Right Watering Makes That Lawn Look Right

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second of a series dealing with the vexing water situation in Brownfield and elsewhere. This week, City Mgr. Eunice Jones talks about lawns and water.)
If you water your lawn once a week, you will have a better lawn than the fellow who ap-

plies the water every day. Here's why:
Grass roots grow as deep as the available water. One inch of water will penetrate some seven inches of soil, which is adequate for good root growth when applied weekly.

A simple way to measure the proper amount of water is by setting a coffee can in the sprinkling area, letting the water fall until the can is filled with one inch.
Experience shows that you'll get a deep-rooted turf which will look better and will stand up better to summer droughts and winter freezes.

A 60-foot lot with a house should take approximately 4,000 gallons a week to cover the lawn with one inch of water. Your cost: about \$1.50 weekly.

No less an authority than the Texas Turf Association recommends the foregoing. If followed, Brownfield residents will find their water costing less and their lawns looking better.

This week in Austin has been a busy, wet one. Coming from West Texas, I have never seen rain like we are having here. It has rained every day for 18 days. I only wish we could get about one-half of it on the Plains.

The attitude of the Legislature has really changed since Easter, which I am told is only normal. Since a session is only 120 days, our adjournment date is May 7. If we do not adjourn on that date, our pay is cut off.

Most of the members are anxious to get our work over with and be able to leave on schedule. Of course, this is a very difficult thing to do as the last Legislature to leave on time was in 1945, while the 1949 Legislature worked until July 8.

Of the many bills that have passed the House this week, I think there are only a few that you are interested in. A bill that passed by a big majority, and that I was sorry to see passed was H. B. 103. This bill provided that 1% of the Permanent School Fund could be transferred to the available school fund.

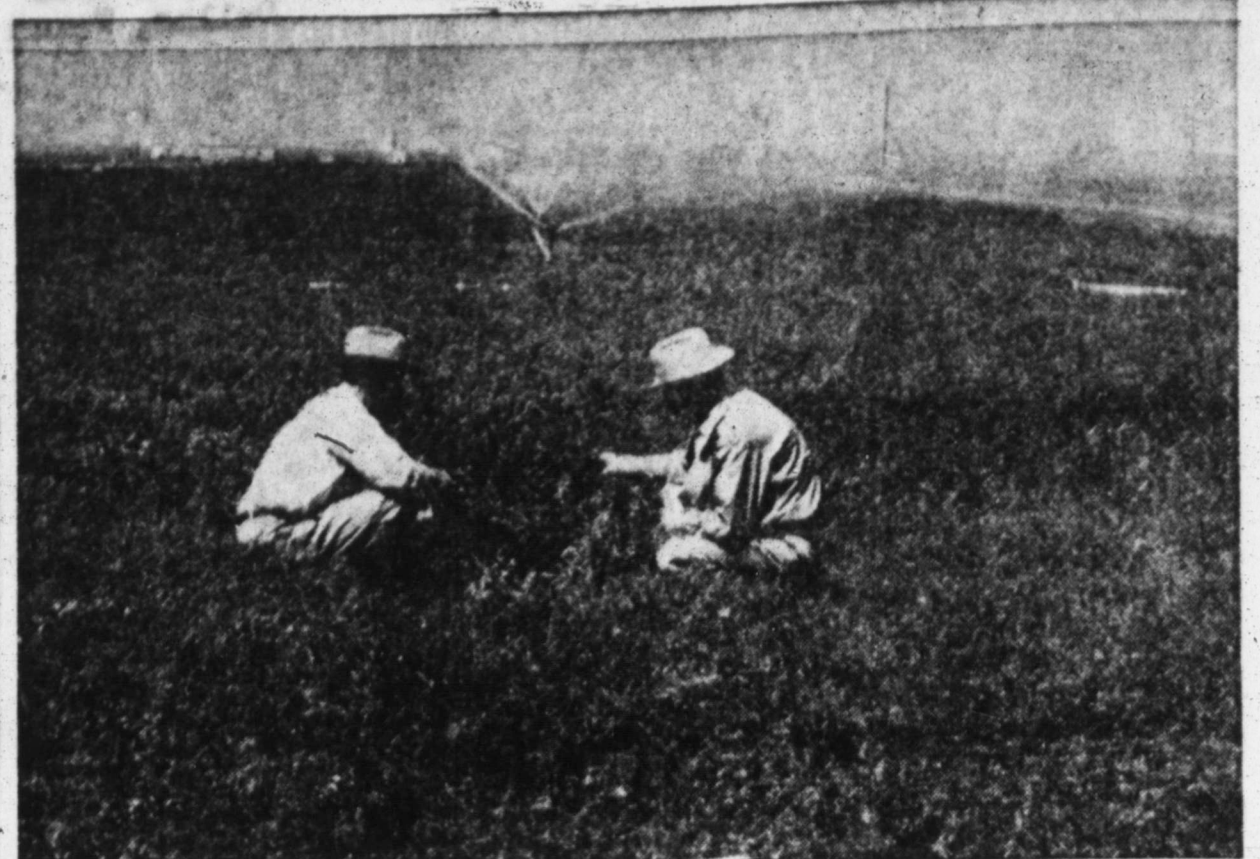
The Legislature in 1899, when the state was in a much poorer condition than it is today, decided it was a bad practice to dissipate the state's permanent school fund by dipping into it to meet current educational costs. They passed laws preventing the practice.

