Star Lites

A TORNADO CAN be a humbling experience, to which many of our Friona neighbors can no doubt attest.

While there was massive damage inflicted by the June 2 tornado, virtually everyone we have come into contact with since the storm agrees it could have been considerably worse, both from a property loss standpoint, and in loss of lives or more serious injuries.

The main funnel cloud was bearing down on the center of Friona, and if the Friona Wheat Growers elevator had not deflected it, most probably, it would have demolished everything on Main Street, as well as taking out a huge section of the residential district.

True, the change of direction for the funnel caused tremendous damage to businesses and residences in the area south of the railroad, and then to Hi-Pro Feeds (if in fact all of this damage was done by the same funnel). But the main force of the storm was diverted to a much less populous area than that to which it was first pointed.

As a newsmen, we have photographed tornado damage all the way from Lazbuddie (including the 1970 storm that killed Mrs. Alton Morris) to Hereford's 1974 tornado and those that struck Vernon and Wichita Falls in 1979.

But none of these did any more damage than the one that struck our community two weeks ago. The F-4 winds, designated by Amarillo meteorologists, translates as winds with a force of 260 miles per hour. This is more than twice the velocity of storms which are rated as hurricanes.

When we emerged from our basement following the storm, and saw the trail of concrete blocks from the garage that was exploded by the storm on Highway 60 and Virginia, and saw the trail it left across our yard, we again were humbled.

Yes, we had a roof ruined. But if that little "finger" of a tornado had been a few yards further northwest it could have taken out our entire neighborhood.

When our children were small, we always heeded the tornado warnings, and went to a neighborhood shelter. In recent years, we've been fortunate to have a basement and have had the opportunity to host several "neighborhood gatherings" when our area was threatened.


Luckily, Ye Editor was watching Steve McCauley, Channel 4 weatherman. We have been very impressed by this young man since he came upon the scene in Amarillo, and he proved his mettle on June 2.

For those of you who may have missed it, McCauley cautioned the residents of Friona from the beginning of his weathercast at 6 p.m. Then, at the end of the news, he came back on with a more stern warning. "This cloud approaching Friona has some definite characteristics of a tornado, and you folks in Friona should probably take shelter," McCauley warned, while showing the radar. That was enough for this ole amateur weatherman.

The following week, McCauley explained that he had recorded a total of 16 "positive" lightning strikes from the cloud approaching Friona. "When you have a cluster of lightning strikes in a storm to this degree, you almost always have a tornado," McCauley explained.

Another local family was also watching Channel 4 that night. The Joe Mendoza family, which includes two or three sons and their families, all went to the parents' cellar before the funnel cloud struck. We heard that there were 35 people in the Mendoza cellar. Most of these families had their homes destroyed. But they escaped with their lives. Joe Mendoza had the cellar dug about a year ago, after one of our threatening storms.

The Mendozas are definite believers in storm cellars. And they'll probably be watching Channel 4 the next time the weather is threatening.

Gift certificates were donated by McDonald's, Long John Silver, Taqueria Jalisco, Pizza Hut, and


Family Dollar.

City Working To Restore Normalcy

The City of Friona has been expending all of their energy for the past two weeks in getting the city cleaned up following the June 2 tornado.

"We have just about finished our list of people with special tree problems. We have been over the city twice, and we're about to the point that we've done all the special work that we can do," said Paula Wilson, City Manager.

Besides large limbs, the city has had to haul entire trees, including some large ones, to the city landfill.

"We have also done about all we can do at the present time at the cemetery. We're waiting for all the stones to be placed upright, and then we'll go in and wash them," Mrs. Wilson said.

The city has benefitted for the past week in having the inmates from the state correctional facility at Tulia helping with the storm cleanup. The inmates helped clean up debris at the city's sewer plant, and in the city alleys, at the roadside park, and also picked up trash along U.S. Highway 60.

"They were a lot of help. We could not have accomplished what we have without them," the city manager said. "We had heard about this group having worked at Dimmitt. Sheriff Rex Williams

was instrumental in securing their services."

