## "MY TURN"

EVERYONE we've talked to the past couple of weeks has a tornado story to tell. . . whether it is about the recent big blow or one remembered from the past. Well, I've got one, too. We'll call it: "The Tornado That Didn't Happen"

When our first two kids got to be ages eight and five, or maybe they were nine and six, they thought they were getting too old to go to Pearl's World Famous Day Care Center. I was working at the paper about three days a week and Laura announced that she was perfectly capable of looking after her little brother, Stanley, after school. They would be at home unsupervised for about an hour and a half before I got home from work.

Back then (it was '69 or '70) in a small homey little town like this, you could leave your youngsters home alone for a couple of hours without any problems. Especially if they were good little kids and minded pretty well.

There was lots of good stuff for them to watch on TV every afternoon. Old reruns like: "I Love Lucy," "Andy Griffith," "Lassie," "Gilligan's Island," "Beverly Hillsbillies." They may seem silly now, but those shows taught some good lessons to kids, such as: it takes hard work to achieve your goals. . . being dishonest gets you in trouble. . . stick up for your friends. . . a little kindness never hurts; etc. You don't see those kinds of virtues displayed in the talk shows that fill the afternoon airways now.

Anyway, the TV was a good babysitter in those days and we didn't want them playing outside while we weren't at home.

It was getting on toward the blustery time of year. The Ralph Taylors had a neighborhood storm cellar in their back yard that was for everyone in our block to use. They lived two houses down and we had made the trip to the cellar a few times when there were storm warnings on TV.

One of our trips to the cellar had been in a driving rain and everyone sat around soaked to the skin in the damp cellar while we waited out the storm. So I fixed up a big straw tote bag that we called the "storm cellar bag" and it was sitting right beside the back door, ready for a quick emergency trip. It contained snacks, flashlights, a small umbrella, towels, and sweaters.

We left the kids strict instructions that if a tornado warning came on the television, they were to grab the bag and go immediately to the cellar in the Taylor's back yard. Do not pass go, etc. etc.

One bright sunny, not-a-cloud-in-the-sky afternoon, I got home from work about 5:30 p.m. and found no kids in the house.

"They're going to be in trouble if they're playing outside" I thought. No children in the back yard either. I checked with a few of the neighbor kids where I thought they might have gone to play. No luck. Just then I noticed the storm cellar door bag was missing from beside the back door and then I knew where they were.

I got to the Taylors place about a minute or two after Juanita Taylor discovered a couple of little waifs sitting in her cellar. They had brought along their favorite doll and teddy bear. Big sister was reading a story book to little brother to keep him from being scared.

"Honey, there's not going to be a storm. You two can go on home now," Juanita told them.

Laura swore the television announcer had said we were having a tornado and should take shelter. I switched on the TV and sure enough, the weatherman was breaking in on the regular program every few minutes to discuss dire weather happenings. . . but it was way north of here in Stratford and the Oklahoma Panhandle.

Now, when I remind the kids of this event, they are thoroughly embarrassed about it all. But we were pretty proud that they had heeded our instructions, and we were thankful that there wasn't actually a tornado that time.

## Crops Bear Brunt Of Storm Damage

Crops in the immediate Friona area, particularly north and northeast of Highway 60, sustained serious damage from the tornadic storm that battered the area on June 2.

The Star is still learning about losses connected to the storm, particularly those in the country, which are not as evident to most of us.

David Grimsley, who farms

northeast of Friona, said he had 2,000 acres of cotton hailed out that evening. He also lost grain dryers to the storm. Grimsley's corn was also hit a hard lick. He said he got some of the "hardball sized" hailstones at his place.

"Some of the big stones had small clusters of hail sticking to them," Grimsley said. This phenomenon was also reported by the

M. C. Osborns in their bad hailstorm.

Grimsley said he had replanted cotton on the land he farms, but his sons Jason and Jimmy have replanted to blackeyed peas. He decided to leave the corn in hopes it will "come out of it." Prior to the hail, the corn was up to a beautiful stand.

JeDon Gallman has a large field of wheat just southeast of town, which would be about ready to harvest, except for the fact that the field is littered with "junk" scattered by the tornado, including automobile parts and various other pieces of metal.

Curt Miller ASCS director, said that Gallman had insurance on his crop that included catastrophic losses, and might be able to burn off the wheat.

