## THE BEALES LAND GRANT.

The subject of the Beales land claim covering a large area of land in New Mexico, Texas and Colorado, is an interesting one to many people, and especially to those who have holdings within the limits of the alleged grant the matter becomes one of absorbing interest The Stock Grower, however, maintains the position it took in the discussion of the matter in the last issue of this paper and now declares further that investigation will prove that this scheme to obtain title to millions of acres of the choicest land of the west will be abortive and can only result in disappointment to the Inter-state Land company who hope to make the concession granted $\omega$ Dr. Beales by the governor of Coahuilla binding in the year 1887 .
In considering some of the facts in the case, to show wherein the claims on which the purchasers from Beales' heirs base their rights to the property are inoperative at the present time, we must first understand that the grant was an empresario grant, and that its very mag nitude kills it as a valid and honest claim to be considered by any court of competent jurisdiction. An empresario grant is a contract under which a person agrees to colonize the land and in consideration of uch colonization be receives certain land aside and apart from what the set tlers receive. Beales did not put any colonists on the land and claims that he was prevented from so doing by certain circumstances of an untoward nature be yond his control. This, of course, he must establish to the full satisfaction of the court before the title to the land could be vested in him, and even should he so establish his right he wonld only get so much of the grant as he was en titled to had be put settlers there, which at best would be-how much?
The northern part of New Mexico is mostly corered with land granta, and
the Beales grant, if good at all, would not include them as they antedate his grant. He could likewise not do any thing with subsequent grants for the rea son that the grantees hold possession by paper title and actual possession. Under the prescription (limitation) of Spain and Mexico ten years would bar Mr. Beales right of action against any claimant of any grant within the boundaries of the so called Beales grant. He has simply slept on his rights for more than a half century and thereby destroyed whatever chances he or his heirs may have had to any land in question claimed by any other person. Under our present territorial statute of limitation the grantees of said sulsequent grants and their successors . have beld possession for more than ten years by actual occupancy and constructively by virtue of the title invested in them. Mr Beales or his heirs not having asserted their rights within ten years, are absolutely precluded from maintaining any action against them, so this settles the status of ail grants subsequent to 1826 , the date o his grant.
Now what remains as affected by the Beales claim is the government land, and in this matter we presume the govern ment is able to take care of itself, and especially so when we take into consider ation that its interests are affected to the extent of about eight-tenths of the are of the alleged claim. Persons who oc cupy land within the limits of the Bealos claim, by tite from the government un der the different rights by which the pab. lic domain is acquired, could never be disturbed because the courts would not pernit a person who has slept on bis rights so long as Beales did, to have pref. erence over a bona fide settler and those who have complied with the law. Hence if there is anything at all coming to Beales and his heirs he will have to get it from the government of the United States out of such purtiou of the public land as has not been disposed of.
The whole subject may be stated briefly as follows and thus dispose of it, from which it would appear that the Inter-state Land company has just about the same right to the area of land claimed by them as Satan would have to a garden plot in the New Jerusalem.

1. Summarized, the Beales grant or claim amounts to nothing at all by reason of its size and for the fur ther weightier reason that Mr. Beales slept too long on his rights, and has not complied with his contracts nor the law ; for under the act of 1854 his claim must be approved by the surveyor general and receive the confirmation of congress, which was not done, though the company may upon general principles of
law try to enforce his claims withou these steps
2. But if there is anything at all in the claim he could only get so much of the grant as he is entitled to had he put the colony on it.
3. If he had done that and thus made his claim good, it does not affect grants which antedate his.
4. Subsequents grants are barred by limitation against Beales, or rather the Beales grant is barred by limitation against any grant or any other claimant who has had possession actual or constructive for more thinn ten years.
5. It don't-affect parties entitled to the land from the government.
6. He has got tu take bis land out of the public domain not disposed of and within the limits of the $80,000,000$ acres.
The Inter-state Land company will have to take another tack if it intends to catch any gudgeons or suckers in wild-cat spec ulations in New Mexico. Let the Beales grant rest in oblivion where the acts of the grantee have consigned it.