The city manager said that the prison furnished the required guards, one of whom is former Friona resident J. Vonne Fulks. The City of Friona fed the men their noon meal each day they were here. "They were all well-mannered. I think they were mostly minimum security prisoners," Ms. Wilson continued.

Regarding the sewer plant, Ms. Wilson said that the lagoons will need to be checked and dredged for things that may have been blown into them. The control building was also completely destroyed.

"We plan to apply for a grant between \$180,000 to \$200,000 to rectify these losses. There is an 'urgent need grant' that could be available," she continued.

This week, representatives from

the Small Businesses Administration, as well as FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Adm.) have been in Friona, as local and county leaders attempt to get the county declared a state and national disaster area.

County Judge Bonnie Clayton and the commissioners have been instrumental in passing an order in declaring the state of emergency. Several state agencies must give their approval, including the DPS, Emergency Management Dept., and if it clears, Judge Clayton will ask Governor George W. Bush to declare a State of Emergency. If he does, then he will be asked to ask President Clinton for a similar declaration on the national level.

If the process is approved by the state and/or nation, the local area would become eligible for state or federal funds.

Three Vets Worked Hard To Save Injured Animals

After the Friona Star came out last week, several people asked local veterinarian, Dr. Gary Cash, if he had ever seen cows fly. "No, but I've seen quite a bit of what happens to them after they've landed," he replied. The Friona Veterinary Clinic was acting as "an animal trauma center" for several days following last week's tornado.

"Physically, the animals around Friona fared a lot worse in the June 2nd tornado, than did the humans," according to the vet. He said he, personally, can account for ten large animals that were either killed outright or had to be put away after the disaster struck. He says there are probably some others he doesn't know about.

The FFA boys brought out a generator to the vet clinic on Friday night after the tornado. This allowed the clinic to operate a few lights, plus Coleman lanterns were used in some of the examining rooms.

The two other Farmer County veterinarians, Dr. Dale Schueler of Rhea, and Dr. Bret Whitten of Bovina, gathered at Dr. Cash's Friona Clinic to do what they could to help the injured animals which were being brought in from all around the Friona area.

The three vets and about 30

volunteer helpers worked on the animals in semi-darkness until about two o'clock Saturday morning. Gary said he was certainly grateful for all the help and the way everyone just pitched in to do whatever was needed to give the animals some relief.

Cash noted that the worst injuries were seen on animals which were located south of town, such as broken legs and severe lacerations. Animals north of town were pretty bruised up from the large hail that hit there.

South of town, Paul J. Smith had a horse that was killed and Yolanda Mendoza's horse had to be destroyed. Hicks Harris, brother of Hollis Harris, from Aqua Dulce, near Corpus Christi, had brought a horse up to be in the Clovis rodeo. He was keeping it at Hollis' pen located south of town and the animal ended up being pretty badly injured. Dr. Cash believes this may have been the horse that was seen flying through the air.

He said one of the oddest things that happened to the smaller animals was the poisoning of Ken Jeter's little Boston terrier. The Jeter well house had blown away and the dog ended up getting into some rat poison which had been in the well-house. You wouldn't think about a pet being poisoned as


a result of a tornado. Cathy Spencer's labrador had a pretty bad head injury from large hailstones. Both these animals survived, with a little help from caring humans.

Ever since the disaster struck Friona, Dr. Cash and his assistant, Randa Allen Copley, have been running what amounts to a clearing-house for lost animals.

Fences are down all over town and dogs are running around everywhere, totally bewildered about where they belong. Cash notes that they've had a lot of calls from people who have either lost or found someone's pet.

The Friona Veterinary Clinic came through with only some damage to the exercise pen fence. This is pretty surprising since the clinic is located only two blocks west of the Hi-Pro Feed mill which was all but demolished in the tornado.

Electricity was off at the clinic for almost 24 hours. Gary says he feels better about paying the electric bill now after seeing how hard the SPS crew worked to get electricity restored following the tornado. When he saw all the downed power lines, he thought it would be four or five days before they could get everything repaired and service restored to the town.

