

The Cattle Trust, as we understand its operation, and as it has already been outlined in these columns, is like the Trusts now in operation with which the public are generally acquainted. There is nothing mysterious in its structure. The gentlemen promoting the enterprise have simply adopted the principles of organization that have been made successful in two instances we know of. It is not believed that the Cattle Trust "Combine" have any swollen ideas of a philanthropic nature in organizing for the protection and promotion of their interests. They have undoubtedly seen that the most successful plan for profits has been put in operation by three or four men in Chicago that has yet become a part of the beef industry of the United States. Under the name of the "American Cattle Trust" they have organized a similar institution and hope for the same opportunities to handle the work of their Trust in as successful manner. Knowing the power of organized capital with the faint restrictions imposed under a trust organization, THE STOCK GROWER is not able to see how or by what method it is likely to permanently benefit the producer. It would be glad to feel that it were otherwise, that these men who have given so much time and intelligent work to the elaboration of a plan could come before the producers and consumers of beef and say we have at length found a way whereby we can take from the middleman and give to each his proper share of what is now torn from him by the greedy men who have the business under their control. The Cattle Trust "combine" say simply, "it is a big thing," and seek to absorb the investments of the rangemen by the promise that they will control the business by the simple aggregation of dollars, or what property they can induce the producers to entrust to them. They tell you, as a sort of tantalizing bait, that only those who own certificates of the "combine" will receive benefits; that you must hurry along if you are to join the procession. If there ever was in the history of such enterprises a case where anybody except the promoters was par-ticularly benefited we would say, give it a trial. But history does not record

an instance of the kind.

DAKOTA has followed Montana terri- James H. Campbell, tory in quarantining cattle from or through the following states and territories, believing that they are liable to carry disease: New York, Illinois, New Jersey, Virginia, Texas, Vermont and Canada. Cattle will be permitted to pass through the territory when going to Washington territory or Oregon, provided, shippers agree not to unload while en route, but will arrange to feed and water the cattle on the cars. If, however, cattle are bound for Dakota and Montana, they must be quarantined ninety days before they will be permit-ted to enter. In all cases cattle should be accompanied by a certificate of health specifying the state on territory the cattle come from, and the destination thereof. This applies to emigrant shipments which includes live stock.

The public are hardly aware of the magnitude of the power growing up in their midst under the name of "trusts." We are all familiar with corporations. We know where to find them. We know what their powers are. We can call them to account. The shareholders can inspect them. They are the creatures of law, and are subject to its limitations. These have been defined by judicial decisions extendnicety what any corporation can do, and what it can not. Nearly all corporations ceeded without express public authority. So also they are limited as to the nature of their undertakings. A railroad company can not engage in manufacturing or genmanufacturing company cannot engage in navigation, or banking, or publishing newspapers, or supplying gas to cities, or speculating in land, or in stocks, or in any trade not specified in charter. These limitations are in the interest of the shareholders as well as of the public. They are grounded in reason, and they form the substratum of corporate existence everywhere. The "trust" is the sphinx of corporation

except that it is not a corporation at all. It may own and control many corporations, but it is bound by no law. There are no limitations upon it, not even those of time and space. Neither the public kind of business or in many different

They call themselves a trust, and invite the public to subscribe money to carry the plan into effect. They also invite the producers of the article to put their establishments into the trust, wanted it, and they do not want it.

They get a certain number of producers with their plant into the trust and a certain amount of money into the treasury. Then they begin to force the other producers to come in by employing their heavy capital to crush them if they do not. #### What They Say of the Cattle Trust.

Last week we called attention to this new deal for controlling the meat supply of the country. This huge concern is a monopoly of the worst kind. Few people realize the irresponsible power that is held by these "Trusts". They are regular confidence games. Butcher's Journal.

Ex Governor Routt has gone east again to complete arrangements leading to the organization of the American Beef Trust company. The governor thinks the plans are progressed far enough now to have the semblance of success, and he believes the scheme will soon assume tangible shape. The cattle men of the west have lately had their eyes opened to the existence of some agency by which they have been systematically robbed of fair profits, and are moving for an adjustment of their affairs upon a proper and just basis as between the producer and consumer. They object to having their business crushed out by extortionate rings of middlemen, and it is in this interest that Governor Routt is now devoting the most of his time. - Field and Farm.