The great problem, as I see it, is not the immediate one of just taking 11 million or so from the fund, but the problem is the precedent.

Once the permanent school fund is tapped for any purpose

"If you enter this program," Roberts cautioned the group, "do it right the first time or don't do it at all. A half-way program is worse than no program."



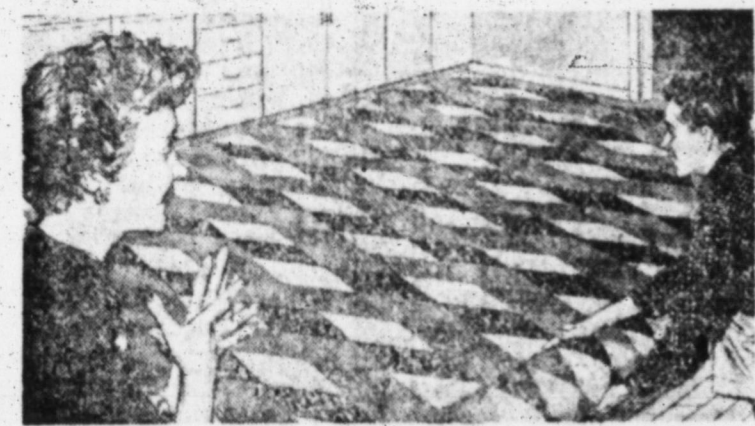

"That request," said Farrar, "has been forwarded to our San Angelo office, and we have asked that office for a cost analysis and study of the calling habits by subscribers at the exchanges. After that study is completed, it then will be necessary for us to negotiate a contract with Puka-Lambro as to how much General will pay for the added service and how much the cooperative will pay. "It is, by the way, an added service, and we're calling it a special service offering." The district manager went on to say that General now has standard contract forms

Correct Posture Week Proclaimed Here

May 1 to 7 has been designated as "Correct Posture Week" in a proclamation issued today by Mayor Arlie Lowmire. He urges the people of Brownfield to learn the rules and habits of good posture. The week is sponsored state-wide by the Texas State Chiropractic Association and locally by Brownfield Chiropractors. "I welcome the opportunity to call upon all other cities, civic organizations, schools and youth training organizations to cooperate in this educational program to make people aware of the value of correct posture and of its benefits to our public health standards," the mayor said in the proclamation. He added that proper posture, especially in young people, is one of the greatest contributing factors to good health, physical endurance, working efficiency and good appearance. which have been approved by REA in Washington and which have been used in other areas between the company and the cooperatives. Brownfield Owners Being Cheated By 'Home Repair' Men

Home owners are being cheated out of more than \$500 million a year by home-repair racketeers, according to Victor H. Nyborg, president of the Association of Better Business Bureaus. Nyborg said 1957 is likely to be an even bigger year for the fly-by-night operators since industry and government are promoting home repair activities. Abuses in home repairs are the number one racket in the United States today, according to BBB statistics. In 1956 the BBB received 174,175 complaints and inquiries concerning misrepresentation of materials and workmanship. Bureaus admit this total is probably no more than one per cent of the total taken from U. S. home-owners.