Twin Girls Born To R. Herrings


Richie and Kim Herring became the parents of twin daughters born Sunday morning, June 11, 1995 at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.




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Parmer County Food Stamp Use Increases

Information obtained through the Food and Nutrition Service of the Department of Agriculture shows that the number of persons receiving food stamps in Parmer County increased from 1,224 in July of 1992 to 1,289 in January of 1994 or by 5.3 per cent. This same source showed that the number of persons receiving food stamps in Texas had increased during this period from 2,440,576 to 2,647,310 or by 8.5 per cent.

During this same period, the number of food stamp recipients nationally had increased from 25.7 million persons in July of 1992 to 26.8 million persons by January of 1994. This represents a 4.4 increase on the national level.

Changes in the Food Stamp program are considered important because many experts feel that these mirror larger changes in the general economic climate. The reasons for this are fairly simple. More Americans use the Food Stamp program than any other means or income tested program. A significant number of persons are eligible for at least some food stamp assistance when they are not eligible for other means tested assistance.

An overall increase in the number of persons using food stamps during what is considered a period of economic recovery is highly significant. It indicates that a substantial number of people are having difficulty obtaining employment in good economic times.

It should be kept in mind that a large number of people who are eligible to receive food stamps do not. Most experts agree that if everyone who was eligible for food stamp assistance did receive it, the number of recipients would probably increase sharply.

An increase in food stamp recipients almost always indicates that household income has declined enough to either make more people eligible for food stamps or enough to make more people who were already eligible for food stamps feel that they have to receive them.

The Department of Agriculture regularly obtains and collates data from regional and local offices that directly administer the Food Stamp program to provide an annual report

detailing national and local food stamp usage. Preliminary information that will go into this report indicates that there have been some changes in the food stamp program over the period.

While the number of food stamp recipients in Parmer County increased over the period, it increased more proportionately than food stamp usage had increased nationally. At the same time, this data would indicate that approximately 12.3 per cent of the population of Parmer County received food stamps in January of 1993 compared to approximately 9.5 per cent of the national population. Some 13.8 per cent of the population of Texas received food stamps in January of 1993.

The total value of food stamps issued to residents of Parmer County increased from \$72,865 in July of 1992 to \$73,451 in January of 1994 or by 0.8 per cent. Nationally, the value of food stamps issued during the month of January, 1993 was \$1.827 billion or 4.7 per cent more than the \$1.745 billion value of the food stamps issued during the month of July, 1992. The value of food stamps issued in Texas had increased by 6.3 per cent from \$174,564,130 in July of 1992 to \$185,640,809 by January of 1994.

As noted, the Food Stamp program is a means or income based program. If the average value of food stamp assistance has increased, it is likely that incomes of food stamp recipients has generally declined. If the average value of food stamp assistance has declined, it is likely that incomes of food stamp recipients has generally increased.

The average value of food stamp assistance per person in Parmer County was \$56.98 in January of 1993 down from \$59.53 in July of 1992 or by 4.3 per cent.


Comparatively, the average value of food stamp assistance per person nationally had increased very slightly by 0.3 per cent from \$67.90 in July of 1992 to \$68.12 in January of 1993.

In Texas, the average value of food stamp assistance per person had declined from \$71.53 in July of 1992 to \$70.12 by January of 1994 or by 2.0 per cent over the period.

Card cuts back on food stamp fraud

Grocers report that food sales increased \$4.5 million in the Houston area with the introduction of the Lone Star card—a 'credit card' sized plastic card that replaces food stamps. Sales jumped because food stamps, which are paper coupons, were being traded illegally for non-food items. Unlike food stamps, the card—which will be available in 32 Metroplex and Gulf Coast counties June 1—cannot be trafficked illegally, and requires a personal identification number to purchase grocery items.

The Lone Star card will be used in these Texas counties as of June 1. It is scheduled to be implemented statewide in 1996.

