### MORE THAN 500 TAKE PART IN ONE-DAY EVENT

#### '30,000 New Baptists by 1964' Is Emphasized During Annual Session Thursday of District 9 Baptist General Convention

"Thirty-thousand new Baptists by 1964," was the goal stressed by Dr. Arthur B. Rutledge, secretary of stewardship and direct missions of Baptist General Convention of Texas, as he spoke to the 24th annual session of District 9 Baptist Convention, meeting Thursday in First Baptist Church, with the Rev. Wayland Boyd of Crosbyton, president, in charge.

In his morning sermon, on home missions, Dr. Rutledge told of the "30,000 Movement," originated in 1956 for the advancement of the Baptist religion in America. The drive is forwarded toward the 50 million unchurched Americans.

Dr. Rutledge gave these figures: "By 1964 we need 10,000 new Baptist churches, 170,000 more Baptists annually, which means 17,000 more in Texas alone."

The 1964 expiration date also

marks the 150th anniversary of the beginning of the first Baptist Convention. The speaker challenged, "It is our obligation and privilege to serve in this great program, and at times we will be asked to make needed loans or supplement salaries in order to assist new churches."

In an afternoon message, Dr. Rutledge stressed foreign mission work and revealed, "Nine per cent of the world's population speak English and 94 per cent of the Christian workers and 96 per cent of the money used for Christian work is going to that nine per cent. That leaves only 6 per cent of the workers and 4 per cent of the money to be used for the other 91 per cent of the world's population."

V. F. Forderhase of Dallas, music director, led the session in singing the "30,000 Movement" theme song, "To God Be The Glory."

The Rev. E. K. Shepherd of

Muleshoe told of the security of the believer in his convention sermon.

A group from Baptist General Convention of Texas, located in Dallas, gave instructions for two sessions of divided groups for specific training: They were Miss Eula Mae Henderson, WMU; Hooper Dilday, training union; Andrew Allen, Sunday school; L. H. Tapscott, brotherhood, and V. F. Forderhase, music.

Others taking parts on the program were Dr. Franklin E. Swanner of Plainview, the Rev. Howard G. Lyons of Plainview, Robert Lacey of Hereford, the Rev. Cecil Meadows of Earth and the Rev. Riley Fugitt of Spur.

At the closing session the Rev. Mr. Boyd was re-elected as president of District 9 of Baptist General Convention of Texas. Elected to serve with him were Mrs. Glen Wilson of Wolfforth, secretary; Doyle

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### REMEMBERS BASKETBALL IN SNOW AND SAND

#### The S. W. White's Have Supported Meadow School Activities And Athletic Teams 37 Years; Ex-Students Honor For Loyalty

The inscription on the bronze plaque reads: "In appreciation of Mr. and Mrs. S. W. White for their loyal support to the Meadow Public Schools."

This prized possession is the only such honor bestowed on an individual by the Meadow Ex-students Association.

Why was Mr. and Mrs. White, who with the exception of three of 37 years, have lived three miles east of Meadow, chosen for this unique honor?

Well, let me tell you about this wonderful couple and maybe you can guess.

It is a known fact with sports enthusiasts in Meadow and surrounding areas, that Mr. and Mrs. White have attended more sports events and school activities, in which Meadow teams have participated, possibly than any two other individuals combined - regardless of age.

Right now is a good time to tell you their age. He is 76 and she is 72. As already demonstrated, it will take more than birthdays to keep them away from a game where, as Mr. White put it, "Our kids are playing."

Mr. and Mrs. White were born in Eastland County and attended schools there.

Mr. White chuckled and said, "She was a town girl - and I was a country boy."

In half defense, Mrs. White corrected her husband and related that she lived in the country and attended a town school.

Their first memory of any sport was a game called Town Ball. Sides were chosen and each player was eliminated by how far he could hit the small wool sized rubber ball. "An 'eye' was similar to a home

run. A player could transmit his "eye" to another player if he desired.

**No Competitive Sports**

There were no competitive sports in the two-teacher wooden school house in the Desdemonia community and no grades as we know them today.