Rumors are current of a huge and secret combination of Colorado and New Mexico cattlemen being formed for the purpose of establishing an "American Cattle Trust company," modeled in some particulars after the lately discussed Mc-Gillan scheme, and designed especially to fight the dressed beef syndicate of Chi cago. Whether such an undertaking will materialize or not remains to be seen, but it is certain that cattlemen are busy devising means to bring the dressed beef monopoly to grief. Not enough is known concerning the movement to furnish points on which the probabilities of its success could be intelligently discussed. is not strong, although we are inclined to wish this one well because of the avowed purpose, announced above, which it has in view. About all that is known about the American Cattle Trust is that it is an institution backed by immense wealth, and that it proposes handling, dressing and canning beeves at Chicago, in which respects it in no wise differs from the existing beef monopoly. Hence the distrust and opposition of the range papers, which seem to think it is a move having for its object and end the defeat of the proposed refrigerators in Texas and other sections of the range country. - Dallas News.

> Big "deals" seem to be the order of the day in cattle matters, as well as in other important branches of American industry, for close upon the beels of Mr. McGillin's gigantic co-operative scheme comes the announcement of the organization of the American Cattle Trust, with a capital stock of \$25,000,000, a working fund of \$12,000,000 cash, a pooling of vast ranching interests, the securing of special yard. age rights, and a complete dressed-beef plant in this city, refrigerator cars to be perated between Chicago and the seaboard, and four ocean steamships to transport the product to foreign shores! And it is not merely the dream of an enthusiast, but seems to be already un fait accompli, as the handling of the first shipment from the west consigned to the Trust is mentioned in our market notes, appearing in another column. The organization seems to be modeled somewhat after the fashion of the Standard Oil company and the Cotton Seed Oil Trust, as the names of such men as Nels Morris, Thomas Sturges, John L. Routt, and others of equal prominence are contained in the list of those most intimately identified with the enterprise, it would seem as if the concern had not only strong financial backing, but substantial support from leading representatives of the range cattle trade. Prominent Chicago, New York, London and Paris bankers—including the Rothchild house—are also reported as backers of the Trust. That there are brains and money enough back of this latest and greatest cattle "combine" no one can question, and its operation will be observed with keen interest by the cattle-growers of the entire West.-Breeders Gazette.

A large amount of nonsense has been written about the organization, plans and purposes of the American Cattle Trust company, organized by Governor Routt and others. The company is the outgrowth of the discussion at the late meeting in this city of the International Range association. The plan of the organization was suggested by Mr. E. M. McGillin, of Cleveland, Ohio, who read a paper favoring a corporation composed of all the cattle growers in the United States, which should, in addition to raising cattle, slaughter them and sell the meat directly to consumers. The plan is impracticable because it is impossible to get all cattle owners to join such an association. But it suggested the thought that a source of profit could be found in a corporation composed of men who possess advantages for slaughtering and selling beef and men who own large numbers of cattle. This is just the kind of a corporation which was formed, and is called the American Cattle Trust company.—Dencer

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THE SWAN BROS. ASSIGN.

Alexander H. Swan, the cattle king of Wyoming, and John Swan, his brother, comprising the firm of Swan Bros., made an assignment on the 14th instant for \$1,100,000. He had lately returned from England, where he had endeavored unsuccessfully to negotiate bonds that he had been carrying heavily, and this is said to have precipitated his assignment. it is the head of the Swan Land and Cattle ompany, and has done a vast deal for the tock and land interests of Wyoming, Neska and Iowa. The Swan Bros. have been doing an extensive business throughout the west, and Professor Stewart says in the Country up to this time had met their engagements promptly, and enjoyed the highest degree of public confidence and credit.

