this enormous loss now entailed by the present methods of trinsportation. This matter of transportation should be made a subject of earnest attention on the part of

An article of prime necessity like the improved car must take the place of hie death pens now used. ## A GIGANTIC ORGANIZATION

The Stock Ghower mentioned three weeks ago that a scheme was on foot among the rattlemen of the northern country for the consolidation of the herds and an organization of interests under pooing system. Tolayy we are enabled o give further details and say that a scheme has been formed for organizing the largest cattle company ever known in this or any other country, controlling han dreds of thousands of cattle and range arger than many states. The originators of the plan are the cattlemen of the Wyo. ming Stock association, with headquarters at Cheyenue. The matter has been in contemplation for some time, but has been kept secret until the situation was such as to allow of open movement in the direction of securing control of such herds and ranges as were desired. The failure of the Swan Brothers brought matters to a focus rather unexpectedly, but the par ties in interest soon made ready, and within a short time will nake a combined movement to secure their end. The plan
is $t o$ unite the cattlemen 'of Wyoming. Colorado, eastern Ctah,western Nebraska, southern Montana and sonthern Dakota in one giãnt company, each giving up his individual herd aud ranch and receiving a proportionate amount of stock in return. A similar association has been recently formed in Texas, but one much less farreaching in extent and complete in organzation.
The plan of the Wyoming men is for Tery man in their association to absoutely surrender all stock and ranch improvements, and receive a certain share in the company. By so doing the danger of flooding the market by throwing upon it a large amount of catue al an unfavorable time will be entirely obviated, and suct disasters as fellowed the Indian Territory cattle sales rendered impossible. For five or six years past the cattle market has been periodically depressed by whe necessities or the weaker ranchmen, their in order to ralse money to meet obliged to ship cattle before they arrired at maturity and accept such prices as the dealers choose to offer This course has been as disastrous to the strong as to the weak hoiders, as these forced sales have reduced the price far below the proper figure, and have enabled the buyers to make their own terms The necessity of further combination has been long apparent, but action would have been postponed for some time, had not the Swan failure occurred. Fear of the disastrous consequences that would follow the sudden casting on the market of the great herds of this company compelled the cattlemen to take immediate action, which they have done with commendable energy. Those connected with it are very reticent in the matter, but enough has been larned to state with reasonable certainty and Clark of Cheyenne, and Ulrichs and Havemeyer of New York, together with a number of Scotch and English capitalists, and some from Philadelphia and Boston, are deeply interested in the scheme, and will do all in their power to carry it to a sccessfal termination. Cattle and Banch Values Improving. The Btock Grower holds to the opinon which it has expressed very frequent ly during the past six months that the cattle business on the open ranges of the southwest is coming into one of the best periods of its existence for satisfactory profits. Cattle raising in the west is un. dergoing a necessary change in many of its features of management, but the business in itself has lost nune of its charac teristics as a safe and sure winner of profits. That this feeling is a part of the mental operations of those who are looking for good opportunities of placing their money, can be shown in more than one instance where men ar e buying cattle and ranch properties, proposing to stay with the business and running it for the profit there is in it.
One of the largest transfers of ranch and eattie properties that has taken place in the southwest is now under way, the fullang of the sroct Growns in due colme. The syndicate buying are alive to the fact that there is money in going into the business at present values. The news was received also

The Hun ter and Evans herd, one of the largest and finest in the northwest, was purchased by Plene Webaux and W. D. Knight, both of Miles City. The purchase was made for large $E$ rench syndicate, who furnished the money, the title being vested in Messrs. New Mexico-A Horse Country. A correspondent, at Dillon City, Mon-
tana, asks: "How is New Mexico as a horse country : Are there many horse ranches in the territory? How is the grass : The markets for Percheron-Nor man geldings?
In reply to the above the Srock Grower will say that fine locations for horse ranches can be secured in New Mexico and except in the eastern portion where loco prevals the breeding of goud ountry on earth for the breeding of goo orses. Feed for winter use can be easily
grown, as alfalfa, the best of grasses, can be raised in any valley where water can be procured. There are but few ranches devoted exclusively to the breeding of borses. None to the Percheron-Norman breeds, though some farmers and ranch. men have lately bought thoroughbred studs of this named breed. Many ranch. men raise their own cow horses and for saddle animals and light buggy teams here is always a brisk demand.
Range grass is, as a rule, good here the year round, and range horses, except
when worked hard, are always in good shape. During the round-up the horses get only grass for feed and stand the work well.
As for a market for Percheron-Norman geldings. This is difficult to answer as none have ever beent offered for sale here. Such horses, when of very heavy weight are generally in great demand in large cities where much heavy transfer hauling is done. There is no doubt but light and medium weight grades would

