Changes Approved

An amendment to the Brownfield ordinance governing General Telephone Company's charges for service was approved during City Thursday,

Councilmen acted on the request of Paul Farrar, here, that the amendment to the rate ordinance be approved as follows:

1. To change the charge for colored telephones from a one-time payment of \$7.50 to 25 cents a month.

This change, explained Farrar, will not in any wise affect the regular service charges for the black instruments. The colored tele phones are considered by the company to be a special service, and the additional charge is to compensate for the

New Schedule Approved 2. To set up a new schedule for installing and moving telephones, the main changes being to increase installation of residence instruments from \$3 to \$5; business installation charges from \$4 to \$7.50, and moving of inside telephones from \$1.50 to \$3.

3.To increase the monthly charges on residence extension telephone from 90 cents to \$1.

The new installation charges and the extension rate will become effective with the company's Feb. 21 billing, said Farrar. The change in charges for colored telephones became effective with approval of the amend-

Brownfield voters overwhelmingly approved a proposed \$300,000 classroom and athletic plant expansion Tuesday in what is believed to be a record ballot for a school bond elec-

A total of 935 residents braved freezing drizzle, as well as occasional sleet and snow, to ballot in the election.

The proposed \$190,000 athletic plant met the roughest sledding, gaining approval by only 132 votes. The other two proposals had little opposition.

Judges said voters crowded the single poll in the courthouse throughout most of the day - even when the weather was worst. Observers indicated the vote possibly is the largest in a school bond election in

Brownfield history. Balloting favored the eightclassroom expansion at Colonial Heights Elementary School by a 654 to 219 mar-gin. Athletic expansion was approved 508 to 376.

Voters approved proposition on the ballot, allowing the onds to be issued under SB 116. The approval, which was necessary to pass the other propositions, is expected to save the school district several thousand dollars through a beter interest rate. Proposition was approved 641 to 201.

The bond issue approval assures adequate classroom facilities here for at least another year and probably two years, according to school officials.

There's something else to consider. If you leave your boat in the water, keep your eye on the weather. Heavy rains may fill your boat. And a sudden rise in the lake level may cause you plenty of trou-ble, even sinking.

Once a year every boat own-er should take his boat out of the water and give it a good cleaning. Scum will collect on the bottom of any boat-fiberglass, metal or wood.




