radiation in this atomic age into which we have all been plunged without a by-your-leave. But, to gain a perspective, it is important to consider what kind of radiation worries us. Is It the radiation from nuclear test fall-out, atomic reactors, industrial or medical X-Ray?

If you are disturbed about whether you or members of your family should submit to medical X-ray examination or treatment, that is a matter for calm consideration, qualified advice and above all, common sense. In the first place, X-rays are for those who are sick, who require them for specific reasons. In the second place, there is no kind or form of medical or surgical treatment that is completely without risk. And in the third place, sixty-one years of experience with X-rays has developed the science of radiology to a high professional plane. diation.

Even the most lurid article we have seen on the perils of radiation - cel types of radiation - admits that it is impossible to conceive of modern medicine being practiced without the use of X-ray in diagnosis and

Dr. Dwight H. Murrey, president of the American Medical Association, says in a recent erticle in The American Weekly: "There is little danger from X-rays today, either to the physicien or his patient. With modern equipment, X-rays are produced with perfect control . . . Control and standardization of the way X-rays are being used in medicine today are in the

Most everyone, we suppose, worries about radiologist as a kind of scientific picture-taker. But this skilled physician gets the same training given to other doctors plus at least three years of specialty study. He is the key man in mod-

> Dr. Murray calls attention to the recent recommendation of the National Academy of Sciences against more than 10 roentgens of manmade radiation during our first 30 years. "They (the Academy scientists) Indicated clearly. he says, "that they were referring to radiation -including X-rays-that would reach the reproductive cells." He then points out that most X-ray exposures - such as head, foot, chest have little effect on these cells. "Even abdominal examinations," says Dr. Murray, "include techniques which reduce to a minimum. exposures to reproductive cells from direct ra-

"Therefore, the Academy experts have estimated that, on the average, these cells receive no more than three or four roentgens from medical X-reys during a 30-year period. Some people, of course, receive none. In cases of cancer patients, where X-rays can save lives, the X-rey dose must be much larger but medical authorities agree that this is

After all, X-ray is indispensable. And while we are wise to learn all we can about it for our own peace of mind, we are no better qualified to decide our own need for such treatment than for major surgery. People who believe in their doctors will doubtless continue to accept







How can a farmer tell if he is storing enough water? The best and surest method would be to follow a few days behind the irrigation, after it has time to penetrate a far as it will, and dig a few holes with post hole diggers.

The hole should be as deep as the profile or the effective root zone. There should be good moisture all the way to the bottom. If an excessive amount of moisture goes into caliche. the irrigation was too heavy and the amount of water should be decreased.

The cost factor would enter into the pre-irrigation again should there be more water on the land than can be stored

The effective root zone of our soil may be considered as reservoir. It should be filled iwthout running it over. Starting the crop with a full re-servoir is much better than