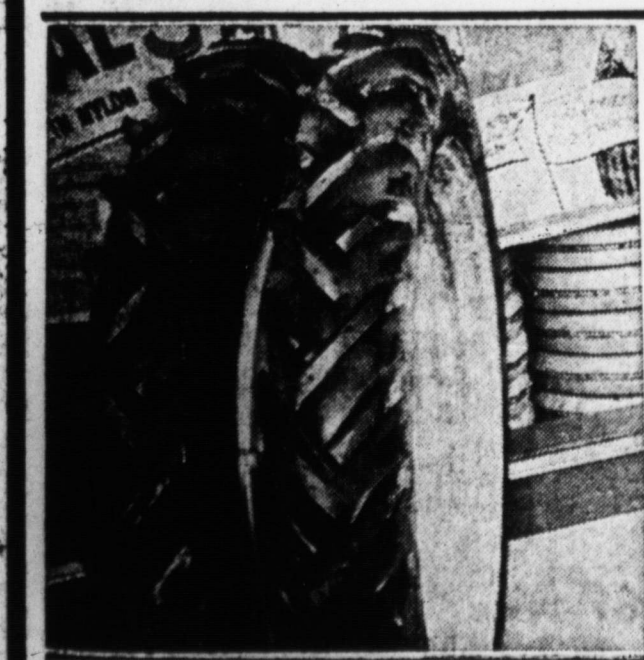

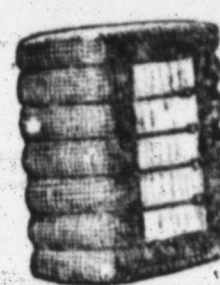

Cotton No. 1 Cash Crop in the State's Agriculture Set-Up

AUSTIN (Special)—Through-out Texas' history, cotton has been the state's leading cash crop and a dominant factor in the state's economy, a University of Texas graduate history student reminded the Texas State Historical Association during its 61st annual meeting here.

Raymond Elliott White, a graduate of Goliad High School and Southwest Texas State Teachers College, presented a paper on "Cotton Ginning in Texas to 1861."

"The earliest inhabitants of Texas, the Indians, cultivated leases for oil, gas and mineral development covering the above described tracts of land, or either of them, owned by Terry County, Texas, such lease or leases to be made upon the terms herein stated.

Lessor shall retain at least one-eighth (1/8) royalty, however, that if such lease or leases covers less than the entire mineral estate, such royalty shall be payable only in proportion to the mineral interests covered by the respective lease. This Week in Austin

By PRESTON SMITH

The Texas Capitol is more than a seat of government. The huge granite building contains paintings, sculptures, and documents that attract scores of tourists daily and more than 20,000 Texas school children each spring.

As a visitor enters the Capitol, he finds underfoot the names of Texas battles set in metal letters in the terrazzo tile floor of the foyer.

Treasures of the foyer come in pairs — two paintings, two statues, and two documents.

A painting of David Crockett, defender of the Alamo, hangs on the right wall and across from it, the famous painting of Santa Anna surrendering to Gen. Sam Houston.

The life-size statues in white marble of Stephen F. Austin and Sam Houston are masterpieces of Elizabeth Ney, German-born sculptress who received commissions from the royalty and great men of Europe before moving to Texas in 1872.

The document which claims the principal attention of visitors in the foyer is a photographic copy of the original Texas Declaration of Independence.

The rotunda is a popular interest point for visitors. There one has an uninterrupted view inside the great dome some 300 feet high.

On the walls of the rotunda, beginning on the ground floor and circling clockwise and in chronological order up through several floors, are portraits of all Texas heads of state.

The House of Representatives and the Senate Chambers are located on the second floor of the Capitol and the third floor is given over principally to the judicial branch of the government.

A fitting end to any tour of the Capitol is a walk through the Capitol grounds to see the monuments, statues, cannons and the Capitol Greenhouse.

A tour of the Capitol and grounds is an experience that impresses even the most casual visitor with the courage of those who made Texas great.

and used cotton," he pointed out. "The Spanish missionaries also cultivated it in small quantities, and when the first Anglo-American immigrants came to Texas in the 1820's, cotton seed was one of the items they brought with them."

"For cotton cultivation to be profitable the settlers needed gins to separate the lint from the seed," White continued. "so the cotton gin was in Texas almost as early as the first settler. John Cartwright and John Sprawl in East Texas and colony all erected cotton gins. Jared E. Groce in Austin's colony all erected cotton gins around 1825."