"A student was advanced according to his ability and was not uncommon for one to stay in one reader - two or three years," commented the gray-haired Mrs. White.

When Mr. White was 10 or 12 years old, a stranger, versed in baseball, moved into the community and organized a team. The first baseball diamond was made in his grandfather's pasture.

In early days youngsters either walked or rode horseback to entertainment held in adjoining communities. Mr. White attended one of these

## WOULD SAVE MANY USEFUL LIVES

### Driver Training Is A Must

The U. S. public school system has been accused of wasting the taxpayers' money teaching such courses as ballroom dancing, "personality adjustment," how to get along with the crowd, and so on.

While some courses of that kind may be of value — but not if they interfere with fundamentals — there is one course set up in some Texas high schools that seems to yield real dividends in a pretty important aspect of modern living: the art of survival.

It is driver education. Catch 'em young and train 'em good applies in this case. Many high schools carry on this work, but some authorities think it should really start in the junior highs, since some kids under special circumstances start driving legally between 14 and 16, and a great many others start driving illegally under 14.

The Texas Federation of Women's Clubs has been campaigning for high school driving instruction for some years and the best authority in the state in such matters, the Public Safety Commission, seems to think such training pays off, since it will issue a driving license to any youngster who has completed an approved course.

The Federation thinks the time has come to

take driver education out of the experimental, haphazard, take-it-or-leave-it stage, and make it a permanent part of our public school system.

It would do this by inserting in the upcoming Gilmer-Aiken legislation a provision for driver education teachers. This would enable every boy and girl to learn the art of survival in traffic from qualified teachers, and raise up a new generation of better, safer and more responsible drivers.

This, it seems to us, is about as far from boondoggling as you can get, since experience has shown good driver training in high school really pays off.

You can hardly pick up a paper that you don't see where one or more high school students have lost their lives in traffic. The nation can ill afford this wastage of potentially good and useful citizens, the very hope of our future.

Ninety-nine per cent of our school boys and girls will become drivers some day. A thorough, well-balanced course in driving under competent teachers not only teaches them how to handle a motor car and familiarizes them with rules and regulations, but inculcates in them a sense of responsibility at the wheel they might never acquire otherwise.

FFA SAVES PARK

Many times during the years that I've been writing this column, deference has been paid to the Future Farmers of America, known more familiarly and briefly to us as the FFA. Too much praise cannot be given this organization whose guiding philosophy is: "Learning to do; doing to learn; earning to live; living to serve."

The FFA is comprised of young men studying vocational agriculture in high schools. Its purpose is to advance vocational education in the public schools; to create and develop interest in agriculture and country life. From its members in the past have come, and in the future will come, young men thoroughly grounded in the profession of farming, equipped to maintain agriculture on a sound, business basis.

Through individual and group activities on local, state and national levels, boys are given incentive and opportunity to develop not only their farming talents, but even more important, character and good citizenship.

The emphasis of the FFA is on "individualism" — each member must enter some active farm enterprise on

farmers that doesn't cost the taxpayers any money, which he receives guidance from his vocational teacher. He also is taught farm mechanics, soil conservation, safety measures, electrification and public speaking—all of the things that will make for a well-rounded farmer and citizen. Because FFA operates its training courses, this nation need not feel any apprehension about the future of farming in America.

And now there has been brought to my attention an accomplishment of FFA right here in my own community which is off the beaten track of its regular performances. Because that organization has functioned at Largo High School for several years, in the near future the citizens of this community will have available for swimming, picnics, sports of many kinds, playgrounds for children and a general recreational center, a beautiful landscaped park.

Here's the story: Some years ago Pinellas County in which

Fish hatcheries of Texas now are ready to provide as many fish as will be needed to stock the new lakes that have become filled with fall and winter rains.

There is a mistaken idea on the part of many people about these hatcheries. Because our hatcheries have done a great deal of stocking of some of our major lakes and streams in the past, there is a tendency on the part of many persons to think that this work is a continuing project.