The direct cause of the suspension was the action brought against A. H. Swan by the German Savings bank, of Davenport, skim-milk for his young stallion. The firm is interested in Chicago, Buffalo, New York, Kansas City, Cleveland, St. Joseph, St. Louis, Sioux City, Philadelphia. Omaha and Cheyenne, and is compowed of A. H. and John Swan. Henry S Swan has not been connected with the firm for some time. He is now ennected with the firm of C. T. Lindsey A Co. wholesale rubber goods, Omalia, and will not in any way be affected by the failure of his brothers.

Alexander H. Swan is the head of the Swan Land and Cattle company and has done a vast deal for the stock and land interests of Wyoming, Nebraska and Iowa. His chief interests in the latter state are the Swan ranch at Indianola, and in Nebraska the Ogallala Land and Cattle company. Among his creditors is W. A. Payton of Omaha, to the extent of a loan of \$40,000.

Swan is as well known in Omaha as in Chevenne, and he is a man of severely strict habits, abstemious and hard working, and his assignment is readily attributed to engaging too largely in organizing new companies. He was one of the first to introduce English and Scotch capital to invest in American ranches, and was for some years very successful in that. He was the projector of the South Omaha land syndicate, although he was disap-

pointed in his intention to dispose of the bonds of the syndicate to Scotch capitalists and the proposed name of New Edinburg was discarded for that of South Omaha. The organization has been highly profitable to those who were able to carry the bonds, and none have been losers. He was largely interested in the Council Bluffs stock yards before the South Omaha vards were started. He was a director of the Ogallala Land and Cattle company, director in the South Omaha land syndicate and a stockholder in the Union stock vards company.

> There are many good bone and muscle making foods for a young stallion, and J has given one good combination with the he might better it, in his location by feeding N. P. linseed meal, obtainable at Cleveland. Let the proportion be: 2 lbs. of ground oats, 2 lbs. of wheat bran, 2 lbs. of N. P. linseed meal, with 6 lbs. of cut clover hay. Moisten moderately the cut clover hay, and mix the ground feed well into it. Give part of the skim-milk upon this at each feed. This is a model ration to develop bone and muscle in a colt, care being taken not to over-feed. Mixing the ground feed with the cut clover will keep his digestive organs in a healthy condition. This is important.

'As the proper age for service, horsemen differ, but twenty four months is a safe limit. It judiciously handled, he might perhaps serve two or three mares between 20 and 24 months. This is the educational age, and he may be controlled and made to do his work in a civilized way. The attendant should be able to control him with a word, and in thus doing he is fixing his character and preventing his becoming as fractions and violent as are badly educated stallions. #### Knocked Out.

On pleuro-pneumonia, the New Mexico Stock Grower, says:

"We could stamp out pleuro by inoculating all cattle that have been exposed to infection, spaying all the females and keeping such stock in secure fences until fatted and slaughtered. As vaccination is a protection against small-pox, so would inoculation be to cattle in actual contact with doubtful herds, and beyond these circumstances, inoculation would not be justifiable."

The following remarks from Principal Walley of the Royal Veterinary College of Edinburgh, is a "deadener" on the

Stock Grower's theory: "The very conditions under which store stock are placed in their wanderings, exercise a powerful predisposing influence in the contraction of such maladies as the one under consideration; but it must not be assumed from this remark that pleuropneumonia or any similar malady can be engendered in the system of an animal by any treatment to which it is in the power of man to subject it. Exhaustion, starvation and exposure are powerful only as factors in this direction, in so far as they place an animal in a very unfavorable condition to fight against disease producing germs-nothing more."-Texas Farm and Ranch.

#### A Range Pest.

Some of our prominent stockmen of the Shonkin range inform us that large grey wolves have appeared on the range south of the river in greater numbers than have been known for years past. We are inclined to the opinion that this is not due to natural increase but to the effect of immigration, as the animals do move in considerable numbers from one section to anthe poisoned baits that have been placed to catch them-in fact it is stated they will not touch them only when driven by extreme hunger. They are proving very destructive to young calves, and the losses from this cause will be no small item. We would suggest that the example of Sun river stockmen in this emergency would be a good one to follow, vix: to organize a club and secure hounds for the chase and go on a grand round-up for the beasts. A few chases would cause the herd to move on to less favored sections. -Fort Benton (Mont.) Press.



