Friona Flashbacks

65 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 22, 1929
 Street commissioner F. W. Reeve has a force of men with tractors and teams employed loosening and removing the dirt along Main Street from the places where it is too high to the low places, thus making it of an even grade in all places. It is Mr. Reeve's plan to thus level the street thus make it perfectly smooth, with grader and drag and thus get rid of the bumps and chuck-holes and allow the water which falls to be carried away by the gutters. Then it is planned to treat the entire business portion of the street with a thick covering of caliche and give it a thorough packing, followed probably with a coat of tarvia or some cheap oil filter. If this can be done, Friona's Main Street will be in A-1 condition and should last several years.

60 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 23, 1934
 The annual Thanksgiving service in which all our Friona churches unite, will be held next Thursday night at seven o'clock in the First Baptist Church building. The address will be given by the Rev. H. L. Thurston, pastor of the local Methodist Church. All other ministers in the city will share in the services, and appropriate music will be provided.

55 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 17, 1939
 The nicest parade, perhaps, to have ever traversed Friona's streets, was the Armistice Day parade, that was given last Saturday afternoon. The parade was under the auspices of the American Legion and Legion Auxiliary and sponsored and arranged by these organizations and the entertainment committee of the local Chamber of Commerce.

50 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 17, 1944
 Just as the Chiefs were getting ready to play their last game of the season and pack their suits away, they found themselves in a tie for the district championship. The chiefs defeated the Tulia Hornets earlier in the season, and then fell to the Hereford Whitefaces. Tulia, then, stinging from the defeat handed them by the Chiefs, ran roughshod over the Hereford eleven. This makes Hereford and Friona all even, and Tulia still has a game to play with Dalhart, and could make it a three-way tie.

45 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 18, 1949
 Don Edwin Lewis, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Lewis of Friona, will be the featured soloist on the Co-op round-up radio program over Station KFDA,

40 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 19, 1954
 Organization of a local credit association Tuesday evening became a reality for Parmer County. The Friona Texas Federal Credit Union now chartered, completed organization at an open meeting in the Friona Legion Hall, with all supervisory personnel elected.

30 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 19, 1964
 The First Baptist Church will officially observe its 50th anniversary this Sunday, with special services throughout the day. Former pastors and members will be the speakers for the occasion. Rev. Russell Pogue, now of Petersburg, will bring the message at the Sunday morning service.

25 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 20, 1969
 Tragedy struck the community of Friona another blow during the past week, as two city teenagers died following a wreck a mile west of town. Becky Broyles, 14, was killed instantly, and Billy Rushing, 15, died Tuesday, after the car in which they were riding went out of

control about 11 p.m. last Saturday night. Investigating officers said the right front tire on the 1967 Ford LTD blew out, causing the car to turn over. The vehicle skidded some 250 feet. Both occupants were thrown out of the car.

20 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 17, 1974
 The cotton harvest season was kicked off here Friday when Jean K. Anthony brought a bale in to Friona Farmers Co-op Gin, the gin's first bale of 1974 cotton. The first bale weighed an even 500 pounds, and yielded 760 pounds of seed. The turnout averaged 26.1 per cent.

The Friona Area United Fund drive stood at 46.5 per cent completed as of Thursday, it was announced by Don Gatlin, general chairman of the drive. Amount deposited to the fund at Friona State Bank amounted to \$3,301.15.

15 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 18, 1979
 County Judge Paul Fortenberry, who had three years remaining on a new four-year term of office, tendered his resignation this week to the Commissioners' Court, effective December 31, 1979.

Vandalism and thefts affected the local area again during the past week. They hit the Richard Lupton

farm, 12.3 miles southeast of Friona on FM 2397, breaking windows in a John Deere combine and a cotton stripper, flattened tires on the cotton stripper and knocked a carburetor off an irrigation well near the implements. Damage was estimated at \$3,456 by the farmer. Three vehicles belonging to Bruegel Bros. Gin, about a half-mile away from the implements, had their windshields and mirrors smashed.

10 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 18, 1984
 Friona's Millard Warehouse opened for business on Monday of this week, and the "business" became official at about noon that day when the company received its first load of products from Swift & Company.

