## Star Lites

**THE HEARTS OF** every resident of the Texas Panhandle, as well as those from across a wide section of the country, go out to the residents of Claude, Texas, following the tragic deaths this week of five of their teenagers in the ice-related traffic wreck.

With the two earlier teenage fatalities related to the fire truck-train accident, Claude has experienced a "double-whammy," that no community, large or small, should have to endure.

Our friend, Rev. Richard Grisham, has discussed the tragedy much better than we could ever do, and we hope you'll turn over to Page 3 of this issue and read his thoughts concerning the tragedy in his "Looking Up" column.

Scotter Russell's sister in Wisconsin had heard the news that far away. It's bad that the Panhandle had to suffer such a loss to make the national news.

**FEBRUARY IS HEART** month, and the American Heart Association as well as the Texas Department of Health uses the occasion to promote awareness of heart disease and other heart-related health problems.

Figures we received this week from the TDH revealed that deaths from heart disease, strokes and hypertension (high blood pressure) together claimed 51,123 Texas residents during the calendar year 1993. This surprisingly amounts to roughly 40 per cent of the 134,417 deaths of Texans during the year.

"Not only is heart disease the leading killer every year in Texas and the nation, but the other cardiovascular diseases appear to be increasing at a rapid pace," said Tom Pollard, director of the Statistical Services Division for the TDH.

As an example, Pollard pointed out that deaths from hypertension increased from 618 to 918—a full 50 per cent—in 1993 from the previous year. This is a pretty staggering statistic.

To combat the prevalence of cardiovascular disease in Texas, the TDH, along with the Texas Medical Assn. and other health groups have joined in a new initiative which officially began February 1. The state's promotion coincided with the launch of a similar national initiative.

A spokesman for the Texas Department of Health said that the coalition's strategies will include both short-term remedial measures and long-range programs to eliminate the causes of cardiovascular disease. "Although CVD is the most prevalent killer, it is still considered preventable, since many of the causes of coronary and circulatory disease can be prevented or controlled," said Dr. David Smith, Texas Commissioner of Health.

Research shows that 78 per cent of adult Texans have at least one of the six major risk factors for CVD. These include tobacco use, physical inactivity, high blood pressure, high blood cholesterol, obesity and diabetes.

Charlene Laramy, director of the TDH Chronic Disease Prevention Program, explained that the state's initiative will establish a coalition to create plans for curbing cardiovascular disease among high-risk groups of Texans by promoting exercise programs, better nutrition and more healthful lifestyles.

Members of the coalition will come from both the private and public sectors. They will collect information, conduct public and professional education, coordinate outreach and available services, promote environmental improvements and enlist community leadership.

Although the coalition members for years have separately operated programs to prevent and reduce cardiovascular deaths in Texas, the new initiative marks the first time the leading groups and agencies have combined their efforts toward common goals.

## Residents Will Vote On 1-Cent Sales Tax

Residents of Friona will have the opportunity to vote on a new one-cent sales tax, which includes a half cent for economic development and one-half cent for property tax relief, in the May election by the City Council.

The issue was approved for the ballot by the Council at its regular meeting on February 6.

A task force representing the Friona City Council and the Friona Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture was formed for the purpose of researching and finalizing decisions concerning the proposal for a sales tax for the city of Friona.

There has been increased concern over the lack of growth of new business and industry in Friona. The Economic Development Committee of the Friona Chamber of Commerce, in looking at options and what we as a community can do to promote business growth and retention, have found that more and more Texas communities have passed a sales

tax for economic development.

The sales tax for property tax relief reduces property taxes by an amount equal to the estimated revenue from the additional sales and use tax.

"Through revenue brought in by the sales tax, other communities have organized economic development programs enabling them to actively seek out new business and industry by offering a variety of incentives which levels the playing field for smaller communities such as our own," stated Teresa Buske, executive vice president of the Friona Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture.

"It offers us an opportunity to compete with the larger cities. Without a sales tax for economic development, Friona will be put at a distinct disadvantage when vying with the surrounding communities which have already passed this tax," she added.

