Method of Disposing of Beef Cattle Must be Changed.
A crisis has been reached in the range cattle business that calls loudly to that in terest to stop their present method of disposing of their beef cattle and take soundings before drifting any further toward the breakers that will surely ruin them all if continued.

The business has assumed immense proportions and unfortunately for the producers of range beef cattle has center the entire product is handled by a strong and powerful yet small syndicate, con trolled largely by three packing houses in Chicago, whose bids are heralded as fast as the wires can carry them to all othe markets and so they control all smaller markets with slight variations.
While the parties in Chicago have made large investments in their facilitie for handling this immense product which entitles them to the credit of having pluck
ned wisely and with long heads for their own interest in driving nearly all butchers nut of the market with their slaughtered petition and controlling rid of their of the market.
Their immense facilities for handling the product have been very influential, in fact, the chief factor in shaping the business in its present behannels and the impossibility of controlling the shipment by the catte producers offers just the proper condition for this small and powerful syndicate to dictate the prices at which cattle must be sold. The supply cient number of cattle are shipped to sup. ply their daily wants and advantage is taken each day to hammer down the price when a large shipment is received. It is easy to find fault and criticise the seeming short-sighted policy and selfish ness that would "kill the goose that lays the golden egg." But such is human nature, and the Chicago syndicate is doing only what all men would do under similar circumstances. Perhaps the mentare not to blame, for taking advantage of tbese conditions,

The writer has had some experience in selling cattle in the Chicago market and his ohservation is that there is usually but one bid on range eattle and the only chance to sell is to dicker with that one man and take his price, all other buyers don't pass them buy
Other great evils attending the present method are the enormous charges made for feed. cartage and commission which will aggregate not less than $\$ 1$ to $\$ 1.10$ per head, while it should be so managed as not to cost over 50 to 60 c . Now the important question arises how to avoid these conditigns into which the busI wess has drifted.
I would suggest there is but one way shipments entirely It would be a stop change and might be attended with some little embarrassment until the change was in good smooth working condition, but "it is the only method that will retrieve our lost ground and restore the price of range beef to a price that will save the cattle interest from ruin.
There is no more beef produced than is necessary for the wants of consumers, to go to producers of beef and make their offers directly to them, when the producer has some chance to be heard in the deter. mining the price. Such an arrangement would soon shape itself, as these large slaughtering establishments must have establishm every day in order to ran be compelled to send their bayers to the producers. It would at once result in an advance of $\$ 5$ to $\$ 10$ a head for range beef, which would abundantly compensate the producers for making such arrangements as to gather and hold their cattle so that purchasers can see them.
There has been a decline in prices on range beef of $\$ 5$ to $\$ 6$ a head within thirty to forty days. But we do not find that the consumers of beef are buying their steaks and roasts at any less price than they did thirty to forty days ago.
Unless immediate action is taken by the range cattle interest to alter these conditions, their cattle will be reduced to ${ }^{2}$ per one year one year.

## Spaying Cattle.

As the spaying of young she cattle has become so general in the west, and es. pecially in Texas, and as it is regarded by many in the light of an experiment, any information of a practical character bearing upon the matter is gladly received by hose who would convert their cows into beef.
Therefore, it was with much interest that we learned of the experience of the Colman-Fulton Pasture company, in this line, as related by Mr. G. W. Fulton, jr, a member of the company. Mr. Fulten says their experience has not been altogether satisfactory, as they have lost ten per cent. of the mature cows, though he regards it as hardly a fair test, owing to the fact that they did not begin till late, when the grase was dry and water scarce. He thinks if the work had been done earlier the results would have been more satisfactory. As it was, the lose was conined almost entirely to matare cows, the very little. He thinks furthermore, that not a litte of the loss was the result of operating too low, causing bernia. The regards calves as the safest subject for operation, but thinks that a year old is the most desirable age, as at that age one is better able to make selection for operation
of those not desirable to keep for breed. ing purposes.

