advantage of others generally do most harm to themselves Wo do not find British colonies legislating in opposition to the investment of caplth by alfeis in such territory:-They aegho that inca pacity, Whethir native or foreign, will have to give way. The opposite policy shows a want of confirlence ia Ametican talent and-resourcea. Those who have land to sell are injuredif they cen sell only to Americat eltiteng. We must go to such worn out countries al Spiln, Turkey or China to ind similar laws in operation. America wants capital and enterprise for her development, and both cain be attracted to some extent by a suitable policy, such as we find in said colo nies. It appears to be necessary in all cases to prevent any great influx of Chi nese, for example, but when any foreign element is admitted, such persons should have all ordinary freedom of action and liberty to invest in land or otherwise at heir diseretion.
There are certain parties who would treat aliens in America as the Jews were treated in Europe and Asia in ancient times.

## A Colorado Steer

Alsop from calfhood, and pever fed on anything but prairie grass. It was six years old on the $2 d$ day of August, and althongh a monster already, is still grow ing. The steer is seven feet four inches in height, and weighs over 2,500 pounds. Its sire was a thoroughbred, but there was no aristocratic blood, so far as is known year ago there was some distinguisbed party passing Laramie, and the steer was
brought in and led up close to the train to be inspected, exciting the astonishment of everybodg. After a few days at Chey enne Mr. Alsop will take his steer to Lin coln, Neb., and exhibit it at the state fair here, after which he will take it to the stoek farm of D. Daniels, in Sarpy county, Neb., and leave it to be corn fed during what it can be made to weigh." Since the foregoing extract was put in type the Northwestern Live Stock Journal, Chey enne, for Oct. 8th, has come to hand, and in it we find the folluwing. "At last Thos. Alsop's big steer has come to grief Some three weeks ago he was brough over from Laramie City to be exhibited at the Wyoming fair, and from here was caken to the Nebraska state fair at Lin count of his wondrous size. The steer was then shipped to Omaha, en route to Sarpy county, to be corn fed, and while in that city fell and broke a leg, to prevent This steer was seven feet four inches high, and weighed over 2500 inche This fresk was of low birth, and bad been reared on the Laramie plains, never bav ing tasted any food other than natural grasses. Mr. Alsop had hoped to feed him a while and see what woald result, but his plan has been frustrated.

## Secretary sin

The Inspector's Bequirements
Letters have been received during the week by the secretary of the Cattle an Horse Growers' association of New Mexi co, from Alex. Rogers, inspector, under the New Mexico law of quarantine, sta tioned at El Paso, Texas, and N. Chaffin deputy inspector at Trinidad, Colorado detailing in full their requirements from shippers for the admission of cattle into the territory. Messrs. Chafilin and Rogers are determined to enforce the law strictly and to give the stock interests of New Mexico and the southwest, in the dis charge of their important duties, the com pletest protection. As their districts com prise the inspection of all cattle entering the territory over the lines of railway, it
bas been thought best to embody the re quirements of the inspectors at EI Pas and Trinidad in a circular for general dis tribution so that intending shippers migh Mexico is quarantnied against and what i Mexico is quarantnied against and what
necessary to be done in order to pass the inspection with cattle.

The following rules and regulations catile from gtates where plaro pneu monia exists have been adcpted by th said inspectors

- First-All cattle coming into the terri F railry of New Mexico over the $\mathbf{A}$, T. a S must be unioaded for inspection at Trin dad. Colorado, and EI Paso, Texas, re spectively.
Secoad-All owners of cattle coming into New Mexieo from localities quaran-
tined against, will be required to furnish


## the following evidences that their cattl free from disease

(A) Afidavit of two disinterested par question they have known the cattle in question for a period of twelve (12) that they have been healthy and exposed to no contagious disease, and that no contagious disease is known or believed to exist in the count (B) Certificay come
(B) Certificate of county clerk of said county that parties making such affidavit are responsible and reputable citizens of the county.
(C) Aftid
charge, made at point of or person in charge, made at point of entry, that his in the foregoing affidavits, and that ship ment has been direct and without unload ing, except for feed and water, and in cleansed and disinfected cars.
Third-Owners, or persons in charge of attle from non-infected localities, must ertify under oath, that such cattle have beenthept in one state for a period of four months (giving name of town and county of said state), and have not been exposed welve (12) mous disease for a period o shipment.
Fourth-All the foregoing evidence be submitted at the point of entry to the inspector when permit for admission to he territory may be issued.
Fifth-Calves gathered in quar points of entry
Sixth-Cattle not receiving permits for admission to territory and retained in quarantine, will be held, at owners' risk and expense.