Cities such as Amarillo, Borger, Hereford, Dalhart, Dimmitt, Littlefield and Muleshoe in our

immediate area, have adopted the tax.

The sales tax would increase the present 7.25 per cent tax in Friona to 8.25 per cent.

"Shoppers are already paying the 8.25 per cent tax in Amarillo. They don't mind paying the extra penny there, along with making the drive. We could use this money in Friona for economic development and property tax reduction," Mrs. Buske said. The extra penny tax doesn't make that much difference in an individual purchase, but it would make a tremendous difference to us, over a long period," she added.

The Chamber spokesman said the task force would be putting a marketing deal together, and would be showing the public how the money would be used. A community-wide meeting will be held prior to the election so that the plan can be fully discussed.

Bob Bearden of the State Comptroller's office has agreed to come to Friona to help explain the tax and answer questions.

Members of the task force include Bill Stovell, Tom Randolph and Jim Atwell, representing the City Council, and Bill McCoy, Byron Boyd and Teresa Buske for the Chamber.

The Chamber's Economic Development Committee is made up of Andrew Zamora, chairman; Richard Barnett, Danny Fiel, Bill McCoy, John Gurley, Chris Molloy and Marca Lynn Herring.

"The passage of this tax is an opportunity for Friona. It is the Chamber's goal and vision to promote stability and growth in our business community and a better quality of life for the citizens of Friona," Mrs. Buske concluded.

All classrooms will host Open House activities Tuesday, February 21. The district-wide schedule is: primary campus, 6-7:30 p.m.; elementary campus, 6:30-8 p.m.; junior high campus, 7-8:30 p.m.; and high school campus, 7:30-8:30 p.m.

Refreshments will be served in the cafeterias by the ARA food service staff.

Parents who have children in the Migrant/Chapter I Program are encouraged to visit Connie Johnson's room (elementary campus #209), Kay Sneed's room (elementary campus #212), Janie Irlbeck's room (junior high campus #18) and Alton Peak's room (junior high campus #1).

The children on the primary campus will be able to demonstrate their computer, reading and writing skills on the Josten's Integrated Language Arts Program, "Dragontales."

This program's design, three Macintosh computers and one printer per classroom, allows teachers and students immediate access to technology.

Using the computer as a teaching tool has enhanced the student's motivation and provided an innovative teaching strategy for

our young children. Special classroom projects depicting Texas and cowboys will be on display.

The elementary campus will have a variety of students' work in the hallways and in individual classrooms. The Science Fair will be held in the gym.

## Runaway Cow Nabbed After Daring Escape!

Friona law officials and a volunteer cowboy assisted in rounding up and capturing a fugitive heifer that jumped from the truck that was hauling it to Excel on Tuesday, in the city limits of Friona on Highway 60.

The large animal, headed to the slaughter house with the rest of the truckload, led the lawmen and volunteers on a slow chase a-la the O.J. Simpson episode; this time the heifer being the fugitive, and the Reeve Lake area substituting for the freeway.

The heifer jumped out of its truck near the Friona Motors-Sonic area on West Highway 60, and after standing alongside the highway for awhile, began to ease over into the lake area. The lawmen and volunteers then worked to keep it in the vacant area and away from the highway traffic.

Trey Ellis, Department of Public Safety officer, said that a motorist called the Friona Police Department about mid-morning Tuesday and reported that a cattle truck was headed to Friona (from the east), and that the back gate was wide open and several cattle were poised at the back "just looking out."

So the FrPD was on the lookout for the truck, but for awhile they could not get the attention of the

truck's driver. He managed to get through both stop lights on Highway 60, and was contacted about the time he passed Hurst Real Estate on the highway.

The one brave heifer had jumped out by the time the driver stopped and got the gates fixed.

"The swing gate (outside gate) had come unhooked, causing the sliding gate (main gate) to get loose. We could've had 20 to 30 cattle out, if they had had a mind to jump," Ellis said.