## A Necessary Bange Regulation.

The regulations made by the executive committee at the meeting of the Montana Stock Growers' association, at Helens last week, for the purpose of wiping out horse tramps, if carried out to a reasonable extent, will have the result of ridding the country of a class of men who are year by year becoming more useless who are practically of no advantage to the country, and who are undoubtedly detriinental to the interests of the genuine cowboy. There are cases, of course somewhat frequently when good men are thrown out of a winter's work through a piece of ill-luck or prehaps through a little bad management on their own part but these regulations were not made for work prehaps three months in the year who spend wastefully every dollar tha hey make; and who calculate before hand on the liberality of the cowmen for their winter's board, knowing full well that their services would be needed again in the spring. If a manner of working the country could be devised in which ewer men would be employed and to
these work be given for a more lengthened periods, there would be nothing to detain that element in the country, which ter, and who are individually when wh time for work is aces Could not the round up be continued onar longer period of time? In this wey foremen would not be obliged to have way many men in the spring and fall of the year. Besides having this advantage the country would probably be riddea more thoroughly and cattle would not be worked so hard. Again, where a smailer ome of men are hired and kept for omed to the range, to the brands, and to the mode of work on that particular range. They can act harmoniously, knowing each thers exact mode of procedure, and in this way they make chemselves more valu ale to the men who pay they wages, a less expensive matter $\mathbf{t}$ keep a smal jear ervund than to have a large cres the year around, than o have lirge crow ol during the year and then to support them all during the winter, whether there fie work for them to do or not. On many of our old-established ranches there is noth-
ing to be done in winter with the exception of a little riding, and a man can not even earn his board in case he sh.

A Mrew Departure for Texas Steers.
This week the representative of Messrs. Driscoll, Blocker \& Davis, heary Texas drovers, closed negotiations with Messers. Barnes \& Schaefer for the winter care and feeding of 2,000 head of steers on the D T ranch on the Platte below Fremont's Orchard, in Weld county. The deal is a mutual co-partnership arrangement. Barnes \& Schaefer have this year put up great quantities of hay on their ranch. whers throult the winter and ner when public graving becomes gad again, they are to turn over to the original owners four-sevenths of ninety per cent. of the cattle received in the fall That is they figure on a possible death loss of ten per cent. and for their interest in the scheme they take out three-sevenths of the herd for their share of the feed, labor and care in keeping the cattie from starvation.
It is understood that Barnes \& Schaefer are prepared to do this feeding on on improved plan. They have two pastures. Then the stock is not cose-berded in one on these lells, bat is run under watch out cases of mild days in winter-the herd is to be held in pasture and fed here is stock stands by bauling the bay out to the fields on a four mule wagon and scattered about at convenient distances. After feeding, the cattle are driven into an ar joining field and their places alled by calves and yearlings, which do the after feeding on the old plan of keeping hogs or that purpose.
Besides this sensible arrangement the receiver of the cattle will at once establish ssort of a hospital, in which one or two hundred of the very weakest animals in the bunch will be isolated and fed with special care so that they will become trong and beaithy again and eventually be placed in the main herd. The parties ing on an ordinary winter of cosis conil be merely mominal By feaing, these Texas brutes in this way feeyng these comfortably throngh the winter and pas out in early spring prepared for the shambles whereas were they not taken up and fed, the probability is they would drift apart on the plains and die from starvation and cold.-Field and Farm.

THE revelations that are be stantly made of the forces that aret tion, which are depressing
cattle upon the oper range entire live stock industry will poesibly arouse the rangemen to forch able action in their own behalf, in the near future. In the one item of excess ive rates on beef shipments from Chicago eastward, it is shown that the railways are taking from $\$ 1.00$ to $\$ 1.25$ from the value of every animal growe weat of Chicago. This is but $a$ wheel within $a$ wheel, with the dressed beef man of Chicago ar the fellow that makes the wheel turn, by which revolution the producer is robbed of millions of dollars annually.

THE International Range association will be found to be a very important fac tor in regulating matters of special interest in connection with the great industry of western cattle raising, and it will receive that consideration from the eastern live stock interests that its prominence and work justly entitle it. President Head's address to the cattlemen of the west, found elsewhere in our columns, is an assarance that the range country, through its central organization, is prepared to look carefully after its own interests, and to put into operation such measures of utility as the pressing necessi ties of the industry here demand.

Texas and Dakota alone among the states and territories of the range country have no protection for their extensive stock interests from contagious and infections diseases. The gresent copdition of affairs among the herds in the vicinity of Chicago it would seem would be sumbcent reason for the cattlemen of the Lone Star state and the territory of Dakota to begin, or at least take steps, to secure some protection for their interests againet the introduction upon their ranges of bovine diseases-unless it may be that with hat cheerful trust in providence that has characterized them in the past in the presence of danger they prefer to have their grazing lands become the dumping grounds for the diseased animals of the remainder of the country. They can get the prutection their stock interests demand by calling on the commissioner of agriculture whe will at once place about them such quarantine restrictions as wilh absolutely protect their eattle from infection from foreiga herds.