Chris Ingram has an entire section of land littered with debris from the tornado.

Miller said that 4,205 acres of cotton had been lost to weather thus far in 1995. The biggest percentage of this was in the Lazbuddie area. A big percentage have replanted to cotton, and will need a late freeze for their crops to mature.

"The good price of cotton has been a factor in their staying with cotton," Miller pointed out.

The biggest crop disaster for 1995 is the county's wheat crop. Parmer County had 22,680.7 acres of wheat declared as a disaster, mainly dryland and due to the drought.

Other crop losses in the county, with acreages, were corn, 272 acres, and sugarbeets, 115 acres.

### Disaster Aid For Local Farmers

In response to a request from Gov. George W. Bush, the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture has designated Castro County as a natural disaster area and has designated six contiguous disaster counties. The declaration makes those counties eligible for assistance through the Consolidated Farm Service Agency (CFSA).

Gov. Bush's request came on the heels of damages and losses caused by drought throughout 1994. The contiguous counties are Deaf Smith, Hale, Lamb, Parmer, Randall and Swisher.

The designation allows family-size farm operators in both primary and contiguous counties eligible to be considered for low-interest emergency loans from CFSA. Each application is considered on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available, repayment ability and other eligibility requirements.

Additional information and assistance is available throughout local CFSA county offices.

## Bass Residence Is Battered By Storm

One of the country residences sustaining tornado damage is one we're late to learn about.

The Estis Bass home, located six miles northeast of Friona, was battered by the heavy wind. The Bases were away from home at the time of the storm.

The tornadic wind ruined a sheet-iron barn, built about 1949. The structure had been sealed inside for the storage of grain. The winds ripped about half of the barn's roof off, Bass related.

The roof of the couple's home sustained damage, mainly by tree limbs which blew off their large trees. The home had trees around it, and this may have saved it from greater damage.

As it was, the couple came home to find several broken windows in the house, with mud and tree leaves inside the house. Bass' pickup was plastered by leaves and mud.

They had to cut a number of trees back in order to save them. One of their big pine trees, located by their storeroom, was laid over.

The tree was 28 or 30 years old, having served as a Christmas tree before being re-planted outside.

Two other cedar trees by the Bass' carport also blew over, and another evergreen tree lost large limbs.

The roof was blown off the family's wellhouse.

Bass said he had grazed out his wheat, so it was not affected, but his farm was badly littered by the remains of things the tornado had picked up and crushed, a bi-product for many of the farmers following the storm.

As of Monday, workers had picked up several loads of debris, and there was still a lot remaining.

Bass said that Butch Preston, who farms a mile north and one east of him, also sustained some damage.

"We appreciate the work by all of our family members, neighbors and friends who came to our rescue," Bass said. His and Zonah's further sentiments are contained in their "card of thanks" elsewhere in this issue.

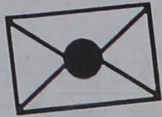
## Clean-Up/Repair Continues In City

I explained that most of them were upset at not knowing it is illegal to park on the shoulder of the road for non-emergency reasons. You can't believe everything you hear.

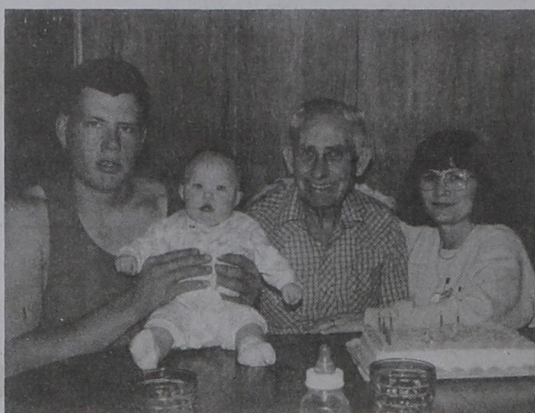

## Date Is Set For County Show Steer Validation

The annual Parmer County steer validation day will be held Wednesday, June 28 at Lazbuddie Feeders. Validation will start at 9 a.m.

Anyone planning to exhibit steers at the State Fair of Texas in September of 1995, Parmer County Junior-Livestock Show, Fort Worth, El Paso, San Antonio, Houston or San Angelo livestock shows must have their steers validated.

The validation process includes: taking a photograph of the steer, placing an ear tag on the steer and making a nose print of the steer.