Shortly after the trucker stopped, John S. Baker came by and noticed the situation. He hurried out to his place west of Friona, loaded his horse into a trailer and came back to the scene.

The calf stayed in the small grove of trees and bushes for awhile, but Baker eased it out of the trees and drove it north, away from the highway.

Baker roped the heifer and the episode appeared to be about over.

But the fugitive had one more trick up its "sleeve."

It laid still and motionless, while Baker, assisted by Ellis and Gene Welch, tried to get the heifer on its feet so they could load it into the trailer.

Finally it sprang up, got out of the noose and was off again.

Baker calmly trailed the animal on his horse, as it went over close to the Community Center/Scout House area. He roped the animal a second time—nabbing it on one try.

This time the volunteers got the animal into the trailer.

The truck driver was unidentified. He was driving a Burns Trucking vehicle leased to Excel Transportation, and was hauling a load from Barrett & Crofoot Feed Yard (near Hereford) to Excel.

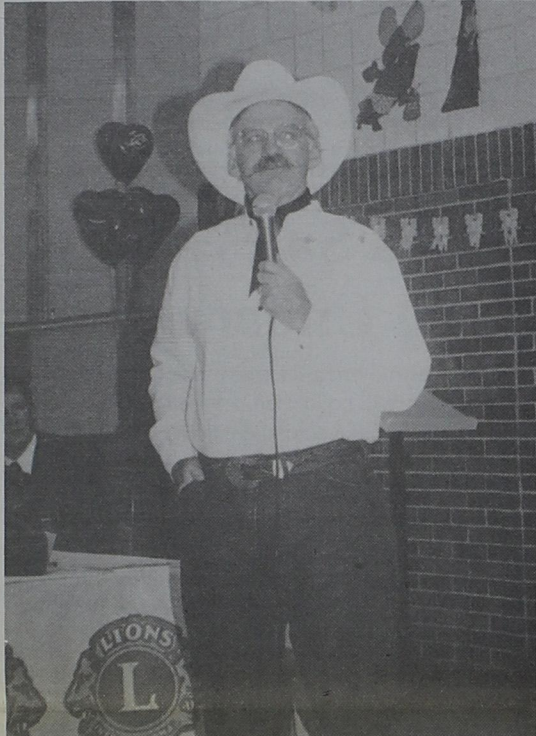

**65 Yrs. Ago--Feb. 21, 1930**

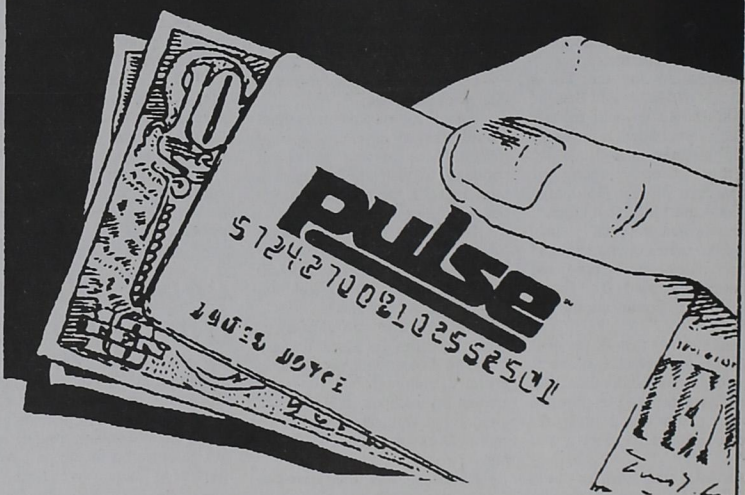

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# Looking Up!

The hearts of the families and friends of the seven young people from Claude, recently killed in accidents, are overwhelmed in shock and grief.

The questions come: How do you handle such terrific and horrible grief? How do you cope with so much sudden tragedy experienced in such a short time?

As human beings we are vulnerable because we love deeply. It is so hard to imagine that many young lives being snatched so quickly by death from one community so similar to our own.

