The cattle sanitary board met at Santa Fe on Monday and Thursday and transact ed considerable business. The most im. portant work done was the formulating of a set of rules and regulations, which will be found elsewhere in this issue.

Ar the meeting of the cattle sanitary board heid at Santa $\mathbf{F e}$, on Tuesday, John W. Poe tendered his resignatig as a member of the same, which wis reluctantly accépted by Governor Ross. Gov ernor Ross at once tendered the appoint ment to W. B. Slaughter, of Socorro, who will without doubt accept the position.

The governor of Colorado has appointed the beef producing industry no longer as cattle inspection commissioners L. B. Tucker, of Denver; B. J. Johnston, of Greeley; William Withers, of Las Animas; George W. Thompson, of Trinidad; George H. Adams, of Crestern; J. F Briak, of Grand Junction; S. S. Green, of Meeker; H. H. Metcalf, of River Bend and D. B. Wyatt. of Greeley.
Thr located rabchmen who put a considerable portion of their investment into land will find in balencing their books at this time that the increase in the value of their realty bas more than offset, in many instances, the depreciation in the value of their cattle. Land poseessions are a good thing to tie to, equally as well in ranches as in town lots or orange groves.
The Texas live stock journals still sing low and whiningly at the free grass fiends, as they affectionately denominate the cattlemen of New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado, etc. Still Texas is not able to protect its own borders from the incoming of pleuro-pneumonia by any law of quarantine, and expends ber vitality in shout iog down those people who have the courage to protect their property and the wel fare of the state or territory from one of the greatest evils of modern times. Texas should take a tumble to herself and quar antine a few of her able editors, at least for a few months.

It would seem to the people of the wild west that the Breeders' Gazette, if it really desires any kind of legislation in the future from the hands of congress to handle efficiently plearo-pneumonia and kindred bovine diseases, should drop its red flag which it is continually shaking in the face of Congressman Hatch, chairman of the committee of agriculture. Mr. Hatch has the "age" and Mr. Sanders ought to know by this time, unless be is past the time for acquiring new impressions of the living present, that Hatch is a bigger man than the editur of the Breeders' Gazette in giving the country what it needs in the matter. Play the gentleman instead of the picador with Mr. Hatch for a while Mr. Benders. Results may justify you in this course of action.
The Srock Grower has maintained during the depression that has existed in cattle values for the past two years that the year 1887 wrould find the cattle raiser approaching the most prosperous career for the industry. The indications all point at this writing to the fulfillment of the good predictions of The Stock Grower. Cattle values all along the line are appre ciating, except in a few lgcalities governed by local causes. The best posted men in

There is a bright lining th the cloud that has temporarily obscured the success of plains cattle rais-
ing.
The department of agriculture,through its agents of the animal industry bureau, is doing most commendable work toward the suppression of contagious bovine diseases. The burean, now as in the past, is well organized and faithful to the trust reposed in it by the department. The expiring gronns of the Drovers' Journal and other papers of like disinterestedness for the highest welfare of the beef pro ducers, are now few and far between. Newspapers that realize the danger that lurks in the diseased cow and which are not subsidized to the stock yard interests of Chicago, 5 el that the agitation of the question of bovine diseases has resulted in great good, and that the public 'sense has at last been aroused, so that protective measures will be given the comutry, independent of the tricksters at Chicago and elsewhere, who would imperil the live stock interests of the land in order to gratify the commercial greed of the Chicago middlemen.
A writer in the Breeders' Gazette protests strongly against the practice of de horning, claiming that the; operation is dangerons, and neither necessary nor advisable. This tender-hearted individual says that to saw off the tips of the horns is all that is requisite to curb the vicious spirit of the brute, which is one of the main arguments of the advocates of the dehorning process. He thinks that to sacrifice the horn at calfhond is a piece of unnecessary vandalism. Mr. Warfield, the writer, has always undoubtedly been on the right side of the fence when Sir Taurus was in one of his unamiable moods. Nevertheless the question of dehorning is meeting with favorable consideration in many portions of the country and the practice is gaining friends.