## Spaying Heifers.

Whilst we believe the breeding of good cattle will pay better in the future than at present, or even in the past, yet it is time in our own judgment, that the practice of paying of all common or low grade heifers should be inaugurated and per istently carried on all over the state.
Why ? For the good of the entire cattle nterest. So long as these low grade eifers are allowed to they will produce their kind, and being a poor kind and un
profitable, they entail a loss of feed on the state that amounts annually to more than the taxes.
Two problems are to be solved to stop the propagation of inferior cattle, and to get rid of the animals themselves at a profit, if possible. Spaying solves both problems. If we had common or low grade heifers we should have them spayed in the next thirty days, and as soon as they were recovered put them on feed, and feed them ofl next spring and summer ior butchers' stuil, or else run them with the and sell either for feeders next fall or feed them ourself.

In the death of the Hon. H. M. Atkio son, of Santa Fe , who passed away from life on the 17th inst, New Merico has lost one of her most prominenteitizens. We quote the following relative to his death and the influence be exerted upon the material interests of New Mexico from the New Merican of the 18th
After a brief yet painful illness the Hon. Henry M. Atkinson fell asleep in death at 11 oclock yesterday morning. Only his intimate friends knew how seriously ill he was, and when the sad news of his death became known throughout the city the sincerest expressions of regret and corrow were universal among the people. He enjoyed the privilege of being one o the most popular residents of New Mexi $c_{0}$, and had friends who loved and esteen ed him residing in every village and hamlet in the territory. A severe cold develope day or two later Bright's diseasas came on to aggrarate the case, resulting in the general's most untimely death shortly be. tore noon yesterday. In this death, which has many particularly sad features, not
only the community of sunta Fe , but the entire sucuth west suffers a lose almost in calculable. Aside from his sterling quali dies as a citizen, his useful career as woldier, and his honor and integrity as a trust and official re ha many positions o rinat and os universally popul, Gen. At inaon was universaly popuar for those
manly characteristies of heart and mind which never fail to win the condidence and admiration of all classes. "He had the manner of a man." He was unassum. log.courteous,bg.hearted and brave. Aver offeial, he left the service of the govern ment comparatively a poor man; but ever reaching out for new enterprises, endowed with fine business judgment and great de cermination, he could not long remain in his condition, and by his untiring efforts richea and prepering to enjog tradan riches and preparing to enjoy the fruits of ed his manly spirit to other and better ed his
worlds.

## Canadian Shortaightednees. <br> gentleman who has just returned

 from the Canadian northwest in the course of conversation mentioded a circumstance which would argue great shortsightedness on the part of the Dominion government. It appears that the Home Land \& Cattle company, which has its beadquarters at St. Louis, Mo., hagve leased from the Do minion government about $2,000,000$ acres of grazing land in the vicinity of the Wood mountains. They now have 6,000 bead of cattle on the land rented. It was intended to stock it with a herd of 40,000 . The great drouth in Moatana prevented many thousand being driven into Canada before the 1st of September. That date the law imposing a duty of 30 per cent. on catle came into force. The company in question have purchased $\$ 6,000$ worth of supplies for their men in Canada. By his ouday he counry has ceen so much will prevent the importation of any more cattle into Canade and, as a consequence will confine the expenditure of the com any to the present requirements entailed by the herding of 6,000 instead of 40,000 cattle. The land leased is not fit for agriculture ; it can be made so by using it for grazing purposes. The Canadian ranchnen do not need it. To all intent andparpose it was useless to the government. purpose it was useless to the government. So are some millions of acres more unless
they can be leased bv cattlemen from this they can be leased by cattiemen from this
side of the border, if they can see their way to pay the heary duty imposed. The general opinino is it would be f more proftable to the Dominion to admit the cattle free, or for a mere nominal duty, to the vast tract of unoccupied lands, than hold the acres, as it were, in mortmain. A revenue would accrue from the puraid that supplies by the ranchers. placed upon cattle in the interest of a ranching firm in the north west territory, in which, it is whispered, a certain member of the Canadian cabinet has a large interest. The west feels much uneasiness about the outbreak of pleuro-pnesmonia in Chi. cago. The range people are eapecially alarmed, not that any Chicago cattle have been known to have been recently shipped to the ranges, but the possibilities are that some might stip through.
Mr. H. M. Taylor, the western agent of the bureau of animal industry to doing what he can to protect the ranch interest, He has requested all the states and territories to inform the railroads at once of their quarantine regulations, and that all eastern cattle coming west be held and inspected and a clean bill of health be proven before they are allowed to pass to the range country.
The railroeds have expressed a willing. ness incooperate with the authorities in
protecting the western cattle interests from disease. They being common carriers, however, they can refuse no cattle that appear bealthy at the time of ship. ment, henee the quarantine offieials should not rely too much upon the railroads, but should keep on the alert and exercise due diligence in their office.
Mr. Taylor was in Kansas City Monday, to see the stock yard and railroad authori. ties, who he said he found ready and will. ing to do all in their power to protect the stock interest. He left Monday night for Omaha to see the railroad and stock yard authorities at that point.

