshop where Mr. Kingsley was working. Kingsley had workmen engaged in building a new garage at his home, and the can of powder had been used the day before in blowing a stump from the ground where the foundation was being built.

45 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 4, 1949

Three people were killed and three others critically injured in a head-on collision of a truck and car three miles east of Friona on Highway 60 Thursday morning. Dead are Frank Phillips, 53, of Farwell, Mrs. Loretta Essie Stone, 25, and her infant son Billy, of Hereford.

40 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 5, 1954

Continued ideal harvest conditions, coupled with the record yields of Parmer maize fields this week, have taxed elevator and shipping facilities to the greatest extent since the early 1930s. Most elevators have experienced temporary shutdowns since the middle of last week, awaiting cars for shipment. Oscar Hellman, local agent for the Santa Fe, states that some 1100 cars of grain have been shipped this year.

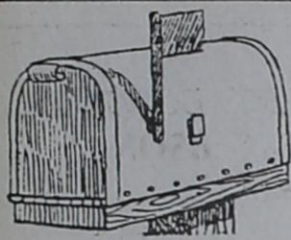

While this certainly is not new, what concerns us is their approach and timing. It seems they are trying to make a connection with the local United Way Fund Drive in both name and timing. Some examples of recently mailed solicitations are:

\*Friona Area Annual Fund Drive; \*1994 Year End Annual Fund Drive, Greater Friona Campaign; \*Friona Fundraising Drive; \*Friona Area Research Support Drive.

While their approach is effective, we feel it is somewhat misleading in that the money you are giving will be ear-marked for Friona, which to our knowledge is not the case.

There are at least two organizations locally that do have separate fund drives with local volunteers, and we do encourage support of these organizations, because of their local involvement and good causes.

We do not discourage anyone from giving by mail to any worthy foundations or research center, just because it is national in scope, but we want the citizens of Friona to be aware of the tactics now being used by some of these organizations, and that they should investigate any organization that they give to.

1 tablespoon butter or margarine

Drain cherries. Measure 1/3 cup liquid into mixing bowl. Add tapioca, salt, almond extract, lemon juice and food coloring. Mix well, then add cherries and sugar. Mix and let stand while making pastry. Bake in 450 degree oven 40 to 45 minutes. Serve warm.

### RICH PASTRY

2-1/4 cups sifted flour  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 tablespoon sugar  
3/4 cup vegetable shortening  
1 egg yolk  
1/4 cup milk  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
Sift flour with salt and sugar. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles fine crumbs. Beat egg yolk and lemon juice together. Blend in milk. Add to dry ingredients, tossing with fork into

soft dough.

Divide in half. Form each half into a ball. Flatten each on lightly floured surface. Roll to about 1/8 inch thickness. Use one circle for bottom crust. Cut second circle into eighteen strips with sharp knife or pastry wheel. Criss-cross strips for top.

Add butter, salt, vanilla and nuts and pour into pastry shell. Bake ten minutes at 400 degrees. Open oven door slightly and reduce heat to 300 degrees and bake 20-25 minutes longer.