Cattle have unique patterns of skin growth on their noses, much like a human fingerprint. This process allows show officials to verify the ownership of a steer at show time.

## Doug Watsons Have Baby Girl

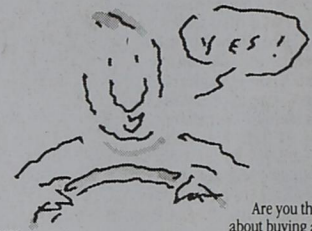
Millie and Doug Watson of Hamsville, Oklahoma are the parents of a baby girl born Sunday, June 18 at 4:13 p.m.

## Breast Screening Clinic Is Set Locally July 19

The Women's Center of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital will again conduct a Breast Cancer Screening Clinic in Friona at Parmer County Community Hospital, 1307 Cleveland Avenue on Wednesday, July 19.

Each participant at our screening will receive a breast exam and one-to-one instruction in breast self-examination by a Registered Nurse specially trained in breast cancer detection, and a mammogram by a mammography technician. Our program is certified by the FDA, American College of Radiology and the State Health Departments of Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico.

Breast cancer affects one in eight women. The key to winning

the battle against cancer is early detection by having an annual breast exam, mammogram and performing breast self-exam each month.

The American Cancer Society urges all women to have their first mammogram by age 40. Those who have a close relative with breast cancer or other risk factors may be asked by their doctor to have a mammogram at an earlier age.

The total cost of the screening is \$70.00. Financial aid is available for breast screening and mammograms to individuals who qualify.

# Board Approves Personnel Move

The Board of Trustees of the Friona Independent School District met in regular session on June 12, 1995.

Highlights of the meeting included:

\*The board approved the 1995-96 athletic and band budgets.

\*The board considered student insurance proposals for the 1995-96 school year.

\*The board also selected the CIGNA Insurance Group as the student insurance carrier for 1995-96.

\*The board discussed the District's Zero Tolerance Policy on fighting. During the 1994-95 school year, ten altercations occurred at Friona Junior High School and Friona High School. This compares to a total of eighteen altercations which occurred during the 1993-94 school year. This is a reduction of 45 per cent.

\*Superintendent Hal Ratcliff gave the following reports: (1) 1994-95 Average Daily Attendance was 1175; (2) Project S.M.A.R.T. (Summer Math and Reading Term) showed an enrollment of 59 students in grades one through five; (3) Summary of Senate Bill 1.

He also presented a personnel report:

\*Bryan Hanna will be the head track coach and assistant high school principal. Kenny Austin had asked to be re-assigned from the track position.

\*Shana Gibson will be the early childhood/special education teacher replacing Kristi Carr who will be the visually handicapped teacher for the Parmer County Special Education Cooperative.

\*Jennifer Harris will be the second grade teacher replacing Nancy Edelman, who is retiring.

\*Christy Barksdale will be the Spanish/ESL teacher at Friona High School. She will be replacing Susie Gonzales who resigned to accept a position at Dimmitt.

\*Tammy Gammon will be the chemistry teacher at Friona High School next year. She will be replacing Dee Anne Taylor who resigned to relocate in Las Cruces, New Mexico.

\*Brad Hale will be the junior high P.E. teacher and high school assistant coach. He replaces Mike Herbert who will be the district's alternative classroom teacher for 1995-96.

\*The board approved the 1995-96 school calendar as recommended by the District-Wide Improvement Council.

\*The board accepted the bid from Lewellen Construction Company to expand the auto mechanics building at high school for \$13,849.80. The accepted bid was the low bid presented.

\*The board set salaries for clerical positions, custodian and maintenance positions, bus drivers and cafeteria employees for the 1995-96 school year.

# Electric Co-op Reviews Proposals

Golden Spread Electric Cooperative received proposals on Friday, June 16, totaling 2,555 megawatts from bidders in response to a solicitation issued earlier by Golden Spread.

Golden Spread's solicitation was made in conjunction with an application filed with the Texas Public Utility Commission for notice of intent to apply for a certificate of convenience and necessity for construction of a new 400 megawatt generating plant for serving peak loads. The notice of intent application was approved by the Commission on April 17.

Both the plan to construct new peaking generation and the solicitation for alternative plans and proposals was made because area load forecasts show a need for additional capacity in 1998. In addition, Golden Spread is seeking to evaluate new opportunities within the electric utility industry for alternative power supply resources.

