NEW AND IMPROVED....We are just into the second year of the state's new automobile registration system, in which your vehicle receives a small window sticker to

place in the car's windshield. We haven't seen the figures, but we'd be willing to bet that the current system isn't nearly as effective in getting all (or most) of

its vehicles registered each year.
In the old days, Texans registered their vehicles by buying new tags every year. Yes, we'll admit that the new system saves by using less raw

new system saves by using less raw products (small paper stickers vs new metal plates every year).

However, for the first 50 or more years that vehicles were registered, you'd have an orange tag with black letters one year, and at the stroke of midnight about January 31, you would be required to purchase and affix a new tag that was black with orange letters. If you were still driving around on February 1 with your old tag, it stood out like a sore thumb parked alongside all of those with the new, and different colored tags.

Using our new system, occasionally someone will warn you that either your vehicle registration or its yearly inspection sticker has expired. At one time you could depend upon your service station attendant to warn you about this

this.

Today, unless we've overlooked one, you have to be in Bovina to get a regular station attendant. We don't know what all of the little widow ladies do to get their cars gassed-up, but we suppose they've had to learn to use a key (or card) pump system.

ANOTHER VEHICLE-related ANOTHER VEHICLE-related comment, after spending Mother's Day in Lubbock. Our boys live on 93rd street. My and Carol's first apartment in Lubbock was exactly 95 blocks farther north than where our sons' house is located.

While we were living in Lubbock and attending Texas Tech, the most traffic was on 19th Street, 34th Street and College Avenue, and on occasion, Broadway.

This past Sunday, Ye Editor almost got run over just trying to make a right turn onto 82nd Street in Lubbock. This is almost mind-

in Lubbock. This is almost mind-boggling.
Our sons, and son-in-law, (very much like 99 per cent of the other Lubbock drivers) scare the daylights out of us by tailgating the vehicle in front of them. And they get very annoyed when drivers such as ourselves get in front of them and allow at least a vehicle length between themselves and the vehicle in front of them. in front of them.

It's no wonder that you have those 100-car pile-up accidents when you have wrecks on the busy freeways in the larger cities. When you have that many vehicles cruising along at 65 mph and more in bumper-to-bumper traffic, by the time you react and put on your brakes, you'd easily affect that

brakes, you'd easily affect that many other vehicles. Our kids never could understand why their father slowed down, looked both ways when passing the intersections at Hub and Clay's Corner (while going north or south). More than once they would remark "You've got the right of way, Dad, why are you slowing dourgo"

We tried to explain that we had been out to these intersections and taken pictures of vehicles whose drivers had been killed. Some of these also had the right of way, but

someone else hadn't noticed.

We'd like to wish today's young drivers much luck in their driving. they need all the luck they can get, don't use much caution.

LEADERS PLEASED

City Earns Grant For Water Wells

The City of Friona this week received a \$213,992 grant from the Texas Department of Community Affairs for the purpose of drilling new, and badly needed, water wells for the city.

City Manager Paula Wilson said that the city plans to use \$37,000 in "matching funds," to bring the total to \$250,992 for the water well project.

the water well project.

The city plans to drill two new wells in the city's well field just north of town.

While the grant money is great, it won't help the city's water needs for this summer, and unless we receive some timely rains, the water supply may be sorely tested before the summer

"We hope to advertise for bids for digging the wells by July 1, and hope to get the work completed toward the end of the summer," Mrs. Wilson said.

The two additional wells will make five in the city's water

field. The other three wells are considered good water producers.

producers.

The latest grant makes the third one the city has received from the Texas Department of Community Affairs in recent years. The other two were for paving projects.

"We are extremely happy to receive the grant. They don't give it to cities unless they really need it. There were around 40 applications for the money this year, and only six communities had their applications approved," the city manager said.

Representatives from the TDCA were in Friona about a month ago to check out the city's well site and its water situation. The application also had to be verified through the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC).

A Parmer County neighbor, Bovina, also was awarded in the

A Parmer County neighbor, Bovina, also was awarded in the neighborhood of \$250,000 with which it plans to build a new water tower. Other area cities whose grant applications were granted included Wellington, Stinnett, Happy and Sanford.

KidCare Program Continues Here

The KidCare program, which was kicked off last year and sponsored y the Friona Chamber of Commerce in conjunction with the Parmer county Sheriff's Department, will continue this Friday and Saturday,

May 19-20.

The program will be held at the Junior High Cafeteria on Friday after school and until 7 p.m., then on Saturday beginning at 10 a.m. until 1

Deputy Sheriff Tracy Bridges is in charge of the program, which

Deputy Sheriff Tracy Bridges is in charge of the program, which makes records of youngsters from infants through 13 years, or up to 17 if the parents wish, to be on file in case they are ever needed.

"We encourage those who didn't come and register last year to do it this year, and in addition, we need to update our records on the ones who registered last year," Bridges said.

The law officer pointed out that officials have come up with a teeth imprint system which is an excellent means of identification. The process uses a small styrofoam tray, similar to those used for meat in today's meat counters in supermarkets. The imprint will prove to be reliable for at least two years, whether or not the children lose or grow in teeth.

Helping with the program will be members of the Friona Police Department, as well as the Friona Chamber of Commerce directors.





SEC Approves Mutual Fund Reporting Rules

Mutual funds have become one of the most popular investments available. They were introduced in this country less than 70 years ago, and today investors can choose from more than 4,000 funds.

more than 4,000 funds.

When you consider how well mutual funds in general have performed, it's easy to understand why they're so popular. For years, mutual fund shareholders enjoyed the benefits of a rising stock market. During that time, many mutual funds posted gains that are not likely to be repeated in the near future.

In 1994, however, the market

In 1994, however, the market stalled and began to consolidate. As a result, some mutual funds experienced sharp declines in value, and their shareholders, who had grown to expect regular increases, were surprised.

One reason many investors were surprised is that they didn't understand the investing parameters of their mutual funds. These are described in each fund's prospectus, which should be read thoroughly before an investment is made. Rather than reading the prospectus, Rather than reading the prospectus, though, many investors look for publications that rank mutual funds, hoping to discover the magic fund. However, these magazines

seldom agree, because they each use their own criteria.

Investors also may seek answers from mutual fund advertisements. No-load funds market their shares to the public mainly through advertising. As the number of funds has increased, so has the number of advertisements.

To help investors better uate their mutual fund choices, evaluate their mutual fund choices, the SEC recently approved mutual fund ranking guidelines proposed by the National Association of Securities Dealers (NASD). The bottom line of these guidelines is that if a fund claims to rank first in a category, it must be able to prove the claim.

The guidelines should help protect investors from overzealous protect investors from overzealous advertising. The new rules allow funds to promote themselves, but also require the funds to include standard information including sales charges and fees, what category the funds are in, how many funds are in that category, the period of time covered and more

covered and more.

Mutual fund reporting requirements should help investors avoid being taken in by conflicting rankings and confusing jargon. Simple, understandable language Simple, understandable language that explains the risks and rewards of each mutual fund will help you avoid surprises and make it easier to select the right fund for your

There are two parts to vision: central vision, with which you look directly at objects and peripheral vision, which enables you to be