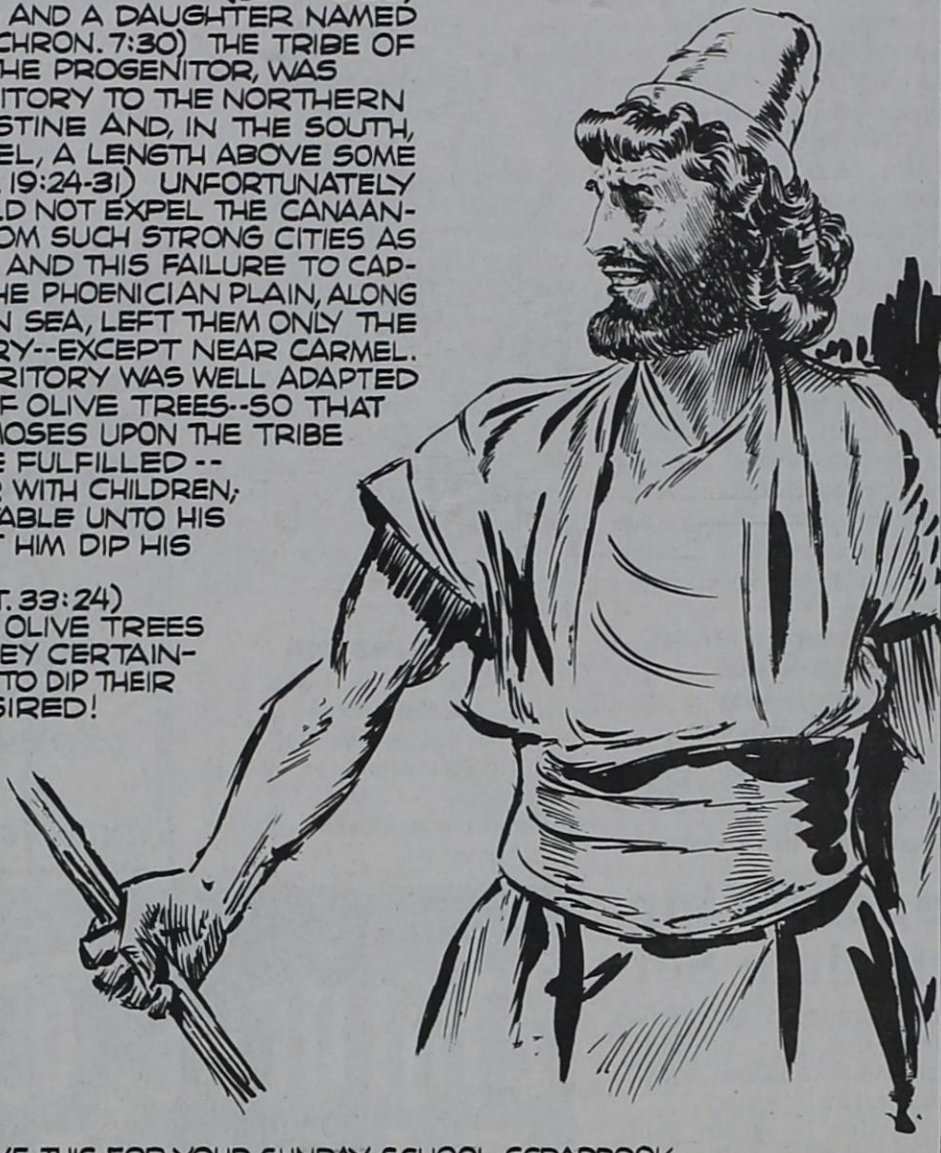

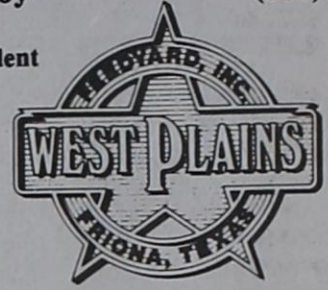

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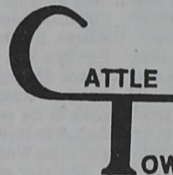
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# Chieftains Snap Old Jinx; Whack Littlefield, 35-21

If the Friona Chieftains continue to play the type of games that they have so far in 1994, school officials may have to consider ordering oxygen masks, or at least having medical professionals available, to assist fans who might be in the "faint of heart" condition.

Last Friday night at Chieftain Field, Friona thrilled most of the crowd of 2800 with another "last-minute heroic" performance.

The Chieftains scored twice in the final 1:43 of the game, to post a 35-21 win over district rival Littlefield.

The win clinched a playoff spot for Friona, its first on the gridiron in eight years. It also set the Chieftains up to win the district championship with a win this Friday at Floydada.

The Chiefs have not won an outright district title in 29 years--since the 1965 team accomplished the feat.

It was Friona's first football victory over Littlefield since 1976, and only their fourth win overall since the two have been district mates. It's probably no coincidence that one of the reasons the Chiefs have been out of the district throneroom in the past 29 years is that for most of that time (25 years) the team has had to contend with the perennial powerhouse Wildcats in their district.