Scheduled for initial operation in early 1998, the plant proposed by Golden Spread would consist of four 100 megawatt, simple cycle gas turbine powered generating units. Natural gas will be used as the primary fuel.

A final site selection has not been made, but two preferred sites are currently under consideration. One site is located in Moore County south of Sunray, and the other site involves properties in Yoakum and Gaines counties east of Denver City.

The proposals received in response to Golden Spread's solicitation from other utilities and independent power suppliers for both new capacity and demand site control options, which could displace Golden Spread's plans for constructing new generation, are being evaluated by the independent consulting firm, R.W. Beck. R.W. Beck will also compare the proposals to Golden Spread's generation plan.

Golden Spread currently purchases all its wholesale power requirements from Southwestern Public Service Company and from West Texas Utilities Company for resale to eleven member systems.

Golden Spread's member systems are Bailey County Electric Cooperative (Muleshoe), Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative (Hereford), Greenbelt Electric Cooperative (Wellington), Lamb County Electric Cooperative (Littlefield), Lighthouse Electric Cooperative (Floydada), Midwest Electric Cooperative (Roby), North Plains Electric Cooperative (Perryton), Rita Blanca Electric Cooperative (Dalhart), South Plains Electric Cooperative (Lubbock), Swisher Electric Cooperative (Tulia) and Tri-County Electric Cooperative (Hooker, Oklahoma).

Golden Spread's member systems serve 94,000 retail customers in the Panhandle and on the South Plains of Texas and in the Panhandle of Oklahoma.

Others came to turn off the butane. Some checked windows and went to town to get material to cover the many broken windows.

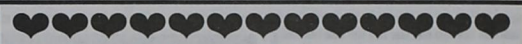
They stopped us as we drove into town from Tulsa where we had been with ill family members, to tell us we had received a lot of damage to our property.

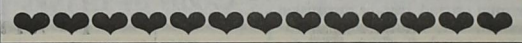

When World War II broke out, Collier joined the U.S. Navy, where he was a member of the Naval Air Corps and worked in pilot training. He served in Okinawa, and flew twin-engine bombers. He said he flew patrol missions for the most part.

Collier said that his outfit had orders to drop leaflets on the Japanese people, to warn them of the impending atom bomb, but due to the fact that many of their planes were out of commission, they aborted that mission.

"The next thing we knew, they had dropped the first bomb, and very soon thereafter the war was over. I was on the island of Guam when the war ended," Rev. Collier said.

Following the war, Collier worked in the oilfields in New Mexico. He was working as a pumper for Sinclair Oil Co. when he surrendered to preach in 1950.

He attended Oklahoma Baptist University in Oklahoma City, working at Tinker Air Base to finance his studies. He pastored 13 churches and started four new ones. All of the churches Collier pastored were located in Oklahoma except for the Sherwood Baptist Church in Odessa.

The kids already have more friends in three weeks than they had in three years in Tulsa. But that is why we moved out here.

# LIBRARY CORNER

By DARLA BRACKEN

When asked recently for suggestions about what important issues might have been overlooked by the school curriculum, I thought about it hard for several days.

Finally, the single most important thing to me that is not being addressed, at least as much as it used to be, was citizenship and responsibilities of citizenship. As the writer of a recent news magazine article put it: "The 4th R"--reading, writing, arithmetic and responsibility.

Remember your own grades in citizenship...and how important they were to your parents!! Our behavior in school is an indicator of our future behavior in the world.

America, and indeed the world, needs responsible, caring citizens. Citizens who take pride in their country, their flag, their communities' homes, and their own behavior and whose actions demonstrate that pride.

It is easy to take advantage of the benefits of a free, Christian society; it is more difficult to take responsibility for preserving these freedoms.

Take just one small example: LITTER. There are receptacles for litter everywhere, but not many people use them; they throw litter down wherever they happen to be. Most "civilized" people do not litter their homes in this manner; why

should we allow our world and our planet to be littered so?

