The undercurrent of feeling towa the Cattle Trust "combine" is a slant eyed deeply suspicious one. "A rose by any other name, etc;" but in this instance if the promoters of the Trust had called it a society for the propaga-
tion of correct notions for the acquirement of power in order to make a competing market for beef without calling in a member of the Big Four, there would have been much more satisfaction on the part of beef producers as to the probable outcome of the Trust for the enhancement of cattle values.
It has come to the notice of THE Tork (inower that W. A. J. sparks upon hearing that the courts had dis missed the criminal indictments which had been found against a leading ranch man and an altogether hono rable citizen of the southwest. for alleged unlawful fencing of the public land and being advised of the utter incompetency of the courts as instruments to divest private citizens of their property at once rose above the courts, ignored all decisions of his predecessors, and nullified an act of congress by the promulgation of an order, wherein he declares that all the land within the boundaries of the san Rafael de la Zanja grant in Arizona, except four square leagues, which the United states surveyor-general recommended to congress, is a part of the public domain. In this matter, the lunatic commissioner denies that private citizens have any rights which he shall respect. The supreme court will un doubtedly protect the lawful owners of the La Zinja grant by the restoration to them of what Sparks in the name of reform would rob them. The suffering west cries out against the despotic ac tions of a man who in the discharge of his duties. knows no law but the hallu cinations of a diseased brain and the promp,tings of a corrupt heart.

## THE "COMBINE."

Elsew: ere will be found an instruct ve esssay on "Trusts." As the range cattle industry is asked to become inter ested to a considerable extent in this somewhat popular method of organization of extensive commercial interest of a similar character, The stock GROWER is able to give its readers con siderable information in the columns referred to as to the scope, responsibility and general purpose of the power called a "Trust." It is at this time particularly good reading. The western cattle rais ing industry has looked a long time for ome Moses to strike the rock that would send forth a living stream of wealth, and which would enable it to gird up its loins against the foes that have oppressed it. The cattle raising business of the west requires only one or wo protective features thrown about it to make it profitable in the highest degrec. It is not a tale that is told as
some may think. With a proper conservation of the profits which belong to the producer and some force in opera tion that will give him a chance to retain what belongs to him when his product goes into the markets of slaughter, the cattle business on the open range under ordinary conditions, is one of the best enterprises for the safe and profita ble employment of capital. The Cattle Trust, as we understand its operation, and as it has already been outlined in these columns, is like the Trusts now in operation with which the public are generally acquainted. There is nothing mysterious in its structure. The gentlemen promoting the enterprise have simply adopted the principles of organ ization that have been made successful n two instances we know of. It is not believed that the Cattle Trust "Combine" have any swollen ideas of a philanthropic nature in organizing for the protection and promotion of their interests. They have undoubtedly seen that the most suecessful plan for profits has been put in operation by three or four men in Chicago that has yet become a part of the beef industry of the Inited states. Under the name of the "A merican Cattle Trust" they have organized a similar institution and hope for the same opportunities to handle the work of their Trust in as successful manner. Knowing the power of organ ized capital with the faint restrictions imposed under a trust organization The Stock Grower is not able to see how or by what method it is likely to permanently benefit the producer. It would be glad to feel that it were otherwise, that these men who have given so much time and intelligent work to the elaboration of a plan could come before the producers and consumers of beef and say we have at length found a way whereby we can take from the middleman and give to each his proper share of what is now torn from him by the greedy men who have the business under their control. The Cattle Trust "combine" say simply, "it is a big thing," and seek to absorb the investments of the rangemen by the promise that they will control the business by the simple aggregation of dollars, or what property they can induce the producers to entrust to them. They tell you, as a sort of tantalizing bait, that only those who own certificates of the "combine" will receive benefits; that you must hurry along if you are to join the procession. If there ever was in the history of such enterprises a case where anybody except the promoters was particularly benefited we would say, give it a trial. But history

## Spaying Eieifors.

By request I send you for publication a simple and safe method of spaying heifer calves, as there is a general belief that only a veterinarian or some one schooled the business can perform the operation. A crotch made of three poles about six feet long is needed to raise the hind parts al the calf from the ground; this part of the animal should be raised about two feet from the ground. A pritch stick should then be employed to spread the lifind legs of the animal. A single pulley will be sufficient to raise the calf to the required position. With a person holding the head you are ready for the operation. Make an incision just below the bag or udder downward, and about four inclues long. The position of the body will throw the intestines forward. By inserting the thumb and forefinger the operator let him draw the latter out gently and with a sharp instrument cut off the three projecting tonsils; replace the womb and linen thread make five square stitches, tieing each separately, being careful that each stitch sews up the skirt or inner lin ing as well as the hide, and the job is complete and a safe operation is performed, and when understood and practiced by a skillful operator it requires but about two minutes. The derrick, pulle;-, pritch
stick and one-half inch rope should alstick and one-half inch rope should al-
ways be in shape and a part of the ronnd-
up outflt. When the roper brings the calf over the animal but is the calf is to be marked and branded the spaying should be done last. An operator who loses more heifers by spaying than bull calves by castration is a pror one; I do not, bowever apply this observation to grown she cattle Esor in Range Journal.