Jones Ends Naval Course

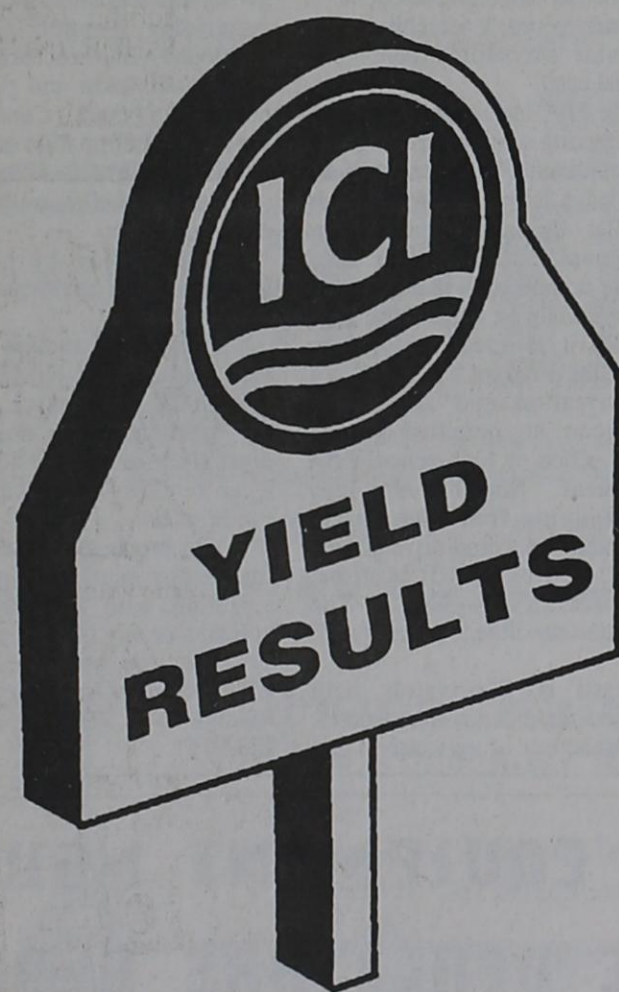

(Continued From Page One) not be able to defend their own laws against the WTO panels, since only national governments will have any standing.

Should Americans have the freedom to set their own trade policies? If GATT/WTO passes, Congress cannot exempt any of our American rights, because the WTO agreement states "No reservations may be made in respect to any provisions of this agreement."

President Clinton enjoys comparing himself with the late President Truman. When internationalists tried to get GATT started back in 1947 (known then as the ITO), Congress and the American people were so opposed to it that Truman didn't even submit it to Congress for a vote.

Traditionally, lame duck congressional sessions have only been used in cases of national emergency. There is no emergency connected with GATT/WTO. Trade will not cease. World trade will continue based on the previous GATT rules.

We have until June, 1995 to pass or not pass on this one. The issue is self-government. Democracy should not be coerced by power-hungry politicians and global corporations. There is still time to write and call your Congressmen and Senators.

Students May Be Eligible For Cargill Scholarships

PRUNELLA CAKE

- 2 cups sugar
- 4 eggs
- 1-1/3 cup buttermilk
- 3 cups flour
- 2 cups stewed prunes-mashed
- 1-1/2 cup chopped pecans
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon each cinnamon, nutmeg and allspice
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 3 tablespoons cocoa

Blend sugar, shortening and add eggs. Stir in flour, which has been sifted with all other dry ingredients, alternately with milk. Add prunes and pecans. Bake in 350 degree oven for about 25 minutes. This makes four large layers.

Let set on wire rack a minute, then turn out to cool.

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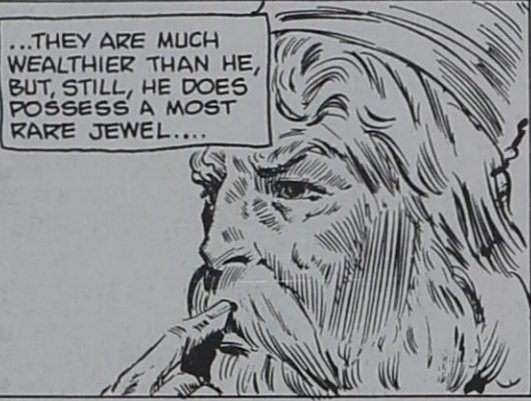