Armour Predicts Eigher Prices.
New York advices of the 5 th instant say that P. D. Armour has returned to tha: city from his southern and western
trip. Mr. Armour is most enthusfastic over the evidences of prosperity everywhere seen in the west, and says that prices for everything are on an upward turn. The most significant statement made by this genius of the mercantile world, was that cattle will never be so cheap again as they have been the past eighteen months. The demand for beef during the coming prosperous days of the country will keep much ahead of the supply and will work a radical change in values which will be highly beneficial to the producers. Armour predicte that the Pacific const will consume all the beer at good prices that can be raised in Arizona, Washington Territory. He reasons that Washington Territory. He reasons that
the population is running rapidly ahead
of of the capacity of the range country to grow beet, and that with the era of good times everwhere prevalent in this country and with people eating meat among the laboring classes who have during the dull period only been fed with it once or twice week, the times for the cattle producers will speedily improve.

## Dead Onto Sparks.

Representative Gifford, of Dakota, in a published interview in New York the other day, expressed the opinion that the retention of Sparks as commissiouer of the general land office, is a part of the democratic plan to suppress Dakota's claims to statehood. He says it is the policy of the administration to throw every obstacle it possibly can in the way of the development of Dakota, for the purpose of delaying the time when Dakota must be admitted to the Union. Mr. Gifford is very bitter in his denunciation of the idministration. He says that Sparks is retained through the influence of southern capitalists nod members of congress who are straining every nerve to turn the tide of immigration that way. Sparks also has large tracts of unsettled land in Lllinois and is individually interested in keeping the settlement and development of the country: east of the Mississippi.

## Governor Boutt Talle Bense.

A Washington special of April 4th says: The New York Tribune of today publishes the following:
Ex-Governor Routt, of Colorado, remarked the other day that the day of fancy cuttle growing in the far west has gone by. "The cattle growing of the future," he continued "will be on a businese basis right down to the marrow. The profits will be moderate and even small, but steady. In fact, the best days of cattle growing are coming, the days when it will be a sufe and steady business. The young fellows who used to come out west with the money of their fathers', ride around on horse-back ir flashy cowboy suits, and charge the expense up to profit and loss (generally loss), have been sent to the rear. Their operations seem to de preciate stock growing greatly and to bring preciate stock growing greaily and to bring cattle growing of the future will be in the hands of experienced men with a prac. tical knowledge of the husiness."

## New Mexico.

As will be seen in the regulations is sued by the New Mexico cattle sanitary bnard no provision has been made for the protection of that portion of the territory entered by the Santa Fe railroad. The board has not yet appointed a veterinary surgeon, but will, no doubt, arrange for the efficient fulfillment of all the pro visions of the law at some subsequent meeting. The board is somewhat disap pointed at the small amount of funds placed at its disposal by the terms of the law, they estimating that the revenue which the board can have to carry forward its work with will not exceed $\$ 6,500$. The framers of the law labored under the impression that the taxable valuation of
the cattle of New Mexico would amount this year to about $\$ 30,000,000$, and thus placed the per cent. of taxation for the uses of the sanitary bond at one-half of one mill. To have secured what is necesary, unless the greatent economy is now ex. ercised by the board with the small sum placed at their command, the rate should have been at least five mills. However, we believe that guod work will be done and the board give to the territory in connection with the department of agricult.

A Bealty Law．
The last legislature of New Mexico passed the subjoined law having refer－ ence to land rights，by reason of a ten years＇occupancy of the land．
Section 1．It shall be lawful for any person who has been，himself，or in con－ nection with his granturs or ancestors，in
undisputed possession of a parcel of land for a period exceeding ten years，under claim of ownership，to apply to the pro－ bate court of the county in which such land is situated．for a certificate of own－ ership in the following manner．He will give notice by publication in at least inve successive issues of a weekly newspaper，
published in the county in which the land so claimed is situated，that on a day therein mentioted，which shall be the day of the next session of the probate court，after the expiration of such adver tisement，he will apply to the probate court for a certicate of ownersinip of a
certain parcel of land，describing the same，so that it can be readily distinguish－ ed．On the day designated，be shall ap－ or due notice of publication with proof or due notice of publication of said no－
tice，and shall proauce such evidence as he desires as to his possession of the premises in question．
SEC．2．Any parties desiring to he heard in opposition to such application shall be heard by the conk and shall have the right to present such evidence nesses as they see fit．If the court is niot satisfied from evidence that the applicant has been in undisputed possession of such land for a periad excoeding ten years，it shall deny the application．If it is satis－ fied that the applicant has been in such possession for over ten years，and is entitled o the ownership ohereor，it shal issue a certincate which shal be signed by the judge and countersigned by the clenk，reciting in substance the applica－ is entitled to the ownership of such land． Such certificate shall in all courts and places be held to be prima facie avidence of the ownership by the applicant of the premises therein described．