Live Stock and Dreseed Beef Freight Charges.
Mr. James F. Hudson has lately written a book, entitied "The Railoays and the Republic," published by the Harpers, in which appears the following:
"One of the most absurd and vicions of discriminations is the difference charged between live stock and dressed beef. profitable. cars roads made money. Dressed beef from animals slaughtered at or near the place of production, if carried in cars, might logically be paid for at slightly advanced freights over ordinary merchandise. The railway managers determined that the cost of transporting beef shonld be the et as live stock to be slanghtered there, or as dressed beef which had been there, or ered in the west. What was a really cynical touch about this was the plea put in by the railroads: 'We will equalize charges on this just principle. We can't allow competition between those who ship live stock and dressed beef, and so we will remain neutral and charge all parties alike for the same service.' The absurdity of this argument is at once visible. One-argument perfectly asinine of its kind, was when a trunk line constitutthe excellence of dressed meat, deciared that by raising the freight on this com modity 'they saved humanity from indulg. ing in poor food.'

An official examination of diseased animals was made at the distillery pens, near Chicago, during the week, and of the cows killed one was found with a fully developed case of pleuro-pneumonia Will the surprised editors of a few of the Hive stock journals of Cbicago now ac knowledge that truth cannot be downed :
Throver the active operation of the officials of the states and territories of the arid area an effective line of quarantine has been established from the Gulf of Mexico to the British possessions. Shalt the agents of the animal industry bureau and the local inspectors be zealous in the discharge of their duties, the range cattle country can bope for immunity from the Chicago stock yards plague.

Is view of the methods pursued by the syndicate in the Chicago market to reduce the value of range steers when marketed, It would seem to a man of ordinary vision that the plains steer producer would be acting with better fudgment for his own Interests to drive his beef product into the Gulf of Mexico, than to send them to a market where there are no competing buyers and where four men regulate the prices to be paid for the steer crop of the western states and territories.
The men who are holding the beef industry of America in their tender palms are called the "Big Four," otherwise they are known as Armour, Swift, Hamlin and Morris They are very active gentlemen, with a surpassing affection for the range cattleman. Devoted to many philanthropic schemes, they have found it necessary to regulate the cattle raising business of the country for the benefit of -themselves. The Chicago cattle market should be named the Big Four market. If any range beef producer doubts the fact of their being a maelstrom there in which he will be wildly tossed, let him ship his steers to the Chicago stock yards for sale.
The news of a miserable murder, that took place this week on the range, which will be found in another column. and
which murder was so atrocious and das tardly that the evil of six-shooter carrying
needs no special moralizing at our hands except to emphasize the demand that every fair minded man and law abiding citizen should make it a special duty to see that the pistol carrying transgressor to dealt with to the full extent of the lave, is its own commentary on the necesity which exists that the six-shooter must go The truth is made apparent in every kill ing that only those go armed on the range who are cowards, and who must depend

It is officially announced that the lung plague, which appeared in a herd of cattle in Oliver county, Dakota, and which is the only instance of pleuro-pneumonta yet announced In the western country, has been stamped out The prompt and efficient action of the authorities in the matter is to be commended and it establishes a safe precedent for the entire country to act upon whenever pleuro-pneumonia is dis covered. A long trench, eight feet deep, was dug in the ground where the herd
had been quarantined and every animal in the herd, whether showing symptoms of the disease or not, was shot and thrown into the trench. One hundred barrels of lime were then thrown on the carcasses and they were then buried deeply. There never was a more perfect case of the
complete stamping out of a disease and stockmen are to be congratulated on their scape from what threatened to be a vital danger. The disease was located a long way from the range country, but if one animal had strayed away from the infect ed herd, it might, in the course of time spread the disease elsewhere.

The beef producers throughout the country are awakening to the necessidy of protecting their interests from the rapa ity of the men who are surrounding the business of cattle raising with a veil of
darkness. The prominent cattlemen of Texas, it is reported, are agitating the question of bow best to guard against the oe to their prosperity that exists in the Chicago syndicate and the railroad pool The matter of raising beef needs no fur cher attention, it is how it can be most
proftably disposed of that is now the erions question. The forces affecting the beef producer adversely to his interests re really of such power, that nothing less than congressional legislation is thought by many close thinkers, wate affairs so that the producer will be no longer at the mercy of the sharpers. Those who take the initiative in bringing about a hetter condition of
things and raising thereby the business from its present wearied state, will find substantial backers coming to their assist.