Texas had three gin-making concerns in 1850, and by 1860 there were four establishments doing a \$28,000 business, White reported.

Two teams of horses or a yoke of oxen powered the earliest gins, as well as the crude wooden screw presses outside the gin house, he noted. Gin hands carried the lint cotton to the press in baskets and packed it into 400 or 500 pound bales, covered with hemp or cotton lap bagging and tied with ropes.

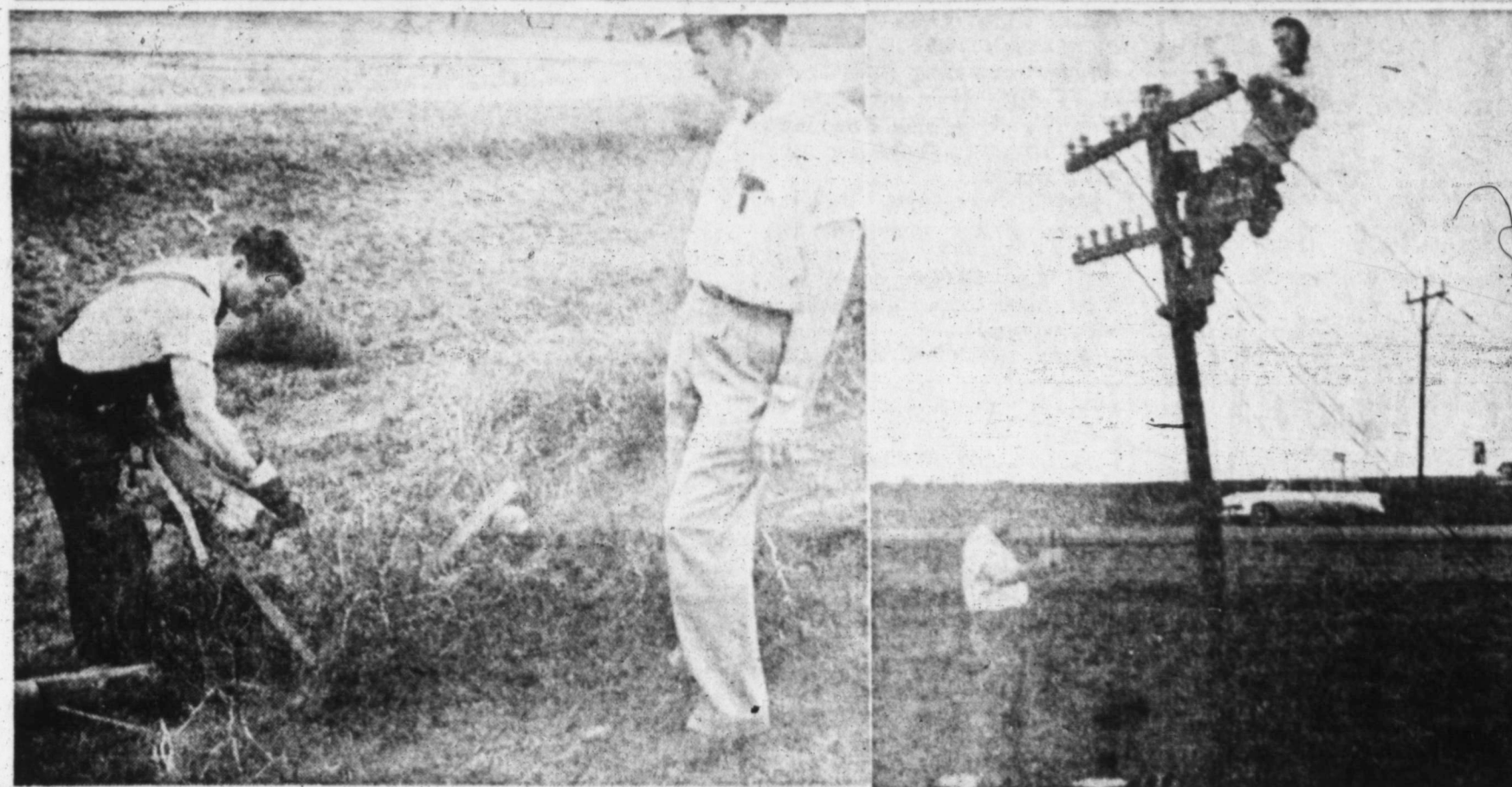