## $A$ WISE PLAN

The plan evolved by Mr. G. L. Brooks, as found elsewbere in this issue, to aid in protecting the values of beef cattle from the ranch to the consumer, merits more than a passing notice. The producing part of the cattle industry has been engaged the past twelve months in studying out methods which in their practical operation will enhance the value of beef on foot and save to the producer a portion of the value of the animal which be believes is unjustly taken from him by middlemen. There is not by this assertion a desire expressed on the producer's part to take away from this necessary class the handling of steers in the markets of sale and slaughter any portion of their just remuneration for services rendered, but it is rather the purpose to prevent the tribute, as it is so happily called, from consuming the value of the steer, which is levied by a powerful combination of handlers. This is what has exercised the rangeman's thoughts and caused him to seek for remedies therefor. Certain forces with which we are familar are now in operation to this end and are accomplishing s one good. They promise in time to be very effective and to give to the producer his just share for his part performed in getting the steer ready for the consumer
Mr. Brooks' plan is an entirely practicable one, for while it can be rade so broad in its scope and operation as to include all cattle raisers, yet for its successful development it does not require the
other plans proposed do, and notably the McGiillin plan. The Mutual association that Mr. Brooks would form, contains the idea which in its practical application has made the strongest and most successfal organizations in other fields of effort that the world has ever seen. It appeals for its support to what can be offered by the individual igdependent of what the rest of the world may do, though, of course, the larger the membership the greater the benefits to be receired.
To be brief. it is simply an organization which carefully guards the interests of its members and thus secures for them the thirty-three per cent. of the value of the steer which is now pocketed by some one else to whom it does not belong.
Then, again, in the organization which Mr. Brooks has laid before us there is offered to the cattle raiser an opportunity to make use of certain factors in connec tion with his business which must soon become a part of it whether be wishes it or not. We refer to the refrigerating of beef in the country of its production and the shipping of the product direct to the consumer, and while today the chancea for this method of handling the range product in beef may seen somewhat doubful to many, yet the time is near a hand when it must prevail and is as sure to be a part of the business as that cattle will be raised on the open ranges of the west for many years to come. Improved methods of refrigeration have recently been adopted which make the process an easy and inexpensive one in even a hot country and which does not require ice to produce the cold necessary to put the dressed product of the steer in condition for transportation
Then, again, in considering the plan proposed by our correspondent the possibility of a union of interests being made by the producers and butchers of the conntry is very great and we might say it is oue of the best features of the plan. The relation of the butcher to the producer as an intermediate party between the latter and the consumer is too well un derstond to need more than passing no tice here. The possibilities of good to the membership of the association recom mended by Mr. Brooks are so many we can expect to see more than ordinary in terest developed in the plan and the prac tical adoption of the same for the imme diate and permanent benefit of the cattle raising industry

THe bill to repeal the timber culture, desert land and pre-emption acts failed to pass congress. This was Mr. Sparks' pet measure, and the unhappy land commissioner is now debating with himself whether or not life is worth living. The vital point of difference was that the senate insisted that there should be an appeal from the commissioner of the land office and the secretary of the interior to the courts; the house, on the other hand carrying out the recommendations of Sparks, insisted, with equal pertinacity, that the existing method should not be changed, and that the decision of the commissioner and of the secretary of the in terior should be final.

Therecan be but little doubt in the minds of those conversant with the situa tion that the close of the year 1887 will see a vast appreciation of the values of all cattle and ranch properties. The south west has already felt the influence of the forces that are in operation to bring about this condition of affairs. The Stock Grower has chronicled the purchase of
two or three extensive land grants which are to be used for raising cattle. Another large purchase is on the point of consummation in this territory of cattle, horses and ranches, involving a consideration of nearly $\$ 800,000$. The signs of the times all point to an inevitable rise in the values of cattle stocks and ranch holdings, and from nothing more do these signs appear than the great interest $\ln$ eastern in-
vestment circles being taken in cattle. The men who rushed into the cattle raising business when values were all at the highest at the time of the boom are now retiring as rapidly as possible from the business and are offering to sell. The man with money is following along in the wake of these wrecks of the plains and is taking their place, for he sees that vestment for his capital than cattle raising on the open range in the southwest and elsewhere where cattle can be grown and matured without danger of loss by

As I have said, I am not one of those who believe the great range cattle busibess to be in an insolvent condition or in plan here considered offered from any such standpoint, but rather that as the business is now passing through a crisis in its history and assuming legitimate proportions, the more jrogressive of those engaged in may consider whether or not this plan offers through combined action, intelligent direction and practical method, relief in whole or in part from evils that are known to exist, from the grasping demands of powerfol monopo hies, and at the same time increase insome degree the profits to be realized from the raising of cattle
That the ideas as presented here are in all its bearing, I am well aware. It is quite possible that objections exist that bave not occurred to the writer which wholly impracticable, but i believe it to be worthy of some thought and consideration, and while within itself it may not be means to lead up to the desired end.

