#### Training Is Slated Here

A five-day food service training course will start here Monday in South Plains Health Unit, according to Homer E. Barnes, city sani-

The course, which is open to food handlers in the home and business, will be taught by Harry A. Smith of Austin, a former state food and drug inspector. Sessions are slated from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Barnes said the course is open to everyone who is interested in correct sanitary procedures in food handling. 'This course will be just as important to the housewife as to the person who works in a cafe or other food-handling business," he said.

The sanitarian noted that more than 25 diseases may be spread through carelessness in food service. "This means in the home as well as in grocery and eating establishments," he added.