OUR correspondent in another column under the heading "Methbd of Disposing of Beef Cattle Must be Changed" has opened the discusaion of the queetion which must be in the minds of many range cattiemen these days and which question ThE Stock Grower is free to confess is one of the most important ast the present time which the beef producer has to deal with. A half dozen fellows tn Chicago are depressing the value of every range steer, as our correspondent shows, from $\$ 6.00$ to $\$ 10.00$ per head. These fellows work in unison. -3 The Canadian authorities have recently prohibited the impurtation of all cattle from infected districts of Great Britain It was their oply afen, and ip order to get at the bottom of the difficulty the fountain head of the dieeate must be industry would be prostrated. The Farmers' Congress which recently assem bled at Minmeepolla, peesed resolution in favor of our governinest prohlbting the importaction of all cattle from toreign conntries where contagious diseases exist. The statutes of the United 8tates express. ly prolatbit the landing on our shores of neat animals from foreign countries, but they also empower the secretary of the treasury to suspend the operations of the law in this respect whenever, in his jodgement, it is of safety to our herds. The time has come when the secretary should avail himeelf of the power with which he is clothed and absolutely prohibit the in troduction of foreige cattle. If Canada realizing the strong necemsity that existed to throw about her herds the completest protection, could shut out the motber country from sending her choice cattie to the breeding farms of the Dominion, the United States can certainly use no less precaution for the beneftit of her live stock industry. The breeders of this country are already convinced that this action should be taken and thus aid all local authorities in their efforts to stamp out the disense whenever it appears. When it is understood that the introduction of pleuro-ppeumonia into this country dates as far beck as 1843, one year after its first appearance in England, and that it hat been prevalent here ever since along our seaboard, no one can question the necess ity which must be apparent to the most obtuse understanding of an absolute in hibition of all foreign cattle.

THE CETCAGO ELOW YARDB In relation to the present outbreak of pleuro-pneumonia near Chicago, where a large number of cattle ane afflicted with the disease in the feeding pens of the distilleries, which cattle came from the west, where no disease exists, the question arises as to how the disease was contracted by these cattle. The only opportunity the infected animals have had to contract dis ease has been while in the Union Stock Yards at Chicago, or in the cars while in transit to that point. It is a woll known fact that the cars used in the transporta tion of cattle are not being cleaned and disinfected after having been unloaded, and in case any of these cars had been used in transporting infected cattle from the east and the litter and manure remaining in them after having been loaded with healthy cattle it is plain to be seen how the disemes could be spread this way. Hon. Norman J. Colman, commissioner of agriculture, in a recent public interview which appeared in the fhieago Timee, says: "There is almoet always pleuro-pneumonia In the state of New York, and every year thousands of calvee from that state are sent to Chicago and the far weet, mathy of them after expoeure to the disease."
Who are conversant with the facts that Commissioner Colmas states an absolute
truth in relation to this matter. This estre of a chits verg haturtly spgests the pens of the Union Stock yards at Chicago havenpt become infected by this means. If thil surnite is correch, the danger to our western interesta in purchasing cattle that have papeed through the Union Stock yards 5 appareat. Who fine over heard of any action aver having been taken by the authorities of the Unloa Stock yards to preveut the admission to their yards of cattle from infected districts of the east And who has ever heard of any steps that have ever been taken by the authorities of the yards to cleagee and-diaisfect their pens to aflold, as fat potsible, the danger from the spreading of the disease On thé contrary, have not the authorities in question scofled at all measures that the friends of protection have sought to throw around the cattle industry of the country, and have they not by every means in their power, even to the exten of seading paid attorneys to Washington and there to cripple the eflorts of those who were seeking to secure material aid and protection. The evil that men do IIves after them, and today the great yards of Chicago are like the mighty Babylon at her fall-full of corruption and rotteness. And, though it might look like a public calamity not to operate through the Chicago stock yarda, yet with the well known bostility of these yards oward the industry of the west in refusing adequately to protect ite vat stock interestes and thoee of all the land tributary thereto from the devastation of a disease which has nearly ruined the cattle inter asts of Australia and hae already cost England $5,549,780$ head of cattle, esti mated to have been worth $8400,000,000$ no other step is left for the weat to take If the organs of the stock yards at Chicago hat have defended the authorities in all their iniquitions proceedings and which are now declaiming that there is no pleuro-pneumonia in Illiboiag are true exemplars of the live stuek industry, and the stock yards combination are the model gentlemen they would have us be lieve, then the cattle may as well die at once as to have the combination of chris. tian gentlemen continue longer to operate upon cattle values of half a continent, de pressing prices and otherwise datroying the business of the beef prodncer. The remedy to be applied to cure the mon strous evil which threatens the very existance of the plains cattle raising businese through the indiference of the anthorities at the Chicago yards and the clean cut operations of the men whoareswallowing the stockmen of the weet is to turn all shipments toward Kanses City and St Louis. No objectionable features have atteched themselves to the mavagemens and operation of these yarde.