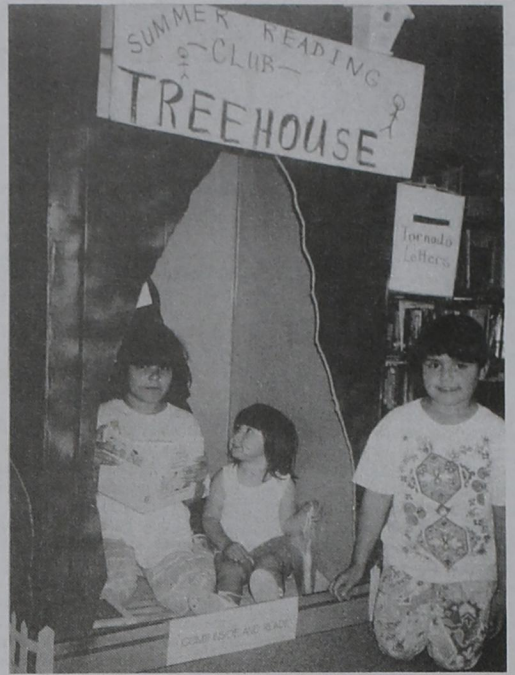
My eightieth birthday family dinner and reception were both very enjoyable.

## Global Investing vs. International Investing

You've probably seen the TV commercials showing express-mail delivery to ranchers in the Australian outback, or turban-clad businessmen discussing computers in the mountains of Tibet.

The world is getting smaller. Advances in technology and communications, combined with the growing economies of more and more nations, are enabling an increasing number of companies to do business throughout the world.

Investors are benefiting from this trend: Today, they can choose from an ever-growing array of international and global investments. With this type of investing, it's vital to fully understand what you're buying. One of the first things to know about "global" or "international" investing is that even though these terms are used interchangeably, they actually have different meanings.

Global investments are companies domiciled or doing business in foreign countries and the United States. A global mutual fund will buy shares of companies anywhere in the world. International investments, on the other hand, are companies that are domiciled strictly in foreign countries.

In most cases, where a

company is headquartered makes the difference. For example, Procter & Gamble, which is headquartered in the United States and distributes its products worldwide, is considered a global investment. However, if you buy the common stock of a Japanese company headquartered in Tokyo, you are an international investor, because the company is domiciled in a foreign country.

This may appear to be nothing more than semantics, but international and global investments can offer different levels of risk and reward.

You may be a global investor if you invest in a company that has sales in a foreign country or a mutual fund that buys shares of such companies. Numerous American corporations—many of them large and well-known—derive substantial income from foreign sales. U.S. companies regularly expand into other countries not only through sales but also by capital investments such as factories. Companies such as Gillette, McDonald's and Coca-Cola earn significant revenue outside the United States.

Investors willing to assume a little more risk can invest internationally by purchasing mutual funds that invest in foreign-headquartered companies. This offers the opportunities of foreign investing combined with the protection of diversification.

International investing also can be done by buying individual shares of foreign companies. The simplest way to do this is to purchase American Depository Receipts (ADRs), which are negotiable securities traded just like common stock on U.S. securities exchanges. They are issued by U.S. depository banks that handle all administration, pay dividends in U.S. dollars after deducting applicable taxes, and provide all statements and reports. More than 900 ADRs are available to U.S. investors. Many of the ADRs that trade on the New York Stock Exchange are well-known companies.

However, individual international stocks—even through ADRs—carry more risk than U.S.-based companies. Currency fluctuations can have a significant impact as evidenced by stocks that were subject to the sudden and drastic devaluation of the Mexican peso earlier this year. Consult a financial professional for assistance with global and international investments, especially ADRs.

More and more investors are taking advantage of today's worldwide markets. If you want to be a part of this trend, be sure to understand the differences between international and global investing—and the risks and rewards of each—before you invest.

## YOUR EYES

### How Baby Learns To See



A new mother told us recently how she and her baby stared at each other right after the infant was born. We know what the mother saw—but the chances are the baby's view was not quite so clear.

Truth is, babies take some time before they can see and focus properly. At the beginning, the child might use one eye at a time or try to use both eyes to look at different objects. It may be a month before the infant learns to focus both eyes at the same object.

Babies first focus on close-up objects, moving the head to follow them. By a year, both eyes should move together. If they don't—if either eye seems to wander—it's wise to see your eye professional right away; early treatment is most effective.

Can you "teach" your baby to see? Not really, but you can provide interesting things to look at. Many parents provide a mobile over the crib for visual stimulation, or soft toys the baby can reach for. Babies love new things to see and new friendly faces to smile at.