In 1949, Jim Elliot was 22 years old when he wrote down these words: "He is no fool who gives what he cannot keep to gain what he cannot lose." When he was 20 years old he had prayed, "Lord make my way prosperous, not that I achieve high station, but that my life may be an exhibit to the value of knowing God."

In 1956, on a hot Sunday afternoon on a strip of white sand on the Curaray River, deep in Ecuador's rain forest, Jim Elliot and four other men awaited the arrival of a group of men from the tribe known to the world as the Aucas. Before four-thirty that afternoon, the waters of the Curaray flowed over the bodies of the five comrades, slain by the men they had come to win for Christ. In the world today, it is called a tragedy, but I wonder, do we understand Jim Elliot's creed, "He is no fool who gives what he cannot keep to gain what he cannot lose."

Jim Elliot's wife, Elisabeth Elliot, is now a well known author, teacher and speaker. She has written a book, "A Path Through Suffering," which I would recommend to everyone. In it, she deals with the subject of suffering loss in this present world.

Our community has just suffered loss from the most devastating tornado to strike our area. Was it God's will? An age old question, that has been covered, and recovered and covered again. So I think I will leave it alone.

One thing I am sure of, for those who will let Him, and I emphasize those who will let Him (because He does give us the freedom to make choices); if we will let Him, He will as Isaiah says replace camel thorns and briars with pine trees and myrtles, give garlands instead of ashes, oil of gladness instead of mourners tears, a garment of splendor for a heavy heart.

Nehemiah wrote of blessings where there had been cursing; the Psalmist wrote of dancing and joy where there had been laments and of pasture instead of wilderness.

Paul admonished Christians in Colossians 3:1, 2 and 3, "If ye then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God. Set your affection on things above, not on things of the earth. For ye are dead, and your life is hid with Christ in God."

Of recent forms.


We stand in awe

Upside down.






MAKE IT TWO BIG MACS AND A BASEMENT BOOTH!

Mike Hanes told us that his wife Claudia and daughter Christian had been to Amarillo. Claudia called him before starting home, to check on the weather, and Mike told her the last he'd seen, it looked like the bad weather was going to miss Friona.

Arriving at Hereford, the two decided to stop for a "Big Mac" at Hereford's McDonalds Restaurant. While eating their supper, the manager came out and told those in the restaurant that a tornado warning had been sounded, and requested everyone to file down into their storm shelter.

Those present followed the instructions in orderly fashion. McDonalds even had some videos to keep the youngsters occupied, until the cloud had passed over.

"I guess the message here is that if you're travelling and you get into some bad weather, you need to stop at a McDonalds," Hanes said.

WHICH CAME FIRST?

Ruth Tucker of Hi-Pro said that a filing cabinet from her former office was discovered in the rubble under Hi-Pro's destroyed mill.

The cabinet contained some vital records, including sales tax receipts, which she was glad to retrieve.

"Does this mean that the office was struck before the mill, so that the cabinet was moved before the mill crumbled?" Mrs. Tucker wondered. We'll probably never know.

IT WENT BY AIR TO AMARILLO!

Our longtime publisher friend Don Nelson of Dimmitt, shared this story which was a result of the tornado that hit Dimmitt the same evening of Friona's tornado:

The first home to be hit by the Dimmitt area storm was that of Bryce and Darlene Dowell, who live 2-1/2 miles south of Dimmitt. The

funnel cloud tore up the couple's garage.

The week following the storm, another Dimmitt lady, Jo Beth Mays, got a call from a relative in Amarillo who had picked up a piece of paper in her yard, on south Bell in Amarillo. It turned out to be a cancelled check, written in 1986 by the Dowells. The old checks had been stored in the Dowells' garage.

The report was that the check was crisp and new-looking; it wasn't wet or even crumpled. Went about 55 miles as the crow flies, or in "air miles."

IT'LL TAKE A LOT MORE REMODELLING!

Ron Davenport has had an office just east of Hi-Pro Feeds for the last several years. Earlier this year, Davenport hired builder Terry Copley to remodel his offices, which started out being the Monsanto Chemical office several years ago.

