Colby Carthel, senior defensive standout for Friona High School's 1994 district champion Chieftain football team, signed a letter of intent Wednesday, February 1 to attend Angelo State University on a four-year football scholarship. Angelo State's Si Southall came to Friona to sign the former Chieftain star. Southall said that Carthel would most likely be playing defensive end and linebacker at ASU. He said Angelo played at Friona High School.

He added that Carthel would be "red-shirted" during his freshman year, to let him grow and mature

## 1994 Rainfall: About Average For County

It may come as somewhat of a surprise to many farmers, but the rainfall
recorded in the area was about average for the calendar year 1994 . Measurements at Friona's National Weather Service recording site came to 17.96 inches for the calendar year. The 32 -year average annual rainfall for the Friona station (1962-1993) is 17.34 inches. However, the measurements varied from one end of the county to another.
Although the last three months of the year yielded 1.29 inches of
moisture, the measurements covered so many different dates that the moisture, the measurements covered so many different dates that the
moisture provided very little benefit to growing plants.