This is not so. Today our fish-hatchery system works differently. There is a definite need for fish hatcheries in Texas. But except in unusual cases they do very little stocking of

big lakes.

They have discovered that poor catches are, in many cases, the result of overpopulation of a lake. Restocking just adds to the seriousness of the situation.

On the other hand, Texas with its myriads of small lakes, created on farms and ranches and across dry creek beds, boasts numerous places for heavy hatchery production. Each time one of these small lakes is built and fish are stocked, it provides fishing for a few more people.

These are private lakes, of course, but they furnish very fine fishing for those who are lucky enough to get permits to fish in them. In turn that takes the pressure off of public waters to a great degree.

Texas may be shy on public lands for hunting, but it certainly isn't shy on public waters for fishing. Except for far West Texas and the Panhandle there are fine lakes within a short drive for everyone. And Texans really are using them. Ditto for the Gulf Coast.

Launching Ramps Needed

One of Texas' greatest needs today, insofar as outdoorsmen are concerned, is for more and better launching ramps so as to provide greater access to these fine lakes and the Gulf Coast waters. With so many more boats and a rapidly increasing number of fishermen, it is becoming more and more difficult to find places to

which to build the first 6,000 feet of 18,000 feet of road to be built on the property. Shortly after the building of the road will get under way. As soon as it is completed several organizations have agreed to provide the several recreational features.

So, because of the FFA's intervention, the citizens of Largo, Florida and vicinity will soon have available a beautiful park and recreational center. And the FFA, according to William E. Moore, teacher of vocational agriculture at Largo High School, will take care of the beautification of the park, planting trees and shrubs at the proper time—at no cost of the taxpayers.

Largo gets a park and the FFA boys have saved for themselves an area in which to continue their forestry activities.

launch boats, without having to spend hours awaiting your turn.

Building new launching ramps, and improving the old ones, is a job that might well be undertaken by local groups, or the city, or the county. It also is possible that the State Highway Department might be able to build a few access spots where highways cross some of our streams.

Certainly all of us agree that it is important that state gasoline tax funds be used to build roads for the use of those who pay the tax. It must be remembered, however, that a trailer and a boat drain much gasoline from the car. Then once the boat is in the water it becomes a motor fuel consumer too.

While there is a tax exemption on non-highway use of motor fuel, it is seldom if ever claimed by the small boat owner. For that reason our road builders might look ahead just a little and assist in providing access.

Sonic Fishing Idea

It is interesting to note how some of the primitive methods that we use to catch fish eventually are improved upon—then placed on the counter to sell. For instance, we have, for a long time, been rigging up jigs on foot-long leaders to follow after deep running plugs.

They were good for both white and black bass.

Now comes Heddon with an improvement on the idea. It is the firetail sonic. It makes a noise the fish can hear, and has a tail section that glows. This is supposed to irritate the bass and if he hits a little short, he still gets hooked.

This firetail won't be a particular menace to the fish population — especially in Texas, because we have so many fish. By the time it gets to working good the fish will get smart and then someone else will come up with something new to lure the fish and fishermen.

Sand Bass Active

Sand Bass now are running in all their glory. We've seen some tremendous catches made within the last couple of weeks. They are especially active where fresh water creeks are flowing into lakes, and in the tailraces just below some of the big dams.

They are hitting on everything. Some like minnows. Others take spoons or plugs.

There has been some fine sand bass fishing in the Rio Grande. Sandies from Falcon Lake have gone up the river

## BEHIND AMERICAN BUSINESS SCENES

### America's Higher Living Standard Reflected In 'New Leisure Mass' Replacing Old 'Leisure Class' of Several Decades Ago

NEW YORK — The average American today earns many more dollars for fewer hours than he did a decade or two ago — the countereffects of minor recessions and inflation notwithstanding.

This has created a new "leisure mass" to replace the old "leisure class." A new multi-billion-dollar industry has sprung up to fill the needs of more people with more time on their hands.

Whether you're an audiophile, a bird-watcher, a model train builder, a bowler or a hunter or fisher, you're the darling of that segment of U.S. industry catering to the high cost of leisure.