Every year brings us nearer to the time when
congress will be as anxious to surround the rangeman with as favorable conditions for the deyelopment of his business as it bas been to encourage the agriculturist and throw about him every protection possible. In the meantime we may hope or the continuance of those agencles of progress that will make the labor of the range cattle raiser eminantly successful.

The Live Stock of the World.
Commenting on the statistics of live tock of different countries, prepared at the instance of our government, the Jour. nal of Commerce, Liverpool, has the following: "They extend over Europe, America and Australasia. The United States, being the owners of the greatest number of these animals of any country in the world, are naturally interested in their statistics. The census of the United States, which is very carefully taken, hows that they possess $45,510,000$ horned cattle, $48,332,000$ sheep, $12,077,000$ horses, and $46,092,000$ swine. The states on the La Plata, in South America, own 19,500,

000 horned cattle, $70,000,000$ sheep, and 500,000 swine, as well as about $30,000,000$ horned cattle which graze on the pampas grass plains of the south. Confining our-
selves, in the first place to selves, in the first place, to those countries where land is practically unlimited, in our colonies of Australia and New Zealand are to be found $8,500,000$ horned cattle, $75,000,000$ sheep, and 800,000 swine, all of which are increasing with great ra-
pidity. In Europe it is estimated that pirere. In Europe it is estimated that bead of horned cattle 36,000000 horsen $200,000,000$ sheep, and about $46,000,000$ swine, the latter being the same number as in the United States. Dividing Europer into its different states, we find that Rus. sia possesses the largest number of each description, having $25,000,009$ horned cattle, $45,000,000$ sheep, $10,000,000$ and $17,000,000$ horses; Germiny comes next with $15,000,000$ head of horned catle, $25,000,000$ sheep, $7,000,000$ swine, and but $3,000,000$ brorses; Austria-Hungary holds $12,000,000$ horned cattle, $7,000,000$ swine, $20,000,000$ sheep, and $3,000,000$ horses; France possesses $11,000,000$ horsed cattle, $24,000,000$ sheep, $5,000,000$ $0,000,000$, $3,000,000$ horses; Great Britain $2,500,000$ horses and 2250,000 seine It, y has 3.500000 horned cattle swine; Ita horses 9,000000 sheep $3,750,000$,000 In Holland there are $1,500,000$ cattle 1 . 000,000 sheep, 500,000 pigs, 300,000 hores Denmark has 347,500 horses, 1,470,000 horned cattle, $1,550,000$ sheep, 530,000 pigs'; Norway holds $1,000,000$ horned catle, $1,700,000$ sheep, and 100,000 pigs; and Sweden 2,000,000 horned cattle, 1,500,000 sheep, 500,000 horses and the same number of pigs. These figures may probably be accurate enough for the United States and Denmark, but about other countries we have some doubts, as, comparing the above returns with those given in our own statistical abstract, we can not find that they agree with any particular year. Tak. we find that Great Britain never hadd that, number, but that in 1879 Great Britain and Ireland owned $32,237,000$ sheep. We will, therefore, suppose that sheep. We chat year is the one intended. I have said be fore, and I insist, that the term "thorough bred" is entirely and totally inapplicable to any animal but a horse. A thorough bred animal means a horse. A thorough.bred horse is just as much a specific breed of horse as an Arab, a Morgan or Percheron, or anything else, and the use of "thoroughbred" in this connection is en tirely unworthy so intelligent and literary a society as this over-which I preside. The term should be "pure bred." I have a letter in my poseession Which will bear me out in this position I have published
one or two articles about it. Let us one or two articles about it. Let us
abandoa the uee of the term. If you have abandoa the uee of the term. If you have
a pure Devon, or a pare bred Morgan, it is not a thorougtbred animal. They talk about

old, and sixteen years before "Eclipe" was foaled, when it was wicked to drive geak horse, or a horse not of desert blood into a race. We do not like the teran, o "pure bred;" it should be "pure blood" o "blooded." The difference is this. Two Percherons might be brought from France and their direet progeny would be "pare bred;" but "pure blood" would mean that chey were not only "pure bred" but that ither the orignal sire or dam.

Chicago, Dr. Murray says, is filled with a terrible cattle plague, and that althongh not recognized or acknowledged to be such until a month ago, it has, as a matter of fact, been virulent there for two years. In fact it is safe in say that the entire western half of the city is infected. In the western part there are many large, open commons and on numbers by cay infect a herd in a day so it is easy to see how rapidly the trouble would spread Cows are brought to these commons from the east side, but the east side had not been infected when I left I found both north and south of the Union Stwek Yards infected. Tracks of the disease bave been found in Geneva, twenty miles from Chicago, and I have no doubt that more will be found in the towns and villages near Chicago.
