#### Surprise! Crim Year

Sees Dry

We are in the midst of that season that has become known as "March Madness." The madness comes from the NCAA basketball championship tournament, which is held each March.

But in these parts, this season

But in these parts, this season signals something else--the annual "Indian" weather forecast.

Every year at sunrise on March 22, Weldon "Indian" Crim gives his annual spring weather forecast.

And needless to say, those basketball coaches in pursuit of the participal championship only wish national championship only wish they had the winning percentage of

The "Indian" has been correct on four of his last five forecasts, which presents another gloomy picture for area farmers this year. A

west wind at prediction time means another dry spring for the area. "The west wind is the worst news possible," says Crim, a third generation forecaster. "We are going to have a dry spring."

And unfortunately for the locals, Crim is right more often than he is wrong. He says that his forecast is accurate "about eighty to rorecast is accurate "about eighty foeighty-five per cent of the time."
And the last five years have certainly proved that point.
The forecast comes from

setting fire to a teepee-shaped wood pile before sunrise on March 22. The direction the wind blows the fire's smoke at sunrise predicts the season's weather.

season's weather.

This family tradition began in 1910. Weldon's grandfather, Taylor Crim, learned about the "fire burning" from observing Indian rituals. The tradition was passed on to his son, J.W., who conducted the "burnings" for 60 years. He was known all over the area as the "Parmer County weather prophet."

are not keeping up with inflation," says Teresa Buske, executive vicepresident of the Friona Chamber of

Commerce.
"Friona is currently dead last in sales tax allocation and sales tax growth when compared to several area communities over the last five to ten years. Our overall growth falls short of the modest inflation rate," she added.
"As you can see in chart (a) below, Friona is far below the

average in increased allocations over the last ten years. How long can we continue to stay at the current level when we have no means of competing with surrounding communities?"

Chart (b) allows residents to compare the amount of estimated revenue collected through the one-half percent sales tax by many of our surrounding cities. These communities are at an advantage when competing for new business or supporting their existing

"Proposition one and two are an investment in Friona. The revenues collected are invested back into the community, helping Friona to continue to provide a quality of life that entices us to stay here and others to want to be a part

"Friona's sales tax allocations of," the Chamber spokesman said.



The hospital drew blood and found Stephen had an abnormal level of blood sugar and was suffering from a bad case of strep throat. They administered medication and released him three days later.

Meanwhile, Stephen's faithful dog remained in the truck. On Sunday, the trucker-was surprised when the Assistant Chief of Police visited him in the hospital. He was even more surprised when the assistant chief retrieved the dog and took him to a kennel until Stephen was well enough to be released. "You just don't find police

"You just don't find police departments that care enough about truckers to go out of their way like they did," Marvin told Land Line.