Hopefully we will never have to deal with a deluge of heart-ache of that magnitude—by God's grace!

Does that mean God did not love those seven young people from Claude. Of course not, for they were all fine, wonderful, Christian young people, serving their community well, enjoying life and having fun as only teenagers can.

They were volunteers trying to help their fellow man, caring youth who stopped by the hospital to cheer a sick Sunday School teacher they loved. God loved them dearly, just as He loves each of us.

I feel that the pastors of Claude are doing an admirable job of counseling and comforting the other youth and people of Claude.

The Church of Christ pastor on the evening news said some wonderful things about how they must cope with the pain.

The Methodist pastor of the five youth who most recently lost their lives also expressed some very appropriate words. Being a pastor myself, I pray that they will continue to have wisdom to deal with the issues at hand.

One divine resource for dealing with great tragedy is prayer. Even

if we know not what to say or what to ask, we can find great solace just by kneeling in the presence of God.

The scripture promises that at such time the Holy Spirit groans with us and offers up prayer on our behalf (Romans 8:26, 27).

As the Psalmist so often discovered, God is big enough and gracious enough to handle and accept our deepest emotions: anger, heartache, disappointment, grief, sorrow, despair, and yes, even doubt. He is there to soothe our deepest pain.

Another way we cope when confused, shocked, and devastated emotionally is through togetherness. Just being there for one another as family, friends, and community. We find within each other strength and grace to share.

The sound of a familiar voice, the touch of tender love, the presence of a collective spirit of caring are essential. A corporate faith of church and community, such as the people of Claude are now exhibiting, bouys up the individuals who cannot stand alone. 

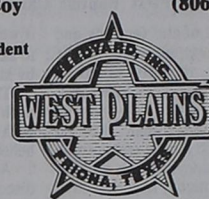

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# Area FFA Members To Exhibit Livestock At Houston Show

Thirteen Friona and ten Bovina FFA members will be joining other 4-H and FFA members from throughout Texas for show ring competition at the upcoming Houston Livestock Show, February 17 through March 5 at the Astrohall.

These FFA and 4-H exhibitors compete in one of two divisions of the Houston Livestock Show—the junior show division. The other division, the open show, attracts its exhibitors from the world's agricultural industry, who are primarily professional breeders and ranchers.

Friona exhibitors will include Andy Carthel, Leslie Fangman, Mac Fields, Trevor Fields, Tania Hand, Melissa Hardin, J'Lord Jarecki, M'Kell Jarecki, Justin Jeter, Bradley Perez, Gerrod Salyer,

Jessica Smith and Amanda Taylor. Those attending from Bovina are Ryan Dyer, Robert Kent, Lance McClaran, Kevin Mitchell, Krysta Morris, Jim Prather, Jake Steelman, Levi Steelman, Jason Stone and Lance Teague.

Entries in both the open and junior shows combine with horse show entries to make the Houston Livestock Show the world's largest. Representing 900 Texas 4-H clubs and FFA chapters, the junior show is expected to exceed 14,000 entries this year. A variety of animals is shown in the junior show division: market steers, market swine, market sheep, market poultry, beef and dairy heifers, breeding sheep, goats, commercial steers and breeding rabbits.

The four market animal categories (steer, sheep, swine and

poultry) represent animals raised by the exhibitor as food sources. Top animals in each of these categories are eligible for their individual market auctions. Total money paid in 1994 at the four junior show auctions exceeded \$4 million.

"Our junior show is the highlight of our livestock exhibition, placing an emphasis on education, supervised instruction and fair competition," said Don Jobes, Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo assistant general manager.

In addition to world class livestock competition for two weeks, superior horse show competition also is on the event's agenda. The International Cutting Horse Contest, featuring contestants from several nations, kicked off horse show competition on Wednesday, February 15. The 1995 Horse Show also will feature competition in seven different breeds: Appaloosa, Arabian, Half Arabian, Miniature, Paint, Palomino and Quarter Horse.

