Brief History of Terry County Farm Bureau

TCFB was born in 1932, when Texas farmers sent representatives to Washington to confer with Roosevelt concerning the depression. The president told the group, "Go home and organize." Thus was Farm Bureau born.

Wood E. Johnson, R. D. Jones Sr., Bill Tilson and Homer Winston were prime movers in the organization days, and served at presidents of TCFB in the early years.

In 1951, because of a sudden increase in membership, an office was opened at 604 West Main, with Miss Eleanor Miller, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Miller of 1301 East Cardwell, as secretary, and Ernest Sears, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kely Sears of Gomez, as service agent.

Kelton Miller succeeded Sears in 1952, and Joe Sullivan succeeded Miller last year Other presidents have been J. T. (Jake) Fulford, Eulice Farrar and Carl Hogue.