Western Grasses.
Commissioner Coleman, of the Agelgot tural Department, some time ago sen Professor George Vasey, the botanist of the department, to make an investigation of the grasses of the arid region of the west, in accordance with an appropriation for that purpose, to ascertain if there
were other native grasses and forage plants which would probably be more produ tive than those now prevailing in that region. Vasey has just returned from his trip, after having made a very thorough investigation of the country included in northeastern New Mexico, east ern Colorado, western Kansas.
He says: "This district of country is a part of what has been known as the great American Desert. The eastern boundary fixed the arid region has commonly been tending westward to the base of the Rocky mountains, a distance averaging about 300 miles in breadth. Climatically and southern section, the dividing line being the sonthern border of Kansas and Colorado. From this point northward th the northern portion of Nebraska is a dis rance of more than five degrees of lati Lude, making an area of more than 90,000 square miles. This is an immense treeless plain, sloping eastward from the
mountains at the rate of about fifty feet mountains
per mile.

The Deadly Disease
The symptoms of pleuro-pneumonia, or attle plague, are thus described:
In its nature it is a specific infectuous disease, generally affecting the lungs and the lining inembrane of the chest, produc ing a particular form of lobar or lob ular pleuro-pneumonia, and in the major ity of cases, if not in all, it is transmitted throughsthe medium of impure air-hence its localization in the lungs. Inoculation with the fluid from the diseased lungs does not produce any effect on otber than the bovine species, but in this its action is most energetic. Producing after a certain interval lesions at the seat of inoculation. volves parts beyond, and if not checked may cause most serious damage and even the death of the animgl inoculated though it does not develop the lung les ions always observed in the infection, ye there is a local anatomical similarity or
identity. The malady is slow and insidi identity. The malady is slow and insidi ous in its course. lasting from two to three weeks to as many months, the chief symp tons being fever, a diminished appetite. a short cough with a peculiar pathogno monic character, with quickened breath ing and pulse, snd physical indications of lung and chest disease. The progress the symptions, and toward the end ther is great debility and $\epsilon$ maciation, death gen erally ensuing after the hectic feath gen set in. Recovery is somewhat rare. The pathological changes are generally limited to the chest and its contents, and consist in a peculiar marbled like appearance of its on the membrane, with oftentimes great effusion into the cavity of the throat: Fortunately it is entirely contined to the bovine species, no well authenticated nstances of its transmission, either acci dental or experimental, to other species having been recorded

Propagation of Splenic Fever
In 1873 Pasteur, aided by Chamberlain and Ronx, carried on some experiments on a farm near Chartres, in order to dis cover why this disease is so common in some districts, in which its spread cannot be ascribed to the bite of flies. Grass, on which the germs of the bacteridia had been placed, was given to the steep. A certain number of them died of splenic fever. The glands and tissues of the back of the throat were very much swelled, as if the inoculation had occurred in the upper part of the alimentary canal, and by
means of slight wounds on the surface of means of slight wounds on the surface of the mucons membrane of the mouth. In order to verify the fact, the grass given to the sheep was mixed with thistles and bearded ears of wheat or barley, and other nortality was sensibly increaseduence the In case of sensibly increased.
In case of spontaneous disense it which were artificially introduced into food in the course of these experd ments are found upon the grass, especially in the neighborhood of places in which infected animals had been buried. It was, in fact, ascertained that these germs existed above and around infected ear-
casses and that they were absent at a cer is true that putrid fermentation place. It most of the bacteria, but before this oc curs a certain number of microbes are dispersed by, the gas disengaged from the carcass; these dry up and produce germs, which retain their soil a long while
The mechanism by means of
hese germs are brought to the surface of the soil and on the grass on which the sheep feed is at once simple and remark able. Earth-worms prefer soils which are rich in humus or decomposing organi substance, and seek their food round the carcass. They swallow the earth contain ing the germ of which we have spoken, which they deposit on the surface of the soil, after it has traversed their intestinal anals, in the little heaps with which we are all acquainted. The gerins do not lose their virulence in their passage sheep swallow them together with the grass on wbich they brouse tbey may con grass on wbich they browse, tbey may con ground by the spade or plow may pra duce the same effect.