The daily show parade returns this year. This colorful attraction features the famous Clydesdale horses, fire trucks, Astroworld singers and dancers, a train, music and about one hundred youngsters, rounded up each day from the show grounds, riding on floats, fire trucks and the train. The parade forms outside the south entrance of the Astrohall and travels throughout the complex. The daily show parade starts at 5 p.m. on weekdays and at 3 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays.

All net proceeds from the annual Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo provide funds for scholarships and research projects throughout the state. Currently, more than 1,500 students receive some form of show-sponsored financial assistance. Since the first scholarship was given in 1957, more than 11,500 awards have been presented to Texas youth at a cost exceeding \$35 million.

The 1995 carnival will feature approximately fifty of today's newest and up-to-date rides, roller

coasters, fun houses, hundreds of games and prizes and every kind of food imaginable. Many park benches and picnic tables also are available to accommodate carnival visitors.

New to the 1995 show is a special attraction in the Astrohall, the World of Cattle exhibit. This hands-on, interactive display is designed to educate and inform visitors about the nutritional value of beef, the benefits of beef cattle by-products and the importance of food safety issues. Show patrons will learn all about cattle and the species' effect on every aspect of consumers' lives. Children will receive an activity packet as they walk through this educational display.

Show patrons will again be able to enjoy the milking parlor, one of show's most informative exhibits. This entire milk production process, from the cow to the grocery store, is colorfully presented. Actual milking demonstrations are conducted daily throughout the duration of the show and include special commentary by university professors, along with video presentations.


Running pigs take to the track during the pig racing event, held February 17-March 5 in Astrohall Plaza at 10 a.m., noon and 2, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8 p.m.

Another fun family feature will be the petting zoos, with three locations for young and old alike to enjoy. Children of all ages also will be able to enjoy elephant and pony rides.

## World Day Of Prayer Service

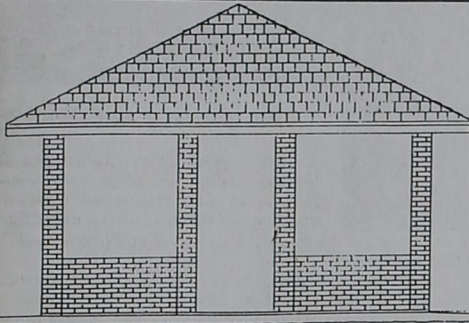
The community will be observing the 108th annual World Day of Prayer with a service on Friday, March 3, 1995 at 7:00 p.m. at Friona United Methodist Church.

## Financial Workshop Set At FHS

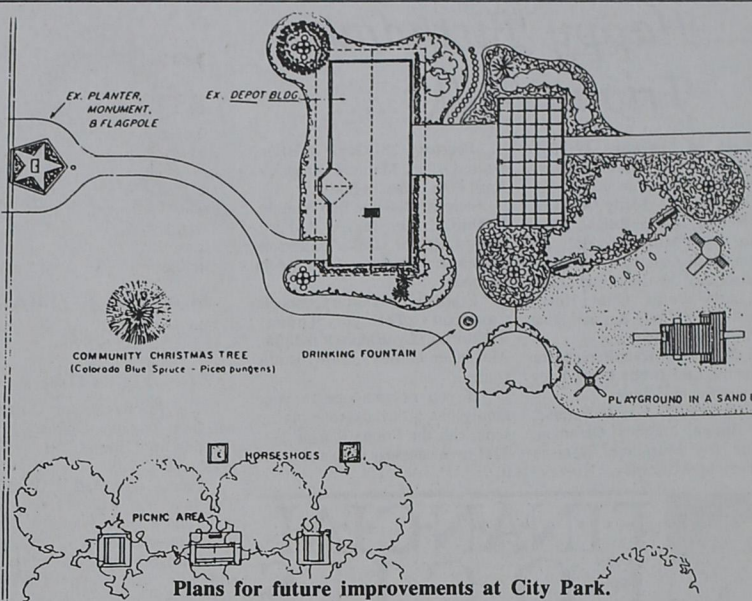
A financial aid workshop will be held in the Friona High School Cafeteria on Monday, February 20, beginning at 7 p.m.