But last Friday night the 1994 Chieftains decided to start a new trend.

They took control of the game right from the outset, and except for a shaky time in the second half, held it most of the way.

The comeback performance definitely was one of the "gutsiest" performances ever by a Friona football team.

Friona chose to take the ball after winning the coin toss, and they had a little surprise waiting for the Wildcats.

Quarterback Jay Belcher faked a handoff, faked a pass, then darted right up the middle, cutting to the sidelines, and finally being hauled down 34 yards later in Littlefield's end of the field.

The tackler used Belcher's face mask as a hand-hold, so another 15 yards against the Wildcats made it a 49-yard play and set the Chieftains up with a first down at the Littlefield 29-yard-line.

Three plays later, facing third and one at Littlefield's 20, Belcher again ran the "quarterback draw" play, and gained 12 yards to the Wildcat eight.

It looked great with a first and goal, but one of only a few tragedies struck on the next play when Lance Looper fumbled the handoff. Littlefield recovered at their own five.

Friona held the 'Cats to only one first down, and forced a punt, taking back over on their own 46-yard line.

Friona faced fourth and two from the Littlefield 46, and seemed about to punt the ball back.

That's when the Chieftains unwrapped "secret play numero dos" on the Wildcats.

Wide receiver Cory Hamilton lined up wide to the right as the Chieftain punter dropped back. When Belcher noticed that Hamilton was left uncovered, he barked the signals, and took the snap from center instead of the ball going to the punter. Belcher fired the ball to Hamilton for a ten-yard gain to the Wildcat 36.

That play sparked Friona to its first score of the game.

Belcher continued to have the big plays. His six-yard gain on the keeper play gave Friona a big first down at the Littlefield 24. Three plays later he ran the keeper-draw play once again, and spurted into the end zone.

Kit Preston's kick made it

7-0, Friona, with 2:53 left in the quarter.

Littlefield drove to the Friona 34 early in the second quarter. But Jimmy Arias got a timely pass interception to end that threat.

A couple of dandy punts by Preston helped keep Littlefield bottled up deep in their own territory and also set up Friona's second TD.

The first punt backed the 'Cats up to their eight-yard-line. The second one went from Friona's own 18 to the Littlefield 25--a sparkling 57-yard kick.

Just a play later, Arias again named himself as the "designated receiver" of a pass from Wildcat quarterback Danny Vargas. Arias made a nifty pickoff of the pass at the Littlefield 40, and with the action flow going to the south, only had to sprint into the north end zone for the score.

Preston's kick gave Friona a 14-0 lead with 1:16 left before halftime, as the Friona stands went bezerk.

In the last minute of play, the Chieftains rushed the Littlefield punter and partially blocked the kick. Friona would have had the ball at the 'Cat 14, but a Friona player had touched the ball past the scrimmage line and Littlefield kept it.

On the second half kickoff, Preston must have put some magic on the boot. The ball bounced where the receiver couldn't field it, and Belcher came in to knock it away. Rusty Simmons fell on the ball, giving Friona possession at the Wildcat 16.

Cory Hamilton sprinted into the end zone, and Belcher only had to fire a strike into his waiting arms.

Only ten seconds had elapsed in the third period, and the score (with Preston's third kick) became Friona 21, Littlefield 0.

Fans didn't have to spend much

time pinching themselves to know for sure if they weren't dreaming about the score.

Littlefield used four runs by Michael Benton for 36 yards, and a 36-yard TD pass to Chris Thompson to break their goose-egg. That made the score 21-7.

Chris Hanna was returning the ensuing kickoff, was hit, and the ball spurted right into the arms of an opportune Wildcat. One play later, Benton's 13-yard run, plus a PAT kick, and Littlefield had trimmed Friona's once-secure lead to 21-14. Worst of all, they had done it in just over two minutes of clock time, and the third quarter was just starting.

The two teams had scored a combined 21 points in only 137 seconds of clock time.

