Before we get all smug and complacent about what is going to happen after the Republicans take office on January 4, 1995, remember that we still have a lame-duck congress in office and they are being called back into session to pass on a major piece of legislation which will put the U.S. economy under the control of a One World Government.

President Clinton is pushing Congress to ratify GATT (General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade; 24,004 pages long) on November 29 (House) and December 1 (Senate). Congress will be given only four hours of debate prior to the vote.

The reason the President is seeking "fast-track" approval on this item is to sabotage the legislative process (no ammendments, no deletions, no filibuster). This is the type of treaty which should require ratification by a two-thirds majority vote of the Senate, rather than just a simple yes or no vote.

Just the fact that President Clinton is so anxious to get this legislation passed, should be a redflag warning to public. We've seen his "hurry up and vote on it" tactics used several times in the two years since he took office.

GATT will increase the federal deficit by \$31 billion in trade sanctions and imposed tariffs. (There goes your balanced budget amendment, Republicans.) There's a \$2 billion provision in the treaty which gives federal subsidies to the Washington Post and the Atlanta Constitution (both big Clinton supporters).

U.S. Agriculture will be a substantial loser under the GATT deal, and American workers will be competing with countries that pay 25¢ hourly wages It eliminates the guaranteed minimum interest rate on U.S. Savings Bonds, and requires every newborn to have an assigned IRS ID number (the mark of totalitarianism). GATT and the World Trade Organization (WTO) will deny people in 123 nations any choice in protecting their own land, farms, food supply or health care.

The WTO is an international bureaucracy with authority to decide trade disputes, giving them power over U.S. domestic policies in the name of "unfair trade practice." All local, state and national governments will be bypassed in the interest of a global "free market" run by a few large international corporations and secret panels or boards. 

## **Friona Flashbacks** from the files of The Friona Star

Yrs. Ago--Nov. 22, 1929 65 Street commissioner F. W. Reeve has a force of men with tractors and teams employed loosening and removing the dirt along Main Street from the places where it is too high to the low places, thus making it of an even grade in all places. It is Mr. Reeve's plan to thus level the street thus make it perfectly smooth, with grader and drag and thus get rid of the bumps and chuck-holes and allow the water which falls to be carried away by the gutters. Then it is planned to treat the entire business portion of the street with a thick covering of caliche and give it a thorough packing, followed probably with a coat of tarvia or some cheap oil filter. If this can be done, Friona's Main Street will be in A-1 condition and should last several years. \* \* \* \* \*

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60 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 23, 1934

The Friona Chieftains ran up against the toughest defense they had seen this season in their bidistrict game last Friday, and the Childress Bobcats overpowered the Chiefs, 20-3.

#### How Good Is Vision Screening?

Vision screening is a quick way to spot individuals with obvious vision problems and signal a need for additional examination and care. It's a low-cost way for the motor vehicle bureau to identify would-be drivers who should

not be allowed behind the wheel without glasses. Screening helps schools identify some children who won't be able to read the blackboard, and community screening is often invaluable in spotting amblyopia in young children.

But screening is not complete eye care. It cannot examine the total health of the eye to identify vision abnormalities. It takes a complete optometric examination to check eye coordination, side vision, tracking and other visual skills. Eye charts may help the school find those who are nearsighted--but not how nearsighted. Farsightedness and astigmatism are not checked at all.

Some screenings for senior citizens do check for glaucoma, but may overlook any other eye disease present.