I have 't cquired by any no possession has been cquired by any person or persons of 80 , , and or any other number of acres land under the alleged claim, atd tha records of the office disclose no foun lation for a legitimate claim of this char cer. No persons have any legal right o attempt wo control or dispose of public nds of the C nited States upon the pre nse of such clains. Persons who pur hase quit claim deeds from the claim ants alleged private land grants do so ai

I cannot but consider this story about the socalled Beale land grant as all gam. the whole scheme is a big suipraat an p by some Kansas City sharks to sell bo gus qnit claims to suckers. There ought to be a stringetst law to especialty punish such dishonest trausactions. We who years know that there is no forty or ifty land grant there. Beates the ting as land grant there. Besides the govern ment has given everybody on the ground a pauld like to know how a Knnsas City land syndicate can give quit claims to these properties. It's all gammon as I paper
Another vast land grant claim is being prepared to float over northeastern New Mexico abd southeastern Colorado, cov. ering sixty millions of seres of the best
land in the country. This new shadow of interstate larceny is too grandly colossal a steal for even this rosy age of hoodie, atthough as a rule the bigger the steal the easier and safer is its accomplishment. These grants, springing out of the myeterions darkness of the mouldering past, are constantly being shaped in more grasping fashion. At first only modest claims were presented and allowed; then square leagues expanded into leagues square and townships and counties only would appease the land grabbers; and now an estate equal to one of the largest states in the union is wanted, upon the absurd claim that it was granted for certain pur poses ubich have never been fulfilled. After a time some ragged tramp, with vile breath and more life upon him than within him, will come forward with a dirty piece of antiquated parchment, layclaim to the whole western continent. It is time that a check was placed to this wanton waste of the public domain and
the oppression of actual aud valuable set-llers.-Tucson Citizen.

are not annulled and the grantees may cause their legitimate titles to be acknow edged in the American tribunals; that all hese were legitimate which were made Under Mexico up to May 13, 1846, and in Texas to March 3, 1836, and that grants made by congress since that tume are legal. pon this pretext it is claimed that there is a complete chain of title from the Mex. ican government down to the Inter-state
Land company. Having asserted this claim, the company now proposes to take the final step by proceeding against the
owners of the Maxwell land grant, which owners of the Maxwell land grant, which is included in the old Arkansns grant, and
compelling them to establish their title.

On its face the proposition to absorb this large area is a monstrous one. It will re quire something more than the company's ussertions to convince the public of the legality, not to speak of the equity. of al lowing it to absorb this territory, eject its setuiers and owners, and set up a huge cheaper to fight the war with Merico orer cheaper that mar treaty Chiago Tribdne.

Investigation proves that this land cheme bubble was years ago exploded by the cold hand of the law and fact, the Texas \& Pacific railroad company alon expending $\$ 100,006$ to secure the opinions of the best legal minds in the laod as to the validity of the claim. Among others, Hon. Wm. M. Evarts was employed to in restigate the subject, and his report was adverse to its validity. Thus so far as re lates to lands situated within the bound aries of New Mexico, this claim under the Beales' heirs is void, a delusion and a snar o catch iurestors. As regards Texas, Col orado and No Man's Land, there is not even a lurking suspicion that this claim Beales secured the wate un the conarte. Beales secured the grant "upon precisely the same conditions under which Wilso mit the forfeiture of Wilson's claim for Don-compliance with his colonization con ract, and the records further show that in the original grant to Wilson it was specified that this grant should becom void in case of Whron's failure w carry out its provisions. Beales, in turn, alto gether failed to colonize the grant, hence the title to the lands described never be came vested in him. To ascertain if America could not furnish these at a price lower than they rule in England, the British government sent a deputation last year to examine the horses in Canada and our western states. Eighty were selected, mostly in Canada, quite satisfactory for military purposes, and od arrival in Eng land were found to cost, with'all expense, a less price than they can be bought for there. In consequence of it, commis sioners will doubtless be annually sent over here to make other and more numerous selections, affording our farmers an opportunity of disposing of a large number of their horses at fair prices. But in order to do this, more careful attention must be given than usnal, in the selection of both parents for breeding purposes. These need not be high-priced animals. but should be sound, of good figure, and fine, free action. The heigbt may vary from fifteen to sixteen hands, and the