Friona's defense rose up, when the Wildcats drove from their own 29 yard-line to the Friona ten late in the third period, and threatened to tie the game. But on a big fourth down play, Arias knocked down a pass and Friona took over.

Juan Gamboa thrilled the Chieftain fans on a 25-yard scamper up the middle. But he was caught and the team couldn't continue the drive.

Littlefield went on a 75-yard scoring drive on which they couldn't be stopped, and Benton tied


the game at 21-all with a six-yard scamper with only 5:11 remaining on the clock.

For all of Friona's big plays, their season was about to go up in smoke if they couldn't produce a scoring drive in the final five minutes of the game.

Officials indicated to coaches at this point that the teams were tied in penetrations, but Littlefield had a lead in first downs, if the game ended in a tie. Both had already played a tie in district--both against Shallowater.

The Chiefs then produced a successful drive, when they had to do it.

Looper made up for his early fumble with a 30-yard blast up the middle to the 45.

Then Belcher, who had so many big runs, made yet another one. He burst up the middle, and although hit by several tacklers, kept muscling his way, finally knocked down at the Wildcat 19, after a brilliant 31-yard run. Only 3:13 remained on the clock.

Gains by Belcher and Looper moved the ball to the Littlefield one, where on third down Hanna crashed into the end zone for the vital score. Preston's fourth successful kick made it 28-21 with 1:43 left in the game.

The drive covered 75 yards and took only eight plays.

Littlefield still had time for another comeback, but a fancy

reverse play tried by the 'Cats on a fourth down from their own 31 backfired in their face.

The Wildcats left the ball on the ground, and linebacker Jerard Lafuente alertly snatched it up and ran it into the end zone.

Preston was five for five, and that made the final score 35-21.

Coach James Morton said after the Littlefield comeback, he called his players together and told them not to panic. "I told the guys just to take care of their jobs and not worry about anyone else, and we'd be OK," Morton said.

After an eight-year absence, the Friona Chieftains will once again compete in the playoffs in football!

Belcher paced Friona with a hefty 144 yards rushing on 18 tries, and Looper had 58 yards on eight attempts.

**Chieftains, Coaches, Fans Pull Together As Team**

"Someone said they didn't know if we were the best team in the district, but we were certainly the ugliest," said Colby Carthel.

It was August when the entire varsity football squad decided to show their team spirit by getting "Mohawk" haircuts. When they walked in to the Brandin' Iron Restaurant where Coach James Morton was having lunch to show him their new "do's", he was surprised and pleased.

"He said it represented how close all of us were as a team," said Davy Hamilton. When the boys suggested that he also get a "Mohawk," Morton made them a deal: if they beat Littlefield, he would let them shave his head. The man is now bald as a cueball.

"I faked the way they pursued," said Jay Belcher, then went the other way." Belcher logged 18 carries for 143 yards with this play, and was named the Amarillo Globe News AAA Player of the Week for his accomplishment.

