Boll Weevil Eradication Referendum will be provided on Friday, March 17 at the Farwell Community Center.
"We're conducting this other High Plains and adjacent Rolling Plains counties in the proposed eradication zone," said Gary Patterson, County Extension
Agent. "This two-hour boll weevil meeting will be conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and will begin at 10 a.m.," he said.

for two continuing education units (CEUs) toward re-certification requirements for private pesticide applicators. Brant Baugh, EA-ENTO (PM),
will present information on the will present information on the present boil weevil situation and
the proposed referendum so that the proposed referendum so that cotton producers can make an
informed decision when they have the opportunity to vote in April. A representative from Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) will follow with a presentation which will further emphasize the critical nature of the provide details about the proposed referendum and program operation.

The Plains Cotton Growers Boll Weevil Suppressions Program has operated for 31 years and has successfully kept the boll weevil from becoming an established economic pest in the High Plains area, the biggest cotton patch in the
world.
"Area producers have enjoyed a competitive edge compared to other regions of the cotton belt where insect control often means spraying up to 15 times a season," said Dr. James Leser, Extension entothese pesticide applications can be directly attributed to the presence of boll weevils."

The PCG program uses a fall diapause control program, applying malathion within its operational cold winter weather, reduce the number of boll weevils able to
wintering adults until a new cotton
crop is up and squaring in the early summer.
Mala Malathio insecticide which a proven and safe the diapause program for 31 years. It was also used for the California Medfly program and is widely used for mosquito control in towns across this area. The program control zone, roughly along the edge of the Caprock Escarpments,