Less than a month ago Davenport had moved into his refurbished place. After the evening of June 2, he can't use the new office any more. In fact, he can't even find it.

"I need to reduce the price of so-and-so from (about \$45,000) to (\$30,000)," he told Vickie Copley. "That's a pretty good reduction," our Classified gal remarked.

"Well, they lost quite a bit of it in the tornado," the realtor replied.

HOW DO YOU PLEAD?

This one isn't local either, but we thought it a bit "unusual."

We heard from a reliable source who has contacts in Tulia that when the tornado threatened the Swisher County capital, several residents were turned away from going to the courthouse basement, which has long been a local shelter.

The reason was, the basement was filled with inmates at Tulia's correctional facility.

We're not sure how much taxes

the inmates pay to support the county.

I'VE GOT GOOD NEWS& SOME BAD, BAD NEWS

Tonya Stovell, recent graduate of Friona High School, has been the proud owner of a brand new sports car for about a month at best.

When her dad, Hi-Pro Animal Health manager Bill Stovell, heard about the approaching cloud laden with possible hail, he decided to put the new car in the "drive-through" at Ron Davenport's office (see separate story), since they didn't have garage space for the new vehicle.

He was about to do the same with the family's Suburban, when he heard about the tornado warning, and decided to head for the basement.

Later, after hearing that Hi-Pro was hit, he went out to check.

Returning to his daughter later, he said "Honey, I've got some good news, and some bad, bad news. The good news is, your new car doesn't have a single hail ding. The bad part is, it's flatter than a pancake!"

The car was hit by a pallet-load of compressed feed bags. The building that was used for shelter is the one that hasn't been located.

IT WAS NO JOKING MATTER

The day of the tornado, Kathryn and Julie Goddard were away from home. Jon was working late out in

the country. Papa David must have been taking an after supper nap.

Jon Goddard called his dad from the country at about 7 p.m., asking if he was all right.

"Why shouldn't I be?" David asked.

"Because Friona has been hit by a bad tornado," the son replied.

"That's a terrible joke to try to play on your father," David responded.

Jon finally convinced him the tornado was for real.



Prisoners Big Help In Cleanup

Eight inmates from the Tulia Unit of the Texas Dept. of Criminal Justice performed a part of their "community service" in a big way following Friona's tornado damage of June 2.

Sheriff Rex Williams called the Tulia facility and asked for assistance from the inmates. Trustees from the prison and volunteer staff members were in Friona from Thursday, June 8 through Thursday, June 15. The prison provided transportation, and the City of Friona fed the workers.

"They were guys who have proven trustworthy, and are happy to do almost anything to get out of their confinement," said Major William E. Walker of the Tulia unit. "We had a group whose regular job is the care of the park near Quitaque," Walker said.

Their "anything goes" was sorely tested on the inmates' first couple of days, when they worked to clean out the city's sewer lagoon, which received some debris from the storm. Later they cleaned the roadside park and picked up trash along the highway.

"We could have sent more men, but transportation and overseeing would have demanded more of us. We were sorry we couldn't get there the night it happened, but had been called by Dimmitt first. We were thinking about you folks in Friona already," Walker continued.

"The taxpayers pay our salaries, so we have an obligation to help them whenever it is possible.

The first couple of days, two officers, Jay Ward and Bobby Burks, accompanied the men to Friona. The rest of the time, correctional officer J. V. Fulks was in charge of the men. Fulks was born and raised in Friona, so it was a "homecoming" assignment for him.

Zane Polson, band director, stated, "These students have worked diligently to prepare for their various solo performances. I know how difficult it is to receive a Division I or II rating at the state level. Each judge may see and hear 35 to 45 performers a day for both days of the contest and only award one or two Division I ratings for each day."

"A Division II rating may be given only five to eight times a day. In fact, I have been teaching 14 years and it is the first time that all the students I have taken to the state contest have come away with medals. I am very proud of these students, the time and effort they have put into this work. Friona should be proud of the way they were represented this Memorial Day."