## The Pacific Coast Market

The indications are that the Pacific coast will be short on good beef the com. ing summer. In addition to what was published in the Stock Grower two weeks ago on this question, we find that the Portland (Ore.) Welcome of recent date raises a doubt as to the future supply in the following presentation of the situation there.-Meat of all kinds is now highpriced, and the probabilities are that it will ascend the scale yet more. A reporter in conversation with one of Portland's leading butchers recently, was informed that he had just paid for a lot of cattle at the rate of six cents a pound on foot,equal to eleven cents dressed. Stall fed cattle are very scarce, and not four car lords in all Oregon were received on the 25 th ult. notwithstanding an order for 1.000 head from Montana. Agents couldn't get the beeves anywhere, for cattle are scarce in eastern Oregon, Washington and Montana,
on account of the heavy winter. Grass. fed stick are plentiful enough, but fat stall-fed animals are unobtainable. A steer weizhing 1.200 pounds, worth $\$ 72$ is more profitable to raise than $t$ cultivate wheat. Any farmer with 160 acres of land can raise feed enough all the year round for 100 head of cattle, and can more readily market the latter at a good margin of profit. Meat will never be much cheaper of thegon. Uur farmers should take note of this, and go more into stock than wheat
raising. There is money in cattle that have offspring, and those who have past ures ought to see it.

## THIE BNOOK GFOWHMS.

S. W. Dorsey Chats With the Repor ter.
S. W. Dorsey on his raturn to New York from England was questioned very closely by a ne wspaper represen'at re as to the alleged unprofitable nature of the cattle business at the present time, and upon other matters in connection with the industry as well. In giving his ideas about the cattle and ranch business and as to the truth of the assertion that cattle raising was nul longer a paying business. Mr. Dorsey said

There is no truth whatever in it. That impression has gone abroad for the reason that four or five years agn cattle compa-
nies were organized all throughout the nies were organized all throughout the
western territories upon about the same basis that a mining company would be organized. People went into the business who had no knowledge of it, bought out herds of cattle that did not exist, engaged in wild and extravagant things in the way of salaries and other expenses in anticipation of a large income where there was nothing to get an income from: Many of the English and American companies that were organized a few years ago were
based upon a capitalization altogether too great, and with the expenses of mismanagement and the mistake in original porchase, nearlv every one of them are now
in a crippled condition, and some of them have gone into liquidation, but there has been no loss, even noder such circumstances, when the dividends paid are consid-
ered. The simple truth is that the cattle ered. The simple truth is that the cattle
basiness, like every other business, must business, like every other business, must
be conducted economically and intelligently, and when so conducted I venture the statement that there is no legitimate
business in the country that will pay so business in the country that will pay so

The attemp has been made by the commissioner of the general land otice to make political and personal capital by assailing the titte and the character of every man engaged in the cattle business. Almost every day some idiotic order is issued from the general land office, the purpose of which is to
annoy the people who already have large investments and to deter those who are willing to invest in the industry. The papers, acting under the suggestion of the selxes hoarse over the public domain grazing farm. Now what are the facts. ted States is arid waterless forf the Cni tical purpose, and only useful for grazing If the cattle were not there to eat up the grass the prairie tires would come along in the autumn and lick it up. The whole theory for holding the land for bomestead entry is too absurd to talk about.
What the plains cattle industry means in relation to the meat supply of the country as well as its infuence upon the economic forces of the land is best explained

You will see that in selling cattle a 31/4c a pound, the 'barons' havn't such a dangerous monopoly after all, and when as in New York, I have never been able to see where the monopoly came in.

The well has arranged wind and pipes run to the dwelling kitchen stable, and in fact ali over the place and all one has to do to get water is to turn cock and his object is at once accom plished. Mr. Erway, the obliging super intendent, kindly piloted us through the barn, which is the most conveniently ranged one I have ever seen on a cow ranch. But what mostly took our eye told cost Mr. Wilion 81,250 , and well h is worth it. He is of good size and a pretty as a picture. Mr. Wilson raises five colts sired by this horse. He ha several bundred acres of land in cultiva tion and employs from six to ten men the farm and about the same number of cow hands. This ranch owns between tea and twelve thousand head of well graded cattle. They will ship about 800 bee steers to Kansas Clty, besides furnishing Alma and the Cooney mining camp with did and cattle and horses in fine condi tion.