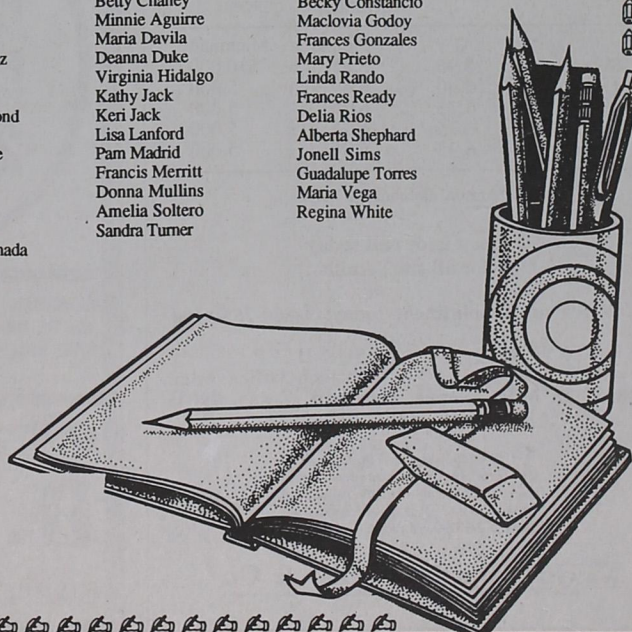

## YOUR EYES

### Are Your Eyes Red?



Red or bloodshot eyes, whether or not there's discomfort involved, generally indicate an irritation of the conjunctiva. That's the membrane that lines the eyelids and covers the exposed surface of the eyeball. It's a sign of trouble that should be avoided or corrected.  
The irritation can be caused by air pollutants, allergies, cosmetics, excess alcohol intake, infection, lack of sleep, overexposure to sunlight, even swimming pool chemicals. Contact lenses that don't fit properly or are worn too long are another contributor.  
Best bet is to avoid the irritation in the first place. Wear glasses or sunglasses on windy days to protect your eyes. Wear goggles when you swim. Remove eye makeup carefully, never go to sleep with makeup on. Get more sleep, don't smoke and limit alcohol intake.  
If contact lenses are a problem, stop wearing them for a few days and see your optometrist to make sure they fit properly. If there is any possible infection present, see the eye doctor promptly.

### A Healthy Approach To Investing (First Of Two Parts)

Common sense tells us it would be bad for our health to eat only one type of food. Just as it's better for our health to choose a variety of foods, it's better for our "fiscal fitness" to choose a well-balanced variety of investments. Investors who diversify among different types of investments, as well as among various industries, are in better shape to handle the inevitable economic ups and downs.

The recent decline in utility stocks illustrates the downfall of putting all your eggs in one basket. Risk-averse investors often look to utility stocks for above-average income and safety. But from late 1993 into 1994, the Dow Jones Utility Index declined about 30 per cent, one of the biggest drops ever in such a short period. Even the strongest companies were dragged down by this unprecedented decline. Some of the best-known utility companies ended up cutting dividends because of lower earnings. Many individual investors looking for stability and income through utility stocks and utility mutual funds were surprised.

Two important lessons can be learned from this decline. First, no industry is immune to the effects of adverse economic conditions on market reaction. Therefore, diversifying investments not only among securities, but also among industries, is the best way to buffer your investments from unexpected declines within one industry.

Second, when an industry suffers a downturn, most securities within that industry are usually affected. However, higher-quality companies are better able to protect earnings and dividends during market declines. For instance, it's

not uncommon for well-managed, financially stable utility companies to pay out only 70 per cent to 80 per cent of company earnings as dividends, even during bad times. Weaker companies, on the other hand, may be forced to pay out virtually all of their earnings or even worse--cut dividends during rough economic periods.

Whether investing in individual stocks or other types of securities, the key is to fill your plate with a variety of wholesome choices. "Diversify and buy quality!" It's the battle cry of serious investors.