The first grass that horses get will have a tend-ency to loosen their bowels and weaken their system. While it may be good for them in the end, it should not take the place of other feed at once. A grain ration should be kept up for some time after horses are turned out upon grass.

Montroes, one of the best three year-olds on the running turf this season, is out of the eleganty-bred mare Patti. She was purchased by Mitton Young at the close of her racing career, but was so victous that she could not be hobbled. This being the case Mr. Young refused to breed her to one of his high-priced stallions, being fearful that she might kick and permanently injure him, but sent her to Duke of Montrose, for whom he had paid but \$500. The result of the union was Montrose, a colt now worth \$10,000.

J. B. Haggin, the Californian whose stable of runners is the largest in America, and whose es-tablishment for the breeding of thoroughbreds is not equaled by any in the world, is also fond of trotters, and hereafter will breed them. #### Chicago Market Nota.

From Breeders' Gazette of May 12. At this time last year the range of the hog market was \$3 50 to \$4.25, while two years ago it was \$4.25 to \$4.50.

Clipped sheep were quoted at \$3.00 to \$5.25 one year ago today, and at \$2.50 to

\$4.25 on the corresponding date in 1885. The trade in veal calves has been reasonably active, but at low prices, the large supply causing a decline to \$2.50 to \$5.25. the latter quotation buying extra qualities.

Beef cattle are fifty to seventy five cents lower than last year, choice to extra grades then readily commanding \$5.25 to \$5.75. In stockers a difference of only about twenty-five cents per 100 be. is noted.

Texas cattle are not yet coming along in very considerable numbers, but the tide has fairly set in, and from this time on will steadily increase in volume. Grassers sell anywhere from \$1.75 to \$2.25 for bull-to \$3.50 for choice steers. Corn-fed lots are quoted at \$4.00 to \$4.40.

The receipts of cattle for the week ended May 7 were much the largest ever recorded at this season of the year. They were greater than could be handled, save at the serious sacrifice of prices, the market declining twenty-five to forty cents. Great depression also characterized the eastern and British markets.

From parties who have recently returned from the western plains it is learned that the losses among the cattle during the last winter were not nearly as severe as was generally supposed. Montana was the greatest sufferer, the mortality there amounting to from five to six per cent. in the native and from twenty to twenty five per cent. in the through cattle. In Colorado and Wyoming it is claimed the loss did not exceed five per cent.

Considerable has, leen said of late concerning the "Cattle Trust" combine, but there are few who consider it an accomplished fact. Such, however, it is. The first shipment of stock consigned to that company arrived at the yards on Monday last, and consisted of five car loads of meal-fed cattle belonging to the Union Cattle company, whose feeding barns are at Gilmore Nebraska. Nelson Morris, of Chicago, is at the head of the affair, the capital stock of which is said to be \$25,-000,000(?).

At Saturday's meeting of the live stock exchange resolutions against the long and short haul clause of the inter-state commerce law were passed. It was also resolved that the members of the exchange would not consent to furnish the railroads the weights of live stock to enable them to "bill according to weight," instead of by the car as formerly. A rule giving countrymen the right to prefer charges against any member suspected of unfair dealing with them was also adopted.

#### Spaying Heifers.

By request I send you for publication a simple and safe method of spaying heifer calves, as there is a general belief that only a veterinarian or some one schooled at the business can perform the operation. A crotch made of three poles about six feet long is needed to raise the hind parts of the calf from the ground; this part of the animal should be raised about two feet from the ground. A pritch stick should then be employed to spread the hind legs of the animal. A single pulley will be sufficient to raise the calf to the required position. With a person holding the head you are ready for the operation. Make an incision just below the bag or udder downward, and about four inches long. The position of the body will throw the intestines forward. By inserting the thumb and forefinger the operator will find first the bladder then the womb; let him draw the latter out gently and with a sharp instrument cut off the three projecting tonsils; replace the womb and with a curved needle and a strong, waxed linen thread make five square stitches, tieing each separately, being careful that each stitch sews up the skirt or inner lin ing as well as the hide, and the job is complete and a safe operation is performed, and when understood and practiced by a skillful operator it requires but about two minutes. The derrick, pulle, pritch stick and one-half inch rope should always be in shape and a part of the round.