OUT HERE

"Why don't you move out here?"
 "What would I do out here?"
 "Well, there are plenty of jobs out here, for people who want to work."

That brief conversation took place last Thanksgiving while my wife and kids and I were visiting my mother and stepfather, Hannah and Harry Lookingbill for the holiday.

At the time, we lived in Tulsa, Oklahoma. I had been out of a job for a few months after six years of working for the same company.

And before that, twenty five years operating a travel agency in downtown Dallas, with a year in between living in Washington D.C.

On the way back to Tulsa, my wife Cindy kept staring out the window in silence when I tried to talk about moving out here to Friona. Finally she reclined her seat and went to sleep.

Not wanting to cause any trouble, I would mention the move to Friona once every week or ten days. I also got our two kids aside and asked them if they wanted to move and be near their grandmother. "Yay," they said. "Then go tell your mother", I encouraged.

As the weeks went on, she weakened under the pressure and told me to go to Friona first and look for a job and a place to live, then give her a call back if I found work. If things worked out, she promised that she and the kids would join me. The kids said "Yay."

So, my brother Rick brought his truck to Tulsa, loaded up some of my belongings, including my computer and a 100 year-old rocker, and I moved into a spare bedroom and closet at my mother's house. That was on Saturday, April 29. At least part of us were finally out here.

I went to the only bank and opened an account, ventured up to

11. And one more for extra thought: That my parents weren't "old fogies" after all!



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

Five Steps To A More Secure Retirement

Retirement planning isn't what it used to be.

In the past, retirees depended on Social Security to meet a large part of their retirement needs. In addition, most workers were provided with employer-funded pension plans that promised a solid retirement benefit. On top of that, Americans were able to save and invest more of their income for retirement—on average, seven per cent.

But times have changed. Social Security is anything but secure, and the huge number of baby boomers headed for retirement will undoubtedly strain the program beyond its limits. Today's workers must rely more on personal savings and investments for retirement income. Unfortunately, many individuals are saving less of their income than their parents did. In fact, today's workers only save about 3 per cent of their income.

What can people do to take control of their financial future? A recent edition of Better Investing magazine suggested the following five-step program for retirement planning.

1. Plan. Set realistic goals and a reasonable way to meet them. Even with a company pension, you should expect to need retirement savings of two-and-a-half to six times your pre-retirement earnings. That means if your annual income is \$50,000, you'll need a nest egg of \$125,000 to \$300,000 by age 65 to supplement pension and Social Security income.

2. Start early, and invest regularly. The sooner you start saving for retirement, the lower your regular deposits must be to meet your goal. To illustrate the impor-

tance of starting early, assume you want to accumulate \$12,000 and have found an investment offering an 8 per cent return. If you have only five years to reach your goal, you'll have to invest \$162 every month. If you have 15 years, it takes only \$34 a month. But start 20 years in advance of your goal, and you'll only have to invest \$20 each month.

In addition, investing regularly puts dollar-cost averaging to work, protecting you from fluctuating stock prices and interest rates. It also helps you benefit from compounding, letting your money grow at a faster rate.

3. Diversify. This is time-honored advice: Don't put all your eggs in one basket. Every investment carries some type of risk—some investments may risk principal, while others might risk earning power. But rarely do all types of investments rise or fall at the same time. By diversifying your money among different types of investments, you lessen the impact of a downturn in any one area.

4. Shelter. Placing some of your savings in tax-free or tax-deferred investments allows you to save more for retirement. Workers who have access to 401(k) plans should take full advantage of this retirement-saving vehicle by investing as much as possible. Individual retirement accounts (IRAs), municipal bonds, annuities and tax-exempt mutual funds are other ways to save more for retirement and spend less on current taxes.

5. Get advice. It pays to enlist the help of professionals to assist with long-range planning. Carefully select someone who can help you project future needs, set reasonable goals and suggest the proper investments to help meet them.

Each of these five steps requires serious thought and regular monitoring to be sure you're on the right track. But the reward for following the steps carefully and persistently can be the retirement lifestyle you've always dreamed of.