Another play that worked well

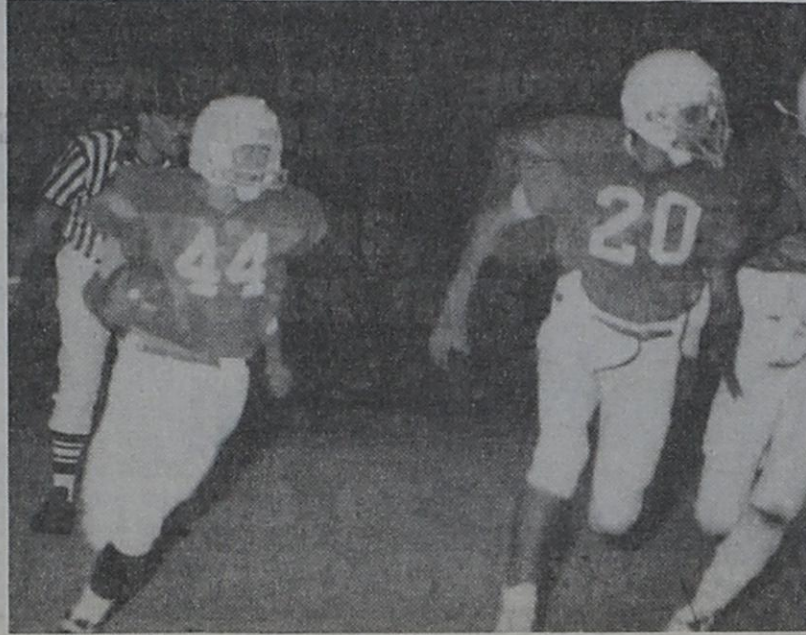

Rusty Simmons recovered the fumble, and on the first offensive play, Belcher hit Lance Looper for the touchdown. So, there was Looper's goal he'd worked so hard for, for so long. That made the score 21-0 ----an unheard of lead over the Wildcats.

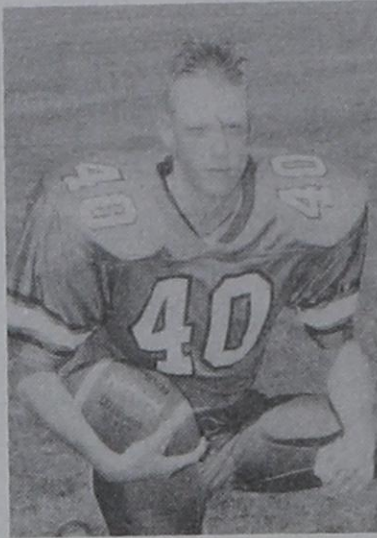
But, then something went wrong. "We sort of lost concentration," said Jimmy Arias.

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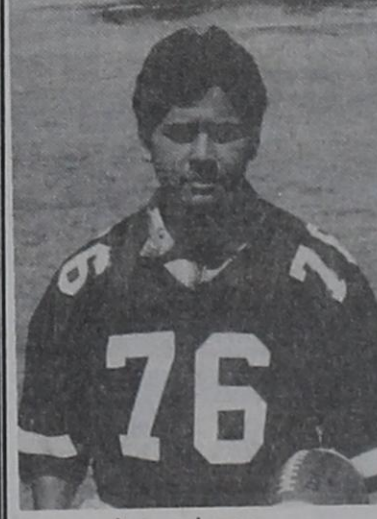

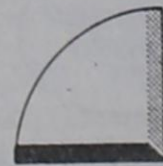

"He'd been saying he was gonna intercept those passes all week," said Roy Hendley, "and he did!"

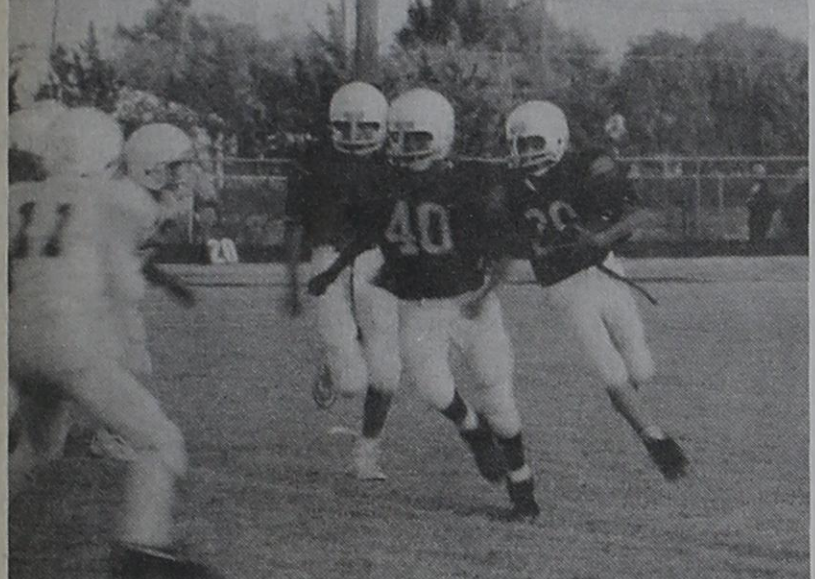
"He intercepted twice from the same guy last year!" said Chris Hanna.