#### The Bainfall Deficiency.

The continued deficiency of rainfall in the United States east of the Rocky Mountains is a little discouraging to the agricultural interests. Especially is this the case where the glowing midday heat of May rivals that of July in intensity.

The dryness of the season over this continent apparently extends throughout the tropics into equatorial South America. Captain Sansom, of the steamer Ailsa, which arrived here on Monday from Columbian ports, reports but very little rain on the morthern coasts of Columbia. From April/10 to 30 there were but four rainy days. Captain Reynolds, of the steamer City of Alexandria, also reports almost continuous fair weather on his recent voyage to Vera Cruz and thence to Havana.

This rainlessness, within the tropics, despite the fact that the trade winds are usually saturated with vapor, is due immediately to the fact that the period of cyclonic disturbances has not yet arrived. When the tropical cyclones commence, as they usually do by June 1, we may then hope for a larger rainfall over our continent, though we may not have to wait till June.—New York Herald.

#### Range Bred Bulls.

Messrs. Davies and Lesinsky, of San Augustine, New Mexico, have demonstrated that bulls can be bred on the range successfully and profitably. These gentlemen realized that there was a demand for such animals among the stockmen of range country. They believed it could be supplied and determined to do They secured thorough bred Hereford and shorthorn bulls from noted breeders in Missouri and other states, which were bred to native cows. The calves were allowed to run with their dams upon the range without shelter or feed. About two months ago Mr. Davies drove to El Paso from the home rauch 159 head of yearling grade bulls that had been sold to parties in Mexico. They were in excellent condition, good color, long round bodies, broad flat bones, smooth head and horns. They were wellgrown and hardy in appearance. They were balf, three-quarter and seven-eighths grade.—Cattle Grower and Flockmaster.

#### Guernsey Cattle.

In the English channel, off the coast of France, are the three islands, Guernsey, Jersey and Alderney, called the Channel islands. Un each of these the cattle are kept pure. Laws are enforced, preventthose of the others. The cattle of the three islands are so similar that they are quite appropriately classed together under the name of Channel island cattle. Though not intermixed by crossing for over one hundred years, and bred for the special purpose of producing fine milk and butter, the nearness with which they represent one type suggests a common origin. They probably descended from cattle brought from the adjacent shores of France. The Guernsey cattle are the largest and coarsest of the three divisions of the breed. On this account some claim that they are bettter than either the Jerseys or the Alderneys for crossing on common cattle.

Breeding Stock Exempt From Duty. In June, 1886, Mr. Chapman and the Carpenter-Stanley Cattle Co., both of New Mexico, entered in the United States custom house in El Paso about 300 yearling beifers and 400 two-year-old heifers, alleging that they were imported specially for breeding purposes, and were in consequence exempt from duty. The collector of customs refused to admit them

without payment of duties, and the parties paid the duties, amounting to about \$825, under protest, as prescribed in the United States statutes. An appeal was taken from the ruling of the collector of customs to the secretary of the treasury, who held that on account of age and the low grade of the animals they were not exempt under the statute respecting animals imported specially for breeding purposes. As soon as the secretary's decision was received the parties, by attorney, in El Paso, immediately commenced action against the collector in the United States district court at El Paso to recover back the amount so paid under protest, and to test the question of the admissibility of such animals on the free list. The cases were tried at last term of the United States district court here, before a jury (April 9, 1887), and resulted in each case in favor of the complainants, the judgment of the court being that the money be paid back to the parties from whom it was received, the animals being exempted from duty.-Cattle Grower and Flockmaster.

