Vision Quest Group ands In Friona

An unusual group of visitors arrived in Friona about noon on Monday. They spent two days and nights in Friona, camped in the Reeve Lake area north of Highway

The group arrived by wagon train, including nine wagons, two trucks, 18 trailers, two vans, 15 vehicles, 65 horses and mules, 60 youths and 45 staff members.

The youth and their leaders are

part of a unique program for juvenile delinquents known as VisionQuest, and it contracts with governmental agencies to provide an alternative to locking up

an alternative to locking up troubled young people.

"These are kids who would otherwise be sitting in jail," stated Dan Johnston, the wagon master for the group. "On the trail, the youngsters are given responsibilities. They have to care for their animals and have to learn how to deal with the outdoors and the to deal with the outdoors and the

From Littlefield, the train went to the Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge, where it spent last weekend. A delegation from the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce visited the train and offered souvenirs.

Julie Goddard, senior student at Friona High School, brought home the gold medal at the state UIL literary meet last weekend in

Miss Goddard, the daughter of Kathryn and David Goddard, won Friona's first state gold medal since 1981 by breezing to wins in District 2-AAA, Region 1-AAA

and Texas AAA.

In district competition, each school is allowed three entries. Julie won that competition at Littlefield in a field of 17

At the regional meet in Odessa, the top three winners from each of the 13 districts in the region competed, and Miss Goddard again was the winner, with 38 contestants

In the state meet in Austin, the well-rounded FHS student competed against the top three winners from each region. There were 19 students in the competition, and again the Friona student took first place.

Showing her versatility, Julie left Wednesday for the state capital, this time to enter the state tennis tournament, where she is one of eight finalists. She is the district champion and regional runnerup in

Virginia Cleveland, longtime bookkeeping and accounting instructor at FHS, and Miss Goddard's faculty sponsor, points out that in the accounting contests in UIL, accounting is the only event in the acedemic area in which a contestant may compete only one time during their high school career, unlike other academic or athletic events.

So, Julie made the most of her one opportunity.

Also in the district meet, Julie hooked up with Abbey Johnson and Lori Jordan to win in the team accounting division.

She became Friona's first gold medal winner in a state UIL event since1981, when Pam Perez first in shorthand, and Mark Blankenship and Mark Zachary won in debate.

Previously, Blankenship and Zachary won the title in debate at Austin in 1980; Skip Mohr won the gold medal in informative speaking in 1970, and Crista Evans won first in poetry reading in 1968.

In the school election, Danny Black and Kathryn Gurley were elected. Black, an incumbent, received 355 votes and Mrs. Gurley polled 319. Kevin Welch was "first runnerup" with 250 votes; Mike Martin received 177; Paul (Lucky) Gonzales received 96 and Jerry Butman 73.

A total of 674 people voted in the school board election, and 535 in the city election.

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

May 8, 1995, fifty year anniversary, Victory in Europe. On April 28th, Italian partisans captured and executed Mussolini, who had tried to escape into Switzerland. German forces in Italy surrendered on May 2.

On May 1, the German radio announced that Hitler had died while defending Berlin against the Russians, and had named Grand Admiral Karl Doenitz as his successor. Allied investigators later

successor. Allied investigators later learned that Hitler and his mistress, Eva Braun, had committed suicide in Berlin on April 30, and their bodies had been burned. Berlin finally fell to the invading Russian

finally fell to the invading Russian armies on May 2.

Early on the morning of May 7,
Col. Gen. Alfred Jodl of the German high command entered Allied headquarters in a red school building at Reims, France. There, on behalf of his government, he signed the terms of unconditional surrender.

surrender.

The free world celebrated May 8 as V-E (Victory in Europe) Day. After five years, eight months, and seven days, the European phase of World War II had ended.

This week I listened to the interview of a German soldier that had been involved in World War II.

He was asked what had happened in the country of Germany prior to the War that would have allowed the extermination camps and war to

The ex-soldier said that he felt like the moral breakdown of the nation was a factor. He said that in Germany in years prior to the war that sterilization began to be practiced, then abortion, and then infanticide (the killing of an infant) and euthanasia (the act or practice of killing or permitting the death of hopelessly sick or injured individuals).

Jesus Christ.



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iching eyes. This doesn't have to happen if you set up your video display terminal properly and use it with care. First step is to adjust the viewing angles. The top edge of the screen should be no higher than eye level as you sit, the bottom edge no lower than about 40 degrees below eye level. To control on-screen glare, shade nearby windows and direct lamps away from the screen. Screen hoods and antiglare filters will help. Adjust image brightness to avoid too much contrast with the surroundings.

Take breaks. Rest your eyes by doing something else for 10 to 15 minutes—once an hour after strenuous work periods, every two hours otherwise. Consult with your optometrist about glasses fitted with a middle-distance prescription or with special tinted lenses that reduce glare.

Understanding Mutual Fund Share Classes

The increasing variety of mutual fund share classes--each class charging sales fees differentlymutual fund share classes--each class charging sales fees differently-has become confusing to average investors. In response, the Investment Company Institute (the voice of the mutual fund industry) has approved guidelines for consistent, industry-wide descriptions of classes for future offerings of mutual fund shares.

Matthew P. Fink, president of the ICI, said, "The industry was concerned that without a uniform standard, the growing number of class designations would lead to confusion and hamper communication among shareholders, mutual funds, brokers and others."

Until recent years, sales charges for mutual fund shares were fairly standard. A no-load fund charged no up-front fee but could charge upon withdrawal. A load fund charged an up-front amount specified in the prospectus but did not charge for redemption.

As costs became more of an issue, different ways to

As costs became more of an issue, different fund groups each began devising different ways to charge shareholders, allowing them to select whichever payment method they preferred. Under the new guidelines, classes of mutual fund shares that carry sales charges will be standardized into the following categories:

will be standardized into the following categories:

Class A shares can be purchased at the traditional offering price that includes the up-front sales charge specified in the prospectus. The usual discount for volume purchases will still apply.

Class B shares can be

can be Class B shares can be purchased at net asset value with no

up-front sales charge. The shares, however, may be subject to a contingent deferred sales charge (CDSC) if redeemed within a certain period of time (typically five certain period of time (typically five or six years from purchase). The actual holding time may differ among funds. An annual distribution service fee also may apply for the same holding period. The Institute calls this "spread load."

Class C shares have neither an up-front nor back-end sales charge. Instead, a "level load" is applied by the fund, charging an annual distribution services fee. This

distribution services fee. This typically amounts to about 1 per cent of the fund's assets.

Class D shares are "hybrid level load." They are identical to Class C shares except that they may have a small up-front load in addition to the annual level load.

The guidelines also include two classes of shares that generally are not available to individual investors. Class Y shares will be sold to institutional investors, and Class Z shares are for employees of mutual fund companies.

mutual fund companies.

The guidelines have been adopted to standardize the classes of shares, not to impose limits on sales fees. Such limits are regulated by the National Association of Securities Dealers (NASD).

In selecting mutual funds, the most important considerations are your objectives and risk tolerance. However, be sure you understand the various classes of mutual fund shares so you know how the fees will be charged. There's always a cost to owning mutual funds. Now you can select the type of cost that best fits your investment strategy.

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