What your pursuit of fun means to the investing public has been pointed up by the New York Stock Exchange in reporting on the market values of 20 leisure-time stocks.

These 20 Big Board issues scored advances in the last 10 years ranging from slightly under 11 per cent by an athletic goods manufacturer to such incredible gains as 1,129 per cent by an outboard motor maker and 1,285 per cent by an electronic organ producer.

The value of one bowling equipment manufacturer's stock went up 67.2 per cent in 10 years. A photographic equipment issue was up 199.8 per cent, power tools 211 per cent, model trains 162.5 per cent.

And, whatever the anti-TV crowd may say, the new leisure-enjoying masses are buying and reading more books, magazines and newspapers. The one publisher's stock listed among the Exchange's 20 leisure-time shares scored a handsome 607 per cent gain.

WHIRLY-JETS — While helicopters are not yet within the reach of the average leisure-time pursuer, their adaptability to civilian and commercial uses have been steadily improving, especially with improvements in turbine powered engines. One of the most versatile is the French-developed turbine-powered Alouette II, recently demonstrated on a cross-country tour of the U.S.

Now comes word that Republic Aviation, which has worked almost exclusively on military contracts in the 27 years of its existence has formed a separate helicopter division to handle sales service and eventual production of the Alouette II on this continent through a licensing arrangement with the French company Sud Aviation.

In addition to its obvious military uses (the French Air Force has a fleet of them) the Alouette II has many features to appeal to the U. S. commercial market. Its 360-horsepower gas turbine engine permits instant takeoffs, eliminating lengthy warmups.

It can be equipped with wheels, skids, skis or floats to permit landings anywhere. It can be used in fire fighting, as a civilian air ambulance, as a crane to lift cumbersome materials, as a camera stand for aerial movie work, as a tow or tug for stranded ships, as an aerial bus or even as a ranch wagon to herd cattle and patrol fences, pipe lines, make heavy aerial deliveries to inaccessible places, including high mountain peaks. Its rotolift principle gives top performance at high altitudes, and last year an Alouette set an altitude record of 26,931 feet.

THINGS TO COME — A new beverage thermometer eliminates the burnt-tongue problem. Its measurement scale indicates a "safe" drinking zone. . . . For children who refuse to swallow an aspirin tablet, there's a new raspberry-flavored liquid medication on the market in a non-spill bottle. . . . You'll soon be able to spray barbecue sauce on your hamburgers and steaks. A new product in an aerosol container is ejected in a non-foaming spray for use as a sauce or a baste.

NON-GOVERNMENT AID — One of America's most vexing problems today — and certainly one of the most expensive — is our over-production of farm goods.

This over-production, which is encouraged by several of our national farm laws, is costing the taxpayers billions of dollars a year.

The Schliebe's met while on a train fleeing from Prussia, when it was taken over by the Russians. Due to improper foods and living conditions on displaced people, they developed tuberculosis. They now have two children, a boy, Burkhardt, is eight and a girl, Margaret, is seven.

The son has been in a hospital with TB of the bone for the past two years. The family seldom is allowed to visit him. They did see him Christmas and were surprised to find all the decorations in red. Mrs. Schliebe said, "We always use white for our decorations."

Schliebe has been cured and is working as a butcher. Mrs. Schliebe, in a sanitarium, is preparing to go home in another month. Margaret, who has been living with an aunt, will be allowed to come home and they have hopes of bringing Burkhardt home soon.

**Praises Gifts**

Mrs. Schliebe's letters are filled with praise and thanks for the clothing, jewelry, toys and other things sent by the club. Many of the toys, though inexpensive, are, "Put up until the children are old enough to appreciate and care for them."

She is loud in her praise of silk hose. "They are so pretty, I must put them away to wear in the summer." She added that their hose were coarse and black.

Speaking of her daughter's happiness over a gift, she wrote, "She was out of her house she was so happy."