#### The Cow Fell From Grace.

James Davidson has been slow to go into the improved stock business, but finally he got started, and at the first crack astonished the natives. Mr. Davidson owns a common everyday cow, meek and mild mannered with only one tail, yet she has acted in a manner calculated to destroy all confidence in her long established character for virtue and upright conduct as an all wool and yard wide family cow. After a protracted and unwarranted absence from her home, she returned the other day, with a young wabbly legged Shorthorn calf, and a short diminutive Jersey calf, born her legitimate offspring having equal claims upon the lacteal duct: and while one would soluce himself on one side of the cow, the other would draw sustenance from the other side in blissful ignorance of the great wrong each had done to the established rules of cow society and a long line of precedents, to which we had grown accustomed and cherished as peculiar to a well established rule of bovine etiquette. For the shock of this uncalled for incident, we will have to console ourselves with the fact that for innovations and progress in the cattle business Sarcoxie takes the biscuit.-Sarcoxie Vindicator.

#### Montana's Quarantine Law.

Quarantine laws and proclamations are occasi oning no little inconvenience at the eastern border of Montana. Two outfits are now held there, and neither will be admitted. One concern is from Canada, but brings no bill of health. These cattle are on their way to Washington Territory. The other outfit is from western Penusylvania, a state that is absolutely quarantined, and can be admitted under no circumstances except after a ninety days' quarantine. Two others have been turned back, one a few cows belonging to an emigrant outfit on its way to Washington Territory. Whatever may be the degree of wisdom contained in the law, it is inexorable, and no relief can be granted. 



The following rosolutions were passed by the the Cattle sanitary board held at Las Vegas, New Mexico, May 20, 1887:
WHEREAS, The Cattle sanitary board of New

has good reason to believe and does lieve that a certain contagious and infectious disease, commonly known as pleuro-pneumonia, exists and has become epidemic in the states of New York, New Jersey and Illinois, also in the foreign countries of Scotland, England and Canada: and

WHEREAS, Cattle have been known to have been whereas, Cattle have been known to have been exposed to said contagious disease and infected thereby without exhibiting any marked symptoms of the disease for a period of at least six months from and after such exposure; therefore be it Resolved. That the governor of New Mexico be and-hereby is respectfully requested to publish his preciamation prohibiting the importation of any horizon extla into the territory of New Mexico.

of any bovine cattle into the territory of New Mexico from either of the above named states and countries except upon the following condi-tions and restrictions, to-wit:

First-All bovine cattle coming from either of the above mentioned states and countries, before being permitted to enter the territory of New Mexico must be accompanied by reliable doon-Mexico must be accompanied by reliable docu-mentary evidence under oath to the satisfaction of the inspector that they and each of them have been outside of said states and countries for at least six months preceding their arrival at the boundary line of said territory, and that during that time they or any of them have shown no symp time they or any of them have shown no symp-toms of such disease. And in addition thereto the inspector, whose duty it may be to inspect such cattle must be satisfied from actual inspec-tion, that none of such cattle at the time of in-

spection show any symptoms of such disease.
Second—All such cattle coming from either of the above named states and countries will be per-mitted to entersaid territory after inspection only

by way of Raton in said territory.

Third—All bovine cattle which by any route di ect or indirect could have come from either of eve named states and countries, shall be spected before being admitted into said territory by such inspectors as shall be appointed for the purpose by the Cattle sanitary board of New Mex-ico.

Fourth-If upon such inspection and proof it shall be ascertained that any of the cattle spected may be driven or imported into the territory of New Mexico without violating any of the terms and conditions of this proclamation or any of the provisions of the law of said territory aplicable thereto, then the same may be admitted nto said territory otherwise their admission is hereby prohibited.

Fifth-In a dition to the foregong conditions, the inspector of any cattle under this proclama-tion may require the importer to furnish satisfactory documentary evidence under eath of all the places where the cattle have been during the six months preceding the inspection. And if the inspector shall have good reason to suspect that any of the material proofs offered by the importer are untrue, he may refuse a permit for the entry of the cattle until such reasonable time as may be

of the cathe until section in the truth.

Sixth—When the inspector grants a permit for proclamation, the the entry of cattle under this proclamat same shall be in writing and accompany tle to their destination, and while the cattle are in transit the owner or person in charge shall pro-duce such permit on demand to any other inspector or any other person whose interests may be affected by the importation of diseased cattle, and a refusal to produce such permit shall render the cattle liable to another inspection at cost of the