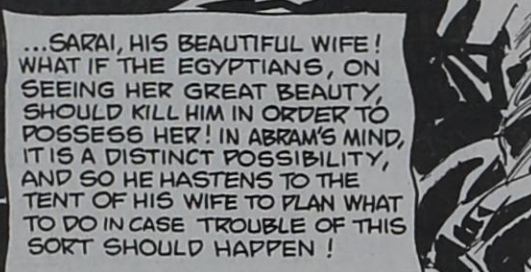

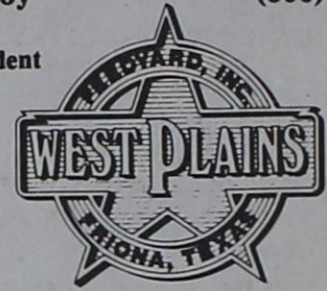

IN BI-DISTRICT GAME

Childress Ends Friona's Cinderella Season, 20-3

The Friona Chieftains ran up against the toughest defense they had seen this season in their bi-district game last Friday, and the Childress Bobcats overpowered the Chiefs, 20-3.

The game, marking Friona's first trip to the playoffs since 1986, was played at Bulldog Stadium in Plainview.

Friona stayed neck-and-neck with the Bobcats in the first half, which ended with Childress holding a 6-3 lead. But the larger Bobcats wore the Chieftains down as the game progressed.

Childress, in the playoffs for the ninth time in ten years, made a 72-yard drive to open the game, scoring a touchdown in their first possession. The PAT kick failed, but the Bobcats had a 6-0 lead.

Friona's first four possessions resulted in four punts, before the team finally found some weaknesses in the Childress defense and completed some passes.

Chieftain quarterback Jay Belcher connected with Jimmy Arias on a vital third down play, and later connected with Cory Hamilton for 14 yards and another first down, to keep Friona's scoring drive going.

Runs by Belcher and Chris Hanna netted 18 yards, as Friona reached the Childress 25.

Five plays later found the Chieftains on the Childress six-yard-line, before a pair of passes fell incomplete. Belcher had Hanna open in the end zone on the third-down attempt, but Childress defensive back Quenton Gould prevented the touchdown by knocking down the pass.

Kit Preston came on to boot a 37-yard field goal with just five seconds left in the half, making the score 6-3.

Childress dominated the second half, scoring a touchdown and a two-point conversion in the third quarter to stretch their lead to 14-3. The Bobcats added their third score on the last play of the game, to bring about the final score.

The Bobcats forced a Friona punt on their first possession of the third

quarter, and got excellent field position at the Chieftain 42. That led to their second touchdown.

Childress quarterback Jason Keys hit Gary Van Ausdal over the middle for a 27-yard gain, setting up a seven-yard run by Keys for the TD.

Friona's last opportunity to score came midway through the fourth quarter when Friona drove to the Bobcat 24. But on a fourth and ten play, Belcher's pass to Juan Gamboa gained only three yards, and Childress ran out the rest of the clock with their final drive.

The Childress coach singled out the play by his defensive back prior to halftime as being pivotal in the win. "That was a very key play. Who knows what might have happened in the second half if they had scored a touchdown right before halftime?" said longtime Bobcat coach Charlie Johnston.

Coach James Morton had words of praise for the Chieftains. "Our kids have done everything we have asked of them all season. We had opportunities to score some points, but just didn't capitalize on them," he said.

The Chieftains were held to just 84 yards rushing and 88 passing, or 172 total yards, one of their lowest totals of the year. Gamboa, who had 832 rushing yards going into the game, was held to only 33 yards, and Belcher, who had gained over 100 yards in his last two games, was held to just 16.

Friona had only eight first downs, to 14 for the Bobcats.

Chris Hanna caught a pair of passes for 54 yards, as Belcher completed five of 14 attempts.

"The kids were pretty 'down' after the game, but I tried to point out to them that all of the teams except one in our classification has to end with a loss, and that over 160 teams in 3A didn't make it to the playoffs," Coach Morton said.

Morton said the district title was a credit to the hard work by the team and the coaches. "We challenged the kids when they were sophomores, to stick with it, and it

paid off," he said. Morton pointed to the win over