Recently she wrote in regard to the way they celebrated Christmas. "Santa Claus does not bring us gifts on Christmas as he does in America. The Christ Child brings the gifts but Santa Claus visits all our children on Dec. 6, to see if they have been good and deserve presents."

The Willow-Wells HD Club reports, "This has been our most interesting project and it is one that creates new interest with each box sent or letter received."

While all of the family were at home, they raised and milked registered Jersey cows. Only recently, Mr. White sold the last milk cow — and as he said, "Got in style and started buying milk."

All nine children attended Meadow school. Five graduated from high school and three attended college. The entire family took an active part in sports, while in school. Basketball and track were their favorite sports.

All nine children still are living and are as follows: Cecil White of Lubbock, Mrs. Lee Walker of Meadow, Carlton White of Alamogordo, N.M., Clayton White of Lubbock, Horace White of Midland, Mrs. Fred Westmoreland of Crane, Mrs. Robert Stokes of Lubbock, and S. W. White Jr. of Hearst.

The first football game Mr. White attended was when Horace was playing with Texas Tech. He said, "I was sorta like the old lady who after

much persuasion, attended a game to see her grandson perform.

Mr. White hinted that Progress and prosperity have taken their toll on life and sports too. Rules are different and our nice gymnasiums are a fairly tale compared to the old outdoor courts where the fans and players either froze to death or frequently were blinded by a West Texas sandstorm.

Mr. and Mrs. White admit they still like sports but mostly attended because they like competition and get a kick out of seeing grandchildren, great-grandchildren, and the neighbors' kids participate. They both have excellent memories for recalling former players, games and scores.

Mr. White stated that people are not as enthusiastic over sports as they used to be. Years of observation have taught him that temper and sportsmanship just don't mix.

He added that he believed many students, especially boys, stayed in school to play ball and therefore got an education, where otherwise they would have quit. He also emphasized the importance of "readin' writin' and rithmetic" and said perhaps some, if not all schools were getting over balanced sports-wise.

Reading from a history written by Mr. White in 1946 of the Meadow girls basketball teams this motto is found: My motto has always been: Win if you can do it with fair play and good sportsmanship, for there are principals involved and after school days are over, opponents should be the best of friends and neighbors—they have a long, long time to live together. He should know—he's seen it occur.

### PRODUCT ALONE NOT ENOUGH

#### It Took Advertising To Sell the Item

Our ever-improving standard of living did not "just happen." New wealth is created only when mass sales follow the development of a new product. Low-cost production would not otherwise be possible.

For instance, five years ago, a manufacturer set out to develop a material which could be blended with cotton to produce a new and stronger fabric. Four years later the material was perfected. Tests showed that it would double the wear-life of cotton clothing, while increasing the cost only 20 per cent.

This was the first step toward new wealth. However, it did not mean actual wealth until the more economical fabric reached the customer. The manufacturer found that clothing companies would not use the new product until consumer demand had been stimulated.

At this point, advertising became vital to the success of new material. For it was only through advertising that public demand could be created. A general educational campaign on the value of the new goods was started.

However, the public did not receive benefits until local retail advertising finally began to sell shirts and trousers made from the fabric.

New wealth actually was created when local newspaper advertising caused farmers and carpenters to buy work-clothes which last twice as long and which cost little more

than they formerly paid. The manufacturers, the sellers and the consuming public all receive direct economic gain when advertising introduces a new and better product.

## Texas Draft Totals 660 For March Call

The Texas draft call for March calls for 660 men for Army service, according to Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director. Colonel Schwartz also announced that Texas draft boards will forward men for pre-induction mental and physical examinations in March. Exams for February were announced previously. The state's March call for induction is the biggest since July 1957, when the monthly quota was 661. The February call was 641. "Draft calls now are running about double what they were in the latter half of 1957," said Schwartz. Draft boards will forward 2,000 men in March for the pre-induction examinations, the same number scheduled for February also were examined in January. In the last half of 1957, only a few men were examined. The March quota will be filled with men who are at least 22 years old on March 1, with the exception of volunteers or delinquents, who may be younger.
